

Chadwick Lake upgrade

Town of Newburgh to
get \$1.8M to improve
water quality

The Town of Newburgh will receive \$1.8 million from the New York City Department of Environmental Protection for improvements to the water-filtration system at Chadwick Lake. The lake reservoir will serve as the town's primary source of drinking water during the shutdown of the Delaware Aqueduct in 2022.

"They want to make sure communities that buy water from them can be self-sufficient during the shutdown," said Town of Newburgh Supervisor Gil Piaquadio.

Currently, the town relies on both the lake and the Delaware Aqueduct for drinking water. The aqueduct is scheduled to close down for more than six months while a new bypass is constructed as part of the aqueduct system under the Hudson River.

"To respond to the demand for water,

City Hall in dire shape

Newburgh's City Hall building is in rough shape, city code enforcement officials say. The building has structural and electrical issues that require immediate attention. And, if lead or asbestos is found during the course of needed work, staff may have to vacate the building.

"Chief Horton has laid down, as a condition of our continued occupation of 83 Broadway... that we need to have certification done by a structural engineer

that says we can continue to occupy this building," said City Manager Michael Ciaravino at City Hall last week.

The building issues are serious, city Assistant Fire Chief and Interim Building Inspector Bill Horton said. They include electrical problems and structural issues that "cause the building to continually shift," he said.

"Two years ago, they started noticing some settling on the southeast corner of the building," Horton said Tuesday, and some cracked joists were found. "Fifteen to 18 years ago they did renovations at City Hall. There had been a second

staircase in the back," on the southeast side of the building, he explained. "When they removed that staircase, it turned out to be more of a support structure. So, the building started settling toward that void space."

The city Department of Public Works built temporary shoring in the basement and on the first three floors of the four-floor building to address the problem, he said. "Recently, there seems to be additional settling going on," Horton said, as well as rotting around windows facing Grand Street.

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Thousands attend March for Our

They marched, held signs, chanted and drummed all along the Walkway Over the Hudson on Saturday. Thousands of people walked across the span in show of support for gun control five weeks following the Parkland, Florida, school shooting.

"I think there needs to be reform on the gun issue," said Elizabeth Mackey, 18. "It's ridiculous that we have to fight for something so simple." Twenty-year-old Jamal Lewis stood next to her. "There are so many lives that have been taken," he said. "It's like they're not trying to prevent it."

Lewis and his friends were standing opposite a group of shouting teenagers on the Poughkeepsie side of the Walkway that morning. They chanted, "We want a leader, not a creepy tweeter," and "What do we want? Justice! When do we want it? Now!"

The March for Our Lives event was held as part of a now global campaign in support of gun-control reform, led by students from Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, where 17 students and staff were killed in a mass shooting on Feb. 14.

"I'm here not just for the students, but all the lives that have been lost due to gun violence," said Newburgher Verne Bell, who walked on the Highland side of the Walkway. Mario Hernandez said he was marching for children today and in the future. "One day, my kids will be in

school," he said.

More than 800 marches took place in and outside of the U.S. over the weekend. According to the Walkway Over the Hudson State Park, almost 8,000 people attended the march on Saturday.

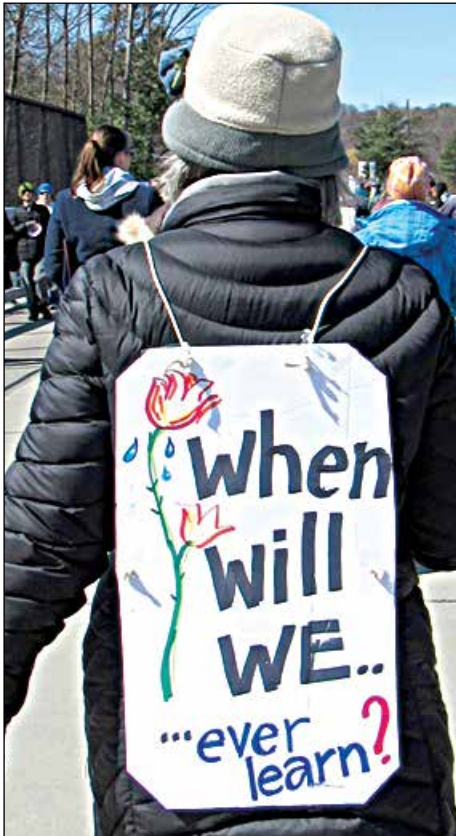

Amendment had been written when Americans were still shooting muskets. "The idea of living with these 21st-Century weapons based on laws for 18th-Century weaponry..." she said, shaking her head.

