

Walden starts process to end flouride

The finish line is in sight for Walden's months-long debate over the potential end of public water fluoridation in the village, as the Board of Trustees authorized village attorney Dave Donovan at its meeting on Feb. 20 to draft a local law that would halt the fluoride program. If the board is satisfied with the legislation, a public hearing could then be set for a future meeting with a final board vote to follow. The local law would be the last

step in a process that began last spring, as the board began the debate on the difficult public health issue.

Walden has satisfied every other requirement of the state law regulating the removal of fluoride, as the board has gathered testimony of multiple health experts and held a session with representatives from the New York State Department of Health on Jan. 22 to hear their opinions on fluoridation. The village has also submitted a mandated plan to the state detailing how residents will acquire

the needed amount of fluoride for their dental health if the water fluoridation initiative is discontinued.

Village Manager John Revella noted to the state officials during the group meeting last month that the state's 2015 water fluoridation law makes it more difficult for towns and villages to stop fluoridating their water than to start. The village began the deliberate process of weighing the removal of fluoride last

Maybrook village race heats up

Leahy challenged for mayor

The Maybrook elections are heating up this year with a fiery divide between the incumbents and newcomers.

Village Mayor Dennis Leahy is running for reelection alongside current trustee Rob Pritchard and trustee candidate Daryl Capozzoli. They are running against the "Maybrook United" - Thomas Starro, a worker for Interstate Waste Services running for village mayor, Joseph Byrne, a tax manager and Valley Central Board of Education member running for village trustee, and Joshua Tyrrell, a full time student, five year parttime EMT, 11 year firefighter and former marine running for village trustee.

Leahy first became mayor in 2008 when the village was in the beginning stages of what he called "the worst recession many of us ever experienced in our lifetimes."

"My goal during those four years was to start chipping away on the village's infrastructure," he says. "You can't build a home unless you have a good foundation. We built a new senior center,

government center, enhanced our parks, added more community events, new sewer lining to replace outdated lines... and started sidewalk replacement on Tower Ave."


Since his first year in office, Leahy has been adding on to his lengthy list of accomplishments in the village. In 2011,

the village started sewer lining through Community Development Grants. To date, 95 percent of the sewer lines have been completed in the village.

Most recently in September of last year, Leahy, along with all other village trustees, introduced the Draft Generic Environmental Impact Statement (DGEIS) for the village's Downtown Design District.



Current village trustee Robert Pritchard is running for another term.

"Many hours were spent getting this document together and we were able to introduce it to the Village Board in September 2017," he says. "This Zoning Code Amendment is a vision for our village and will set the table for investors in our efforts to bring back Main Street in our village."

The DGEIS had been in the works for six years and is on track to be adopted

this year. On February 26, the board of trustees unanimously passed the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA) Generic Environmental Impact Statement (GEIS) Findings Statement, the amendment pertaining to the downtown zoning design district.

"This did not happen overnight," says Leahy. "The old Maybrook Rail Yard property is looked upon as the best site for industrial development in the county because of five key elements: water, sewer, rail service, [Orange County Airport and Stewart Airport] and [being] two miles from Interstate Route 84. Our village thrived for many years as a railroad community...[the old Maybrook Rail yard] has the potential of becoming the 21st Century Rail Yard in our village that will support a thriving Main Street, bring in new residents and quite possibly a need to reopen our Maybrook Elementary School. Our village is moving forward and we are on the path to where we want to go."

Now, Leahy is looking forward to a bright future in the Village of Maybrook.

"My vision for the Village of Maybrook in 2018 and beyond is to continue to move forward on the revitalization of our village," he says. "It's taken a lot of work to get to this point and [the Village of Maybrook Board of Trustees] will continue to push forward."

Along with wanting to see Main Street thrive again, Leahy wants to see positive growth, good jobs and property values rise.

"I've lived and owned a home in the Village of Maybrook for 30 years," he says. "...I, along with trustee Robert Pritchard and trustee candidate Daryl Capozzoli, have an investment in this village just like all of the other homeowners in the village."

Pritchard first won a seat as village trustee in 2010 while working full time at the Stewart Air National Guard Base. As the base converted from C-5's to C-17's, Pritchard spearheaded a year-long project at the base to counter the loss of some of the 250 jobs, ultimately resigning his position on the board.

In 2012, Pritchard regained his seat and was appointed as Deputy Mayor in 2017 after trustee Noreen Reynolds announced she would not be seeking re-election.

"At that time Mayor Leahy asked me if I would accept the responsibility of the role of Deputy Mayor in part due to the now top priority of driving economic development in the village and I accepted," he says. "...My accomplishments are generally associated with infrastructure, economic development and revitalization. I have been working on these programs since my 2012 re-election and it has been a long road."

Speaking on the SEQRA GEIS, Pritchard says the February 26 vote to enact the Maybrook Traditional Downtown Development into law will allow and encourage developers to invest in the Maybrook community.

Economic development in the village is a top priority for Pritchard.

"One of the assignments [in] my role in economic development includes bringing in development and consequently tax revenue," he says. "For this I have made several trips to visit the owners of a large industrial parcel in the village to attempt to encourage their interest in developing the property they own...After spending a day with the mayor and I these owners have decided to pursue development and are now earnestly in the engineering stages of an 880,000 square foot light manufacturing and corporate park. It is my intention to assist them in seeing this through to fruition and build this village a formidable tax base."

