Council OKs new city manager salary, benefits

The Cleveland City Council has unanimously approved a salary and benefits package for Joe Fivas, the incoming city manager.

Fivas will begin Aug. 11. His starting salary will be \$140,000.

A benefits package, very similar to that of the previous city manager, was presented by Councilman Dale Hughes, human resources director Jeff Davis and city consultant Larry Wallace. Fivas has accepted the package and has begun house hunting in Cleveland.

The benefits package includes health insurance, \$350 per month car allowance, three weeks of vacation plus accrual at a rate of 1 week per

year and 50 days of sick time with more accruing over time. He will also be able to join a local civic club with dues paid by the city. Dues for professional organizations, such as the Tennessee City Management Association, would also be covered. Moving costs will be covered by the city of Cleveland.

"We had a lengthy meeting with Mr. Fivas. I think we have a winner in Mr. Fivas," Hughes said.

He described Fivas as "a man of energy. I feel that he is a man of insight."

Hughes reminded the Council that everyone city consultant Wallace spoke to who had worked with Fivas said he has strong abilities to be city manager.

"[My wife] Sandra and I spent a lot of time with

received more than 60 applications, which were scored by a committee appointed by the City Council. After combining scores to get a top 10, the committee discussed the candidates with consultant James Mercer of The Mercer Group and a

family over the weekend, and the family was looking forward to moving here," said Mayor Tom Rowland.

Vice Mayor George Poe said he felt the Council had met the time frame that the residents of the city wanted to see.

Councilman Richard Banks thanked the initial search committee for its work.

The city manager position was also named. Fivas became one of the finalists from the alternates list when one of the original five withdrew, after accepting a position elsewhere. Candidates had interviews via video conferencing before the final four were brought in for face-to-face interviews. One of the final five withdrew their application.

During his interview, Fivas had commented on Cleveland being a good place for families. Fivas also commented on the city staff. "Cleveland has very skilled department heads, and my management style is for them to handle any internal conflicts within departments, and only step in when there is a conflict that needs

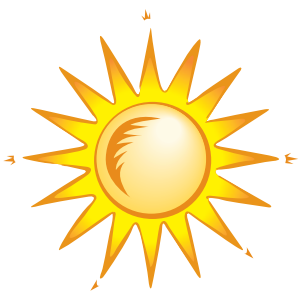

Goodbye to a legend

Pat Summitt, the lady behind the Lady Vols, dies following 5-year battle with dementia

KNOXVILLE (AP) — Pat Summitt, the winningest coach in Division I college basketball history who uplifted the women's game from obscurity to national prominence during her 38-year career at Tennessee, died Tuesday morning. She was 64.

With an icy glare on the sidelines, Summitt led the Lady Vols to eight national championships and prominence on a campus steeped in the traditions of the football-rich south until she retired in 2012.

Her son, Tyler Summitt, issued a statement Tuesday morning saying his mother died peacefully at Sherrill Hill Senior Living in Knoxville surrounded by those who loved her most.

"Since 2011, my mother has battled her toughest opponent, early onset dementia, 'Alzheimer's Type,' and she did so with bravely fierce determination just as she did with every opponent she ever faced," Tyler Summitt said. "Even though it's incredibly difficult to come to terms that she is no longer with us, we can all find peace in knowing she no longer carries the heavy burden of this disease."

Summitt helped grow college women's



basketball as her Lady Vols dominated the sport in the late 1980s and 1990s, winning six titles in 12 years. Tennessee — the only school she coached — won NCAA titles in 1987, 1989, 1991, 1996-98 and 2007-08. Summitt had a career record of 1,098-208 in 38 seasons, plus 18 NCAA Final Four appearances.

She announced in 2011 at age 59 that she'd been diagnosed with early onset dementia. She coached one more season before stepping down. At her retirement,

Summitt's eight national titles ranked behind the 10 won by former UCLA men's coach John Wooden. UConn coach Geno Auriemma passed Summitt after she retired.

When she stepped down, Summitt called her coaching career a "great ride."

Summitt was a tough taskmaster with a frosty glower that could strike the fear of failure in her players. She punished one team that stayed up partying before an early morning practice by running them until they vomited. She even placed garbage cans in the gym so they'd have somewhere to be sick.

Nevertheless, she enjoyed such an intimate relationship with her players that they called her "Pat."

Known for her boundless energy, Summitt set her clocks ahead a few minutes to stay on schedule.

"The lady does not slow down, ever," one of her players, Kellie Jolly, said in 1998. "If you can ever catch her sitting down doing nothing, you are one special person."

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Life Care motion granted for 90-day extension

Settlement eyed by legal teams

U.S. District Judge Harry S. Mattice Jr. has granted a motion made jointly by U.S. District Attorneys and counsel for Life Care Centers of America, for a 90-day stay in the case against Life Care.

The order suggests an end to the case may occur within the next 90 days.

Filed June 24, the order states the parties in the case "have reached a settlement in principle, subject to all required approvals."

"Specifically, Life Care has made a settlement offer that the attorneys for the United States will recommend to the Department of Justice official who has the authority to accept or reject the offer," the motion reads.

The government brought suit against Life Care with allegations the company had overbilled the government for the costs of treating patients.

"Additionally, Life Care and the Department of Health and Human Services, Office of the Inspector General will be negotiating a corporate integrity agreement, to be executed simultaneously with the settlement in this action," the motion continued.

According to the Office of Inspector General for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, a corporate integrity agreement is negotiated with health care providers and other entities as part of the settlement of federal health care program investigations arising under a variety of civil false claims statutes.

"Providers or entities agree to the obligations, and in exchange, OIG agrees not to seek their exclusion from participation in Medicare, Medicaid, or other federal health care programs," the department stated.

The OIG says these agreements have many common elements,

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Man killed by train early this morning

A pedestrian was struck by a train and later died from his injuries after an incident this morning on Old Chattanooga Pike.

The accident occurred around 6:45 a.m., according to Cleveland Police Department Sgt. Evie West. She said authorities were unable to identify the victim by press time this morning.

The man was found by first responders about 20 minutes after the accident. He was said to have severe injuries.

Life Force's medical evacuation helicopter transported the victim to Erlanger Hospital in Chattanooga.

Investigators with the police department are working with investigators from Norfolk Southern to determine how and why the incident occurred.

The railroad tracks run parallel to Old Chattanooga Pike from South Ocoee Street, and cross the road near the back entrance to the APD 40 Industrial Park.

Authorities: No injuries reported in plant explosion

(AP) — Two explosions and a fire rocked a natural gas plant in southern Mississippi on Monday night, but no one was injured and flames continued for hours Tuesday, authorities said.

Emergency Management Director Early Etheridge in Jackson County said the first explosion occurred at 11:30 p.m. and was followed by a larger explosion minutes later. Etheridge said the second blast could be felt up to 10 miles away.

"The two workers on duty were in a safe room at the time of the two explosions and were not injured," Etheridge said.

"The explosion and fire which followed has heavily damaged the processing area," he said.

Etheridge added that the fire still burned Tuesday morning but "has diminished over the past several hours."

Firefighters continued to stream water on the fire, he said. "What's burning now is residue in the lines," he said. "We aren't sure how long it will continue to burn."

The plant located near Pascagoula had just been sold to the minority owner, Enterprise Products Partner L.P., from majority owner BP.

Company spokesman Rick Rainey said the Houston-based company had owned 40 percent and BP 60 percent.

"Once the fire is out, we'll launch an investigation into the cause of the explosion and fire," Rainey said.

The Mississippi plant removes the liquid from natural gas and ships it to utilities along the East Coast, Rainey said. The liquid is then sent to other plants where propane and butane are produced.

He said the plant has a capacity of 1.5 billion cubic feet of natural gas per day, but the plant was nowhere near its capacity.

High court will hear dispute over service dog at school

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court is taking up an appeal from an 11-year-old Michigan girl with cerebral palsy who wasn't allowed to bring her service dog to school.

The justices said Tuesday they will consider whether Ehlenna Fry's family can sue the school district for violations of federal disability laws.

Fry's family obtained a golden-doodle to help her open doors and retrieve items. Her school district initially refused to allow Wonder at school. Officials relented a bit in 2010, but they placed many restrictions on Wonder. Ehlenna and her dog later transferred to another school.

Her family sued the school district for violations of federal disability laws. The case was dismissed after a judge said the Frys first had to seek an administrative hearing. An appeals court last year upheld that decision 2-1.

The American Civil Liberties Union, which is representing the family, says the case is important because school districts around the country have repeatedly denied children with disabilities their right to bring service dogs to school.

Court will hear appeal over high ATM fees

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court will hear an appeal from Visa and MasterCard seeking to throw out a lawsuit accusing the credit card companies of illegally fixing ATM prices.

The justices on Tuesday agreed to review an appeals court ruling that said the antitrust case against the companies and three major banks could go forward.

A group of consumers and independent ATM operators argue that payment processors illegally coor-

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Retired pope thanks reigning pope for his focus on mercy

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Retired Pope Benedict XVI endorsed Pope Francis' mercy-filled ministry Tuesday during an unprecedented Vatican ceremony featuring a reigning pope honoring a retired one on the 65th anniversary of his ordination as a priest.

The ceremony served in part to show continuity from Benedict to Francis amid continued nostalgia from some conservatives for Benedict's tradition-minded papacy.

Francis had invited the entire Vatican Curia, or bureaucracy, to celebrate Benedict's anniversary, and prelates turned out in force for the rare occasion of being able to greet each man in white. The audience took place in the Clementine Hall of the Apostolic Palace, the same marble and fresco-filled room where Benedict bid a final farewell to his cardinals on Feb. 28, 2013, becoming the first pope in 600 years to resign.

While Francis presided over the ceremony, it was Benedict who stole the show with an off-the-cuff, mini-theology lesson sprinkled with Greek and Latin that showed that the mind of the German theologian is still going strong at 89.

Benedict thanked Francis for letting him live out his final years in the beauty of the Vatican gardens, where he said he felt "protected."

"Thank you, Holy Father, for your goodness, which from the first moment of your election has struck every day of my life," Benedict said, speaking without notes. "We hope that you can go forward with all of us on this path of divine mercy, showing us the path of Jesus toward God."

