## EGSC plans 9/11 memorial

On Friday, September 11, East Georgia State College will host a 9/11 memorial event to recognize first responders and military students and employees. The memorial will begin at 9 a.m. at the flagpole at the front of the Luck F. Gambrell Building on EGSC's Swainsboro campus. The community is invited to attend.

In case of weather issues, the event will be relocated to an indoor area. Social distancing will be enforced, and protective face coverings will be required while inside campus buildings and where social distancing may not be possible.



Accesstoonline web portal now used to provide more accurate **COVID** reporting

According to the county commissioners' noon update before press time Tuesday, September 1, the total active cases of COVID-19 in Emanuel has increased to 79.

There have been 819 total confirmed cases. Of those confirmed cases, 716 patients have recovered while 24 have died. Altogether, 4,559 patients have been tested; 261 of those patients are awaiting results.

This week's active count of 63 indicates a decrease of 2 cases from (Continued on page 2A)

### Thoughts on positive COVID rates

They keep saying positivity rates in COVID should be below 10 percent and is considered to be a strong indicator for infections. However, I am confused by that. In my opinion, the positivity rate only reflects those who are tested and received positive results

In Georgia, during the months of March and April, the reported rate was at 17 percent. I kept saying, "That number seems low, because the only people at that time getting tested were those that, according to two medical representatives, had said they thought they had COVID."

So, to clarify, if two medical representatives informed you that you look like you have COVID, and the positivity rate is only at 17 percent, it sounds like medical representatives do not know how COVID actually appears.

Now, others are getting tested and are thinking that they might have COVID or may have been exposed to the virus. But, how


can this be? It is not an indication of universal testing, like experts seem to think, nor is everyone being tested on an every week basis.

In actuality, I suspect that the majority of the population has never been tested. Medical representatives, probably, are tested regularly. For those who receive positive COVID tests results, two additional tests are required to be taken and must both indicate negative results prior to that person being able to return to work, per

CDC guidelines (which my college is using). So, unless a positivity rate is zero, then there is a strong indication no one has Covid.

With the current test, I do not see people wanting these tests performed unless they absolutely have to, and are more likely to do so if testing is free. I think free tests are offered at public sites. However, if local walk-in clinics advertise a charge of \$175 for insured patient testing, why undergo the test if there is no real suspicion for COVID?

Many would say we are long past those days, others would say we have a long way to go. As for this day, we seem to be at an impasse in race relations in this country. We aren't talking to each other. We are yelling. It is only going to get worse as election time nears and politicians pander to their supporters on either side of the racial divide. What is keeping us from reaching out to each other? Arnie Sidman, former senior vice president at RJR Nabisco and an Atlanta tax attorney is author of "From Race to Renewal: It's Not All Black & White." In a recent opinion piece in the At-

prove race relations between Black Americans and white Americans must be voluntarily implemented outside the political realm" and that "the initial goal should simply be making Blacks and whites more comfortable with one another in a social setting." Sidman suggests that white churches black churches pair up with an agreed-upon minimum number of congregational pairs that could meet and "discuss family stories and items of mutual interest or concern in a less threatening and confrontational medium than protest marches." The answer is that churches — Black and white — are composed of human beings who bring their prejudices in on Sunday, hear a rip-roaring sermon about turning the other cheek, walking the extra mile, getting the mote out of our own eye and then revert back to business as usual on Monday. Sadly, I speak from experience. My own.





## **Savvy Senior:** Financial help for retirees affected by COVID-19

Dear Savvy Senior,

Are there any financial assistance programs you can refer me to? The coronavirus pandemic has cost *me my part-time retirement* job and has shrunk my measly IRA account.

Needy Retiree Dear Needy,

Absolutely! In addition to the \$1,200 federal coronavirus stimulus check that was distributed in April and May, there are many other financial-assistance programs (both public and private) that can help struggling retirees, as well as give relief to family members who help provide financial support for their loved ones.

