Tripp Fitzner: The Middle Judicial Circuit's new district attorney

Tripp Fitzner says his desire to be a lawyer dates back to his high school debate years at Darlington School in Rome. He still remembers the moment his debate coach won him over and how that moment eventually translated into a

"I'll never forget what the speaker said that day. He said, 'If you're an athlete, you can only run so

fast, hit the ball so hard, swim so many laps, make so many shots. Athletics limits what you can do in a way. You should go out for debate because there's no limit on how often or how well you can persuade people.' That stuck with me. My path to becoming a lawyer wasn't always clear and clean cut like some other attorneys' career stories, but my involvement in debate absolute-

ly helped shape what I wanted to become professionally."

After Fitzner graduated from high school in 1992, he went to Georgia Southern and studied accounting in hopes of obtaining a "marketable degree." Although he graduated with a BBA in 1998 as intended, he felt he wasn't done with school just yet. Fitzner had taken the LSAT as (Continued on page 2A)

Smoyer completes mission in Brazil, soon returning to Naval Academy

The following is an interview of Trent Smoyer conducted by his grandfather, Albert Jones. He is the 21-year-old son of Alison and John Smoyer of Twin City. Smoyer recently returned from an extensive missionary trip in Brazil. In the interview, he outlines the experience. Immediately following the last question are Smoyer's self-reflections about how the mission work affected him as a shipman.

Question: Can you briefly detail your background?

Answer: I graduated from ECI in 2017. I had the honor of being the class valedictorian and STAR Student as well as being named to the allstate football team twice. I had great teachers at ECI and football coaches who pushed you to your limits. Those people helped prepare me for the next chapter of my life.

The entrance requirements and application process at the U.S. Naval Academy are substantial. I completed several interviews before getting

to the final interview with Congressman Rick Allen's service academy board. All along, I had tremendous support from faculty and many local leaders. I wrote several essays, received letters of recommendation, and filled out more paperwork than I





Active COVID-19 case count at 46, down by 31 from last week

According to the county commissioners' noon update before press time Tuesday, July 14, the total active cases of COVID-19 in Emanuel has decreased to 46

There have been 231 total confirmed cases. Of those confirmed cases, 181 patients have recovered while four have died. Altogether, 2,569 patients have been tested; 367 of those patients are awaiting results.

This week's active count of 46 indicates a decrease of 31 cases from the previous week. This is the first time in several weeks the active case count has trended downward.

The report on **July 7** was as follows:

- 77 active cases
- 172 confirmed cases
- 91 recovered2,241 total patients
- 381 patients awaiting results

The death count has maintained at 4 since June 19. Three other statistical categories (confirmed cases, recovered patients, and total patients tested) have increased on a weekly basis. This week's number of patients awaiting results is the only other statistical category

that has decreased for the first time in a number of weeks.

The Emanuel County Board of Commissioners remains the go-to for the most current, cumulative list of coronavirus cases here locally. The commission works jointly with Emanuel Medical Center, East Georgia Healthcare Center, and the health department to provide an update everyday Monday through Friday at noon on Facebook. a junior and did well on it, so when he tossed around in his head what should come next, it only seemed natural he go to law school. Fitzner went to his grandparents, who were helping him through school, and expressed to them he had a vision for his life after college—a vision that specifically meant becoming a lawyer. They were supportive in every sense of the word and encouraged him to begin applying to law schools across the country. He did just that and was accepted into the University of Dayton's College of Law.

"I had lived in Georgia all my life. Other than vacations, I never saw much else other than this state. Going to school so far away would give me a chance to experience life in a new way. I also thought it would help my grades by being so far away from my friends and other distractions," explained the Sylvania native.

Sure enough, with his acceptance into Dayton, Fitzner packed up his belongings and made the 11-hour drive, taking his well-established work ethic with him. Fitzner worked on the side as he completed his undergraduate degree, and that never changed as he worked toward his juris doctorate despite the high demands such an undertaking requires. He

completed the requirements for that degree and took the bar exam. While he awaited his results, he interned for the Middle Judicial Circuit here under former a DA.

Ironically, after Fitzner graduated law school in 2000, he began working as an accountant. It would be a few months before he transitioned into the role of an attorney. Then after having served from 2001-2005 as the Middle Judicial Circuit's first juvenile court prosecutor, from 2005 to Decmber 2008, Fitzner used his accounting skills as well as his law education to serve as district court administrator for the Eighth Judicial Circuit, which covers 27 counties in the state, stretching from Fitzgerald to Madison. In that role, Fitzner was the administrative arm of the superior courts, handling millions of dollars.

Still, Fitzner felt incomplete in a sense. He wanted to help make a difference in a bigger way. He wanted "the big show:" trying cases in a court room as a prosecutor and hopefully making people's lives better by extension. It was in 2009 when current DA Hayward Altman took office that Fitzner would make his way back to Swainsboro. Altman offered to bring the young lawyer back on board due to his administrative experience and his desire to try cases. Fitzner accepted, and the years since becoming a part of the local community have helped carve out his life today, including his recent successful go at politics.