Pritchard has several other ideas for projects in the works, including the extension of Main Street across the railroad tracks to allow for access to both the new corporate park as well as the Stewart State Forest Preserve. He has also been working on the creation of a 500 foot pedestrian and bicycle path interconnecting the two parks in the village that are currently separated by a half-mile walk on public roads.

Pritchard and Leahy are running with Capozzoli, a U.S. Army veteran and third-generation Maybrook resident. He has a long history of getting involved with the Maybrook community having been a member of the village planning board for eight years, a village police officer for 20 years and village fireman for 26 years with eight of those years serving as the president of the fire department.

"For as many years as I've been here, I've had a simple goal just to make [Maybrook] a village that people want to raise their children in," he says. "I want my children to be able to raise their children here. I think my ultimate goal is to give the best services to our taxpayers."

Capozzoli currently works for the Orange County Parks Department.

"My ties go deep," he says. "I've been working there for the last 20 years. I started at the bottom as a laborer and now I am a parks maintenance leader in Newburgh. I run Algonquin, Cronomer and Cronomer Hill [park]. I run all three of those parks, but I started from the bottom and worked my way up."

Self-proclaimed "political pragmatists," Byrne, Starro and Tyrrell make a promise to village residents to put aside their personal political affiliations when making decisions for the village.

"There is a lot of misunderstanding about what you can do based on what ideology you have," says Tyrrell. "In terms of local government, our scope of responsibilities is so narrow and our abilities are so limited by the New York State Constitution and the U.S. Constitution that we can't, like Democrats are usually known for taxing stuff, we can't tax everybody into oblivion, because they're going to leave...So when the political pragmatism comes into play is that we need to be able to see and take pieces from each side in order to address all the needs of our community but also not creating too much of a burden now or in the future."

The Maybrook United are focused on four things: fiscal conservatism, infrastructure, public safety and community development.

They want to fix the village's broken budget system starting off by pledging not to take any salary if elected to office and reexamining the budget, looking for redundancies, ineffective practices and surpluses.

According to the Maybrook United, fixing the village's budget would allow for the village to replace the water tower on Prospect Avenue.

"The problem with that water tower is that it's about to be a water treatment plant part two," says Tyrrell. "Because again, [the village] has no money set aside in the capital reserve."

Tyrrell, a public administration major at John Jay College of Criminal Justice,

says it is time for a fresh set of eyes on the village board.

"In so many years people have been complaining," says Tyrrell. "We've heard the complaints. We've embodied the complaints. We're a part of these complaints. Year after year when these elections would come around, the board was uncontested. And it's time [that] changes."

Along with fixing the budget, the Maybrook United say they will do an aggressive search for all available grant opportunities, something they say may be hard to come by in the "current political finance climate."

A growing issue in Maybrook is the increase in drug overdoses. As an EMT, Tyrrell has seen first hand how devastating the impacts of an overdose can be.

"The usage of drugs is a very hard topic to touch," he says. "As an EMT for the last five years for the Village of Maybrook, I've seen [a lot]...It's everywhere. It's not just here. The problem is that everybody seems to think that they have an answer and all we keep on doing is getting dead heroin users. I wish I could just go up to the heroin addict and say, 'Hey, listen, we don't want you to do this because we don't want you to die. What can we do to help you?"

Montgomery warns against phone scam

The Village of Montgomery is warning against a phone scam targeting residents.

Referred to as "caller ID spoofing," scammers are able to change the number they are calling from to a local number, in this case with the area codes 629 or 457, indicating that the origin of the call is a station other than where it actually comes from.

"...You pick [the phone] up thinking it's a resident or a family member," says Trustee Mike Hembury. "... They're selling you products, they're asking if you want to combine your credit cards and it's tricky."

Mayor Stephen Brescia introduced a resolution during a February 20 board of trustees meeting in support of the "Think Differently" initiative, an initiative advocating for the inclusion of all individuals living on the autism spectrum and with special needs.

The "Think Differently" initiative was introduced in 2015 by Dutchess County Executive Marc Molinaro, who has a daughter on the autism spectrum, and is supported by Orange County Executive Steve Neuhaus. Now, the Village of Montgomery is pledging to support Orange County in promoting awareness of children and families living with special needs.

and has followed the state's rigorous steps along the way. "Only municipalities that want to remove it have to jump through all of these hoops," Walden Mayor Susan Rumbold said. "They have a lengthy process if you want to remove fluoride, but if you want to add it you can just fill out your paperwork and here it is. Municipalities that don't currently have the fluoride in their system, there's nothing there telling them what they have to do for their citizens. It seems to me that the legislation is very punitive to municipalities that want to remove it."