To find out what types of assistance you may be eligible for, just go to BenefitsCheckUp.org, a free, confidential Web tool designed for adults 55 and older and their families. It will help you locate federal, state and private benefits programs that can assist with paying for food, medications, utilities, health care, housing and other needs. This site – created by the National Council on Aging – contains more than 2,500 programs across the country.

To identify benefits, you'll first need to fill out an online questionnaire that asks a series of questions like your date of birth, ZIP code, expenses, income, assets, veteran status, the medications you take and a few other factors. It takes about 15 minutes.

Once completed, you'll get a report detailing all the programs and services you may qualify for, along with detailed information on how to apply.

applied for online; some Program (LIHEAP), as downloadable application forms that you can print and mail in; and some require that you contact the program's administrative office directly (they provide the necessary contact information).

If you don't have Internet access, you can also get help in-person

at any of the 84 Benefit to very low-income Enrollment Centers located throughout the U.S. Call 888-268-6706 or visit NCOA.org/centerforbenefits/becs to locate a center in your area. Some centers also offer assistance over the phone.

**Types of Benefits** 

Depending on your income level and where you live, here are some benefits you may be eligible for:

Food assistance: Programs like the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) can help pay for groceries. The average SNAP benefit for 60-and-older households is around \$125 per month. Other programs that may be available include the Emergency Assistance Food Program, Commodity Food Supplemental Program, the and Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program.

Healthcare: Medicaid and Medicare Savings Programs can help or completely pay for outof-pocket health care costs. And, there are special Medicaid waiver programs that provide in-home care and assistance too.

Prescription drugs: There are hundreds of programs offered through pharmaceutical companies, government agencies and charitable organizations that help lower or eliminate prescription drug costs, including the federal Low-Income Subsidy known as "Extra Help" that pays premiums, deductibles and prescription copayments for Medicare Part D beneficiaries.

Utility assistance: There's the Low-Income Some programs can be Home Energy Assistance well as local utility companies and charitable organizations that provide assistance in lowering home heating and cooling costs.



Recently, while driving through the Wal-Mart parking lot, I saw a young couple with two spotted hound dog pups in a basket. Their sign read, "Free Puppies with Food." Naturally, I had to stop and inquire. They gave me the same story I have heard so many times before: "We didn't know the mother dog was in heat." I questioned them about the puppies, breed, age, health, how many in the litter? There were six in the litter.

The young couple had already given away three, and they kept a female puppy. I agreed to take the two left, and I assured them I had rescues that would take the pups and place them in good homes. I strongly urged the couple to please get

the mother dog spayed soon, so this didn't happen again. I also voiced my concern over their keeping one of the puppies, because now they would have two dogs that would need to be fixed. I gave them names of some resources that may be able to help them.

I would like to give the

couple credit for trying to find loving homes for the pups. They didn't dump them off at a dumpster like so many people do. However, when giving away free pets, how can you be sure they are going to good homes and not going to be used as "bait" for dog fighting? As I was driving home with my two "free puppies," I had growing concerns about the homes the other three puppies went to. Did they go home with a person who will be a responsible pet owner, or did they go home with someone who took them on an impulse?

We've all been guilty of impulsive shopping. We see something in the store or on-line that we think we have to have, but after we get it home, we change our minds and want to return it. Taking home a free puppy or kitten from yard sales or off the Wal-Mart parking lot is like impulse shopping. You see that adorable face, smell that puppy breath, get lots of kisses in the face, and your heart just melts. You think you have fallen in love. Then you say, without thinking about all the responsibility that comes with a new pet, "I'll take it."

There is a big difference between shopping in a store and taking home a free pet. When shopping in a store, you can return an item if not satisfied with it. Give-a-ways are non-returnable. If you get home with your free new puppy or kitten and realize you have no place to keep it, or your landlord doesn't allow pets, or you can't afford to feed it and keep it healthy, you can't take it back, because the people are long gone. Then what do you do? Most of the time, the pets end up in shelters or are left abandoned somewhere.