Vinogradov said she was absolutely against arming teachers with guns, as were many teachers who marched that day, wearing signs that read, "Books not Guns," and "Arm Teachers with Books."

Vinogradov's own sign, which she wore on her back, quoted the lyrics from the Pete Seeger song "Where Have All the Flowers Gone?" Except there was a twist. "The song goes, 'When will they ever learn?'" she said. "My sign reads, 'When will we ever learn?' We need to take collective responsibility."

Following the Parkland school massacre, students quickly organized to lobby for increased gun control, with specific demands for lawmakers to 1. ban assault weapons such as the AR-15 rifle, used in Parkland and other mass shootings, 2. end sales of high-capacity

magazines, such as those used in a mass shooting in Las Vegas that killed 58 people in October, and 3. require universal background checks.

President Donald Trump has proposed arming teachers with guns. He also tweeted about the possibility of strengthening background checks, referring repeatedly to the Parkland shooter as having mental-health issues. However, last year Trump signed a measure that repealed legislation restricting gun sales to the mentally ill.

Last week, Trump tweeted in favor of banning bump stocks, writing, "We will BAN all devices that turn legal weapons into illegal machine guns." No gun-control reform measures have been enacted since Trump met with lawmakers in February, when he promised to shore up background checks and ban bump stocks. According to the Center for Responsive Politics website OpenSecrets.org, the National Rifle Association contributed more than \$30 million to Trump's most recent presidential campaign.

Coast Guard backs away from anchorage plan

The U.S. Coast Guard has released a report that shies away from a plan to build ten anchorage sites for commercial ships traveling the Hudson River between Yonkers and Kingston. The anchorages would have provided stops for large ships, including oil barges, en route to the Port of New York.

"I said we would kill the initial anchorage plan and we did – the PAWSA report confirms that it should stay dead," said Congressman Sean Patrick Maloney in a statement last Tuesday.

The Coast Guard proposed the new anchorage sites with 42 permanent berths in 2016. The plan instantly generated opposition from affected municipalities, environmental groups and local lawmakers including Maloney, who has railed against the proposal since its inception.

The Coast Guard suspended the plan in 2017 after it received roughly 10,000 public comments on the proposed project. The Coast Guard then held workshops to include local residents, educators, environmentalists and businesses to look closer at the plan.

Earlier this month, the Coast Guard's Ports and Waterways Assessment (PAWSA) report summarized findings from the two meetings, held in Poughkeepsie and Albany in the fall. Key recommendations included creating a Hudson River Safety Committee, increasing recreational boating safety and clarifying existing regulations. "The Coast Guard will use this PAWSA report, together with other information, to determine whether, and to what extent, regulatory actions are needed," the report states.

"During the PAWSA workshops we acknowledged that the existing anchorage regulations are unclear, and we are considering how those regulations could be made more readily understood. We have no outcome timelines at this time. Any other substantive rulemaking effort associated with the Hudson River will follow Coast Guard public notice and comment rulemaking procedures to allow for public participation in the process," the report concludes.

Local environmentalists are applauding the report. "The result of the PAWSA is a welcome next step toward

resolving the very contentious proposal by the tug and barge industry for new anchorages on the Hudson," said Riverkeeper President Paul Gallay in a joint statement with Maloney last week.

"Whether or not a new anchorage proposal is ever put forward, it's clear that any new regulations will involve public comment. We hope that the public will remain very much engaged in speaking up for the protection of the river as the process moves forward," Gallay said.

Scenic Hudson President Ned Sullivan noted the Coast Guard had not made any firm decisions on whether to move forward with anchorages. "We must stay vigilant to ensure that the damaging proposal for new anchorages is not revived," he said.

