What to know about fireworks injuries

Fireworks are a common sight at various celebrations throughout the year, but are most prominent during the summer months when Canada Day and Independence Day are celebrated. Fireworks have been in use for thousands of years. Many historians believe fireworks were developed in Liuyang, China, in the second century B.C. The first "fireworks" were made from bamboo stalks that, when thrown into a fire, would explode due to hollow pockets of air in the bamboo, says the American Pyrotechnic Association. Eventually early gunpowder recipes provided the boom behind the fireworks, and modern fireworks are not very different from those early incarnations.

Due to the explosive nature of fireworks, not to mention the required flame to light the fuses, fireworks have the potential to cause serious injury if not handled properly. Many injuries occur each year, particularly among do-it-yourselfers setting off fireworks in their neighborhoods.

The following are some of the most prevalent injuries related to fireworks, courtesy of the Consumer Product Safety Commission.

• Burns are the most common injuries associated with fireworks. The CPSC says burns accounted for 39% of all injuries in 2022. The hands and fingers (29%); head, face and ears (19%); legs (19%); and eyes (16%) are the areas of the body most often affected by burns.

• Cuts and bruises to the head, face and ears also are common fireworks-related injuries. Such injuries may result from the fast movement of the fireworks upon launch. The blast of fireworks can even damage facial tissue and break bones in the face.

The CPSC says where known,

the fireworks with the highest estimated emergency department-treated injuries in 2022 were firecrackers and sparklers. Many people think that sparklers are safe because they are largely marketed to children, but they burn very hot. According to Wired, sparklers can reach temperatures anywhere from 1800 F to 3000 F. To put that in perspective, iron melts at 2800 F.

To protect oneself, it's always best to leave fireworks to the professionals. Safer options for home celebrations include confetti, balloons, silly string, and other colorful options.



Smoked foods are wildly popular. The unique flavor that smoking imparts to anything from beef to poultry to seafood to vegetables is impossible to replicate with other cooking methods, which perhaps contributes to its popularity.

As hosts prepare to welcome friends and family for a July Fourth barbecue, they can cook to impress with this recipe for "Smoked Beef Short Ribs" courtesy of Allen Kiezel of Fatty Butts BBQ and KamadoJoe.com

5 Steps to Grill Vegetables

(Culinary.net) Burgers, brats, steak, chicken, pork chops and all the flavors of fresh meat get all the love on the grill, but a wellrounded meal calls for sides and veggies.

Before you plan your next backyard barbecue, incorporate tasty vegetables - peppers, asparagus, onions, tomatoes, zucchini and more - for an all-out blitz of fresh-grilled flavor. Consider these simple steps to properly grill your crispy veggies:

1. Light the grill. Step one, of course, is to prep a hot grill. For the best cooking experience, you'll want medium-high heat or even high heat for quick, direct grilling. By lighting the grill ahead of veggie prep, you'll allow plenty of heating time to complete your other tasks.

2. Prepare vegetables. Depending on what you plan to cook, there'll likely be some preparation to undertake, such as cutting off stems and blemishes or removing pits and seeds. In addition to cleaning up your ingredients, you may want to chop, dice or slice based on the recipe.

3. Coat vegetables with olive

oil. Drizzling just a small amount of olive oil over your vegetables and tossing to coat adds a couple benefits. First, it helps the outer layer crisp rather than dry out, plus it aids in seasonings - like salt and pepper - sticking to the vegetable instead of falling off while on the grill or in a pan.

4. Consider using foil packets or skewers. If char marks aren't your thing, tossing chopped or diced veggies into a foil packet before hitting the grill steams them for a bit of a softer texture. Alternately, wooden skewers soaked in water (to prevent burning) can help keep smaller chunks of veggies from slipping through the grill grates while still achieving a crispy exterior.

5. Pay attention to grill times. Different types of vegetables and preparation methods call for different cook times, but 5-10 minutes over direct heat generally gets the job done. The smaller you chunk, chop, slice or dice, the less time it'll take.

Smoked Beef Short Ribs

Serves 3

Spritz

- cup beef broth
- cup soy sauce
- spray bottle cup water

Main

- pounds beef short ribs sheets butcher paper
- 1½ tablespoons mayo

Dry Rub

- tablespoons black pepper 1½ tablespoons garlic powder
- tablespoons seasoned salt

1. Remove the beef ribs 1 hour prior to smoking. This will give the meat time to reach room temperature for more even cooking and allow the rub to adhere better. Trim off any extra thick fat and silver skin from the top of the short ribs. You can remove all of the fat, but I keep a thin layer for protection and added flavor. Slather the mayonnaise evenly over the entire surface of the beef ribs. Mix dry rub ingredients in a bowl and sprinkle evenly over the ribs. You'll want a heavy coating of the rub to help build a nice bark on the outside of the beef short ribs. The ribs are thick, so even a lot of rub won't overpower them.