Taking in a new pet is a big responsibility. It should be a carefully, well thought out decision, not just an impulse. Pets are living, breathing creatures! They have to be fed and watered, have proper shelter, proper health care, exercise, love and get spayed/ neutered. A pet should NOT be treated like a child's Christmas toy that is tossed to the side when newest/cuteness wears off.

Before you are tempted to take home that cute/ adorable pet, you should ask yourself these questions:

(If you rent) Does my landlord allow pets?

If I move will I be able to carry my pet with me?

Do I have a proper place to keep it where it will be safe and stay warm/cool and dry?

Can I afford to feed it and give it the proper veterinarian care it needs to keep it healthy?

Do I have the time to spend with it, to train it, exercise it, and love it?

Will I have the funds to have it fixed (spayed/neutered) when it is old enough? (4-6 months old).

I cannot stress enough the importance of spaying/neutering pets. If more people did this, we wouldn't have the problem of pet over-population. Our shelters and rescues wouldn't be running over. We wouldn't have problems with strays roaming our streets and hanging out at dumpsters. There wouldn't be anyone at yard sales or on the Wal-Mart parking lot giving away puppies/kittens. A key to this is finding resources and funding to assist the people in our community with spaying/neutering. I am trying to do my part through writing grants and looking for resources to help.

I do get so frustrated at times seeing how some animals are abused or neglected, and the problem does not seem to be getting any smaller. Barb Moore, our Emanuel County Humane Society President, has said to me, "How do you eat an elephant? The answer is "One bite at a time." Sometimes I feel like that elephant keeps getting bigger and bigger, but I will not stop my efforts, no matter how big the problem seems to be.

I keep hoping these articles I write will make a difference in the way people think about and treat their pets. I know that education is the key to help change the way we think. Hopefully, one of these days, we will conquer that elephant through our efforts of education. If we all do our part, we can make a difference. I look forward to the day when giving away unwanted animals in a parking lot is a thing of the past. Don't you?



The involved dog, male, Asian Shephard, multi-colored, weighed 77.4 lbs. at time of intake and had severe injuries to its back.

Medical care was rendered by Dr. Wesley McRae, DVM, who performed an overall health evaluation and examined and applied wound care to the large canine. According to documentation from this visit, it was recorded that the dog suffered severe injuries on his back and was flea infested. The two lesions on the back of the dog was measured to be 6"x 3" and 3"x 2". Hair was reported missing on both lesions and appeared to be black in color, indicating necrotic (dead or dying) flesh present. The wounds were severely infected underneath the dead skin and drainage was present, and appeared to be caustic in nature, indicating possible burn results by some agent. Medication and care instructions were provided to shelter staff and the dog's care was turned back over to the animal shelter. The diagnosis given was severe, traumatic, contact dermatitis – caustic in nature

In the short time frame, the second report provided by Dr. McRae detailed that Dallas appeared to be bright, alert, responsive, and had a normal temperature. In comparison to Dallas' first visit, all wounds were healed by the second visit, no infection was reported present, and health scar tissue formation was reported and not deemed concerning. Since the primary visit in July, Dallas had since gained seven pounds. Finalizing the report, Dr. McRae documented "Due to the diligent care by the Swainsboro Animal Control in administering the medications prescribed by McRae Veterinary Clinic, Dallas has fully recovered from the severe wounds that were present a month ago and is doing great."

On Thursday, August 27, Dallas' case was brought before the honorable Magistrate Court Judge Dawn Braddy, who was sitting in for the honorable Judge Ronald Wiggins. Judge Braddy provided opportunity for both parties to speak, which involved shelter manager Leta Fuentes and the dog's owner, Connie Dowd.

**Fuentes** provided detailed information and records obtained from the vet's office as well as that of the shelter. Photos and current status of Dallas were also displayed to Judge Braddy. Dowd stated that the

involved dog, Dallas, was a stray that she had taken in and admitted to knowledge of one "skin mark," but did not admit to knowledge of all documented wounds. Emanuel
