The Delaware County Sheriff's Office was recently notified by a resident of the receipt of a scam fundraising call. The resident received a telephone call from

an individual claiming to be National Fireman's Association soliciting the resident's personal identifying information as well as a monetary donation. In this case, the caller terminated the call after their solicitation attempts were unsuccessful.

Every day, police, firefighters and emergency medical workers risk their lives to make communities safer. To show your support, you may immediately consider making a monetary donation when you receive an unexpected call from someone requesting donations for a police, fire or other first responder agency or organization, DuMond said.

DuMond urges residents to consider the following facts before acting:

• Simply having the words "police," "firefighter," or emergency responder," in an organization's name does not mean police, firefighters or emergency medical workers are members of the group, or that it is a lice or firefighter groups may not be tax deductible. Many kinds of organizations are tax exempt, including fraternal organizations, labor unions, and trade associations, but donations to them

• As a result of the fraudulent fundraising calls that are being made each day soliciting donations, the vast majority of our local police and fire service organizations will only solicit your donations through local fund-drive mailings. Telephonic fund raising activities are generally announced in advance of any fundraising campaign.

- · Research the organization and then call the organization or your local law enforcement or fire department to verify a fund-raiser's claim to be collecting on behalf of the organization or department. If the claim cannot be verified, report the solicitation to your local
- Ask fund-raisers for identification. Many states require paid fund-raisers to identify themselves as such and to name the organization for which they're
- Ask how your contribution will be used. Ask what percentage of your contribution will go to the fire or police organization, department, or program. Also ask if your contribution will be used locally. Ask for written information; it will buy you time and help you make a
- is tax-deductible. Make your check payable to the official name of the group or charity. Avoid cash and credit or debit card donations; Cash can be lost or stolen and credit/debit card accounts can be compromised.
- Be wary if a fund-raiser suggests you'll receive special treatment for donating. For example, no legitimate fund-raiser would guarantee that you won't be stopped for speeding if you have a police organization's decal in your car window. Don't feel intimidated about declining to donate. A caller who uses intimidation tactics is likely to be a scam artist. Report the call to your local law enforcement



Expert Tips for Welcoming a Kitten

Fostering kittens and cats has risen in popularity during these unprecedented times, and many pet lovers are becoming fosters to urge to cuddle your kitten right away.

Power Sports

As your kitten gains confidence in its new surroundings, she will want to explore more. 





From July 30th to August 5th, 2021, Delaware County Public Health received 20 new positive cases of COVID-19. There are currently 32 active cases in the county with 2 hospitalizations.

This dashboard is posted weekly on Thursdays.

According to the CDC, Delaware County is currently at substantial level of community transmission. Substantial level of community transmission is defined as 8-9.99% positivity rate in last 7 days. The CDC and Delaware County Public Health recommend that everyone, even those who are fully vaccinated, wear a mask in indoor public locations, if you are in an area of substantial or high transmission, to maximize protection from all variants including Delta and prevent possibly spreading

it to others. Vaccines help protect people from getting CO-VID-19 or from getting severely ill from it. Unvaccinated people should get vaccinated and continue masking. CDC also recommends that fully vaccinated people wear masks in public indoor settings in areas of substantial or high transmission. With the B.1.617.2 (Delta) variant rapidly spreading throughout the country, this is more urgent than ever.

The highest spread of cases and severe outcomes is happening in places with low vaccination rates. 47.2% of Delaware County's population is fully vaccinated.

Fair Board Accommodates Pandemic Precautions
To Ensure Safe Fun For All

The Delaware County Fair will return to Walton Aug. 16–21 after the hiatus of 2020, but people can expect to see a few changes since the last fair in 2019.

One of the biggest changes is that derby tickets will only be sold the day of the event due to changing venue capacity restrictions, Ed Rossley, president of the Delaware County Fair, said. Admission tickets for the fair will only be sold during the fair week.

Rossley said there will be fewer commercial vendors this year and vendors will be spaced

Along with encouraging social distancing, there will be posters reminding people

to wear a mask if they are not fully vaccinated, although Rossley said there is no way to enforce this protocol.