Bald Eagles set up nest on Mount campus

Halfway through the spring semester, Mount Saint Mary College has eagerly accepted two new residents on its campus – a pair of nesting American Bald Eagles.

Around the end of January, members of the college community noticed the pair enlarging a nest in one of the campus's trees, which previously was home to a Red-Tailed Hawk that abandoned the area. Since then, Associate Professor of Biology Douglas Robinson, who has a background in avian research, has been watching carefully for signs of nesting, which would indicate that the pair were preparing for the birth of eaglets.

Last week, the professor announced to the campus, "We're proud parents to-be!" The female eagle's behavior indicates that she is sitting atop something in the nest – likely eggs. Due to the location of the nest, he explained, it is hard to determine how many she may be sitting on. But if all goes well, the eggs should hatch in about 35 days.

"Since the first sighting of the eagles on campus around January 25, 2018," Robinson explained, "the eagles have added sticks to broaden the nest by 18 inches on each side and increased the depth of the nest by double! Over the last two weeks, nest lining material, including grass and pine needles, have been brought to the nest, indicating that the eagles seem pretty serious about having a go at raising some young this season."

Robinson is a behavioral ecologist focused on avian breeding biology. Through various research projects, Robinson has been marking crows since 2001, focusing

specifically on the crows of the Newburgh area since 2011.

County hosts hazardous waste collection event April 14

Orange County will collect hazardous-waste on Saturday, April 14 at Thomas Bull Memorial Park. Household hazardous waste will be accepted from county residents along with prescription and over-the-counter medications.

To participate in the free collection event, county residents must show proof of residency. The event begins at 9 a.m. and ends at 3 p.m.

Acceptable hazardous waste includes adhesives, aerosol cans, automotive products, fire extinguishers, flammable liquids (oil, gas, kerosene or mixtures), corrosives, cleaners, creosote, driveway sealer, pool chemicals,

fluorescent light bulbs, inks, mercury, oil-based paints, pesticides, herbicides, propane cylinders (camp size), roofing tar, rubber cement, solvents, thinners, varnishes, shellac, stains, wood preservatives, used cooking oil, and rechargeable batteries.

Not acceptable are refrigerators, tires, air conditioners, electronics, water-based paint, BBQ-size propane tanks, appliances and alkaline batteries. Medical sharps are also not accepted.

Canadian newsprint is not the enemy – tariffs are

Every day at the News Media Alliance headquarters, a stack of newspapers arrives for myself and the staff. But with the Department of Commerce and the International Trade Commission currently considering tariffs on Canadian newsprint, those days of screen-free reading could be coming to an end.

The fact that newsprint is being threatened is the work of one newsprint mill in the Pacific Northwest, NORPAC. In August 2017, NORPAC petitioned the United States Department of Commerce to begin applying tariffs to newsprint imported from Canada, claiming the imported paper was harming the U.S. newsprint industry. But NORPAC is not acting in the best interests of newsprint consumers or the U.S. paper industry at large — they are acting in their own interest and no one else's.

The buying and selling of newsprint has always been regional without regard for the border. Consumers of newsprint — from newspaper and book publishers to telephone directory manufacturers — tend to buy newsprint in their region, close to their printing operations. The printers who typically utilize Canadian newsprint are those in the northeast and Midwest, where there are currently no U.S. mills operating.

But those regions are not newsprint deserts because of unfair trade by Canadian paper mills. Rather, newsprint mills shut down or converted to producing other, more profitable paper products when the demand for newsprint fell, something that has been happening steadily for decades. Since 2000, the demand for newsprint in North America has dropped by 75 percent.

But affordable Canadian paper has helped keep the printed news alive and flourishing well into the 21st century. With new tariffs, many smaller newspapers will feel their belts tightening. The combination of preliminary countervailing and antidumping duties increases the cost of imported newsprint by as much as 32 percent, and a number of newspapers have already experienced price increases and a disruption in supply. If the International Trade Commission and the Department of Commerce make these tariffs permanent in the coming months, it could lead some small local publishers to cut their print product entirely — or even shut their doors.