During last Tuesday's meeting, the

council discussed a draft law regarding abandonment of use, as the village hopes to revitalize local rental properties. A public hearing has not yet been scheduled for the local law, which pertains to buildings constructed before 1958 that were intended for use as multiple-family dwellings. Under the current law, longabandoned properties can revert to the zoning for a one-family structure. "Some of these buildings are so large, and have been used as apartments in the past, we want to allow them to continue because they were built before a certain period of time and that was their original usage," Rumbold said. "So we want to

allow people to buy these buildings and not have to convert them into one-family residences. We want to be able to allow them to continue with that original use. That would entice people to purchase them, knowing that they didn't have to renovate them into single-family homes. That would create more good living space for people and get these properties sold." Under the draft law, the two units in the properties would include distinct living units for two different families with separate provisions for cooking.

The board is also in the early stages of looking at legislation that could potentially create a registry of abandoned properties in Walden. Under a potential local law, the village could identify the abandoned properties and then assess fines to the owner of the home (in many cases a bank that has foreclosed on a house or taken over an abandoned site) for code violations, possibly adding the fees to the home's water bill."That law is to encourage the banks to take care of their properties once they take them over," Rumbold said. "They should keep the lawn mowed, keep the structure in good condition." The board recommended that Donovan investigate the matter further, and the discussion on the potential local law will continue in the weeks ahead.

In July of 2016, Leahy introduced legislation pertaining to the drug use or sale by renters in the Village of Maybrook and was passed unanimously by the board of trustees. A part of the legislation, under Chapter 152: Rental Property, reads:

"A special summary proceeding to evict a tenant from leased premises may be maintained upon the ground that the premises, or any part thereof, have been used or occupied for the purpose of using or possessing drugs deemed by New York State Penal Law to be illegal by their nature, quantity, possession, or use..."

On February 28, Leahy will be holding a meeting at the Maybrook Village Hall with Town of Montgomery Supervisor Rod Winchell, Village of Walden Mayor Susan Rumbold, Valley Central Superintendent John Xanthis, Valley Central Assistant Superintendent Michael Bellarosa and Village of Montgomery Mayor Stephen Brescia to discuss the current state of the drug epidemic and identify problems.

The Maybrook United think that the village can do

more to address the drug issue.

"I think that [the meeting] is a starting point but we have too many round tables," says Byrne. "Now we're just changing locations of them and new faces....We need a community coalition beyond those round tables."

The Maybrook United want to address the drug epidemic in two ways: funding and education. They want to allocate funds to help resolve the drug epidemic by hiring more police officers to patrol areas within the village and educate younger kids in schools about drugs.

Byrne currently serves on the Valley Central Board of Education, where he says he oversees a \$101 million budget that funds the education for more than 4,200 students and employs more than 400 staff members. He previously ran for trustee in 2014 and recently resigned his position from the village zoning board of appeals.

He says he brings a much needed younger perspective to the board and hopes to bring optimism back to Maybrook.

"You want to have a village where you have young families coming in," he says. "Not only do younger

families help the school district but everybody wants to talk about [Maybrook Elementary] never opening back up again. Will it happen? I don't know. But the only way you get that is if you get the younger families in here."

Starro is running for mayor because he wants village residents to be heard.

"I don't think [Leahy] is strong enough," Starro says. "He's not listening to the people."

He wants to update the village police department, officially recognize Logan's Way, an undedicated road, and work towards having full transparency with residents.

"I've got a strong team here," says Starro. "We work together. We talk constantly. We nosedive into different topics...we go deep."

For Starro, he says being mayor is all about doing it for the people. Not for the title.

Village of Maybrook elections will be held on Tuesday, March 20 at the Maybrook Senior Center from noon to 9 p.m.

Gardiner's climate task force advocates solar power

The Climart Smart Gardiner Taskforce (CSGT) recently presented a "Community Solarize Campaign" to the town board, advocating for community solar from local farms in the Hudson Valley.

Gardiner, a climate smart community, passed a Solar Law last year marking the beginning of bringing solar energy to the town. Now, the town is applying for a \$5,000 New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) grant to provide for community outreach programs and initiatives.

"This 'solarize Gardiner' project is being brought under the umbrella of Climate Smart Gardiner," says CSGT member Franco Carucci. "...What we presented [to the town board] was a background on what a solarize campaign is and what the next steps are and, most importantly for the town, what their level of commitment is and what they need to do to support us along the way on the campaign."

The New York State Department of

Environmental Conservation (Dec) began their Climate Smart Communities program almost a decade ago. Currently, 214 New York communities, comprising 35% of the state's population, have partnered with their state government to build an environmentally conscious future.

To become a certified Climate Smart Community, municipalities complete 10 "pledge elements" - lists of required action items. Pledge element one requires a municipality to make a public commitment to reducing greenhouse gas emissions and preparing for unavoidable climate change, sending the pledge to the DEC, and then beginning on element two: setting goals and plans for climate action. Pledge element one passed in Gardiner in January.

"With the solarize campaign you really have two options that you can go with," says Carucci. "It's either the traditional rooftop solar or a community solar program. The rooftop solar, while people usually understand that a little bit better because they've seen solar panels on roofs, is not necessarily the easiest campaign to

run because there are significant upfront costs and [maintenance] required...So what we decided to do was community solar. In essence, you have a solar developer who buys open land that is open to the sun and puts out an enormous amount of solar panels that then capture the solar energy. And that gets sold back to the electrical utility company, [which] in our area would be Central Hudson. Customers can then subscribe to the solar developers panels and reap the benefits of the 'debt metering credits,' which is a credit on your monthly bill, usually about 10% to 15% depending on your level of subscription. So, your energy would still be coming from Central Hudson but that energy is being offset 100% by the solar subscription you purchased into."