Driver and spectapopularity of the events tor safety is a concern throughout the fair, and especially important at the demolition derby. All drivers must be at least 16 years old, 16 and 17 with parental permission in writing, and wear a helmet and seatbelt at all times. Participating vehicles must have a hard top with all glass and chrome removed.

Drivers must make contact every 60 seconds; no sandbagging or drivers face disqualification. Drivers are not allowed to hit the driver's door, which are painted white, or they



> The antique engine demonstration started in 1977. For several years it was a handful of antique engine enthusiasts who brought their machines to the fair until they merged with the Catskill Mountain Antique Engine and Machinery Club in 1989. The club with its many members from Delaware and surrounding counties really expanded its presence on the

fairgrounds since then.

Members built a barnshaped buildina 2014 to house antique engines and tools, and each year the display has grown. To show what farmers do with harvested corn, in 2015 a wooden silo was built by Unalam, which is also known as Unadilla Silo Company. In 2016, the club built a cupola on top of the barn and sided the water house on the fairgrounds. Inside the Antique Engine Building, the club added an antique butcher's wheel.

The club built a blacksmiths shop, in 2017, near the barn that usually has demonstrations all week by area blacksmiths. Three of the walls fold down so that people can watch the demonstration from every angle.

"We got Raymond Orals' blacksmith shop," said Bull of the donated forge. "The shop originated in Rock Rift."

This past year, the organization poured a cement floor in the building so it is more handicapped accessible.

To raise funds for the club, the club will hold a raffle for a shed, crosscut saw with painting, tractor flower planter, four afghans and a peddle tractor. Tickets can be purchased at the antique engine building during fair week.







ARENA SORTING TUESDAY NIGHT AT HORSE SHOW RING

POWER WHEELS DERBY

TUESDAY AT 11

This year, the smallest derby drivers will take to the track on Tuesday, Aug. 17 at 11 a.m. in front of the grandstand.

Rules

- 1. This is supposed to be fun for the kids. Parents let them have fun! Judges can rule that children can't participate if there are modifications to the car beyond those allowed.
- 2. Kids 3-10 years of age may participate. Two age groups: 3-5 and 6-IO years if there are too many kids, otherwise we will run one heat.
- 3. Derby is limited to 6 to 12 volt power wheels only. Connecting multiple batteries together is


not permissible.

- 4. No added reinforcements for strength.
- 5. All doors and tailgates must be strapped shut. Use zip ties or duct tape or other flexible products to make them stay shut. No sharp edges.
- 6. Stock tires only. No screws in tires, no chains, etc.
- 7. Do not raise or lower. They must be the stock height that came from the store.
- 8. The vehicle is allowed to have up to a 12 volt lawn mower or motorcycle battery. Battery cannot be mounted in the passenger seat, and the battery must be secured and sealed away from the child.
 - 9. Decorative chang-

es can be made to the Power Wheels to make it look like a derby car, however, there can be no reinforcement to the Power Wheels. Changes and additions can only be decorative, such as header pipes sticking up, painting the car, etc.

Each Power Wheels vehicle will have four balloons attached to its corners. Four deflated balloons means the driver is done. Please have your children stay in their car.

- 10. Helmets are mandatory; bicycle helmet is okay.
- 11. Shoes or sneakers required. No sandals.
- 12. Must have a seat belt and it must be used.
 - 13. No passengers.
 - 14. Everyone must



To give folks some background on the different classes offered by NYTPA here is a rundown:

The Super Stock Trac-

ferent types of tractors in the same class. Weights and regulations make this class very competitive. Super Stock Diesel tractors weight 8,500 lbs., and are limited to 3 turbo stages and 30.5x32 tires. The Super Stock Alcohol tractors are limited to 504 cid and weigh in at 7500 lbs.