Benedict's vote of confidence

may help quell conservative criticism of the current pope's loose theology, lack of attention to liturgy and emphasis on mercy over morals.

Francis has recently dismissed new questions about the implications of Benedict's resignation by insisting that there is only one pope — himself — and that Benedict had pledged his obedience on the day he resigned.

He told reporters this weekend he felt that Benedict "had my back" and was continuing to help the church through his prayers. He added he had heard that Benedict had even sent away some nostalgic faithful who had come to him complaining about the "new pope."

During Tuesday's ceremony, Francis entered the Clementine Hall to applause from the gathered cardinals and went straight to embrace Benedict, who stood up and removed his white skullcap in a sign of deference. They embraced several more times during the ceremony.

Benedict listened intently as Francis addressed him — as "Your Holiness" — lauding his 65 years of service to the church and saying his decision to retire to a life of quiet prayer to a small monastery in the Vatican gardens was a very "Franciscan" thing to do.

The monastery "is nothing like those forgotten corners where today's 'throwaway culture' tends to put those who lose their strength with age," Francis said. "Quite the contrary!"

The monastery, the pope said, is similar to the Porzuncola, the small chapel in Assisi where his namesake St. Francis founded his order and then spent his dying days.

Home prices climb in April

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. home prices scaled new heights in April, with seven cities — including Boston, Charlotte, Portland, Oregon, San Francisco and Seattle— setting record highs.

The Standard & Poor's/Case-Shiller 20-city home price index increased 5.4 percent in April compared with a year earlier, just a tick down from the 5.5 percent annual gain in March.

Home values are now just 9.6 percent below their peak nearly a decade ago, according to the report released Tuesday.

Shrinking inventories of homes for sale have boosted prices, while a healthy job market and historically low mortgage rates have kept demand from potential buyers strong during the spring months associated with the highest volume of sales.

The number of listings has fallen 5.7 percent from a year ago, the National Association of Realtors said last week.

Home prices rose in all 20 major housing markets, with double-digit annual increases in Portland and Seattle.

"While strong price growth in these markets should help increase inventory in the coming

months, homes will be significantly less affordable for homebuyers than this time last year," said Ralph McLaughlin, chief economist at the online real estate service Trulia.

In addition to the other five cities at record home values, Dallas and Denver, continue to be well above their historic peaks.

Overall home ownership rates have dropped near a 48-year low in the aftermath of the housing bust that began in 2007. But sales have improved as the broader economy has slowly healed.

Sales of existing homes improved 1.8 percent last month to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 5.53 million, the best pace since February 2007, according to the Realtors.

Providing the foundation for much of that growth has been a solid 4.7 percent unemployment rate that points to a stable period for workers.

Rising prices have also been tempered by low mortgage rates that are holding monthly ownership costs in check.

Supreme Court abortion ruling could affect Tennessee laws

NASHVILLE (AP) — The U.S. Supreme Court's Monday ruling on abortion restrictions in Texas could affect the outcome of a federal court challenge to two Tennessee laws.

"It seems like this will be a slam-dunk in Tennessee," said Ilene Jaroslaw, an attorney with the Center for Reproductive Rights, which represents plaintiffs in both states.

The Tennessee laws under challenge "are indistinguishable in practice from the two that were judged unconstitutional in Texas," she said.

In the Texas case, the Supreme Court struck down laws requiring

abortion clinics to meet hospital-like standards and requiring abortion providers to have admitting privileges at nearby hospitals.

Tennessee's admitting privileges requirement became law in 2012 and resulted in the closure of two of Tennessee's eight clinics that provided surgical abortions, according to court records. Of the six remaining clinics, two face possible closure because of the strict new clinic standards adopted by the legislature in 2015.

Tennessee Attorney General spokesman Harlow Sumerford said in a written statement that the office is reviewing the

Supreme Court ruling and evaluating what is applicable to the Tennessee case.

The Tennessee suit also challenges a third law that was not considered by the Supreme Court in the Texas case. It requires women seeking abortions to receive mandatory counseling and then wait 48 hours before they can get the abortion.

Jaroslaw said she expects the mandatory waiting period to be struck down on the basis of the reasoning in the Texas case.

"The decision sets forth a clear standard for judging these laws," she said. "You can't just say it promotes women's health with no

evidence. You can't just limit abortion under a pretext or sham law."

In August, U.S. District Judge Kevin Sharp temporarily ordered the district attorneys general in Bristol and Nashville not to enforce the clinic standards law against the Bristol Regional Women's Center and The Women's Center, in Nashville.

That's because the two clinics have said they are trying to comply with the standards but have been stymied by state agencies that were unprepared to implement the new requirements.

Those two clinics along with the Memphis Center for

Reproductive Health brought the Tennessee lawsuit.

Jaroslaw said her office will reach out to the court this week to set a new hearing in the case.

State Rep. Susan Lynn, R-Mt. Juliet, who sponsored the law requiring hospital-like standards for clinics, expressed her disappointment with the Supreme Court's decision in a written statement.

"I am firmly committed to making sure that life is protected and that women are not put into risky medical situations," she said. "That's what we will continue working toward in the General Assembly."

U.S. complains to Russia over harassment of diplomats

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. and other western diplomats in Russia have reported a surge in harassment from Russian intelligence services, prompting Secretary of State John Kerry to complain to Moscow, the State Department says.

Spokeswoman Elizabeth Trudeau said the harassment is of such concern that Kerry has personally raised the matter with Russian President Vladimir Putin in March and has also raised it with Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov. Trudeau said the uptick in harassment began in 2014, which roughly corresponds to the imposition of western sanctions on Russia over the Ukraine crisis.

"Over the past two years, harassment and surveillance of our diplomatic personnel in Moscow by security personnel and traffic police have increased significantly," she told reporters Monday. "Other western embassies have reported the same thing. The safety and well-being of our diplomatic and consular personnel abroad and their accompanying family members are things we take very seriously. We have raised and we will con-

tinue to raise at the highest level, any incidents inconsistent with protections guaranteed by international law and we will respond appropriately in accordance with U.S. and international law."

Police: Man stabbed mother, father in Englewood home

ENGLEWOOD (AP) — Authorities have charged the son of an Englewood couple in a knife attack that killed his father and seriously injured his mother.

Englewood Police Chief Gary Miller tells local media that 29-year-old Michael Elrod attacked his father, 62-year-old Phillip Elrod, and his mother, Teresa Elrod, on Sunday morning at a home in East Englewood. Phillip Elrod died while being rushed to a hospital. Teresa Elrod is still being treated.

Witnesses at the scene, including an 8-year-old child, identified Michael Elrod as the suspect. Elrod was arrested and is charged with second-degree murder and attempted second-degree murder.

Miller says Phillip Elrod sustained stab wounds to the chest, back and lower abdomen. He says Teresa Elrod is expected to recover from her injuries.

It wasn't immediately clear if Michael Elrod has an attorney.

Teenager charged with murder after house party shooting

BROWNSVILLE (AP) — An 18-year-old man has been charged with first-degree murder, attempted first-degree murder and felony reckless endangerment in connection with a shooting at a Haywood County house party that left a teenage girl dead and two others with gunshot wounds.

Citing court records, news outlets report that Quin Love is being held without bond after having been arraigned Monday in connection with the early Sunday shooting. It's unclear whether he has an attorney.

Authorities say Love fired 10 rounds from a handgun into a crowd at the party, hitting three people, including 17-year-old Elia Hernandez.

Haywood County Sheriff Melvin Bond says Hernandez was inside the house, hiding from a fight outside, when she was fatally shot in the abdomen.

Investigators say Love also shot 22-year-old Jonathan Davis and 19-year-old Carlos Savage. Both have been released from the hospital.

Manhattan Project Park looks back at secrecy, security

OAK RIDGE (AP) — A program being presented at Oak Ridge next month is designed to provide insight into life there during the Manhattan Project.

The Manhattan Project National Historical Park program is scheduled for 3 p.m. July 8 at the Turnpike Gatehouse. The program is free and open to the public, but parking is limited.

The park says the program will look at life at that time with security, the need for secrecy and the worry of spies.

The gatehouse is located at 2900 Oak Ridge Turnpike. Parking will be next to the gatehouse on the north side of the road.

Education Secretary King to speak at charter conference

NASHVILLE (AP) — U.S. Education Secretary John B. King Jr. is scheduled to speak at a conference of charter schools in Nashville.

King has two appearances set for the National Alliance for Public Charter Schools event on Tuesday afternoon.

He is scheduled to first participate in a "fireside chat" with Andy Rotherham, co-founder of Bellwether Education Partners, and will then deliver the keynote address to a general session of the conference.

The federal agency is holding a competition to award \$65 million in grants to as many as 20 charter management organizations to expand access to students from underserved communities.

Republican Gov. Bill Haslam made opening remarks to the conference on Monday.

Armored car robbed in Memphis, police looking for suspect

MEMPHIS (AP) — Police say they are looking for a man accused of robbing an armored car and fleeing in a black Dodge Avenger.

Memphis police said a security guard occupying a Loomis armored car was approached by a man with a gun at a shopping center parking lot on Monday.

Police said the man took an undisclosed amount of money. Officers said the guard fired a shot at the man, but it is not known if the suspect was hit.

No injuries were reported, and no arrests had been made as of late Monday afternoon.

Knoxville planning to build park in honor of Zaezion Dobson

KNOXVILLE (AP) — Officials are planning a memorial park in Knoxville that will honor a 15-year-old who died shielding two girls from gunfire.

The site of the proposed park in the Lonsdale neighborhood is just feet away from where Zaezion Dobson was killed in December during what police have called a gang-related shooting, according to media outlets. No one has been charged in Dobson's death.

Zenobia Dobson, Zaezion Dobson's mother, suggested the park as a safe space for children to play, said city spokesman Eric Vreeland.

"I feel for the kid whose parent doesn't want to take them anywhere (to play), or can't," Zenobia Dobson said at the time.

Zaezion Dobson Memorial Playground and Park will cost about \$60,000. Knoxville's Community Development Corp. and steel company Gerdau have agreed to donate land for the park. Knoxville's Community Development Corp. will own and operate the playground.