Gardiner Supervisor Marybeth Majestic says the town board is unanimously in support of the community solarize campaign.

The CSGT is heavily eyeing New York State Solar Farm, which sits on the border of Gardiner and Modena, as one of the potential sources of energy.

"There are local Gardiner residents

that own [the New York State Solar Farm]," he says. "That's one of the things [New York] wants to push even more: trying to keep things as local as possible because that gives a community feel."

The \$5,000 NYSERDA grant will be used to fund CSGT community outreach activities, such as educational seminars and events. If you want to help with the community solarize campaign, consider volunteering for a role in coordinating media outreach for the CSGT, scheduling workshops and events to educate the Gardiner community, taking photos and emailing the community about solar events.

On March 2, the CSGT is holding a vegetarian potluck at the Gardiner Library, located at 133 Farmer's Turnpike, from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. to work on local solutions to climate change.

The CSGT will be looking to form new sub-committees during the potluck to promote their solarize campaign and continuing some existing programs, like the Gardiner Repair Cafe, which falls into one of the "action items" a municipality can take to become a certified Climate Smart Community.

Hearing loss group resumes

Frank has just completed a six-month training through a grant provided to Hearing Loss Association of America that has equipped him to discuss the questions and struggles that individuals may have related to hearing loss.

Frank is not an audiologist or a hearing aid dispenser. His goal is not to market any specific product but rather to provide information that will help individuals decide next steps if they are experiencing some level of hearing loss. His training "Are You Having Trouble Hearing your Grandchildren" is directed at those individuals who may suspect that they may be experiencing some hearing loss and are seeking information to help them address their questions and concerns.

The group meets in the library community room, 133 Farmer's Turnpike in Gardiner. The community room is equipped with T-coil technology for those with compatible hearing aids and cochlear implants.

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Don't throw it away

Gardiner Library hosts Repair Cafe

This past Sunday, the Gardiner Repair Café made its way back to the town to help residents restore their broken but beloved items.

"...What we [do] here is repair items rather than them getting tossed into a landfill," says John Wackman, organizer of repair cafes in the Hudson Valley.

Wackman started his first repair cafe in New Paltz in May of 2013. Currently, repair cafes are present in 18 different locations in the Hudson Valley and Catskill region.

The volunteer-run organization offers several repairing services - anything from sewing pants, a massage, fixing chairs and even photo restoration.

This past Sunday, Wackman and several volunteers set up shop at the Gardiner Library, who sponsored the event.

Don Grice, a "repair coach," was in charge of photo restoration and manipulation - a hobby he picked up years ago.

"The process is pretty simple in most cases and follows

the Hippocratic Medical Oath: First - do no harm," says Grice. "People bring in their treasured picture and the first thing we do is scan it into the computer...Once we have a digital image of the photo I use Photoshop, because I have it, but I show people how to use GIMP, available at GIMP.org for free, if they are interested in learning how to do this themselves."

Grice goes on to describe the photo restoration process, saying that he does anything from adjusting the size of the picture if people want something different than the original, more trickier stuff like color manipulation and isolating areas to adjust them separately and using the clone tool in Photoshop to cover cracks and erase things.

"It's a fun way to combine computers, art and photography with 'family history' and dealing with people so I've really enjoyed doing it at the cafes," he says.

In addition to the Gardiner Repair Cafe, Grice also volunteers for the New Paltz, Esopus and Rosendale repair cafes. He says the repair cafes combine three things that are important to him: reusing and fixing things so that they are not dumped into landfills, helping people in the community and teaching people.

"The cafes are a really great example of neighbors helping neighbors in a very friendly and productive environment," he says.

The Gardiner Repair Café is also a part of the town's Community Solarize Campaign, being an action item in the category for waste management and reduction.

OCLT celebrates 25 years

The Orange County Land Trust (OCLT) is celebrating its twenty-fifth year anniversary as an organization this year.

Led by the late Louis Mills, who served as Orange County's first County Executive from 1970-1977, OCLT was founded to protect Orange County's farms, natural habitats, and iconic landscapes in the light of growing development pressure. Mills was joined by several of the County's leading business, farming, and conservation leaders to form a Board of Directors, which included: Marty Borko, Elmire Conklin, F. Edward Devitt, and the late, Robert "Bob" Augello, Esq., Ann Botshon, Seymour Gordon, Milton Arthur Lain III, and Jacques Levine.

The Land Trust was officially incorporated in March of 1993, thanks in large part to attorney Bob Augello, who tirelessly provided years of invaluable pro bono legal service to establish the organization.

Some of the group's earliest activities focused on the protection of Sterling Forest from a massive development project that would have otherwise fragmented the ecologically-diverse forest and threatened drinking water sources. After years of ongoing discussions and

negotiations, a coalition of organizations and agencies, including the states of New Jersey and New York, helped establish Sterling Forest State Park.