The Super Modified Two Wheel Drive Truck division is truly a unique class. The class is filled with truck bodies ranging from 1923 "T" buckets to late model full-size truck bodies. The trucks are limited to 575 cu inch motors ranging from basic blown alcohol injected BBC to supercharged injection drag racing









engines with full data logger computers an even twin turbo charged by hemi engines. Add the combination of the max weight of 6,200 lbs. with 3000+ HP, then add in a 30" high drawbar - and it can only equal in results of crowd-pleasing, aweinspiring massive wheel standing runs.

Modified Tractors are unlike anything you have seen on the farm. Take a farm tractor and strip it down to just the rear-end and rebuild it with all custom parts with a number of possible engine combinations. You can use two or three automotive engines, aircraft engines, or jet turbines or a combination of all. What you get is what is known as a "modified" pulling tractor. Mounting

the engines in various configurations, crank to crank, sideways or even stacking them, make the competition even tougher. Hook these tractors up to a transfer sled and just watch the dirt fly with wheel speeds more than 80 mph.

The Super Farm class is considered an entry level class into sanctioned tractor pulling. These tractors are diesel powered weighing 9,300 lbs. and run 24.5x32 tires. The engines have a max displacement of 640 cubic inches and a sinale 3x3 turbo. The engine must retain a stock OEM engine block, cylinder head exhaust and intake manifold. Component chassis are not allowed. This combination allows a lot of different colors to compete.

The Limited Pro-Stock 4.1 Tractors are new to New York Tractor Puller this year with 8 active competing tractors. These are diesel tractors with a maximum cu of 640 and 8 cylinders. OEM aftermarket replacement blocks are permitted.

The Limited Pro Diesel Trucks have fans shouting and cheering for their brand loyalty as these 8000 lb. pickups come to shows. Running an OEM body makes this class easier to relate to their farm and work vehicles in the parking lot.

Hay Section - 6 classes – Large or Small Square

Chopped Silage Section 2 Hay Crop Classes plus Corn Silage

Baleage Section - 2 classes; Corn Plants – 1 class

Awards for Section Champions and Overall **Grand Champion**

Section 005: Dry Hay

A. Each Entry will consist of a complete small square hay bale or 6" section ("flake") of a large square bale or enough round bale dry hay to fill a 13 gallon trash bag.

B. Hay bales will be judged on the basis of color, leafiness, fineness of stem, moisture appropriate for storage, freedom from mold, spoilage and weeds, and representativeness and appropriateness of forage species for class.

C. Entrants are encouraged to carefully select the class that best represents the hay they are entering.

D. Hay Champion will be named from among the hay entries.

Section 006: Chopped Haycrop Silage

A. Haycrop will be judged on moisture, color, odor, freedom from mold, spoilage and weeds, representativeness and appropriateness of forage species for class. Samples will also be taken from entries and analyzed for nutritional and fermentation profile before final placings are made. B. Entrants are encouraged to carefully select the class that best represents the haycrop silage they are entering.

C. Haylage entries should be placed in a 1 gallon zip lock bag, with exhibitor tag placed within the bag.

D. Haycrop silage placings and Champion will be named from the silage entries based on visual assessment, laboratory analysis, and predicted milk yield when analyzed in a typical high producing dairy cattle diet using nutritional software.

Section 007: Chopped **Corn Silage**

A. Corn Silage will be judged on moisture, color, odor, freedom from mold, spoilage and weeds, relative amount of grain in silage and adequacy of kernel processing. Samples of entries will also be analyzed for nutritional content and fermentation profile before final placings are made.

B. Corn Silage entries should be placed in a 1 gallon zip lock bag, with exhibitor tag placed within the bag.

C. Corn Silage placings and Champion will be named from the corn silage entries based on visual assessment (including degree of kernel processing), laboratory analysis, and predicted milk yield when analyzed in a typical high producing dairy cattle diet using nutritional software.

Section 008: Baleage

A. Haycrop baleage (large square and round bale) will be judged on moisture, color, odor, freedom from mold, spoilage and weeds, representativeness of forage species for class. Samples will also be taken from entries and analyzed for nutritional and fermentation profile before final placings are made.