2. Preheat the grill to 250 F.

3. Place short ribs on the grill and smoke at 250 F until it hits an internal temperature of around 175 F in the thickest part least 175 F, remove them from tions and share. Enjoy!



recommend using a good leavein meat thermometer so you don't have to constantly check the short ribs. We're looking for a nice bark to have formed before we wrap the short ribs. If your bark isn't where you'd like it to be yet, keep smoking for an additional hour or so to help the bark form.

4. Combine the spritz ingredients and place in spray bottle. Each hour after the first 3 hours or once the bark starts looking dry, open up the smoker and spritz the beef short ribs. Make sure your spray bottle is set to spray in a light, even mist and not a direct blast of the liquid. You just want to moisten the short ribs, not soak them.

5. When the bark has formed and the smoked short ribs hit the target temperature of at

the smoker, lay them in the center of 2 pieces of partially overlapped butcher paper (lengthwise), and then wrap tightly around the ribs. You can spritz the butcher paper a few times to help it form a tighter wrap around the beef short ribs. If you don't have butcher paper, vou can use heavy duty aluminum foil instead. Just note, the bark will be a little mushy when it's done, as it's not permeable like butcher paper and will partially steam it.

6. Return to the grill, insert the meat probe again, and smoke at 250 F for approximately 4 more hours. The smoked beef short ribs are done when the internal temperature is around 205 F to 208 F and the meat thermometer slides in and out like a knife slicing through room temperature butter — barely any resistance. I find that this usually occurs around 205 F, but all meat is different. Remember to take the temperature in a few places as the short ribs tend to cook slower in larger areas.

7. Remove the smoked beef short ribs from grill and keep wrapped while it rests for a minimum of 1 hour. If you need to keep the meat warmer even longer, place them inside of a good cooler for up to 4 hours.

8. Slice the short ribs between each bone and serve with the bone or slice into smaller por-

Interesting facts related to Independence Day

Americans celebrate Independence Day every July 4. The holiday has become synonymous with summer fun, as grand fireworks displays and backyard barbecues are integral components of many people's Fourth of July celebrations.

As Americans and residents of the United States prepare for some festive Fourth of July celebrations, they can keep these interesting facts related to Independence Day in mind.

- There have been many iterations of the American flag. The American flag has become an iconic symbol of freedom recognized across the globe since the United States declared their independence from Great Britain in 1776. But few July Fourth celebrants know that the current version is the 27th iteration of the American flag. According to the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, the current version of the flag officially became the flag on July 4, 1960.
- More than half of all Americans own an American flag. A 2023 poll from WalletHub found that 57% of Americans own an American flag. And that's not the only way Americans show their national pride, as the same poll found that roughly one in three Americans intended to purchase patriotic merchandise for July 4.
- The United States is not the only place to celebrate American independence. Such celebrations occur in various countries, including Australia, Denmark, Ireland, and Norway. The festivities in Rebild National Park in Denmark is believed to be the largest celebration of American independence outside the United States.
- The National Hot Dog and Sausage Council estimates that 150 million hot dogs are consumed on July 4. Though there's no corresponding estimate related to how many hamburgers Americans eat on July 4, various reports suggest Americans eat roughly 50 billion burgers annually, so it's fair to conclude many a burger will be consumed this Independence Day.

- July is a popular month for nations to celebrate their independence. In addition to the United States, various countries, including Algeria (July 5), Argentina (July 9), The Bahamas (July 10), Belarus (July 3), Burundi (July 1), Canada (July 1), Cape Verde (July 1), Colombia (July 20), Kiribati (July 12), and Liberia (July 26), celebrate their Independence Day in July.
- John Adams, a founding father of the United States and the second president in the country's history, felt Americans should celebrate their independence from Great Britain on July 2. That's because the Continental Congress voted for independence on July 2, 1776. However, the Declaration of Independence was not approved for two more days, thus making July 4 the day to celebrate America's independence from Great Britain.



Sparklers are not child's play



Did you know that the average primary flame blowtorch burns at around 2,000 F? USFS National Technology and Development says wildland fires typically burn between 1,600 and 2,000 F. Aluminum, brass, bronze, copper, and cast iron also can reach melting points at or slightly below 2,000 F.