The playground will be for children 12 and younger, said KCDC Executive Director Art Cate. In addition to the playground, preliminary plans include a wide lawn, climbing logs or boulders, seating for parents and a small amphitheater. At the entrance, a memorial will bear Dobson's name and likeness.

A public campaign is underway to raise another \$40,000 for the park.

Board of Regents hires longtime Statehouse reporter Locker

NASHVILLE (AP) — The Tennessee Board of Regents has hired longtime Statehouse reporter Richard Locker as the higher education system's

spokesman.

Locker succeeds Monica Greppin-Watts, who is joining the communications team at the University of Alabama.

Locker began covering the state Capitol for The Commercial Appeal of Memphis 33 years ago and has since contributed state government and politics coverage for the Knoxville News Sentinel and The Tennessean of Nashville. He previously worked for the Nashville Banner and the Knoxville Journal.

Locker joins the Board of Regents staff as the education system faces major changes. Haslam, a Republican, has taken steps toward giving independent boards to its six four-year universities. Once the four-year schools are spun off, the Board of Regents system will concentrate on the administration of two-year colleges where free tuition is available to any high school graduate.

Eagle Foundation releases 'Hope' in honor of Orlando victims

DANDRIDGE (AP) — The American Eagle Foundation has released a bald eagle into the wild named Hope in honor of the victims of the Orlando nightclub shooting.

The Knoxville News Sentinel reports that the 13-week-old bald eagle left his artificial nesting tower overlooking Douglas Lake near Dandridge on Friday.

Based in Pigeon Forge, the American Eagle Foundation releases most of its eagles in honor of, or memory of, individuals.

On Friday, foundation President Al Cecere led a brief program that included the reading of the names those killed in the June 12 attack that left 49 dead, the worst mass-shooting in modern U.S. history.

Cecere says the eagle's name signifies hope for the future.

Chattanooga State Community College to ban campus smoking

CHATTANOOGA (AP) — Chattanooga State Community College soon will have a smoke-free campus.

A Chattanooga newspaper reports the ban starts July 1 on smoking, along with the use of chewing tobacco and electronic cigarettes.

College spokeswoman Nancy Patterson says the college wants to prepare students for a workplace that could shun smoking.

Patterson says student feedback to the ban has been generally positive. She says students will be offered services to help them quit smoking.

The college also is in the process of converting "smoking huts" to solar-powered charging stations for laptop computers and smartphones.

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In rain-soaked West Virginia, flood victim planning funerals

RAINELLE, W.Va. (AP) — Like other business operators along Main Street in the West Virginia town of Rainelle, Pamela Wallace Arnold is slowly cleaning up from state's worst flooding in decades. As a funeral planner, she's also helping to bury the dead.

She runs Wallace and Wallace, one of two funeral chapels in this West Virginia town of 1,500 residents. Wallace is doing double duty drying out her rain-soaked business — launched by her great-great-grandfather in 1926 — while planning the funerals of some of the flood victims.

Rainelle is in Greenbrier County, where 15 of the state's 23 deaths from last week's devastating floods occurred. Where the visitations will be held, not even Wallace knows. She's also not sure whether she can ever reopen at the same location.

She just understands that the community needs her.

"Obviously, our very first concern is taking care of the families," she said Monday. "We have to get somewhere quickly so we can take care of things."

Wallace is looking for another place where she can relocate temporarily. If not, her business has locations in other towns.

Thousands of homes and businesses across this mountainous state were damaged or destroyed when up to 9 inches of rain fell in a short span, causing perhaps the worst flooding West Virginia has seen in three decades. More than 400 people were living in shelters statewide.

Because of the widespread devastation, the Democratic nominee

for governor, Jim Justice, announced Tuesday that he will pause his campaign for at least two weeks so he can concentrate on helping flood victims.

Justice says he has started a relief fund called Neighbors Loving Neighbors to help those who lost their homes or other possessions. He said "politicking is the last thing that's on my mind," and though his headquarters will remain open, he won't personally campaign.

Some of the worst destruction occurred in Rainelle, which is surrounded by hills, the Meadow River and several tributaries. Once home to the largest hardwood lumber mill in the world, the town's motto displayed on its website reads: "A town built to carry on ... building great things since 1906."

Now rebuilding will have to be done.

Further up Main Street, Smathers Funeral Chapel has not received inquiries about handling flood-related funerals for local residents. But owner Monica Smathers Venable said her phone system has not been working properly since the floods.

Storm damage prohibited Venable from holding a funeral Saturday unrelated to the floods. She hoped to conduct it Tuesday but isn't sure yet due to uncertainty about ongoing storms and road conditions.

Venable, too, is worried about damage at her site.

"If the building is not structurally sound, that changes everything," she said. "If it's just cosmetic, I think we'll have a go

at it."

At the Park Center shopping plaza, state troopers assisted with traffic flow and helped carry items to a supply drop-off and distribution center while helicopters buzzed overhead.

The Rainelle United Methodist Church, made entirely of American Chestnut lumber, was turned into a donation center. The church basement flooded but the main level, which sits higher off the ground, was spared.

Cindy Chamberlain, who oversees the shopping center distribution center, said she worked with the American Red Cross during the massive response to Hurricane Katrina in New Orleans more than a decade earlier.

"It parallels Katrina. It is that bad," she said.

Downpours on Monday brought back fears of the flood to some residents.

"That was the first thing that went through my head," Valerie Oney said. "I was like, 'Oh my, is this going to happen again? Are we sacrificing everything for nothing?'"

Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin defended the state's preparation and response, but conceded they were caught off guard by an uncertain forecast and by how much rain fell so quickly.

"We didn't anticipate, I don't think, being as bad as it was with as heavy amounts as we had," Tomblin said. "I think that it just came up so fast."

Rainelle resident George Wagner, who lost all his possessions when his apartment flood-

ed, said he was aware of warnings about potential floods the night before the storms.

"I'm going to be paying more attention to the warnings and watches until I find another place," he said. "It's not going to be around water, that's for sure."

Some residents have formed armed patrols to protect what was left of their homes and possessions after some reports of looting. Fayette County Sheriff Steve Kessler warned potential looters in a Facebook post that anyone caught would be arrested and jailed.

Volkswagen reaches \$14.7B emissions settlement

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Volkswagen would repair or buy back polluting diesel vehicles and pay each owner as much as \$10,000 under a \$14.7 billion deal the car maker has reached to settle lawsuits stemming from its emissions cheating scandal, a person briefed on the settlement talks said Monday.

The figure would be the largest auto scandal settlement in U.S. history and a huge step in Volkswagen's efforts to address the legal fallout from its admission that its vehicles were designed to fool emissions tests.

The deal sets aside \$10 billion to repair or buy back roughly 475,000 polluting Volkswagen vehicles with 2-liter diesel engines, and to compensate each owner with an additional payment of between \$5,100 and \$10,000, the person said. The person asked not to be identified because the deal will not be filed in court until Tuesday, and a judge has ordered attorneys not to talk about it before then.

How VW would repair the vehicles to bring them into compliance with clean air laws has not yet been finalized, the person

said.

Owners who choose to have VW buy back their cars would get the clean trade-in value from before the scandal became public on Sept. 18, 2015. The average value of a VW diesel has dropped 19 percent since just before the scandal began. In August of 2015, the average was \$13,196, and this May it was \$10,674, according to Kelley Blue Book.

The settlement still requires a judge's approval before it can go into effect. Owners can choose to decline Volkswagen's offer and sue the company on their own.

The settlement also includes \$2.7 billion for environmental mitigation and another \$2 billion

for research on zero-emissions technology, the person said.

Don Marron, a banker from Allentown, Pennsylvania, who owns a 2012 Jetta SportWagen diesel, said he's glad Volkswagen is offering more compensation than earlier reports had suggested. But Marron wants assurance

that if Volkswagen fixes his car but he doesn't like the way it performs, the company will still buy it back. And if he keeps his car and saves Volkswagen money, he wants compensation for doing that.

"At this moment, I don't know anything more than I did a couple of months ago," he said.

The scandal erupted in September when it was learned that the German automaker had fitted many of its cars with software to fool emissions tests and had put dirty vehicles on the road. Investigators determined that the cars emitted more than 40 times the legal limit of nitrogen oxide, which can cause respiratory problems in humans. Car owners and the U.S. Department of Justice sued.

VW is still facing billions more

in fines and penalties, a lawsuit by state attorneys general and potential criminal charges.

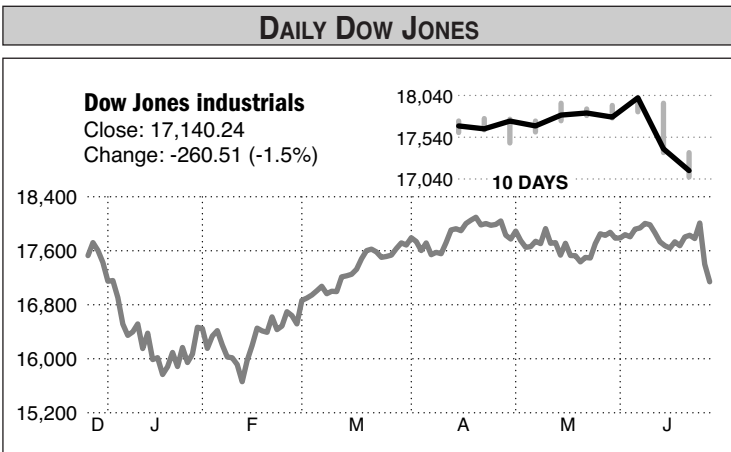
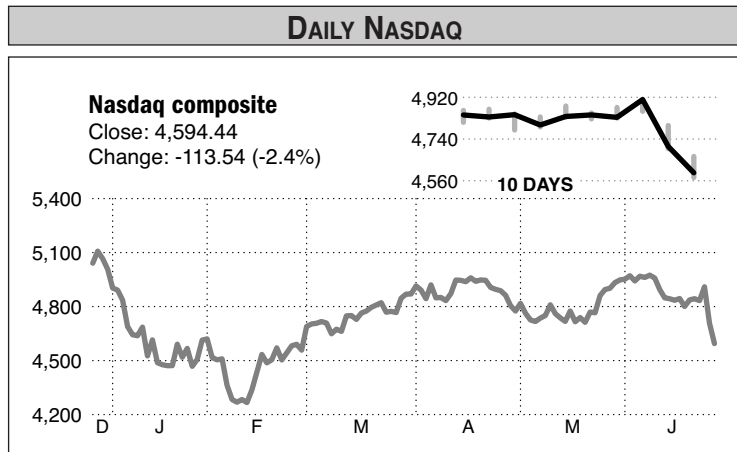
The \$14.7 billion settlement also does not include another roughly 90,000 3-liter Volkswagen diesels, which had another version of cheating software.