When Fitzner accepted the position offered to him, he specifically submitted to becoming chief assistant district attorney and became responsible for child victim prosecution in Candler, Emanuel, Jefferson, Toombs, and Washington counties. He simultaneously took on the task of felony prosecution here and in Candler County, financial matters, grant writing, and developing the victim advocacy program for the DA's office in this circuit. His professional endeavors here also include being elected by attorneys across the five-county circuit to serve four terms on the State Bar of Georgia's Board of Governors, making policy decisions that governed the practice of law across the state. He has also worked with multiple law enforcement agencies within the circuit by training search and seizure procedures. Nationally speaking, Fitzner has been tapped by the National District Attorney's Association to train attorneys across the country in trial advocacy.

All of these accomplishments are near and dear to Fitzner's heart, but his family life sits atop all else. When he initially moved to Swainsboro in 2001, Fitzner joined friend and mentor Altman in attending First Baptist Church. Through that place of fellowship, he met the woman who

would become his wife and matriarch of his family. They began dating in the summer of 2002, and he quickly knew Jennifer Price, now Fitzner, was the one with whom he wanted to spend his life. He proposed to her on Christmas of 2002, and the couple married June 7, 2003.

"Jennifer has been very supportive throughout my career. I can't even describe how much she means to me and how much her support has helped me over the course of everything I've done, especially running for office. She kept me motivated throughout the campaign trail," Fitzner said with admiration. "She wants me to be happy and encourages me to do something I love. Jennifer is always honest with me and holds me accountable. She's a great friend to me and an even better mother to our children. To say she's my rock would be an under-

statement."

In addition to his wife,
Fitzner has four sons.
Aside from two grown
sons, Zac (Penelope) of
Alabama and Cliff of
Ohio, Tripp and Jennifer
have two younger sons
from China, Song and
Elic. Those four children
and their new grandchild,
Gabriel, son of Zac, are
the lights of their lives.

It is that family precisely who helped sway him to run for office. Providing for them as a husband was important to him, but his background in protecting

children, part of the responsibility of the DA, was important as well. His two young, innocent children reminded him of that.

"I started thinking about running for DA about two years ago. I knew Hayward probably wouldn't run again because he had his time in and wanted to be with his wife. I prayed about it, then I talked to Jennifer and our friends to see what the response would be. I was overwhelmed with support. I didn't start campaigning right away, but I did start laying the foundation back then."

As he started taking those initial steps, Fitzner found himself in unfamiliar territory. He was nervous and had to overcome his introverted nature. He credits that kind of hard work, along with his solid professional reputation, for his win at the polls in June.

"I've been blessed to have a wife who kept me going when I didn't want to sometimes, and I know I'm fortunate for the people across the circuit, especially here in Emanuel, who went to bat for me. I'm also really lucky that I had three really great mentors in Hayward; Tom Rawlings, who was the first fulltime juvenile judge in this circuit; and Stan Smith, who was my direct supervisor when during the time I was administrator in the Eight Judicial Circuit. All three of these men and friends taught

me in ways of their own. Hayward has given me so much advice over the years. Tom—I had no idea what I was doing in the beginning, and he was a patient man with a brilliant legal mind. He taught me a lot about procedures and helped me train on the job while Stan humanized the bench for me. I wouldn't be where I am today without any of these folks, and I freely admit that."

When he looks back, Fitzner is intrigued by one thing in particular: you can't predict where your life is going to go. Where he started as an accountant certainly isn't where he ended up as the incoming district attorney of a busy judicial circuit. However, in full transparency, what's most striking to Fitzner is the future.

"I am so humbled to be the next DA here. I'd be lying if I said I wasn't a little nervous going in just because we're living in unprecedented times with new challenges, especially when you think about what our office might have to face with budget cuts from the state and matters like that, but I'm ready. I'm mostly excited. I can't wait to serve the citizens of the Middle Judicial Circuit, and I can't wait to lead our office. Some of my goals are to foster an all-hands-on-deck culture, to be accessible, and most of all, make everyone proud. I thank you all once again, and I stand ready for January!"

Masks to be required at all **USG** institutions starting 7/15

Dear Friends of East Georgia State College Faculty and Staff,

I am writing today to update you about steps we are taking at EGSC concerning protective face coverings.

When our students arrive on campus next month, each one will receive a cloth face covering with the EGSC logo. This is made possible by private donations. Thank you to those who have made this possible!