Some, like NORPAC, may argue that by imposing duties on Canadian imports we're saving American jobs and boosting our own economy, but while that may sometimes be true for other industries, the opposite is true of newsprint.

What we're seeing with the newsprint tariffs is not a government acting to try to better the economy for its citizens. Instead, it is "political arbitrage" by one private investment group — where they are effectively looking to use the U.S. government to tax local and community newspapers across the United States in order to bolster their own bottom line.

When considering whether to take NORPAC's claims seriously, the Department of Commerce excluded input from U.S. newsprint mills owned by Canadian companies — specifically Resolute Forest Products and White Birch. Excluding manufacturers who, during the period of investigation, had three functioning newsprint mills in the U.S. because they have sister mills in Canada shows an unwillingness to understand the borderless newsprint industry and the restructuring that has taken place in recent decades.

If the tariffs on Canadian newsprint are allowed to stand, we're not only risking a centuries-old relationship with our neighbors to the north, but we're putting our own U.S. news industry in jeopardy. While the big national and regional papers may have less trouble finding the funds to keep their print editions coming, we could see small publishers lose footing, and those tiny local papers are some of the most vital members of our news community. Under the right conditions, those papers can find a way to maintain their footing, but if the newsprint industry can't support them, those communities will become news deserts, and that's a future none of us want.

We may not be able to save the entire industry by keeping tariffs off our paper, but we can keep it thriving while we re-position ourselves for the years to come. Having affordable newsprint will help us do that.

The home front mobilizes a century ago

Recently, I visited the headquarters of the American Red Cross in Washington, D.C. I was seeking information in their archives about the work Newburgh's Red Cross Chapter did a century ago in support of the troops serving in World War I. That home front work was astounding by any measure. We are proud today of the rapid distribution of news and feedback via social media to organize movements. Think back to 1917-1918 and realize that citizens had newspapers and conversation as the ways to spread their messages.

The first transmission of spoken word and music via the new invention of radio had happened in 1903 and few American homes had invested the money and time to build a "crystal set" radio receiver before the 1920's, not that there was much on the airwaves to listen to. Telephone service came to Newburgh in 1879 but it wasn't until 1890 that this city had over 100 customers for the service. So America, as it followed the growing war across Europe, learned what was happening each day by waiting for the printed word to be distributed and then talking to their neighbors about it.