Not long after, the Land Trust set their sights on other lands of natural and agricultural importance. Thus in 1995, the Land Trust accepted the donation of a sixty-acre property in Slate Hill, now known as Hunter Farm Preserve.

Nearly twenty years later, the Land Trust, now based out of Mountainville at the base of Schunnemunk Mountain, employs a professional staff of six led by Executive Director James Delaune. The Land Trust also owns and manages thirteen nature preserves and helps monitor over eleven-thousand acres of protected land annually, including lands that were protected through partnerships with the Town of Warwick, Open Space Institute, and County Government, among others.

The Land Trust will celebrate this special milestone with past and present board members at a Founder's Day luncheon at their office in April and at their Annual Benefit Reception on Friday, June 8 from 6-9 pm at Cedar Lakes Estate in Port Jervis.

Arming teachers?

resident Trump's response to the recent shooting in Florida included a suggestion that some teachers, if properly trained, could respond to a school shooter if provided with a weapon. He also suggested financial incentive for teachers willing to carry a weapon into school.

Educators, not surprisingly, hate the idea. Teachers are not soldiers or cops, they are educators. Many took to social media to point out that they were struggling to get funding for basic classroom supplies, much less firearms.

And quite frankly, the more loaded weapons in any public place, the greater the possibility of an accidental discharge or the possibility that a weapon could somehow fall into the wrong hands.

Area school districts may not be preparing to arm their teachers, but when it comes to school safety, many are being proactive. Wallkill Schools Superintendent Kevin Castle pledged as much last week in an open letter posted on the district's website.

"We will continue to work with police agencies, our school resource officer, the Building Safety Teams, the Positive School Climate Teams and outside support groups to review our safety protocols and to maintain a positive school environment," Castle wrote.

Pine Bush Superintendent Tim Mains said that the district has responded to numerous reports and rumors, as per district protocol. In most cases, the reports and rumors proved to be unfounded.

"We cannot share information with you due to privacy concerns," Mains wrote, "but you certainly can share information with us, and we want you to. In fact, the most valuable thing you can do is bring your concerns to our attention."

He also cautioned that "spreading rumors via social media is not productive, particularly when posting the names of specific students."

In the meantime, school administrators need to continue pressing for more federal funding for school safety, including funds that would improve security, hire more school safety officers and fund school threat assessment and crisis intervention programs, including mental health responses. These are far more productive notions than arming teachers.

After the tragic shooting at the school in Parkland Florida we are back to the debate on gun control. I graduated high school in 1960. In the 12 years I spent in school I don't remember reading about a mass shooting at a school anywhere in the country despite the fact that a greater percentage of people owned guns and it wasn't uncommon for students to bring guns to school, shotguns during small game season and rifles during deer season.

Back then it was hard to find a student who knew someone who used drugs, today almost every high schooler knows a drug user. Last year we had 25,000 gun deaths, two thirds of them suicides and over 60,000 drug overdose deaths. I venture that the day of the 17 Parkland deaths more school age children died from drugs and that goes on every day and it doesn't count the gun deaths caused by drug related violence. Drugs are bio-chemical weapons of mass destruction and the people who smuggle them or manufacture them should be treated as terrorist. Looking at the number of children suffering from ADS and bipolar problems I wonder how much neurological damage even moderate drug use by parents is doing to their unborn children.

Orange County California just removed a two mile long homeless encampment from the side of the road among the things removed were 250 ton of trash, 1100 pounds of human feces and 5000 hypodermic needles, the homeless are more victims of a drug culture.

We have experienced yet another horrible act of violence in our schools. If all the other horrible acts were not enough, it is very apparent our schools are NOT SAFE!

I worked for the New York State Police in the Emergency Management Section. Shortly after the Columbine (Colorado) School shooting, then Governor George Pataki designated Lieutenant Governor Mary Donahue to lead the New York State Safe Schools Policy and legislative agenda.

Myself and each of the Emergency Management

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What makes the sap run?

f Uncle Bill came down to the farm from Vermont, or western Massachusetts, he invariably brought a gallon or half-gallon can of maple syrup. He'd buy the syrup from a New England road stand, or country store, and it didn't matter where.

If it was Sunday, our mother would make pancakes or waffles and we would open the syrup can and she would pour the maple into small, clear, cut-glass pitchers which would eventually stick to the breakfast table tablecloth.

Sometimes these small pitchers were of white Depression glass. After the meal, the good uncle's can of syrup was reverently stuck in the back of the refrigerator. Often this bright can, printed in woodland scenes of maple trees, galvanized buckets, and horse-drawn snow-runner collection sleds, cooled

alongside a quart Ball jar of our own maple syrup made from the trees of our farm.

As a boy, I learned how to make maple syrup. It didn't take much. Up the lane was an elderberry bush. The interesting thing about elderberry is that its stems are hollow. The Indians knew this, and my father knew

this, and he taught me -- to tap a maple tree, first make your taps. I cut the sweeping arms of the elderberry and with my Schrade pocket knife whittled what was necessary. The middle of the stem was of white pith and you could clean this out with a wire or a bent clothes hanger. Never prepared, I searched around for buckets, or jars, or anything I could hang on the tree.