COVID-19 has already resulted in more than 130,000 deaths in the United States. That is why I am sending this message today to all of our faculty, staff and students:

"As members of the Bobcat family, each one of us has a personal responsibility to do everything possible to take action to bring an end to this crisis. That is why I urge each one of you to carry your face covering with you like you would carry your cell phone. When you are inside campus buildings or encounter others on campus or in the community and put on your face covering, it may save the life of a person meet. At this unusual time, any one of us may have contracted coronavirus --- yet not be exhibiting symptoms. When you put on your EGSC face covering, it may save the life of a beloved family member of a person you meet that day. When you put on your EGSC face covering, you may very well save your own life or avoid serious medical complications from the coronavirus. 

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

Gone with the wind

As Dad got older, he often asked me to take him back to the old homeplace just outside the city limits of Garfield. He never complained about his new life in Swainsboro, but he began to have a strong feeling that his country way of life was vanishing along

with the wind. Seedless watermelons and chicken nuggets were showing up more in our local grocery story, and \$0.10 for fatback was escalated to more than \$2 per pound. Fruits and vegetables were being grown with so much fertilizer and insecticides that he no longer recognized the pure, country taste of coolness he knew so well as a young boy.

Scientific procedures, corporations, modern farm machinery, and bigtime farmers had pushed the little man and his family out of business and into a nearby town. Old farming plows and farm implements lay rusting away now. The big farmhouses with long hallways that held so many childhood memories are frozen silent in time, all lost to history. The smokehouse is quiet with unique smells from the past, and the chicken coop only remembers when the tall, red rooster belted out his call at daybreak while his flock of Rhode Island reds scratched furiously for worms in the front yard. The fields are barren now with flashes of purple and white wildflowers intermingled with patches of golden sunflowers where cotton and corn once grew. Old, bumpy dirt roads have been paved over while old, rustic bridges have been torn down and replaced by sturdy, concrete ones.

Daddy was amazed how the landscape had changed since he was a boy. The old homeplace seemed to be a relic from the past. Pine trees had been planted over the entire farmland. The old family fish pond was no longer visible from the road, and when the dirt roads had been surveyed and paved, several acres of the farm were taken up for the rights-of-way. Visually, Daddy didn't recognize his childhood home; it had silently gone with the timeless wind.

He recalled when he was a young boy, he and his brothers had dug stumps and cleared thick underbrush to clear the woodland for land that was suitable for growing cotton, corn, and peanuts. He realized that the land had returned to its natural state, but he was sure that the woods nearby held the offspring of rabbits, squirrels, raccoons, and opossums he and his brothers had hunted on warm moonlit nights and that the brooks and streams were surely filled with fish because no one had fished them in years. It was clear to him now that nature always prevails in the end. Man leaves his mark, but it is soon "gone with the wind."

I am writing today to update you about steps we are taking at EGSC concerning protective face coverings.

COVID-19 has already resulted in more than 130,000 deaths in the United States. That is why I am sending this message today to all of our faculty, staff and stu-

When you are inside campus buildings or encounter others on campus or in the community and put on your face covering, it may save the life of a person meet. At this

unusual time, any one of us may have contracted coronavirus --- yet not be exhibiting symptoms. When you put on your EGSC face covering, it may save the life of a beloved family member of a person you meet that day. When you put on your EGSC face covering, you may very well save your own life or avoid serious medical complications from the coronavirus. Please join me in protecting our Bobcat family, your own family, the local community and yourself."

Recently, the University System of Georgia (USG) provided the following guidance to all 26 USG institutions:

"Effective July 15, 2020, University System of Georgia (USG) institutions will require all faculty, staff, students,

and visitors to wear an appropriate face covering while inside campus facilities/buildings where six feet social distancing may not always be possible. Face covering use will be in addition to and is not a substitute for social distanc-

Face coverings are not required in one's own dorm room or suite, when alone in an enclosed office or study room, or in campus outdoor settings where social distancing requirements are met.

Anyone not using a face covering when required will be asked to wear one or must leave the area. Repeated refusal to comply with the requirement may result in discipline through the applicable conduct code for faculty, staff or stu-

Reasonable accommodations may be made for those who are unable to wear a face covering for documented health reasons."

We are implementing this guidance from the USG at EGSC beginning July 15.

Dear Savvy Senior,

Can you recommend some simple devices that can help tech-challenged seniors with video calls? My 80-year-old mother has been isolating herself for months now in fear of the coronavirus and I haven't been able to see her face-to-face in quite a while.

Video chatting is a great way to stay connected

To help connect you and your mom virtually, there are various products on the market that offer simple video calling for seniors who have limited ability or experience with technology. Here are four devices to consider.

GrandPad: This is a top option for simple video calling, and much more. The GrandPad is an 8-inch tablet specifically designed for seniors, ages 75 and older. It comes with a stylus, a charging cradle and 4G LTE built-in so it works anywhere within the Consumer Cellular network – home Wi-Fi is not required.

Ready to go right out of the box, GrandPad provides a simplified menu of big icons and large text for only essential features, providing clutter-free, one-touch access to make and receive video calls, send voice emails, view photos and videos, listen to personalized music, check the weather, play games, browse the Internet and more.