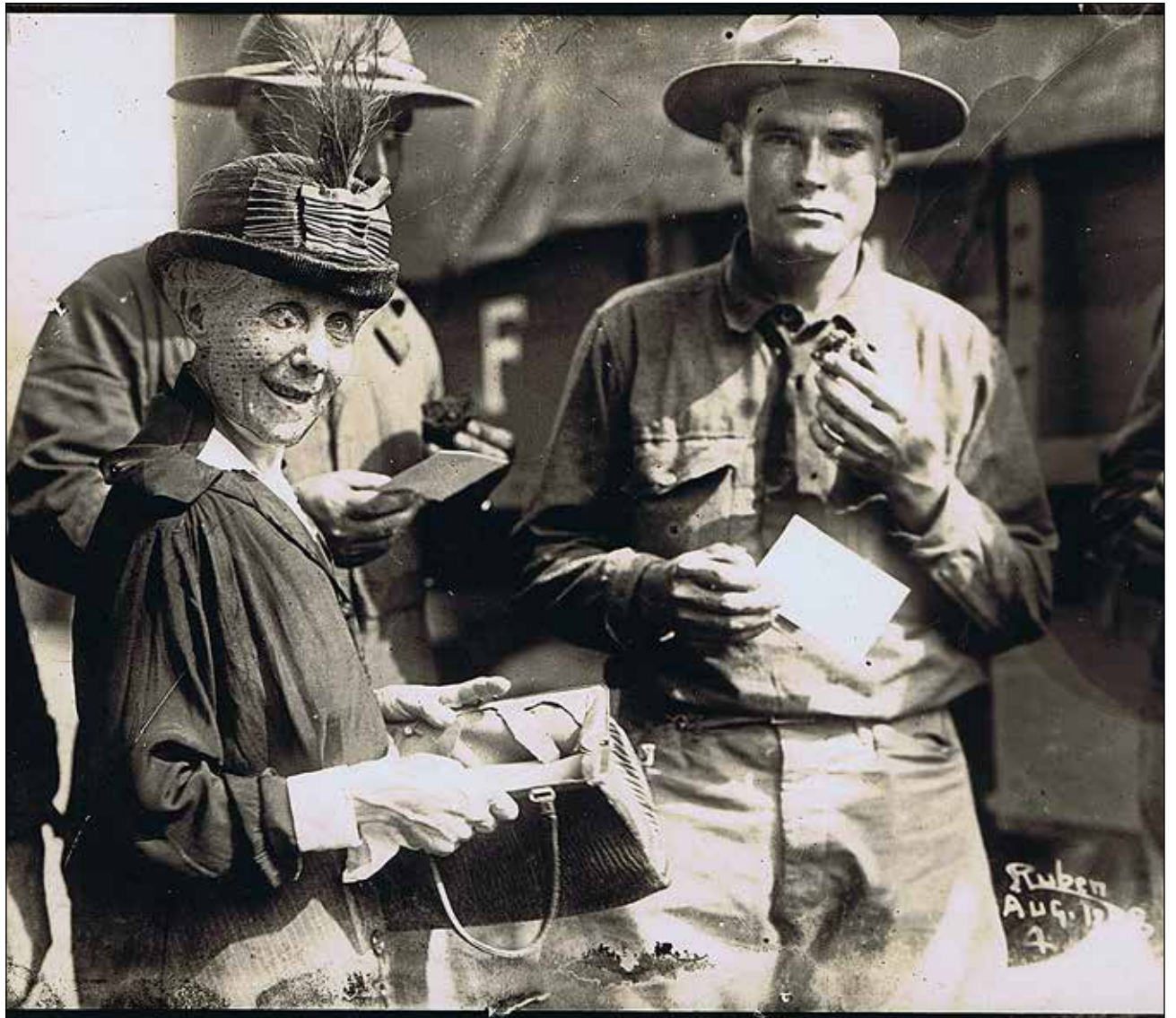

On the last day of February 1917, a handful of Newburghers met at City Hall and formed a local chapter of the Red Cross. Forty people came to their first chapter meeting in March at the Columbus Trust Company Bank. By March 26, that early spring, they had established and outfitted a headquarters at 44 Grand Street and had begun to organize manpower and supplies to support the troops who would soon head off to fight. Every local man was sent off to training camp with newly knitted washcloths, socks, sweaters, gloves, hats and scarves plus books and paper.

The first committees of Newburgh's young Red Cross were Soldier's Relief and Home Service. Soldier's Relief made and packed all those supplies for our local troops and Home Service took care of the needs of families whose loved ones departed for the front as well as took care of troops passing through Newburgh on their way to being deployed from New York harbor. In that second decade of the 20th century, several railroad lines connected at Newburgh and so men being deployed from all points west rode troop trains that stopped here for fuel.

Like the magnificent young people we see mobilizing for action this month, Newburgh's children did the same leading one war effort on their own. They noticed that soldiers on the trains that came into the Newburgh station were asking if anyone could help them mail a letter or postcard back home. A group of youngsters did just that and soon they were meeting troop trains and soliciting mail. Word spread to the thousands of

soldiers making the journey to their embarkation point in New York that Newburgh was the place where your last stateside letter could be mailed, so have it ready. Young Newburghers positioned themselves at the street corners that intersected the long row of passenger cars and called out asking if anyone needed a letter or card mailed. Envelopes always fluttered down from the train windows to their waiting hands. Grocer John W. Hoffman whose store was at 249 Water Street provided the stamps from coins that neighbors put in a jelly jar on his counter. Every day, with the letters stamped at Hoffman's, that small volunteer postal army carried them to the mail slot at the post office five blocks away.

The average American worker in 1917 earned barely \$500/year. Yet, in World War I, the Newburgh Chapter of the Red Cross recruited 12,000 members at \$1 each and 7,000 pupils at 25 cents each. Dues was just the beginning of local support. Volunteers, including school children who stayed after school for the task, cut and rolled muslin from our cotton processing plants like

The Bleachery. Many children brought in old laundered sheets and tore those into strips for bandages too. In one month in 1918, they shipped out 98,000 surgical dressings bound for Newburgh's Company E and Company L serving in France.