VW in April took an \$18.2 billion charge to cover the cost of the global scandal, which includes a total of 11 million vehicles worldwide.

The company has admitted developing sophisticated software that determined when the cars were being tested by the EPA on a treadmill-like device called a dynamometer and turned on the pollution controls. Once all wheels began spinning and the steering wheel was turned, the controls were turned off.

The company, which knew the EPA's testing routine, got away with the scam for seven years before being caught by the International Council on Clean Transportation, which hired West Virginia University to test a VW in real roads conditions.

House Republicans fault U.S. military response to Benghazi

WASHINGTON (AP) — A report by the House Benghazi panel is faulting the military for its slow response sending resources to Benghazi, Libya, during deadly 2012 attacks on a U.S. outpost, despite clear orders from President Barack Obama and Defense Secretary Leon Panetta.

Republicans on the Benghazi committee released an 800-page report on Tuesday on the attacks that killed four Americans, including U.S. Ambassador Chris Stevens.

The panel's chairman, Rep. Trey Gowdy of South Carolina said "nothing was en route to Libya at the time the last two Americans were killed almost eight hours after the attacks began."

Gowdy said the Libyan forces that evacuated Americans from the CIA annex in Benghazi were not affiliated with any of the militias the CIA or State Department had developed a relationship with during the previous 18 months.

Republicans on the House Benghazi Committee faulted the Obama administration Tuesday for what they said was a slowed response to help Americans under attack in Benghazi, Libya, in 2012.

Four Americans, including U.S. Ambassador Chris Stevens, died in two assaults at the diplomatic facility and CIA annex.

The panel's chairman, Rep. Trey Gowdy of South Carolina, said the panel's report, being released Tuesday, was not aimed at Hillary Clinton, secretary of state at the time. Democrats have said the goal of the report is to undermine Clinton's presidential bid.

Gowdy said Tuesday that the report documents that the U.S. was slow to send help to the Americans in Benghazi "because of an obsession with hurting the Libyans' feelings."

He said the report was not aimed at Clinton, but portrays "series of heroic acts" by Americans under attack "and what we can do to prevent" other assaults.

The Libya attacks became immediate political fodder, given their timing in the weeks before President Barack Obama's reelection, and that has not abated

despite seven previous congressional investigations. There has been finger-pointing on both sides over security at the U.S. diplomatic outpost in

Benghazi and whether the White House initially tried to portray the assault as a protest over an offensive, anti-Muslim video, instead of a calculated terrorist attack.

Democrats released a report Monday saying that while the State Department's security measures in Benghazi the night of Sept. 11, 2012, were "woefully inadequate," Clinton never personally turned down a request for additional security. Democrats said the military could not have done anything differently that night to save the lives of the Americans.

On Tuesday, the panel's Democrats denounced the Republicans' report as "a conspiracy theory on steroids — bringing back long-debunked allegations with no credible evidence whatsoever." The statement added: "Republicans promised a process and report that was fair and bipartisan, but this is exactly the opposite."

The State Department also issued a statement Tuesday, saying that the "essential facts" of the attacks "have been known for some time," and have been

the subject of numerous reviews, including one by an independent review board.

Spokesman Mark Toner said the department had implemented most of the recommendations of the independent review board and was continuing to expand security at its facilities and improve its threat assessment.

"We have made great progress toward making our posts safer since 2012," Toner said in a statement. "Our priority continues to be carrying out our national security mission while mitigating the risks to our employees."

Toner said the department cooperated extensively with the House panel, providing more than 50 current and former employees for interviews and over 100,000 pages of documents.

Rep. Jim Jordan, R-Ohio, who helped write the Republican report, told CNN that "too little effort was made to protect" Stevens and the others. "We didn't move Heaven and Earth to get help to the people who were fighting for their lives," he said.

Days before deadline, Senate to consider Puerto Rico measure

WASHINGTON (AP) — Treasury Secretary Jacob Lew is warning of widespread consequences, from layoffs of police officers to a hospital closure, if the Senate fails to act before Friday on a rescue package for debt-stricken Puerto Rico.

The U.S. territory is in a decade-long recession, and the island owes a \$2 billion debt payment to creditors on July 1. The House already passed legislation to create a new control board and restructure some of the U.S. territory's \$70 billion debt.

In a letter to Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell on Monday, Lew said the crisis in Puerto Rico "will ratchet up to an even higher level" if the Senate doesn't pass the House bill in the next four days. He said that if the island defaults on the July 1 payment, the government may be forced to shut down public transit, close a hospital or send police officers home.

"We know for certain that it is the 3.5 million American citizens who live in Puerto Rico who will be further harmed," Lew said.

McConnell, R-Ky., has said the Senate will consider the House bill this week, but he will need support from both parties to surmount a certain 60-vote threshold to advance legislation. Votes could come as soon as Wednesday.

A look at the legislation and the politics:

WHAT THE BILL WOULD DO

The House bill would create a seven-member control board to oversee the island's financial recovery, similar to a board that oversaw the District of Columbia two decades ago. The board could negotiate with creditors and the courts over reducing some debt, but the bill does not provide any taxpayer funds to reduce that debt.

The legislation is needed because Puerto Rico, like all U.S. states and territories, cannot declare bankruptcy under federal law. Mainland municipalities and their utilities can, while municipalities and utilities in Puerto Rico cannot.

The House is out of session until July 5, so the Senate will have to pass the House bill unchanged for it to head to the president's desk for his signature before the Friday deadline.

WHO SUPPORTS IT

The legislation enjoys rare bipartisan support from the White House and Republican leaders in Congress. House Speaker Paul Ryan, R-Wis., helped negotiate the House bill.

"The Puerto Rican people are our fellow Americans. They pay our taxes, they fight in our wars. We cannot allow this to happen," Ryan said on the House floor just before the chamber overwhelmingly passed the bill 297-127 on June 9.

House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., also supports the bill, despite a provision opposed by Democrats that would allow the Puerto Rican government to temporarily lower the minimum wage for some younger workers.

The governor of Puerto Rico is backing the bill, even though he says the control board would have too much power over the territorial government.

"What's the alternative right now?" Gov. Alejandro Garcia Padilla said in Washington last week. "We need the bill yesterday."

WHO DOESN'T

Senate Democratic Leader Harry Reid of Nevada is so far withholding his support from the bill, partially over the minimum wage provision.

"At the very minimum we need some amendments," Reid said last week.

Democratic Sen. Bob Menendez of New Jersey and Sen. Bernie Sanders, I-Vt., are both strongly opposed to the bill, saying the control board would be too favorable to creditors and ignore ordinary Puerto Ricans.

Some creditors have lobbied conservatives to oppose the measure, arguing that the bill is unfair to banks and tantamount to a bailout for the territory.

While scheduling a procedural vote on the bill, McConnell indicated on the Senate floor late Monday that no amendments will be allowed.

THE DEADLINE

McConnell has said for weeks that the Senate would take up the bill, but has pushed consideration until the 11th hour. The Senate is expected to start voting on the bill toward the middle or end of the week.

More Clinton emails released, including some deleted

WASHINGTON (AP) — An additional 165 pages of emails from Hillary Clinton's time at the State Department surfaced Monday, including nearly three dozen that the presumptive Democratic presidential nominee failed to hand over last year that were sent through her private server.

The latest emails were released under court order by the State Department to the conservative legal advocacy group Judicial Watch. The batch includes 34 new emails Clinton exchanged through her private account with her deputy chief of staff, Huma Abedin. The aide, who also had a private email account on Clinton's home server, later gave her copies to the government.

The emails were not among the 55,000 pages of work-related messages that Clinton turned over to the agency in response to public records lawsuits seeking copies of her official correspondence. They include a March 2009 message where the then-secretary of state discusses how her official records would be kept.

"I have just realized I have no idea how my papers are treated at State," Clinton wrote to Abedin and a second aide. "Who manages both my personal and offi-

cial files? ... I think we need to get on this asap to be sure we know and design the system we want."

In a blistering audit released last month, the State Department's inspector general concluded Clinton and her team ignored clear internal guidance that her email setup violated federal records-keeping standards and could have left sensitive material vulnerable to hackers.

The audit also cited a then-unreleased copy of a November 2010 email Clinton sent Abedin in which the secretary discussed using a government email account, expressing concern that she didn't want "any risk of the personal being accessible."

Clinton never used a government account that was set up for her, instead continuing to rely on her private server until leaving office in 2013. Though Clinton's work-related emails were government records, she didn't turn over copies until more than 30 lawsuits were filed, including one by The Associated Press.

Before providing her correspondence, Clinton and her lawyers withheld and subsequently deleted tens of thousands of messages that she claimed were personal, such as

emails about her daughter's wedding plans, family vacations, yoga routines and condolence notes.

With the new release Monday, more than 50 work-related emails sent or received by Clinton have since surfaced that were not among those she provided.

Clinton campaign spokesman Brian Fallon on Monday repeated past statements that Clinton had provided "all potentially work-related emails" that were still in her possession when she received the 2014 request from the State Department.

Fallon has declined to say whether Clinton deleted any work-related emails before they were reviewed by her legal team.

There are times when declarer must do something extra-special to accomplish his mission. Usually the required play is well off the beaten path, and the difficult part lies not so much in executing it, which might be easy, but in recognizing it in the first place.

For example, take the present case where South was in five diamonds and West led the king of hearts. Declarer won with the ace and played the ace and another trump to the jack. He then led a low club from dummy, planning to play the nine if East followed low. But East put up the jack, and South had to take it with the ace.