A GrandPad tablet costs \$250 plus \$40 monthly service fee and is sold through Consumer Cellular at *GrandPad.net* or call 888-545-1425.

Amazon's Echo Show: With its built-in camera and screen, the voice-command Echo Show also provides a simple way to have face-to-face chats with your mom, but she'll need home Wi-Fi installed.

Echo Shows, which come in three screen sizes – 5-inch (\$90), 8-inch (\$130) and 10-inch (\$230) – will let your mom make and receive video calls to those who have their own device, or who have the Alexa app installed on their smartphone or tablet.

Once you set up her contacts, to make a call your mom could simply say, "Alexa, call my daughter" And when you call her, she would ask Alexa to answer the call (or ignore it). There's also a feature called "drop-in"

that would let you video call your mom's device anytime without her having to answer it.

Available at *Amazon. com,* the Echo Show also offers thousands of other features your mom would enjoy like voice-activated access to news, weather, her favorite music and much more.

If you decide to order an Echo Show device for mom, be sure your ask Amazon to mark it as a gift so it doesn't get tied to your Amazon account. For instructions to help your mom set it up, or if she doesn't have a smartphone, go to Amazon.com/gp/help/customer/display. html, and type in "Help Loved Ones Set Up Their Echo Show Remotely" in the "find more solutions" bar.

ViewClix: This is a smart picture frame specifically designed for elderly seniors that lets family members make video calls, send photos and post virtual sticky notes with messages to their loved ones ViewClix from their smartphone, tablet or computer. Seniors, however, cannot initiate video calls from their ViewClix. Home Wi-Fi is also required.

Available in two sizes – 10-inch for \$199, and 15-inch for \$299 – you can learn more about this product at *ViewClix.com*.

Facebook Portal: If your mom is a Facebook user, a voice-command Facebook portal (see *portal.facebook.com*) is another simple way to stay connected – home Wi-Fi is needed.

Portals, which come in three sizes – the original 10-inch Portal (\$179), the 8-inch Mini (\$129) and the massive 15-and-a-half-inch Portal Plus (\$279) – are like Echo Shows, except they connect through Facebook. With a Portal, your mom can video call your smartphone or tablet (and vice versa) using Facebook Messenger or WhatsApp.

Gracie's Deviled Eggs

- 6 eggs (hard boiled)
- 2 Tbsp. mayonnaise
- 1 Tbsp. yellow mustard
- 2 Tbsp. dill pickle relish or sweet pickle relish
- 1 tsp. paprika (optional)
- salt and pepper to taste

Peel shells off of hard boiled eggs and slice in half (lengthwise). Using a spoon, gently remove the yolks from the whites, placing all yolks in a small bowl. Using a fork, mash yolks into small pieces. Add mayonnaise, salt, pepper, mustard, and relish to yolks and mix until well combined and creamy. Using a spoon, carefully scoop some of the yolk mixture into the white of each egg half. Repeat until all egg whites are filled. Lightly sprinkle with paprika and keep in the fridge until ready to serve.

Kade's Pizza Pinwheels

- 1 Package refrigerated pizza crust
- Pizza sauce
- Mozzarella Cheese

Lightly grease baking sheet and set aside. Unroll pie crust onto a large cutting board. Spread a light layer of pizza sauce over dough. Sprinkle with mozzarella cheese. Carefully roll dough to make a log shape. Pinch sides together and using a pizza cutter or knife, slice into individual pieces to form round individual pinwheel pieces. Bake at 425°F until cheese is melted and pinwheels are light golden brown. Serve with pizza sauce.

Nana Dina's Salted Caramel Pecan Chocolate Chip Cookies

- 3/4 c. unsalted butter, softened to room temperature
- 3/4 c. packed light or
- dark brown sugar
 1/4 c. granulated sugar
- 1 large egg, at room temperature
- 2 tsp. pure vanilla extract2 c. all-purpose flour
- 2 tsp. cornstarch
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt1 c. semi-swe
- 1 c. semi-sweet chocolate chips
 1/2 c. chopped upsalted or salt
- 1/2 c. chopped unsalted or salted pecans16 wrapped caramels, cut
- into 4 or 5 pieces each
- sea salt for sprinkling

In a large bowl using a mixer, beat butter, brown sugar, and granulated sugar together until fluffy and light in color. Mix in egg and vanilla extract. In a separate bowl, combine flour, cornstarch, baking soda, and salt. On low speed, slowly mix in wet ingredients until combined. Add chocolate chips and pecans. Mix until evenly distributed. Cover dough tightly with aluminum foil or plastic wrap and chill for at least 1 hour. Remove cookie dough from refrigerator and allow to sit at room temperature for 10 minutes. (The cookie dough will be slightly crumbly when preparing to bake, but will come together as you roll into balls.)