Red Cross workers led the local canteen movement. Canteens were support stations set up wherever soldiers moving toward the front might need refreshments, supportive conversation or, perhaps, letter writing (there was no standard that soldiers must be literate and in 1918, many were not). Mrs. Harriet C. Winne offered to lead this group and soon had another large volunteer corps making coffee and baked goods seven days a week as they also met the arriving troop trains and truck convoys. In the spring of 1918, they were meeting, feeding and encouraging an overwhelming average of 9,000 men a week as America funneled its new army to the shores of the Atlantic headed for Europe.

SUNY Orange presents program on opioid addiction

“The addiction to opiates has become rampant in the U.S over the past decade,” states Dr. Donald F. Slish who is a professor of biological sciences and the chief premedical advisor at SUNY Plattsburgh. On Thursday, March 29, he will analyze addiction from the perspective of neurobiology, the branch of biology that is concerned with the anatomy, physiology, and pathology of the nervous system. He continues, “Aside from the psychological and sociological explanations, our basic biology predisposes us to repeating extremely pleasurable experiences. This is due to our limbic system, part of our mammalian inheritance.”

The lecture, which is free and open to the public and presented in cooperation with the SUNY Orange Biology Department, will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Sandra and Alan Gerry Forum, Room 010 in the Rowley Center for Science and Engineering.

The limbic system influences the peripheral nervous system, and its function is to modify behavior based on experiences. Through his lecture, The Neurobiology of Opiate Addiction, Slish will discuss the role of the limbic system in the process of addiction, from the level of the receptors to changes in the wiring

of the brain that lead to destructive behavior. He explains, “Experiences that are good for our survival and reproduction and bring pleasure, are remembered and repeated. Negative experiences are also remembered and avoided. Highly addictive drugs like opiates are especially good at activating feelings of pleasure despite being linked to maladaptive rather than adaptive behavior.”

Donald F. Slish has a BS in Biochemistry from the University of Scranton and he earned his PhD in Pharmacology at the University of Cincinnati School of Medicine, Department of Pharmacology and Cell Biophysics. He teaches General Biology, Cell Biology, the Biology of Cancer, the Pharmacology of Recreational Drugs, and Cardiovascular Pharmacology. Slish has authored and co-authored several books and peer-reviewed articles. His new book is entitled Pharmacology of Recreational Drugs.

Prints and Ghosts in Beacon

TheoGanz Studio is very pleased to present Prints and Ghosts, a solo exhibition of recent mixed media monotypes by Elana Goren.

This exhibition conveys the idea that the animal subjects are always in peril, facing early death as they inhabit the human world, usually spending entire lives unseen by the people who benefit from their existence. These animals are, in essence, living ghosts, unseen and unheard as they face death. Recognition of individual lives is paramount and in this show, the same individual is seen differently with each print of the same subject, sometimes strong, sometimes more of a ghost.

The theme relates to both the idea of ghosts in death as well as ghosts as a term used in the printmaking world. In printmaking, ghost prints are fainter impressions of a preprinted plate where the ink residue from the first print is left behind and yields a lighter, different impression in the second print from the same print. Sometimes the subtleties of ghost prints come through more strongly than the original and this has been a source of fascination and experimentation for the artist.

Elana Goren is a printmaker, teacher, illustrator and graphic designer who has taught graphic design at SUNY New Paltz as well as painting and printmaking at Westchester Center for the Arts. She has taught monotype and etching with other printmaking methods at the

Garrison Art Center and has given etching presentations at the School of Visual Arts. She has also worked as an art director for the major companies and institutions including the Denver Art Museum and Scholastic, Inc. 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Passover is the first of the major Jewish holidays mentioned in the Bible and is the most beloved of all the holy days. More families celebrate Passover, an eight-day festival, beginning this year on March 30 at sundown and continuing until April 7, than any other holiday. It commemorates the deliverance of the children of Israel from Egyptian bondage and also recalls the story of their exodus from Egypt. Jews feel that it is a commandment to retell the story that begins in slavery and ends in freedom.