Declarer next tried the king and another club, hoping West would have to win the third club. But East won with the queen and returned the queen of spades, and South went down one.

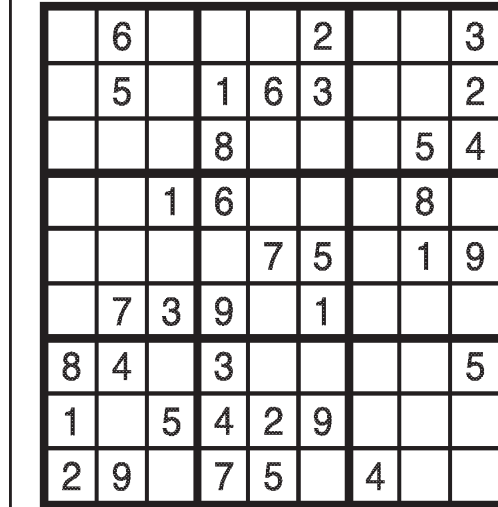
Declarer was very much on the beam in trying to establish dummy's clubs without allowing East to gain the lead for the killing spade shift, but his thinking did not go far enough. There was a way to establish the clubs without losing the lead to East, but it was not easy to see. The winning play is to refuse to take West's king of hearts at trick one!

Let's say West continues with a heart to the ace (he has no more effective play). In that case, South discards a club, cashes the A-K of trumps, then plays the A-K of clubs and ruffs a club. A diamond to the ten allows South to discard two spades on dummy's 8-7 of clubs, leaving him with only one spade trick to lose.

By willingly surrendering the first trick to West, declarer ultimately gets two tricks in return. Instead of losing a club and two spades, he loses a heart and only one spade, and that is a profitable transaction no matter how you look at it.

Fiat Chrysler gearshift probe finds 266 crashes, 68 injuries

DETROIT (AP) — A government investigation into confusing gear shifters like the one in the SUV that crushed and killed Star Trek actor Anton Yelchin found 266 crashes that injured 68 people.

The numbers are in documents posted Tuesday by the U.S. National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. The investigation was closed after Fiat Chrysler agreed to recall 1.1 million vehicles.

Investigators also found 686 consumer complaints about the shifters.

Yelchin died June 19 after his 2015 Jeep Grand Cherokee pinned him against a mailbox pillar and fence at his home in Los Angeles. Police are investigating.

His Jeep was among vehicles recalled in April due to complaints from drivers who had trouble telling if they put the transmission in “park” after stopping. Many reported the vehicles rolled off after the driver exited.

Police: Trooper shoots, kills man waving gun during stop

FREDERICA, Del. (AP) — Delaware State Police say a trooper fatally shot a man who waved a gun toward troopers during a traffic stop.

The shooting occurred Monday night after police say Caroline County, Maryland, sheriff's deputies pursued a stolen pickup truck into Delaware driven by a man wanted in burglaries in both states.

Police say the 25-year-old Greensboro, Maryland, man displayed a gun as he drove into oncoming traffic, then stopped on the shoulder of Route 1 near Frederica. Police say after he ignored commands to drop the gun and waved it toward troopers, one trooper fired, fatally shooting him.

The trooper, who has been with state police for four years, was placed on routine administrative leave.

Police didn't release the man's name or the races of the trooper or the man.

Massachusetts highway worker killed, driver charged

MEDFORD, Mass. (AP) — A highway worker is dead after police say he was hit by an impaired driver on Interstate-93 in Massachusetts early Tuesday.

It happened shortly before 3 a.m. in the northbound lanes of the highway near exit 33 in Medford when State Police say a Fiat 500 slammed into a truck and then hit the worker, killing him. Police say the worker was picking up traffic cones as part of a lane marking contract crew. A second worker has suffered minor injuries.

State Police say 31-year-old James Scoville, of Chelmsford, is charged with vehicular homicide and operating under the influence. He's set to be arraigned later Tuesday.

Another highway worker was seriously hurt after being hit in Boston Monday. A man has been charged with OUI in that incident.

Tim Tebow comforts family when man has apparent heart attack

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — When a man suffered an apparent heart attack on a flight from Atlanta to Phoenix, Tim Tebow emerged from the first-class section and helped comfort his family.

Erik Dellenbach, executive director of the Tim Tebow Foundation, tells the Florida Times-Union that the former NFL quarterback prayed with the family and other passengers after the medical emergency on the Sunday night flight.

After the plane landed in Phoenix, Dellenbach says Tebow used a car that had been waiting for him to carry the man's family to the hospital where he'd been taken.

It's not the first time Tebow has been in the news lately. After the deadly Orlando nightclub shooting, he left a trip to the Bahamas to teamate who was injured in the attack.

Police say DUI suspect drove a mile with body lodged in car

OCEANSIDE, Calif. (AP) — Oceanside police say a suspected drunk driver struck and killed a man, then drove for a mile with his body lodged in the car.

Twenty-nine-year-old Esteysi Sanchez of Oceanside was arrested Monday morning for vehicular manslaughter. She's jailed and it's unclear whether she has a lawyer.

Police say that around 6:30 a.m., Sanchez hit a man on a

sidewalk.

KNSD-TV says the man's body went through the windshield and ended up on the front passenger seat but his severed leg crashed through the back window and landed on the trunk.

Police say Sanchez drove about a mile, parked in a cul-de-sac and walked away. She was arrested a short time later.

The victim's name hasn't been released.

North Dakota drug informant's family sues for wrongful death

FARGO, N.D. (AP) — The family of a North Dakota college student who was a confidential informant for a drug task force filed a wrongful death lawsuit Monday accusing a sheriff's department, a deputy and the county of failing to ensure the 20-year-old's safety.

The body of Andrew Sadek was found exactly two years ago in the Red River, which separates North Dakota from Minnesota, not far from where he attended college in Wahpeton. An autopsy concluded Sadek died of a gunshot wound to the head but the manner of death was “undetermined,” according to the complaint brought by John and Tammy Sadek.

Their suit names as defendants Richland County Sheriff's deputy Jason Weber, who was part of the task force, as well as the county. It says the defendants failed to train Andrew Sadek to perform undercover operations and failed to “reasonably supervise” him.

“We filed the lawsuit today, two years from the day Andrew's body was discovered, hoping to achieve accountability for those who put Andrew in harm's way,” said Tim O'Keeffe, one of two Fargo attorneys for the Sadek family.

A spokeswoman for the North Dakota attorney general's office did not return email messages Monday seeking comment.

Settlement ends trial in deadly 2012 oil platform fire

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A settlement Monday brought an abrupt end to a complex trial combining 10 lawsuits arising from a deadly explosion and fire on an offshore oil platform in November 2012.

The accident off the Louisiana coast killed three workers and injured several others on a platform owned by Texas-based Black Elk Energy.

Those involved in the cases included relatives of the workers killed, injured workers and companies that were working for Black Elk. Settlements on some of the claims and counterclaims were reached before and during the trial. The final settlement was announced Monday morning and a jury seated a week earlier was dismissed.

Charles Talley, attorney for Black Elk, and Frank Spagnoletti, representing some of the injured workers, said terms were confidential.

“Significant compensation was paid to those who went through an absolutely horrific and tragic accident,” Spagnoletti said. “We're happy to have it resolved.”

The platform was about 17 miles from Grand Isle, Louisiana, in about 50 feet of water. It was shut down for maintenance and was not producing oil at the time of the explosion on Nov. 16, 2012.

Veteran: Therapy wrongly denied because she is HIV-positive

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — An Iraq War veteran claims in a federal lawsuit that she was unlawfully denied aquatic therapy at an orthopedic hospital in Pennsylvania because she has the virus that causes AIDS.

The lawsuit against OSS Health in York Township seeks a declaratory judgment stating that the alleged denial constitutes discrimination under the Americans with Disabilities Act.

The plaintiff is a 40-year-old York County resident identified only by a pseudonym.

She says that a physical therapist recommended during a June 2015 visit that she receive aquatic therapy. She says when her medical records showed she was HIV-positive, she was turned away.

Attorneys for OSS and two co-defendants, Drayer Physical Therapy Institute and the therapist, deny any wrongdoing.

Pennsylvania officer shot 7 times is released from hospital

FOLCROFT, Pa. (AP) — A police officer who was shot seven times during a drug investigation exchanged salutes with cheering colleagues as he left a Philadelphia hospital Monday, just three days after the con-

frontation.

Folcroft Officer Christopher Dorman has endured at least two surgeries since being shot Friday in the face, leg and groin. He was nonetheless able to walk from a wheelchair to a waiting car in a U.S. flag-themed shirt and hat.

The 25-year-old officer had been fired upon as he approached people suspected of smoking marijuana behind an apartment building in the borough of Folcroft, just southwest of Philadelphia.

More than 80 members of law enforcement were on hand to cheer Dorman as he left the hospital. Dozens of police cruisers with flashing lights then escorted him to the Folcroft fire station, where he was welcomed by a crowd of community members.

“I'd like to say thank you to everybody for being there for me and my family and my fellow brothers in blue through this,” Dorman said. “Everybody's support means a lot. I appreciate it.”

After an hourslong manhunt after the shooting, authorities charged Donte Island with attempted murder and aggravated assault.

Federal authorities had sought Island for nearly a year on parole violations. They say he regularly tested positive for marijuana use. A judge signed a warrant for his arrest in September, but parole officials said they could not find Island at either address he had given, including the Folcroft apartment where he was arrested Friday.

Chief Deputy U.S. Marshal John Patrignani declined to say Monday what efforts had been made to find and arrest Island, citing the ongoing probe of the Dorman shooting. Island had served about nine years in prison following a 2003 gun case.

Girl, 4, is sole survivor of van-train crash in Colorado

TRINIDAD, Colo. (AP) — A 4-year-old girl was the only member of her family to survive after their minivan was hit by an Amtrak train at a crossing with a history of problems in southern Colorado.

The girl was hospitalized with serious injuries after the Southwest Chief train headed from Chicago to Los Angeles slammed into the van as it drove across the tracks Sunday morning near Trinidad, about 15 miles from the New Mexico border. Hospital officials would not release information on her condition on Monday.