Preheat oven to 350°F. Roll dough into individual small balls, about 1.5 tablespoons of dough each, and place on baking sheets lined with parchment paper. Press a few pieces of caramel onto tops of cookies and sprinkle each with sea salt. Bake for 10-11 minutes, until barely golden brown around edges.

(From front page) military career options and post-military career options that come to those who graduate from the United States Naval

Academy.

After one year at the Naval Academy, I resigned and fulfilled a two-year missionary stint for my church. Specifically, I was sent to Brazil. I reapplied to the Naval Academy and will return August 13.

(For those who don't know, it is not unusual for midshipmen who are members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to fulfill a mission during their time at the academy. In fact, the Navy sees a great benefit in that many midshipmen who elect to serve as mission-

aries are assigned to foreign countries and learn a language. Since the Navy sails all over the world, having Navy crews with foreign language skills provides an advantage.)

Q: Receiving an appointment to the Naval Academy is very difficult. What led you to the decision to apply to the Naval Academy?

A: Only 8 percent selected of the 16,000 applicants receive a nomination. Those applicants are from as many as 50,000 who think about applying but weed themselves out when they look carefully at the academic and physical demands of the academy. I decided to apply to the Naval Academy because I am very interested in the prospect of a career as a military officer as well as receiving a topnotch education the Naval Academy provides. Based on my resume, I knew I would be a competitive candidate, and I am very grateful for all who assisted me on my path to receiving an appointment to the academy.

Q: I have heard that your first year at a service academy can be pretty rough. What was it like?

A: It was rough. I would compare it to football camp for a year, plus the courses and military training on top of that. An incoming class is about 1,200 people, and about 100 of them do not return after the first year. A graduating class ends up at just over a 1,000 people, so another 75 or so drop out along the way. You need to know that when applying and dedicate yourself to success. Unlike a regular college, you must be willing to dedicate your time and focus to development in three major categories: mental, moral, and physical. This consists of early morning workouts and late-night homework sessions—not to mention the routine military responsibilities. Plebe year also consists of a restriction of media privileges during the week, limited weekend liberty, and many

unorthodox tasks that

could only be understood by someone who has been in the same situation.

Q: What is the one thing that stands out about your time so far at the Naval Academy?

A: My first year at the Naval Academy provided me with lots of opportunities to grow personally, but more importantly to grow with all of those who were around me. I learned even more about the importance of working together as a team to ensure the success and protection of all. You succeed as a team or fail as a team. Your "team" is a company of about 40-50 midshipman who are together all day.

Q. Back to your mission in Brazil... Did you have any training for this?

A: The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints places a huge priority on Bible and scripture training for its youth. In high school, you have voluntary seminary several times each week. You cannot be selected as a missionary in Brazil unless you complete seminary. Then there was six weeks of training in Provo, Utah for introduction to the language and culture. Of course, you don't really learn the language or culture until you are immersed in it. It took me about four months to really feel comfortable with Portuguese and six months to become fluent. I arrived in Brazil on September 12, 2018. Upon arrival in Brazil, I went through 12 more weeks of missionary and language training in what we refer to as the "mission field" which is just the everyday world.

Q. What was the main focus of your missionary work in Brazil?

A: As a missionary, my focus was to invite others to come unto Christ by helping them receive the gospel through faith in Jesus Christ and His sacrifice, repentance, baptism, receiving the gift of the Holy Ghost, and becoming a lifelong disciple of Jesus Christ.

Q. How did you go about accomplishing this missionary work?

A: My daily routine during the mission was to wake up at 6:30 a.m., exercise, eat breakfast, get ready, study the scriptures, and plan my day with my missionary companion. We would do all of that before 10 a.m. We would leave our house at 10 a.m. and stay in the streets, talking to people or visiting them in their homes until around 9 p.m., only stopping for lunch. On an average day, we would talk to around 20 people in the street and visit about five homes. The relationships that I was able to develop with those who accepted a visit from my companion and I in their homes will always hold a very dear place in my heart. Even though most were poor to very poor, they often provided us with meals. I saw how living the gospel of Jesus Christ truly changes the lives of those who choose to live it.

Q. Did COVID-19 affect your missionary work?

COVID-19 As cases grew worldwide, the Church suddenly informed most of its missionaries serving outside of their native country they had to return home early or it might become too late to leave and re-enter their native country. I arrived back in Atlanta on March 24 earlier this year, so I was in Brazil about 19 months. I was originally due to come back July 2, so my mission was cut short by three months. Since I have been home, I have been able to maintain contact with many Brazilians I met during my mission-

ary service.

Q: How long did it take you to become fluent in Portuguese? What are the main characteristics of the language that you found interesting?

A: It took about five to six months for me to become fluent in Portuguese. Portuguese is one of the languages closest to Latin. I love the flow of Portuguese, and I enjoy the way that Brazilians use physical language to express themselves as well. Their slangs and expressions are also very catchy; sometimes I catch myself using them in English conversations.