When I got very old, and found a woman to fall for my broken charms, and married, I fed her real maple syrup from the trees outside our windows, and taught her what little there is to know about the fine arts of syrup. Unfortunately, she was hooked on the stuff, and now not a season goes by that I don't receive imperatives about finding "the buckets and taps". But, of course, this keeps me young. Yet, of equal misfortune, she discovered she can make her own granola with our syrup, and so supplies are in constant jeopardy of being baked with oats rather than poured lusciously on homemade pancakes. Clearly, these are the unforeseen perils of matrimony. Calmly, I have tried to represent to her that the use of homemade maple syrup on a health food of such questionable value as steel-rolled oat granola, is a culinary activity bordering on the criminal. No avail. I yield.

The earliest I have seen sap buckets on trees is in January and that was up at Mohonk Preserve, so I guess they know something. I usually tap by the end of the first week of February. The early sap is considered the best, and you never know how long the season will run. It's all over by mid-March. If the nights are cold

and there is snow on the ground, the sap will run well once the air gets above freezing, creating a "positive pressure" in the tree. Once the air gets colder than the ground, a "negative pressure" is evident in the tree,

and moisture enters -- is sucked into -- the roots.



I used to have a woodened handled, barn maker's handcrank drill and drill bit, but I have upgraded to a DeWalt cordless drill with a ½ inch bit. It almost makes things too easy. Drill into the tree about waist high, a couple inches, preferably above a good root wing. I only do about ten taps. I have no covers on my buckets, so after a rain they need to be

dumped. Who wants to boil down all that rainwater? Unlike some of my friends, I have no outside wood fired evaporator, and we boil down the sap in a turkey roasting pan on two stove top burners running simultaneously. To know when to stop the boil is part of the art.

Everyone knows the ratio of sap to syrup is 40 to 1 and so far we have put up about $\frac{1}{2}$ gallon.

You can see, maple syrup is not a product we sell on this farm. If you want something sweet, we have honey. The sun is out, the sap is running!

Non-Commission Officers of every Troop in the State Police were assigned to participate in the formulation of policies and procedures that would hopefully prevent any recurrence of the horror at Columbine. A period of fact finding, and literature review ensued. All stakeholders participated in this effort; NYS Department of Education, New York State Police as well as all other Police, Parents, teachers and security experts to name a few. Ultimately a very comprehensive picture of the current state of readiness emerged. There were many good policies in effect and many changes that were needed to improve the ability to respond to what is currently known as "Active Shooter" situation. While this is a bit long winded it gives people an idea of what an "After Action Response" entails.

The rest is history. New York State has been fortunate (lucky?) and has not had a mass casualty incident. I belong to the Ulster County Chief's of Police Association and they conduct monthly meetings with school officials. Maybe New York State has a good model (or maybe we are lucky). In any event we have a school safety issue. As a parent and a Grandparent and a former elected official I can confidently say we are not offering adequate protection to our school children. If terrorist and mentally ill people have identified schools as a "Soft Target' we must respond to this situation immediately. If government can not protect our school children, then we the parents and grandparents must. If children

must be kept home for a period of time, so be it. The political machinations of "whose fault is it", is best left to politicians. Until such time as it can be shown that it is not needed, I suggest all schools be staffed with armed security, trained in mitigation of mass casualty assaults.

As Americans we have been extolled about how we should spend billions of dollars to support people who are not supposed to be in America. It is time we had Safe Schools and must spend whatever it takes to achieve them.





he Department of Theatre Arts at SUNY New Paltz proudly presents "Water by the Spoonful," a stirring dramatization of one soldier's return to civilian life, with performances March 1-4 and March 8-11 at Parker Theatre on the New Paltz campus.

Section 1

This Zoning for Solar Energy Law is adopted pursuant to sections 261-263 of the Town Law of the State of New York, which authorizes the Town of Lloyd to adopt zoning provisions that advance and protect the health safety and welfare of the community.

Large Scale Solar Energy Systems capa ble of generating 25 megawatts or more are separately regulated by New York State agencies and are not covered by this local law.

Section 2

The Code of the Town of Lloyd, Chapter 100, titled Zoning, Article VI, titled Supplemental Regulations, Section 100-39.1, titled Solar Energy Facilities, be and the same hereby is amended by canceling existing Subsections E.(1), E.(3)(d), (e) and (f) and enacting new Subsections as follows:

E. Approval Standards for Large-Scale Solar Energy Systems as a Special Use.

(1) Large-Scale Solar Energy Systems are permitted through the issuance of a special use permit within Agricultural, Heavy Industrial, Light Industrial, Designed Business and General Business Zoning Districts. subject to the requirements set forth in this Section, including site plan approval. Applications for the installation of a Large-Scale

Solar Energy System shall be reviewed by the Code Enforcement Officer and referred with comments, to the Planning Board for its review and action, which can include approval, approval on conditions, and denial.

E. Approval standards for Large-Scale Solar Energy Systems as a Special Use

(3) Special Use Permit Standards. (d) The electrical and control equipment of all Large-Scale Solar Energy Systems shall be enclosed by six-foot-high fencing to prevent unauthorized access. Warning signs with the owner's contact information shall be placed on the entrance and perimeter of the fencing. The type of fencing shall be determined by the Planning Board. The fencing and the entire system of arrays and secondary equipment shall be situated and screened so as not to be visible from streets, public ways, and all neighboring properties, to the greatest extent practicable.