Trooper Art Gumke of the Colorado State Patrol said the girl's father, 32-year-old Stephen Miller, who was driving the 2005 Chrysler Town & Country, and his wife, Christine Miller, 33, of Trinidad were killed along with their three other daughters, aged 6, 2 and 8 months. He said the minivan was moving at the time of the crash and was not stuck.

The Millers were on their way to church at the time, a fundraising webpage said.

Call for review of whitewater center after amoeba death

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — North Carolina Gov. Pat McCrory says there needs to be a review of oversight for the U.S. National Whitewater Center following the death of an Ohio teenager who contracted an infection after she visited the park.

McCrory told The Charlotte Observer on Monday that there should be a total re-examination of how facilities like the whitewater center are handled in comparison with swimming pools.

Mecklenburg County Health Director Marcus Pleiscia said at a news conference that his agency doesn't have the capacity to analyze the water for the type of amoeba responsible for the death of 18-year-old Lauren Seitz.

While the center has temporarily suspended rafting and kayaking, all other activities are open for operation, and it says its Fourth of July celebration will proceed as scheduled.

Judge blocks part of Mississippi LGBT marriage law

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — A federal judge ruled Monday that Mississippi clerks cannot cite their own religious beliefs to refuse themselves from issuing marriage licenses to same-sex couples.

U.S. District Judge Carlton Reeves' ruling blocks the state from enforcing part of a religious objections bill that was supposed to become law Friday.

Reeves is extending his previous order that overturned Mississippi's ban on same-sex marriage. He says circuit clerks are required to provide equal treatment for all couples, gay or straight.

Mississippi's religious objec-

tions measure, House Bill 1523, was filed in response to last summer's U.S. Supreme Court ruling that legalized gay marriage nationwide. That ruling is called the Obergefell case, after the man who filed it.

“Mississippi's elected officials may disagree with Obergefell, of course, and may express that disagreement as they see fit — by advocating for a constitutional amendment to overturn the decision, for example,” Reeves wrote Monday. “But the marriage license issue will not be adjudicated anew after every legislative session.”

Attorneys were still waiting on rulings from Reeves in two other lawsuits seeking to block all of the religious objections law, including provisions that could affect schools' bathroom policies for transgender students.

8-year-old bitten by boa constrictor he was trying to pet

GREENVILLE, S.C. (AP) — Police say an 8-year-old boy vacationing with his family in South Carolina was bitten by a boa constrictor he was trying to pet.

A report filed by Greenville police says the family from Trenton, North Carolina, was walking through downtown Greenville on Sunday when they

came upon a man letting people pet a nonvenomous Colombian red-tailed boa.

Police spokesman Officer Gilberto Franco says the boy and his father approached and asked to pet the snake, which was about 5 feet long. When the boy tried, the snake bit him on the right forearm.

The snake was pulled off the boy, who was taken into a nearby restaurant for a towel and water. Emergency personnel arrived and treated the boy's wound.

No charges have been filed and the snake was not seized.

Police had previous run-ins with mom who killed daughters

FULSHEAR, Texas (AP) — Officers had been called out 14 times since 2012 to the home of a mother who killed her two daughters and was fatally shot by police, a Texas sheriff's office said Monday.

Some of the calls were related to alarm issues, the Fort Bend County Sheriff's Office said in a news release. But officials said that due to legal constraints by the county attorney, they couldn't describe the other calls for service.

Sheriff's office spokeswoman Caitilin Espinosa had told People magazine that prior calls had involved a “mental crisis” related

to 42-year-old Christy Sheats.

Sheriff Troy Nehls said a family argument led to the shooting Friday evening at a home just outside the Houston suburb of Fulshear. Prior to the shooting, Sheats convened a family meeting in the living room that was attended by her husband, Jason Sheats, and her daughters, Taylor Sheats, 22, and Madison Sheats, 17, according to the sheriff's office.

“During that meeting, Christy Sheats held up a gun and shot both girls,” the sheriff's office said.

Jason Sheats and the daughters ran outside, where Madison Sheats collapsed and died. Jason Sheats ran to the end of a cul-de-sac.

Taylor Sheats was shot again by her mother on the street. A witness told investigators Christy Sheats then went back in the home, reloaded her gun and shot Taylor once more.

When officers arrived, they saw Christy Sheats shooting one of her daughters in the street, the sheriff's office said.

An officer fatally shot Christy Sheats after she refused to obey commands to drop her handgun. Taylor Sheats was taken to a Houston hospital, where she died.

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Streaking Indians beat Braves for 10th straight

ATLANTA (AP) — Trevor Bauer complained that he wasn't as sharp as in recent outings.

The way Cleveland has been hitting, Bauer didn't have to be sharp to help extend the longest winning streak in the majors this season.

Lonnie Chisenhall hit a three-run homer, Bauer gave up two runs in six innings and the Indians beat the Atlanta Braves 8-3 on Monday night for their 10th straight win.

Jason Kipnis added a homer in the ninth.

"It's contagious," Chisenhall said after hitting a homer for the second straight game.

"It's fun going in the batter's box when the guy in front of you and the guy behind you is hitting."

The Indians have outscored opponents 68-21 and have hit 21 homers, including 10 in their last three games, during the streak.

The Indians had 14 hits as they scored at least six runs for the seventh straight game. Mike Napoli drove in a run with three hits.

"We know we can hit," Bauer said. "Getting everyone going at the same time is big for us. It makes our job as pitchers a lot easier."

The AL Central-leading Indians extended their longest streak since closing the 2013 regular season with 10 straight wins.

Chisenhall's homer in the fourth inning off Tyrell Jenkins (0-1) broke a 1-1 tie. Jenkins relieved rookie right-hander John Gant, who left the game in the third inning with a left oblique strain.

Vintage 'Smoke' recaptures glory days with Sonoma victory

SONOMA, Calif. (AP) — Tony Stewart sat slumped on the stairs inside his team transporter a year ago reflecting on the worst slump of his NASCAR career.

He had a migraine that day at Sonoma Raceway and spoke softly about his plight. Stewart didn't know what to do to return to his glory days. He had no idea how to adapt to NASCAR's rules package and seemed thoroughly defeated.

Asked that day about his confidence, he meekly admitted he was suffering.

"What's that? I should Google that and see if I can find the meaning of that word," Stewart said. "I don't have any confidence."

That shell of Stewart was nowhere to be found at Sonoma over the weekend, where Smoke was in vintage form. He was cranky, candid and comical. All the ingredients that make him competitive.

So when Denny Hamlin slipped by him in the seventh turn of the final lap in Sunday's race on the road course where Stewart has

been such a force for so many years, no one doubted that this throwback version of the three-time champ would bullishly try to seize the lead and the win.

He made his move in tricky turn 11, where Hamlin overshot the corner and left enough room for Stewart to squeeze inside. Stewart then ran him up the track and into the wall as he charged toward the finish line and his first checkered flag in three years.

Stewart's peers pumped their fists out their windows to applaud him. Some ran to his car, or met him in victory lane. Crew members lined the wall to high-five him as he celebrated. It was a show of support not often seen in NASCAR, maybe not since the late Dale Earnhardt's win in the 1998 Daytona 500.

Even Hamlin, who had just given the race away, went to congratulate his former teammate and one-time mentor.

"Tony has been ultra-fair to me. He's treated me really well my entire career," Hamlin

said. "It's not like I gave him one by any means. He gave us an opportunity to move him, we did, and then we got it back."

It was an important win for Stewart, who is retiring at the end of the year, and for NASCAR, which needs its biggest stars in the spotlight. The win will earn Stewart a spot in the championship field should he crack the top-30 in points, and he's currently 32nd in the standings but only nine points back.

More important than making the Chase, though, is that it showed Stewart is still the same guy he was before three years of injuries, on-track mediocrity and personal perils. He struggled mightily after breaking his leg in a 2013 crash, then was emotionally devastated after accidentally striking and killing driver Kevin Ward during a New York sprint car race in 2014. He's facing a civil suit filed by the driver's family.

He announced last year that 2016 would

Cloney shuts down Chanticleers in CWS Game 1 win

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — JC Cloney just keeps rolling along at the College World Series, pushing Arizona to the doorstep of its second national championship in five years.

Cloney pitched a four-hitter, Ryan Aguilar drove in two runs and the Wildcats beat Coastal Carolina 3-0 in Game 1 of the College World Series finals on Monday night.

Cloney extended his scoreless innings streak at the CWS to 16. The junior left-hander pitched seven innings in the Wildcats' 3-0 win over UC Santa Barbara last Wednesday.

"I'm not really tired right now. The adrenaline is still going," said Cloney, who threw 122 pitches. "I'm still trying to figure out what just happened."

He wasn't the only one. The Chanticleers, playing in the finals in their first CWS appearance, went down in order four times and never had a runner advance to second base until the ninth inning.

Cloney (8-4) allowed four singles, walked three and struck out six in the second complete game of his career. He was spot on with his location of a fastball in the 80s, a cutter, breaking ball and change-up. He induced 13 groundouts.

"You want to sit on a fastball, and he throws you a cutter. And you sit on the off-speed, and he throws a fastball," said the Chanticleers' Michael Paez.

The Wildcats (49-22) can wrap up their fifth national title and first since 2012 with a win Tuesday.

"They all know where we're at

and what we're doing," first-year coach Jay Johnson said. "We need to prepare well tonight, the coaching staff and players alike, and get ready to attack the opportunity."

The Wildcats scored in the first when Aguilar singled in Cody Ramer, who led off with a double. Aguilar added another RBI single in the seventh to make it 3-0.

Coastal Carolina (53-18) threatened in the ninth. Anthony Marks singled leading off and Zach Remillard bunted down the third-base line for a base hit on a close play. Connor Owings hit into a double play, and Cloney caught G.K. Young looking at strike three to end the game.

Arizona's defense, which has committed only one error at the CWS, continued to come up big. Second baseman Ramer, playing

A legend passes

Summitt was revered pioneer for all people

KNOXVILLE — Pat Summitt, legendary Lady Volunteers basketball coach, mentor and mother-figure to her players; a revered ambassador for her university and state; a trailblazer for women; and a role model for people all over the world passed away Tuesday, in Knoxville at the age of 64.