Q. What was the food like, and what did people mainly ask you about the United States?

A: Every meal consists of rice and beans. They also take lots of pride in their cookouts. Brazil is also full of exotic fruits such as goiaba and maracuja that make for really tasty juices. Most of the time, people asked me if I had ever eaten anything other than fast food in my life. They tend to think that's all we eat. Many also asked about certain aspects of my daily life.

Q. Are the Brazilian culture and people much different from the U.S.?

A: The Brazilian culture is definitely a lot more laidback than American culture. The people are very hospitable and very receptive. The American concept of keeping to a schedule and filling it with as much as possible is not as enforced. Brazilians believe time is to be enjoyed and not hurried. Religion also plays a huge part of their culture. Brazil is probably the most biodiverse country on earth

in every respect—wildlife, plants and trees, and physical terrain. Sao Paulo is also the most culturally diverse city in Brazil with a mixed population from many nations and continents.

Q. Like many major nations with a lot of poverty, there is a lot of crime. Did you ever feel endangered?

A: Sao Paulo is the seventh most populated city in the world and has a high crime rate. The favelas have houses literally built on top of houses on every hillside. I never felt endangered because the missionaries are always well-respected and thought very highly of.

Q. What is the main thing that stands out in your mind about Brazil?

A: The thing that probably stands out most about Brazil is great people who are very friendly and open.

Q. What is the main thing that stands out about your missionary work?

A: It was definitely one of the most satisfying periods of my life. Being able to play a role in the transformation of many people's lives as they chose to align themselves with the teachings of Jesus Christ also strengthened me and enriched my desire to serve and love my neighbor.

Q. What life advice would you give young people in Emanuel County today?

A: Seek to open yourself up to new ideas. Maybe there is a little more for you to discover beyond the horizon. Service to others is a great way to accomplish this objective. Whether it be through military service or uniting yourself with a service group, as you serve others, you broaden your horizons and positively affect the lives of your neighbors.

Below is Smoyer's summary in his own words of the unique mission experience as it relates to the four dimensions of a human being and services as a future U.S. Navy Officer. He also discloses the five most important takeaways from his trip.

• Reinforcement of the importance of exact obedience and how it produces positive outcomes.

• Living elevated standards creates positive results in all facets of life and all those you contact.

• Witnessed several dozen people I taught make 180 turnarounds after living morally sound

• Sharpened critical listening skills, gaining a better understanding of other's thoughts and feelings.

• Achieved solid experience in logistics management and goal analysis as an area supervisor of 18 to 20 missionaries over a 20-square-mile zone.

 Encouraged others to become the best version of themselves by tapping into their full potential.

 Counseled and convinced several dozen people leading them to a more abundant life.

• My efforts culminated in being selected by the Mission President to serve as Assistant to the President responsible for the well-being and leadership of 180 missionaries including: logistical organization and support, statistical analysis of goals, and training.

• Superior management experience.

Physical Dimension

• Exercised a minimum of 30 minutes daily to begin each day.

• Walked 8 to 10 miles

daily in a very hilly terrain throughout my assigned area.

• Reinforced the impor-

• Reinforced the importance of physical well-being to enhance mental and moral achievement.

Spiritual Dimension

• Countless times, I went from meeting someone on the street by random selection; gaining their confidence, resulting in an invitation to their home; and helping them make important changes to improve his or her life, seeing their successes weeks after the initial encounter.



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Three Emanuel County baseballers play in Perfect Game World Series

Three young baseball players from Emanuel County—Tuff Boddiford, Brody Fleming, and Karson Kettles—went with their respective travel teams to the 2020 Perfect Game World Series held in Atlanta on July 3-7. All three play with the Line Drive organization based out of Pooler.

Boddiford and Fleming, members of the 12U Line Drive team, have shared the diamond since they were 8-years-old. Together, the two of them have played on two Dixie Youth state championship teams. Line Drive makes their fourth shared travel team.

Both are rising seventh graders with promising futures at different positions. Boddiford attends ECI, where he plays baseball and football. The son of Eric and Dawn Boddiford of Twin City, he pitches, occasionally plays third or outfield, but primarily plays shortstop. He is known for his power and quickness as well as his ability to make difficult plays. He routinely makes difficult plays at shortstop look easy. Boddiford is extremely quick around the bases and a smart baserunner. He stood out in Atlanta, scoring several RBI and hitting a home run.

Fleming, on the other hand, plays first and third. He, too, sometimes plays in the outfield. As of late, however, he has found his home on the mound. He shined in Atlanta as the only 12U player to reach 75 on the radar more than a few times. (Fleming was consistent between 71 and 74 but threw strikes at 75, his age.) Like Boddiford, he is a power hitter and has a strong arm. He's also sound defensively with a good glove in the field. Fleming's strong suits are his quick hands and pitching skills.

He and Boddiford make a tough duo to handle; both boys have great foundational knowledge of the game, always knowing

what to do on the next play before it even happens.