(e) Any application under the Section shall meet all substantive provisions contained in local site plan requirements in the Town of Lloyd zoning code that, in the judgement of the Planning Board, are applicable to the system being proposed. If none of the site plan requirements are applicable, the Planning Board may waive the requirement for site plan review.

(f) The Planning Board shall require an applicant to prepare a

visual impact analysis as part of the submittal requirements for Large- Scale Solar Energy Systems.

(g) The Planning Board may impose conditions on its approval of any special use permit under this Section in order to enforce the standards referred to in this Section or in order to discharge its obligations under the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA).

(h) The applicant shall, to the greatest extent practicable, avoid construction on areas of prime farmland as designated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Brandon Powell drives inside with the ball.

Burke led 10-3 with 3:14 left in the first quarter. Pine Bush overcame that early deficit until it was tied 39-39 at the end of the third quarter. Both teams battled in the fourth quarter until Burke took the lead late and survived to win 54-51 by taking down the state's fourth ranked AA team.

"We expected a dog fight today, and that's what it was. They outworked us," said Steve Distefano, Pine Bush coach. "This is something that will be a learning experience. It is humbling. It's one game at a time right now. That's for real. This is playoff time, so what better motivation than to come off of that."

Pine Bush dropped to 19-1 as Burke snapped the Bushmen's 47-game regular season winning streak.

After Burke jumped out to a quick start

the Bushmen started finding a groove and pushed back. Brandon Powell, who scored three points in the first half, scored 15 points in the second half with a three. Bryan Powell, who scored 18 points in the game, with 10 points in the second half, landed a shot with 3:50 left in the fourth to give Pine Bush a 47-46 lead.

Mason Memmelaar scored 10 points for the Bushmen and finished a shot as the game went back and fourth. Burke led 54-51 in the closing seconds when Memmelaar put the ball up from the perimeter. It did not fall, and Burke handed the Bushmen their first loss of the season.

"I don't think we came ready enough. We were not prepared for what they were going to bring at us," said Memmelaar, a senior. "And at the end, we fell short."



Town of Crawford

History: Crawford was first settled by the Thomas Bull family who, appropriately enough, founded the hamlet of Bullville circa 1760. The hamlet of Pine Bush first came into being circa 1765 when Robert Milliken settled there. The Searsville area was first settled by Johannes Snider circa 1768.

But Crawford was not to become an official township until Mar. 4, 1823, when it was formed from the Town of Montgomery. There has been a recent resurgence in the hamlet with work proceeding to upgrade and restore the Main Street area.

Most of the growth in the outlying areas has been residential, with horse farms a growing land use in recent years. The town now includes nearly 50 square miles and a population of about 7,875.

Town of Gardiner

History: The first settlers were descendants of the New Paltz Patentees and Dutch from the towns of Shawangunk and Rochester. In the later half of the 19th century, Irish families came to settle in Gardiner.

The town was formed April 2, 1854 from the nearby townships of Shawangunk, Rochester and New Paltz. It was named for Addison Gardiner, a Rochester resident who was elected Lieutenant Governor in 1844.

Ireland Corners was settled in 1763 by Daniel Deyo. Two Irishmen, John and Charles Geirigan, settled there in the 1830s and built a small corner store. The Ireland Corners Hotel was built in the late 1800s.

The town's oldest business is the Tuthilltown Grist Mill, which was built in 1788 by Sela Tuthill and has been in operation virtually continuously since then. In addition to the grist mill, the Wallkill River also provided water power for wood and woolen mills.

The first apple orchards began in operation around 1810. Today, the orchards remain a vital part of the Gardiner community.

Town of Montgomery

History: During its earliest settling in the 17th century, it was known as the Precinct of Shawangunk and was originally part of Ulster County. In 1743 it became known as the Precinct of Wallkill and in 1772 the Precinct of Hanover. It received its current name in 1788 in honor of the well-known patriot and soldier, General Richard Montgomery. Montgomery was a Brigadier General in the revolutionary army and died at the storming of Quebec in 1775.

The Town of Montgomery includes 3 waterways, the Tinbrook, Muddykill, and The Wallkill River. The later is celebrated as one of the few rivers to flow north in the Eastern United States. These waterways were ideal sites for Indian settlements, and remnants of there inhabitance are still found today.

In the early 18th century, a man by the name of Cadwallader Colden settled in the area. Colden was named the first surveyor general in 1720, and soon after was named to Governor Burnett's provincial council. In 1761 he became lieutenant governor of New York. He was one of the most learned men of the colonies and was a frequent correspondent of Benjamin Franklin. Colden, also a physician, contributed substantially to a variety of intellectual and scientific fields. He studied botany, physics and philosophy and was published several times on his findings. The area he settled in was called Coldengham, which is the present Coldenham, located off of 17K.

Village of Maybrook

History: The Village of Maybrook was incorporated in 1925. A village, literally built by the railroad, the roots of Maybrook actually date back to 1735, when land was deeded for a highway to be extended from the Town of Shawangunk to Goshen, passing in front of the Goodwill Church.