Born Patricia Sue Head on June 14, 1952 in Clarksville, Summitt arrived at the University of Tennessee for her first job as a 22-year-old physical education teacher and coach in 1974. As it turned out, the move to Knoxville would be the only one she'd make in her career. She leaves a legacy of greatness and grace that will never be forgotten.

Famous for her intensity, Summitt's competitive fire was reflected in her steely blue eyes and an icy stare that often connected with, and strengthened the resolve of, her student-athletes. Conversely, she possessed warmth and humor that demonstrated, in a motherly way, that her critiques were from the heart of someone who truly cared. They were simply methods of coaxing the very best she could get out of young women for whom she was responsible and preparing them for the rigors of the game and life.

More than once, she reflected, "they don't care how much you know until they know how much

you care."

Summitt served as head coach of the Lady Volunteers for 38 seasons and recorded an astounding overall record of 1,098-208 (.840). She made the UT program known and respected worldwide for its standard of excellence.

Her incredible body of work in that regard earned her the title "Naismith Women's Collegiate Coach of the Century" for the 1900s. It was a hallmark achievement for a leader who received a plethora of national (seven times) and SEC coach of the year (eight times) accolades during her career.

"We are deeply saddened by today's news of Pat Summitt's passing. We send our deepest condolences to her son, Tyler, and to her family and friends," said Tennessee athletics director Dave Hart.

"Pat Summitt is synonymous with Tennessee, but she truly is a global icon who transcended sports and spent her entire life making a difference in other peoples' lives. She was a genuine, humble leader who focused on helping people achieve more than they thought they were capable of accomplishing. Pat was so much more than a Hall of Fame coach; she was a mother, mentor, leader, friend, humanitarian and inspiration to so many. Her legacy will

The Flames open the 2016-17 season with the annual Homecoming exhibition game against Piedmont College on Nov. 5 at 2:30 p.m. The regular-season schedule begins on Nov. 11 when the Lee men will be in Carrollton, Ga., for the Peach Belt/Gulf South Challenge hosted by the University of West Georgia.

Mike Kobani, Senior (Bodo City, Nigeria — Appalachian State)

Mike joins the Lee program for his final season of eligibility after spending the first three years of his career at Appalachian State in North Carolina. He will provide immediate size, rebounding, and a post presence for the Flames both offensively and defensively. Kobani transfers after appearing in 47 games for the Mountaineers over the past 3 seasons. He holds a career-high of 18 points, coming against The Citadel in 2014. Before App State, Mike helped High Point Christian to a 25-7 record as a high-school senior averaging 12 points and 8 rebounds per contest. Mike will graduate from Lee in 2017 with a degree in Sociology.

Cody Jones, Sophomore, Holly Pond, Ala. (Sewanee — University of the South)

Cody comes to Lee after a standout freshman season playing for Coach Bubba Smith at Sewanee. Jones will be an immediate asset for the Flames in terms of his shooting, scoring, and ball-handling ability. He transfers to Lee after a freshman campaign that saw him earn SAA Newcomer of the Year honors. Cody scored in double figures 17 times for the Tigers, with high marks of 26 against Millsaps and 27 against Berry. For the season, Jones cleared 39% shooting from behind the 3-point line.

Cleveland Summit eyed for potential redevelopment

The Cleveland Summit apartments might be next on the list to undergo redevelopment downtown.

The complex at 44 Inman St. was formerly the historic Cherokee Hotel and currently serves as public housing.

During a voting session Monday, the Cleveland City Council approved reimbursing the Industrial Development Board \$15,000 for a structural condition analysis to determine if the building is a good candidate for redevelopment.

The idea was proposed to the City Council through a memo from Senior City Planner Corey Divel.

"Conversion of this site from a current subsidized housing complex to a redeveloped use based on market rates would be a critical step in raising surrounding property values, and act as a catalyst for further redevelopment along Church Street and the immediate area," Divel wrote.

Mayor Tom Rowland commented that he and Doug Berry, the Chamber of Commerce's vice president of economic development, are meeting with a prospective buyer for the property next week. Rowland said he will inform the Council on how the meeting goes at the next City Council meeting.

The Summit is owned by Emerald Housing, which is owned by Chris Hodges and headquartered in

Knoxville.

"The city has had an ongoing conversation with MainStreet [Cleveland] and there has been desire on a part of the businesses downtown to hopefully improve that affordable housing and to possibly take that Cherokee Hotel back to a boutique hotel or permanent housing like apartments or condominiums," Berry said.

To do that, knowing the condition of the building and its value is essential.

"We have to make sure there are no major structural flaws," said Berry. "We don't suspect any, but you can't take that for granted."

Barry also explained the \$15,000 would not be spent all at once. The money is going to fund "third-party

inspections by qualified engineers."

If it is found the building is feasible for redevelopment, a new public housing facility will be built in a different location for those families. Rowland and Berry confirmed it is in the works for an area on South Lee Highway to become the new home for residents of The Summit through the Section 8 public housing vouchers program.

"It would be a great improvement in quality of life for the residents to move to a more grounded, more traditional and modern facility," Berry said.

Once everything is approved, it is expected it would not take more than 24 months to build a new facility for Summit residents.

Redevelopment of The Summit back

to a hotel has been a potential discussed by the Council for the past year. A market feasibility study was conducted by Hotel & Leisure Advisors on the potential success of a downtown hotel and conference based on the current and future market. The former Cherokee Hotel was listed as a potential location. However, the study listed the Old Woolen Mill as a better location.

Designs for converting The Summit into a hotel were also developed by University of Tennessee students, as a part of the Smart Communities Initiative partnership between the university and the city. These were presented as ideas, but no concrete plans had been made with the current owner.

me," Fivas said.

He also had an idea on the areas he wanted to focus on, if he became city manager.

"We need to invest in our infrastructure, for our industries and our possible retail growth," Fivas said.

Fivas served as the town manager for Indian Trail, N.C., from 2010 to 2015.

Prior to that, he was the city manager for Owosso, Mich. He has also worked as the executive director of downtown development for Owosso and assistant director of state affairs for Michigan Municipal League. He has also served as policy adviser to the Michigan State House of Representatives.

Fivas and his wife Julie have two children, Ellie and Gabbi. Both daughters will be in middle school. Some of Fivas' in-laws live in Loudon County.

The Council plans to hold annual reviews of the city manager with the first being scheduled to be complete by the end of February 2017. Annual reviews are held for every other city employee.

The City Council also created an assistant city manager/CFO position to replace the city clerk/finance director position by a unanimous vote Monday. The position will essentially oversee the same functions as the previous title. An update to the city staff organizational chart will be presented to the Council at a future meeting to reflect which assistant city manager is over which departments.

The Cleveland City Council also passed the final reading of an ordinance requiring two businesses operating as recycling centers in the wrong property zoning to close within two years, despite the pleas of two business owners and a petition of 600 customers.

"They think it is truly unfair," Larry D'Agata of Can It Recycling said.

The resolution was approved 5 to 2 with Councilmen Charlie McKenzie and Avery Johnson voting against it. The ordinance change had passed on first reading last month and then was delayed at the request of

the D'Agatas of Can It Recycling, who own one of the recycling centers in question. The D'Agatas have hired attorney Allen Murphy to work with them on this matter.

However, an option that had not previously been discussed did get some attention. The possibility of creating a zoning overlay, which could define specific zoning requirements for that section and legally allow recycling centers and salvage yards, was discussed. The two businesses in question would be defined as salvage yards, according to state law.

Councilman Bill Estes asked if the two businesses could seek a change to the commercial zoning to allow recycling centers or salvage yards "but maybe not across the whole board." The planning staff had previously mentioned that allowing such businesses in all commercial zones would not be recommended.

Jonathan Jobe, Development and Engineering director, said a zoning overlay would be the only option.

"We could overlay that South Lee Highway corridor," Jobe said.

Similar overlays exist for the Historic District, East Inman Street and the Interstate corridors. These overlays allow for requirements to be written for a specific area without changing what the zoning regulations of an already established zone.

Estes said this was an option the owners could pursue, if they chose, within the next two years. However, the Council did not give an indication of whether such an overlay would be approved.

The company has been in business in different locations on South Lee Highway for more than two decades.

Murphy said the issue needed further discussion and asked for 60 days to talk with both business owners.

"I do not agree that the option presented by the Council is a reasonable one. I am a little surprised that with so many businessmen sitting on the Council that it was suggested. This is not a realistic option for

anyone," said Ian Nelson of M&N Recycling, the other business that would be impacted.

Nelson said he started his business three years ago and entered a 10-year lease on the property. He asked the Council to give him the remaining seven years to operate, so that he could honor his lease. He said he needed this time to relocate and notify his customers.

Attorney Andy Brown, who represents a competing recycling company which is in the proper zoning, said his client first filed a complaint with the city that the two recycling centers on South Lee Highway were not in the correct zoning nearly a year ago.

"The first complaint was filed in September 2015," Brown said. "We would like to push this matter to its conclusion."

State law does not give cities the right to refuse approval of a license for a legitimate business. In prior meetings, it had been stated that it is the responsibility of the business owners to ensure they are in the correct zoning.

"His (Brown's) client has a vested interest in putting my client out of business, and I think that is the thing that is most unseemly about this is you have a private citizen coming to the [Council] and putting them out of business," Murphy said. "You are being used by a private citizen to put two tax payers out of business."

The D'Agatas have recently purchased the property they operate from now. They have repeatedly said that simply starting over at another location is not an option.

Banks said he did not want to set a precedent for other businesses to operate in the incorrect zoning by allowing these two to continue.

"I don't think this was done with any malice or ill intent on anyone's part," Murphy said.

The Council also unanimously approved:

- Increasing the number of Class 2 beer permits allowed in the city limits from 10 to 12.

- Creating a new municipal inspection fee upon retail food store wine licensees.

Prosecutors ask for church shooting factors

CHARLESTON, S.C. (AP) — Federal prosecutors in South Carolina want to know what mitigating factors the defense plans to present during the sentencing phase of the death penalty trial of accused Charleston church shooter Dylann Roof.