B. Entrants are encouraged to carefully select the class that best represents the haycrop baleage they are entering.

C. Entries should be brought in sufficient quan-

tity to fill a 13 gallon trash bag, with exhibitor tag securely affixed or contained within. Entries will be transferred into bags for display provided by the Superintendents upon judging.

D. Haycrop baleage placings and Champion will be named from the baleage entries based on visual assessment, laboratory analysis and predicted milk yield when analyzed in a typical high producing dairy cattle diet using nutritional software.

Section 009: Corn Stalks

A. Stalks of corn will be judged on the basis of their potential yield and quality. Factors will include plant size, appropriate ear development for typical field conditions, and freeness from visually evident leaf disease and nutritional stress.

B. Stalks (5) should be bundled tightly by two bands.

C. Entries must contain with root balls. Corn stalks

that have been cut off will be disqualified and removed from the contest. Soil may be left on roots to prevent drying of stalks. Entrants must specify the RM day on entry tag and are encouraged to include additional corn hybrid information on their exhibitor tag.





Watch miniature horses and ponies pull carriages through an obstacle course - handlers are judged on reinsmanship. Miniature horses and ponies are also judged on color, jumping, driving and trotting.

English show and saddle seat-style riders will also compete Sunday in showmanship, hunter pleasure and timed obstacle driving courses.





In the Pleasure Carriage Driving classes the equine is to be hitched to a safe, suitable 2 or 4 wheeled vehicle in light harness. They will be asked to show at a walk, trot and extended trot, and to stand quietly. Headers are allowed.

Hunt seat competition will begin Thursday at

8 a.m. Included in the program are flat and jumping classes, where the horse's movement and form are judged, and equitation classes, where the rider's ability on both flat and fence courses are tested. There are classes for men, women and children.

At the end of the day-long competition, championships are presented to the winners in the following categories: Open Hunter, Open Pleasure, Adult Hunter, Green Hunter, Junior (14-17) Hunter over fences, Junior (14-17) Hunter flat, Children's (13 and under) Hunter

over fences, Children's (13 & under) Hunter flat, Adult walk/trot Hunter, Junior (11-17) walk/trot Hunter and 10 & Under walk/trot Hunter.

Thursday evening, beginning no earlier than 5, is the Cowboy Challenge. This is a timed

trial obstacle course for horse and rider, and is broken into two age groups, 17 and under and 18 and older. The challenge consists of at least eight obstacles, including a dismount and one task that must be completed on foot.

Each contestant has n two minutes to complete the course. Space is limited to 20 riders in each class.

Friday is the Western Division competition, starting at 8 a.m., which features reining, equitation, showmanship, road hack, "pleasure," therapeutic leadline and stock seat equitation. Horses are judged on the quality of their gaits - walk, jog and lope, lead changes at

the lope, response to rider, manners and disposition. Children and adults who ride horses as therapy will compete in two categories, leadline and equitation. At the end of the day championships will be awarded in the Pee Wee (10 years and under), Children's (11-13), Western (11-17 years) in walk trot, Junior Western (14-17), Adult Walk-Trot, Adult Western and Best All-Around Horse/ Rider Combination - divisions.

On Saturday, Aug. 18, beginning at 8 a.m. children and adults will compete in the Gymkhana division. Classes include Dash, Cloverleaf barrels, California Pole Bending, Straight Barrels and Keyhole. After the preliminary rounds, the youth, junior, senior and open champions will be crowned.



Welcome back, Delaware County Fairgoers:

We are extremely pleased that the 134th annual Delaware County Fair is set to take place from August 16 - 21. The fair is as much a part of our agency history, as it is for our county and the communities that are deep seated in agricultural history. It may also delight some of you to know that as usual, The Delaware County Sheriff's Office will be actively patrolling around the fairgrounds and parking lot all week to help ensure the public's safety and welfare.

In anticipation of an enjoyable fair event, we'd like to offer a few tips to help keep you all safe and healthy during this year's event:

1. Check the weather for Walton and be sure you are adequately prepared for the weather forecast on whichever day you choose to attend.