It's likely safe to say that parents would never let their children handle a blowtorch, wander into a forest fire nor touch molten metals, yet many seemingly have no concerns about children playing with sparklers during July 4 celebrations. The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP) says people often treat sparklers much too casually, even though they can burn at temperatures of about 2,000 F. Children are allowed to hold and wave these red-hot metal rods like toys. Sparkler sticks pose a serious burn risk, and the sparks can cause additional burns and eye injuries, warns the CHOP. Young children who would not be trusted with other hot materials should not hold sparklers, warn health experts. Older children should be carefully supervised around sparklers and other fireworks.

Those who want to avoid any possible injuries on July 4 and during other summer celebrations would be wise to avoid sparklers in favor of safer forms of entertainment. Here are some ideas

- Glow sticks light up in the dark and can be worn or waved around safely.
- Fill water balloons with a mixture of glitter and water. When the balloons pop, it is a festive display.
- Send children around with canned string products that they can spray on one another. If making a mess isn't an issue, shaving cream "fights" also can be fun diversions for children.
- Adults can lead by example and leave the fireworks displays to the professionals. Take a ride over to the seaside or where a town is hosting a fireworks display and enjoy the sights from a distance.
- Purchase battery-powered blinking lights such as those sold at circuses or concerts. Kids can spend hours running around with them in hand. Less expensive flashlights purchased at a dollar store can create the same effect.
- Let children play with confetti cannons.
- "Snappers" or "poppers" could be an option if they are sold nearby. These are small noisemakers that explode and pop when they are thrown at a hard ground surface.

Sparklers may be festive and beautiful to behold, but they are not designed to be handled by children. Alternatives to sparklers are equally fun and much safer.

- · Never leave a child unattended in a pool or around any body of water no matter how small, even for a minute.
- · Teach children basic water safety.
- · Avoid overloading the pool with too many boisterous swimmers, especially if adults, older kids and young kids are in the water. Small children can quickly get lost in the fray.
- Avoid swimming if you have been consuming alcohol.
- Designate a lifeguard, whether it's a hired, certified professional, or someone who has taken on the task and will keep eyes fixed on the pool at all times while swimmers are present.
- Establish rules and enforce them. Prohibit diving into shallow water and running around the slippery edge of the pool.
- Learn how to administer CPR to both children and adults.
- If a child goes missing, look for him or her in the pool first.

Makes one 9-inch pie

- 1 recipe Plain Pie Pastry (see
- 6 cups blueberries, fresh or
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 34 teaspoon ground cinnamon 2 tablespoons cold unsalted
- 1 egg beaten with 1 table-

Line a 9-inch pie plate with 1 rolled-out crust and place in the refrigerator to chill.

Put the blueberries in a bowl, add the lemon juice, and stir to coat. Separately, combine the sugar, flour and cinnamon,

mix thoroughly and stir into the blueberries. Spread the filling in the crust, and scatter the butter over the top. Brush the rim of the crust with the egg wash, cover with the second rolledout crust, and seal and flute or

> crimp the edges. Put the pie in the refrigerator to chill until firm, about 30 minutes. Store the remaining egg wash in the refrigerator, too.

Brush the top crust with egg wash, then score the top with two perpendicular cuts for steam vents. Bake for 20 minutes, then lower the oven temperature to 350 F and bake for another 30 to 40 minutes, until the juices are bubbling and the crust is golden brown. Cool on a wire rack for at least two hours before slicing, then chill in the refrigerator until ready to serve.

Blueberry Pie

- frozen (thawed and drained if
- ½ cup sugar
- ½ cup all-purpose flour
- butter, cut into bits
- spoon milk, for egg wash

Plain Pie Pastry

Makes two 9-inch pie crusts 2 cups all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon salt

3/3 cup vegetable shortening 5 to 7 tablespoons cold milk

Sift the flour and salt into a bowl. Cut in the shortening with a pastry blender until it is the size of small peas. Sprinkle 1 tablespoon of the milk over part of the flour mixture. Gently toss with a fork and push to the side of the bowl. Sprinkle another tablespoon of milk over another dry part, toss with a fork and push to the side of the bowl. Repeat with the remaining milk until all of the flour mixture is moist-


Press the dough together to form 2 equal balls, then flatten into disks. Roll out the crusts right away, or wrap the dough tightly, smoothing out any little wrinkles or air pockets, and refrigerate for up to 2 weeks. On a lightly floured surface, roll out each ball to a thickness of 1/8 inch. Use a light touch and handle the dough as little as possible.

Preheat the oven to 425 F.