Prosecutors note in court documents filed Monday such disclosure before the trial was ordered in the Boston Marathon bombing case. The documents said that providing the information beforehand will allow the government to investigate defense claims and also help seat an impartial jury.

Mitigating circumstances such as drug abuse or mental illness that the defense will rely on in sentencing are generally not required to be revealed until after a defendant is found guilty. If the defendant is found guilty, there is a second part of the

trial to determine the sentence.

The government wants the judge to order the defense to reveal such factors by Oct. 1. The 22-year-old Roof is scheduled to stand trial Nov. 7 in the slayings of nine black parishioners at Emanuel AME Church a year ago.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Jay Richardson noted in the filings that U.S. District Judge George O'Toole Jr. ordered the defense to provide such mitigating factors before the trial in case of Dzhokhar Tsarnaev, who was sentenced to death for his role in the marathon bombings. Explosions at the race in Boston on April 15, 2013, killed three people and injured more than 260.

Richardson wrote that by providing adequate notice of the mitigating factors, the government will have time to investigate and rebut them in court.

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EU leaders plot a future without Britain

BRUSSELS (AP) — European Union leaders began plotting a future without Britain on Tuesday, urging the island nation and economic powerhouse to disentangle itself as fast as possible from the other 27 nations in the bloc to avoid extending the turmoil that has been roiling European and global markets.

EU Council President Donald Tusk said he was planning a special meeting of the EU leaders minus Cameron in Bratislava in September to chart a way ahead, after last week's referendum made abundantly clear that a business-as-usual approach to Britain leaving could possibly threaten the unity of the entire bloc.

On Tuesday, Prime Minister David Cameron held talks with European Commission President Jean-Claude Juncker hours ahead of an EU summit in Brussels where the outgoing British leader is expected to say that exit talks might not be launched before October. There has been talk that Britain wants informal negotiations on what the U.K.'s future relations with Europe might look like before that happens — a notion many in the bloc have rejected.

Juncker and other European leaders insist they won't begin any talks until Britain invokes the Article 50 of the EU's Treaty of Lisbon, which sets in motion a two-year process to split away from the group designed to unify Europe after the horrors of World War II.

In an unprecedented emergency session of the EU parliament, called after Britain voted Thursday to leave the union, Juncker demanded that Britain clarify its future.

"I want the U.K. to clarify its position. Not today, not tomorrow at 9 a.m., but soon," he told lawmakers Tuesday. "We cannot allow ourselves to remain in a

prolonged period of uncertainty."

Juncker said he had banned his policy commissioners from holding any secret talks with Britain on its future until London triggers the exit clause.

"No notification. No negotiation," he said to resounding applause.

Tusk was already looking further ahead. He said the 27 EU heads and state and government — minus Cameron — would hold a special meeting in September to discuss "the new process of deeper reflection, a new impulse for Europe, a new future for Europe."

"We need a few weeks to prepare this process," Tusk said.

The immediate reaction to the

British departure — also called the Brexit — in the EU parliament was emotional Tuesday. Nigel Farage, a British member of the European Parliament and a leader in Britain's "leave" movement, was booed and jeered when he urged Europe to give Britain a good trade deal when it leaves, saying jobs in Germany's auto sector might be at stake if it doesn't.

"Why don't we just be pragmatic, sensible, grown-up, reasonable ... and cut a sensible tariff-free deal?" he asked.

In a speech interrupted several times, Farage warned: "The UK will not be the last member state to leave the European Union."

Bearing out his words, French

far-right leader Marine Le Pen called the British vote "an extraordinary victory for democracy — a slap for a European system based more and more on fear, blackmail and lies."

German Chancellor Angela Merkel, meanwhile, said Tuesday she will use "all her strength" to prevent the EU from drifting apart. At the EU summit, she and other leaders hoped to hear Cameron's position and chart the way forward. Cameron, head of the failed "remain" side, has said he will not be the leader to invoke Article 50, leaving that for his predecessor, who is to be chosen by October.

Britain's "leave" leaders hope the nation can still enjoy many perks of the EU internal market for business, while being able to deny EU citizens entry to the U.K. to address concerns about unlimited EU immigration. Merkel, head of the EU's biggest economy, made clear that isn't an option.

In an address to the German Parliament before heading to Brussels, Merkel said she expects that Britain will want to maintain "close relations" with the EU once it leaves, but warned it cannot expect a business-as-usual approach.

"Whoever wants to leave this family cannot expect to have no more obligations but to keep privileges," she said. "We will ensure that the negotiations are not carried out with the principle of cherry-picking."

She and other leaders joined Juncker in saying there can be no talks with Britain until it starts the formal procedure to leave.

Lawmakers paid tribute to Britain's EU commissioner in Brussels, Jonathan Hill, who resigned after last week's vote. He wept in the parliament Tuesday as he received a standing ovation.

Michelle Obama and daughters in Africa to push girls' education

KAKATA, Liberia (AP) — First lady Michelle Obama visited a leadership camp for girls in Liberia to launch her latest Africa visit Monday, urging the teens in one of the world's poorest countries to keep fighting to stay in school.

With her own teenage daughters joining her, Obama told the girls she was "just so thrilled to be here with you."

"I'm here to shine a big bright light on you," she said.

Education for girls is the central theme of the first lady's trip, which also includes stops in Morocco and Spain. She was welcomed on her arrival in Liberia with a red carpet and traditional dancers.

In connection with the first lady's visit, USAID announced up to \$27 million in funding in Liberia programming for Let Girls Learn, an initiative launched by Mrs. Obama and President Barack Obama last year.

The first lady is traveling with her mother and daughters Malia, 17, who recently graduated from high school, and Sasha, 15.

Liberia was battered by civil wars between 1989 and 2003. Ebola swept the country in 2014, killing more than 4,800. Schools were closed for months.

The country was founded as part of an effort to resettle freed American slaves and has deep ties to the United States. The country's oldest vocational high school, located in Kakata, is named for African-American civil rights activist Booker T. Washington.

The school suspended mid-term exams scheduled to start Monday "to allow the students to give Mrs. Obama a rousing welcome to appreciate what the United States has done for us," principal Harris Tarnue said.

Lebanese army detains 103 Syrians in wake of bombings

BEIRUT (AP) — Lebanese troops detained 103 Syrians for illegal entry into the country in a security sweep Tuesday, a day after a series of deadly bombings struck a village near the Syrian border, the military said.

The government warned of a mounting challenge in tiny Lebanon, which abuts the war-torn Syria, underlining the magnitude of Monday's attack that saw nine bombings, eight of them from suicide attackers, strike in the small Christian village of Qaa, killing five people.

"The attack on the Lebanese national security and the unfamiliar manner in which it was executed usher in a new kind of phase in the state's confrontation with the dark forces of ter-

rorism," a Cabinet statement said.

The bombings triggered fear and panic among Qaa's residents and a deepening sense of foreboding in Lebanon, which has grappled for over five years with spillovers from Syria's civil war.

Tuesday was declared a national day of mourning and authorities postponed funerals for the five killed in Monday's bombings, citing security reasons. A major religious event scheduled in the capital, Beirut, by the militant Hezbollah group was also postponed.

Also citing security concerns, the ministry of culture postponed the opening of the Bacchus Temple, part of the famed ruins of Baalbek. A troupe

of Syrian actors roaming the Bekaa Valley with a performance about refugee woes postponed its tour. A limited curfew was imposed in Qaa and the surrounding area.

The army said it carried out security raids in six areas in the Baalbek region, which has many informal Syrian refugee settlements. It said nine motorcycles and two vehicles were confiscated and two Lebanese were arrested with illegal weapons.

Monday's explosions, four in the early morning and five at night, also wounded nearly 30 in Qaa. Later in the day, two bombers blew themselves up outside the village church as people gathered for funerals of those killed earlier Monday.

Israel bans access for non-Muslims to Jerusalem holy site

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israeli police on Tuesday banned non-Muslims from a contentious Jerusalem holy site until the end of the Muslim holy month of Ramadan following two days of clashes with Palestinian rioters at the site.

Police spokesman Micky Rosenfeld said rocks and other objects were hurled toward police forces and Jewish worshippers in a nearby plaza. A 73-year-old woman was lightly wounded and police arrested 16 suspects in the disturbances that have been going on for three days, Rosenfeld said.

As a result, police decided to close access to Jewish worshippers and other visitors for the remainder of the week to prevent tensions with Muslim worshippers until Ramadan is over.

Since Sunday, Palestinians had holed up in the Al-Aqsa Mosque atop the mount and attacked officers with fireworks and other objects they had stockpiled inside.

The mosque is part of a compound sacred to both Muslims and Jews. Muslims refer to it as the Noble Sanctuary, where they believe the Prophet Muhammad embarked on a night journey to heaven, while Jews refer to it as the Temple Mount, where the two Jewish temples stood in biblical times.

Violence had erupted at the site in mid-September before spreading elsewhere. Since then Palestinians have carried out dozens of attacks, including stabbings, shootings and car ramming assaults, killing 32 Israelis and two visiting Americans. About 200

Palestinians have been killed during that time, most identified by Israel as attackers.

The unrest has led to renewed calls for peace talks, which last broke down more than two years ago.

Also Tuesday, visiting U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon told Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu that while he understood Israel's security concerns, any measures it took would not "solve the underlying causes of the cycles of violence" that have plagued the region.

"I encourage you to take the courageous steps necessary to prevent a one-state reality of perpetual conflict that is incompatible with realizing the national aspirations of Israeli and Palestinian people," Ban said,

speaking in Jerusalem alongside Netanyahu.

Netanyahu asked Ban to use his final six months in office to rectify what he called the United Nations' unfair treatment of Israel. He singled out the U.N. Human Rights Council, which he said always condemns Israel, the "country that does more to promote and protect human rights and liberal values than any other in the blood-soaked Middle East."

"Our progressive democracy has faced more country specific resolutions more country specific condemnation at the UN Human Rights Council than all the other countries combined," Netanyahu said. "And I believe that this is a profound betrayal of the United Nation's noble mandate."