For many years, the road which is now Route 208 was called the Walden Road, but in 1950, the portion passing through the village was renamed Homestead Avenue in honor of the early owners of homesteads along this

In the early 1880s, this valley was first considered ideal for a railroad line

and, in 1883, the first surveys were made for a rail line through the Wallkill Valley, from Hamptonburgh to Montgomery, to connect existing Erie and Lehigh and Hudson Lines. In 1887, plans were unveiled for the construction of the Poughkeepsie Railroad Bridge, enabling goods from all western portions of the country to be delivered to New England and, in return, expedite the flow of industrial products from the New England states to the western portion of the country.

The steel rails were laid in April of 1889 through the settlement of Orange Junction. The name was later changed to Maybrook Junction and, eventually, to Maybrook.

In 1908, the Orange County Railroad began to enlarge the existing railroad yards, buying farmland on the east side of the tracks. The enlargement made Maybrook one of the largest freight terminals in the east.

In 1968, the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad was consolidated with the Penn Central, signaling the beginning of the end of Maybrook as an active railroad town. Lines were diverted and the business began to decline, grinding to a full stop in 1973, when a fire destroyed the Poughkeepsie Railroad Bridge.

Village of Montgomery

History: When James Ward bought a mill on the east side of the Wallkill River in 1740, he built the first bridge across the river and opened up the land for development that would one day become the Village of Montgomery.

The village's history is closely tied in with that of the town when the families of Jacob Bookstaver, Frederick Sinsabaugh and Johannes Youngblood bought an 800-acre tract here in 1735. Before even that date, however, they had journeyed to this area to help found the Brick Reformed Church.

What is now the village was called Ward's Bridge. It was included with the Precinct of Shawangunk in Ulster County until 1743 when it became the Precinct of Wallkill. In 1772, the precinct was divided and that portion containing the village became the Precinct of Hanover.

After the Revolutionary War, Hanover became the Township of Montgomery, named in honor of the general who fell at the Battle of Quebec.

But it wasn't until Feb. 17, 1810 that Ward's Bridge was formally incorporated as the Village of Montgomery. There followed the boom years of the village, with the famous Montgomery Academy growing and many general stores, drug stores, tobacco shops, blacksmiths, carriage shops, newspaper offices and law offices springing up all over. The financial depression that socked the nation in 1830 hit Montgomery as well, and it didn't really recover until ground was broken for the Montgomery Branch Railroad in 1866. Other rail lines followed, and the village boomed again.

Village of Walden

History: The first settlements of the lands surrounding the high falls of the Wallkill occurred in the middle of the 18th century, decades before a wealthy merchant named Jacob Walden found it to his liking.

In the mid-1700s, the land was part of the Wallkill Precinct and was the home of a grist mill believed to have been built by James Kidd and his family in a place they called Kiddtown.

In 1812, a New York City businessman, who had made his fortune as a mercantile trader, visited the area. Jacob Walden and his wife were so impressed, they decided to settle here and bought many of the farmlands along the river, including the old grist mill. The family resided in a stone house at what is now the corner of Wait and North Montgomery Streets and the property of the Historical Society of Walden and the Wallkill Valley. The stone house remained in the Walden family until 1856, when it was sold to Edward Wait.

Walden set out to encourage manufacturers to locate in the area. The Franklin Company, founded in 1822 by Jesse Scofield and Dr. S.C. Capron, was erected at the site of the original grist mill. The company manufactured cotton and woolen goods and by 1934 had become the largest manufacturer of flannel in the U.S.

In 1831, E.W. Bridges was commissioned by Walden to plot and map all of his lands and the adjoining area. It was the first map of what was to become, in 1855, the Village of Walden.

Through the years, Walden gained a reputation for its knife manufacturing industries, with the Alden and the New York Knife Works becoming the major industries of the area around the turn-of-the-century. After the first World War, the knife industry declined and disappeared from the village altogether when Schrade Cutlery moved to Ellenville.

Town of Shawangunk

History: According to local historian Marc B. Fried, the first settler in what was to become Shawangunk was Gertrude Brown, whose deed from the Esopus Indians for the "land named Sawankonck" is dated January 24, 1682. From an ancient map, a copy of which is displayed in Shawangunk Town Hall, it is apparent that Gertrude (a widow) and her three young children actually settled on their land within the next five years. A tract of more than 1,200 acres, lying south of the Bruyn Parcel was obtained by members of the van Camp, Decker, Terwilliger and Shut families, whose October 1694 patent indicates that by that date, the proprietors has already "made considerable improvements by settling, cultivating and manuering the same and whereof thay are now Actually Possest." The Bruyn and van Camp/Decker tracts were along the Shawangunk Kill.

The Precinct of Shawangunk was created in the early 1700s, with Shawangunk officially becoming a township on Mar. 7, 1788.

With an area of about 57 square miles and a population of about 12,022, Shawangunk has seen the hamlet of Wallkill become the business center of the town. Just outside of the hamlet, the Wallkill and Shawangunk Correctional Facilities are big employers there.





Fiero is planning on visiting Poland and Ecuador with his wife this year and doing a solo trip to Thailand next January.


"Everywhere has different birds and every place is intriguing as the last," he says.