Fleming is a student at DEA. He is the oldest child of Brent and Stephanie Fleming of Swainsboro. As an Eagle, he plays football, basketball, and, of course, baseball.

The two have been an integral part of Line Drive 12U's season thus far. Together, Boddiford and Fleming helped qualify their team for the Perfect Game World Series, a prestigious invitation-only tournament for major travel teams like their own. Invitations were divvied out based on national rankings.

At the beginning of the season, Line Drive/ Wilson 12U was ranked 10th in the southeastern district and 60th in the nation. That ranking will likely be even higher now, thanks to the team's impressive finish in the tournament two weeks ago. Out of 70+ teams, Boddiford, Fleming, and company finished 14th in the Gold Division of the World Series, which was one of three "colored" brackets (gold, silver, and bronze) due to the tournament's large turnout.

Line Drive 12U played seven games, losing only two of those. Their only losses were both to Easton Top Notch from California, who headed into the tournament as No. 1 in the nation.



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

multiple shots fired. Swainsboro's police chief, Randy Ellison, has addressed the recent situations with city council, Mayor Charles Schwabe, and the local district attorney's office.

In response to the nature of the crimes as well as concern for residents within the area. city council has suspend-

ed the business license belonging to the Gumlog Road business owner.

"The mayor has an obligation to ensure that the citizens of Swainsboro are safe, as do I," said Chief Ellison about the license suspension. "The license was not revoked, only suspended at this time in an attempt to ensure safety within the area."

As of Wednesday, July 8, according to officials, the two male victims were reportedly in stable condition but are being uncooperative in providing details to law enforcement personnel, as are bystanders who were present during the shootings. Based on information

obtained thus far, officials believe the recent shootings are gang-related. Any members of the public are encouraged

to relay any knowledge related to these events to law enforcement.

"Whether it is a police office, deputy, lawyer, or district attorney representative, we encourage any leads on the matter to be reported. Help us help you," Chief Ellison stated.

Two drivers airlifted following crash

approximately 3 p.m. on Friday, July 10, a crash occurred at Old Reidsville Road and Highway 80 East.

The initial report described one vehicle on fire with entrapment.

Emanuel County EMS sent two ambulances while firefighters responded with an engine and Rescue 1 from Swainsboro, along with a Twin City engine. Several sheriff's deputies responded to block traffic in both directions of Highway 80 and to conduct the crash investigation.

The drivers of both vehicles, a 2012 Jeep Liberty 4x4 SUV and a Chevrolet Silverado Z71 4x4, received emergency care at the scene and were transported by EMS to Swainsboro Airport, where they were loaded into two AirEvac helicopters and flown to the trauma center in Augusta with non-life-threatening injuries.

A patriot's story

Independence Day after writing about past celebrations, I had to follow up with remembrance of a patriot who honored the flag and went into battle for the country he loved. Readers have told me they most enjoy seeing names of folks, places, and events they remember. This column is filled with both.

Woody Reynolds was born in Montgomery County. He was introduced to patriotism at anearlyagebyhisfather who named his sons, George Washington Reynolds, Andrew **Iackson** Reynolds, and Woodrow Wilson Reynolds.

He had many before addresses choosing to spend his retirement years at Norristown Junction.

In the month of In his youth, he went where jobs were available. A short career in professional baseball, working on a banana boat in the Caribbean Islands, picking fruit in Florida, and a factory job in St. Louis kept him employed through the Great Depression. He kept close ties to his family during this time and especially to a young girl on a neighboring farm. During this time, he also learned that the world was larger than Montgomery County, and he did not feel called to be a farmer.

married my mother's younger sister, Ruth, and started his career in food services in Jacksonville, Florida. In a short time, he was made manager of a new chain restaurant, The Crystal. If you ever had a small Crystal burger, you remember it well.

Life could not have been better for the young couple. and his bride loved living in the city and could visit home and family often. Then came the morning of December 7, 1941 the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. The fury he felt demanded he defend his country. He headed to the naval base in Jacksonville to enlist. He knew he would be drafted soon, so he chose the Navy. His goal was to use his food service experience to feed troops on ships headed into battle. It didn't quite work out that way. He was attached to a marine unit assigned to chase the Japanese out of the south Pacific all the way to Japan.

When the marines hit the beach, a mess tent was set up to feed the fighting men. This was mobile, and they followed the "island hopping" to clear out the Japanese. Near the end, he contacted a tropical disease carried by mosquitoes which affected bones and joints. He was sent home via hospital ship and spent the next few years in VA hospitals. He was discharged as a disabled veteran, and the condition remained with him and returned periodically throughout his life.

After discharge, he honored his wife's wishes to live near her family and settled in Swainsboro. "Jabbo" Chappell (father of Henry) had built Swainsboro's first

drive-in restaurant complete with "car hops" and named "The Southern Pig" specializing in barbecue. After a few years, Woody again felt the call to be part of the military and accepted a civil service position in food services. This carried him to Fort Benning, Donaldson Air Force Base, Hunter Field, and finally back with the marines at Parris Island.