- 2. The fair is exciting and we understand that you want to be in attendance, but if you feel sick, stay home.
- 3. If you require handicap parking, ensure that your official handicap parking placard/ permit is out and visible upon entrance into the parking lot, so that the parking attendants can easily direct you to the appropriate parking location.
- 4. Make sure your vehicle is locked and any valuable personal property within, is out of sight. Neither the Delaware County Fair nor the Delaware County Sheriff's Office are financially responsible for lost, stolen or missing items. If you don't need it, it's probably best to leave it at home. We love pets, but do not bring your pets to the fairgrounds. You will be turned away at the gate as no pets are allowed



on the grounds and leaving them in the car for the day is definitely not an option. Only service animals are allowed on the grounds.

6. Understand that the fair board has stringent rules for a reason, therefore, due to homeland security regulations, all bags and coolers are subject to search at the gates. Only sealed, non-alcoholic containers will be allowed through the gates. No alcohol is allowed on the fairgrounds. If you are found to be in possession alcohol (in violation of the fair rules), it will be confiscated.

7. If you find that you have lost or found personal property while on the Delaware County Fairgrounds, be sure to contact the secretary's office or the Sheriff's

Office command post to report the loss and/ or to turn over the found property. The Sheriff's command post is located on the eastern side of the fairgrounds next to the EMS Building near the Fair Street entrance.

8. We know that children and vulnerable others mean the world to you and to us, therefore, if you are attending the 2021 Delaware County Fair with children or people who may wander and become lost, we highly recommend that you take daily photos of your children or such other people. These photos are extremely valuable for giving swift and accurate descriptions and reports to our patrols on the fairgrounds.

9. Anyone creating or participating in any

unruly, disorderly or an otherwise inappropriate or disruptive events/behaviors will be escorted off the premises and may risk being banned from the premises for the entire week. If you are banned and choose to reenter, you may be arrested for trespassing as the fairgrounds are privately owned.

For several years our Sheriff's Office Community Relations Exhibit was located near the end of Fairway Street. This year we have been afforded a location within the Commercial Tent near the "elbow." We love to interact with our citizens, so please come see us, peruse our many educational and informative handouts, pick up some promotional items, ask us about opportunities for careers in law enforcement, or just say hello. It's been a long year and we want to know how you've been.

bers: 58,000 children are victims of nonfamily abductions. The key to recovering these children is quick action by parents and law enforcement. A statistic by the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children states that "the first two hours after a child is abducted are the most critical." Therefore, this year, the Delaware County Sheriff's Office will offer a Child ID table for parents to obtain a free hard plas-

tic Child ID Card for their children (child must be present). The forms will be available all week for completion prior to the scheduled event. Please note that none of the information you provided is retained. Therefore, it is important that the ID card and printout is kept in a safe and secure location in the event it is ever needed.

The Child ID table will be located in the Commercial Tent at the Delaware County Sheriff's Office Community Relations Exhibit and is available on the following days and times.

- Children's Day -Tuesday, Aug. 17 from 11 a.m. -6 p.m.
- Thursday, Aug. 19 from 2 6 p.m.
- Saturday, Aug. 21 from 11 a.m.- 5 p.m.

Mounted Patrol Division:

As you've come to know and love, our agency has a Mounted Patrol Unit. At various times throughout fair week, we will have deputies patrolling the fairgrounds on horseback. We love photos, answering questions, and visiting in general, so don't be afraid to signal us to stop.

Canine Division:

Since the fair last year was cancelled due to COVID, Deputy Sheriff Kyle Karcher was unable to formally introduce his K-9 partner Deputy Sheriff Elias Butler ("ELI") to the Delaware County Fairgoers. Karcher and

K-9 Eli will be on the fairgrounds on Tuesday for Children's Day, on Wednesday as well as Saturday. Karcher loves to showcase Eli, as he is incredibly sociable. If you see us on patrol, stop us and say hello. Eli is extremely photogenic. It is our desire that everyone who attends the 2021 Delaware County Fair has a safe and enjoyable experience.