After retirement, he again followed his wife's desire and settled near her sister, Iris Wilson, near Norristown Junction. When his new home was completed, he erected a tall flagpole in the front yard. He followed flag etiquette he had learned with the marines to raise and lower each day. At appropriate times, he always flew her at halfmast.

His saddest day was when he lowered the cherished flag in memory and respect for his beloved wife, Ruth. A few years later, his son made sure the flag was lowered with proper etiquette for Chief Petty Officer Woodrow W. Reynolds United States Navy WWII.

of viruses and bacteria. Now more than ever, it is vital to keep our kitchens properly cleaned and sanitized to prevent food-borne illnesses. Keeping your kitchen clean for food preparation will help prevent the spread of bacteria. Dangerous bacteria can lurk around countertops, surface areas of your kitchen, and on both large and small appliances. These bacteria can contaminate your

Here are some tips: Clean kitchen surfaces with soap and water. After cleaning and rinsing, sanitize the surface with a sanitizer. A good sanitizer can be prepared by mixing 1 teaspoon of chlorine bleach per quart of water. A new solution should be made daily and placed in a spray bottle for easy use. Allow the surface to air dry after sanitizing. Wash your hands after the surface is cleaned

or sanitized.

Paper towels are ideal to use for cleaning because they can be used once and thrown away, which prevents bacteria from multiplying and being spread throughout the kitchen. If you use dishcloths, they should be changed and laundered often. Sponges have nooks and crannies where germs can hide and spread from one surface to another. Thus, sponges should not be used. To prevent chemical contamination of your foods, never reuse cleaning product containers, and keep chemicals away from foods.

Keeping appliances clean is important because it will last longer and will help prevent the spread of bacteria. Large appliances such as refrigerators, freezers, and ovens need cleaning at least monthly. Use soap and water to wash the fridge. Do not use an abrasive cleanser or scouring pads because they can damage the surface. The greasy build-up may require the use of a heavy-duty cleaner or grease cutter and a soft cleaning pad.

Dishwashers are self-cleaning but check

for large particles of food lodged in the filter. Ovens are often self-cleaning and help make spills easier to clean. After the oven has cooled from the cleaning process, wipe away the ash residue that is left. Be sure to ventilate the kitchen when cleaning the oven in case it gives off fumes or smoke. Unplug small appliances before cleaning and never immerse in water unless directions say it is permissible.

Be confident that your kitchen is clean and safe from bacteria. Cleaning the kitchen frequently makes the job easier and will make food preparation more enjoyable. And keeping sanitizer solution freshly made and handy will give you that extra protection from bacteria that can cause food-borne illness.





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Fowler returns, retells history of old Twin City jail


If you've had a chance to drive through Twin City on North Railroad Avenue, you may have noticed a quaint historical building coming back to life. In the city charter and records of the merging of Graymont and Summit, this beautiful brick structure is depicted as the "calaboose." Most in town refer to it as "the old city jail" or "old city hall." One of Twin City's senior residents and great storytellers, John Fowler, will regale you with stories of an escape at the old jail. He tells the story vividly of two men overpowering a Twin City police officer he names as "Coot," who was shot in the leg during the incident.

During the ongoing restoration of this historic setting, a small metal, almost completely rusted over, and illegible label was discovered. A bit of cleaning revealed that the cells were manufactured by the E.T. Barnum

Michigan. A wee bit of research into this company revealed an illustrious history throughout the U.S. as well as an infamous dark historical caveat of the history of jails and corrections in our county. The internet is replete with information about this company and one unique product, jail cells. An advertisement for the company lists cities throughout America using this product for their "lock-ups." Statesboro and Dublin appear in their advertising.

Historical societies in many cities describe their use of the E.T. Barnum jail cells. The product was touted as being lection of history. a large part of the westward expansion in U.S. small cities and counties throughout Kansas. So, when and how did these "cages," complete with double hinged bunks and an opening for food trays, find their way to Twin City?

The cramped ominous and cold appearance is a bit frightening. One of the company's advertisements suggest that their product would increase morals and reduce crime, perhaps.

The cells located in Twin City are being restored right down to the double bunks for display-only purposes for visitors to enjoy a recol-

From Detroit to Kansas to other cities throughout the country, there is connection and history, dark as it may be, when looking at these cells.

On a lighter note, a citizen curious about the old jail made a recent visit just to see if the cells were still present. While visiting, the individual recalled a bit fondness of memory regarding a family member of theirs who had a proclivity to imbibe spending some quality time there and laughed about frequent

trips made to the old jail to retrieve the family member. It was reported that there seemed to be some connection with that particular family member, who is now passed away, just knowing that the cells are still there.

On February 20 1903 W. L. Hutton was paid \$8.00 for painting the new jail and R. L. Bailey was paid \$2.25 for