Passover is truly a family holiday because of the importance of conveying the story and meaning of Passover to the next generation. This is done on the first two nights at the "Seders" with the help of the "Haggadah." Children are an integral part of the Seders. It is the youngest child's role to ask the Four Questions about the importance of the night: others look for the "afikomen," a special matzah hidden before the Seder. The door is opened for Elijah the prophet, and songs of praise are sung.

To Italians, St. Joseph is the patron saint of carpenters, widows, unwed mothers, and orphans, and they gather each year on (March 19) to honor him with a St. Joseph's altar. This is a day for feasting and, of course, prayers and attendance at Mass. The tradition of staging the St. Joseph Altar was brought

by Sicilian immigrants and is specific to Sicily, not found anywhere else in Italy.

How the food-filled altars came to honor St. Joseph is subject to doubt. Some say the altar had its origin in a famine in Sicily, and with so many people starving, all that the people could do was to turn to their faith. They offered prayers asking for St. Joseph's help to intercede for them, so they would have successful crops. There are a myriad of faith-filled stories that have been prayed to St. Joseph for his protection and fatherly love. It doesn't matter which story you believe, it only matters that the loyal Italians continue to have their altars which are offered in thanksgiving for some favor or request that was granted. Much of the preparation of the food is done weeks or days in advance of St. Joseph's Day, by family members or helpful volunteers.

Sacred Heart Parish loyally honors St. Joseph each year with a stunning St. Joseph's Altar, always a perfect success, with parishioners already anticipating next years gathering of the faithful, to their favorite fatherly saint.

Grace Profaci's family started this prayerful tradition in Sacred Heart Church, to honor their Patron Saint, the pure, quiet, obedient and hard-working St. Joseph. Grace has lovingly continued her family's tradition making the beautiful St. Joseph's breads. Vincent Cracolici and his family, his sons, Sal and Peter of Vesuvio's Restaurant provide many delicious foods and so much more. Joe Bilello graciously thanks all the faithful for their devotion in making this day a phenomenal and beautiful memory for everyone.

The St. Joseph's altar is layered with food, and the food is layered with significance. The altar itself is constructed in three levels, connoting the Catholic belief in the Trinity. Some of the breads are baked in the form of crosses, palm fronds, rosaries, and the crown of thorns. Deacon Peter blesses the altar, and it is a tradition for him to share his personal Holy Family painting that is placed above the altar. Representing the Holy Family, four children from Mrs. Lynda Piper's REP classes sit down to eat the meal.

Every visitor is given a piece of the bread to take home and keep all year to protect the family from starvation. Custom and tradition hold that all visitors to an altar, a private or a public

Newburgh man sentenced in chain and padlock assault

A Newburgh man was sentenced on Friday to 20 years in state prison and five years of post-release supervision for seriously injuring a man with a chain and padlock and one and one-third to four years for attempted to assault a second person. The sentences are to run consecutively for a total prison term of 21 1/3 to 24 years in prison.

Carlos Melendez, 29, was convicted after a jury trial in January of assault, attempted assault and criminal

possession of a weapon for having struck two men in the City of Newburgh with a padlock and chain.

He was also sentenced to two and one-third to seven years in prison on the weapon charge, which will run concurrent to the other two sentences.

Early on the morning of May 20, 2017 near 478 Broadway, Melendez allegedly used the padlock and chain as a flail to strike the two men in the head. One man

suffered life-threatening physical injuries and required hospitalization.

“The community will be safer during the two decades this defendant is in prison,” said District Attorney David Hoovler. “This defendant’s conduct could easily have resulted in the loss of life and is deserving of a lengthy sentence of incarceration.”

Swimming program returns for 6th year

The America Rows and Swims Newburgh (ARSN) free swim program for children returned for its sixth year, and had an opening day on Sunday, March 25, at the Union Avenue Community Fitness Center Pool, according to Juliana LoBiondo, the founder and director of America Rows and Swims Newburgh.

America Rows and Swims Newburgh is a not-for-profit organization which provides free learn to swim clinics for children living at or below the poverty level in the city of Newburgh, through grants and donations, and the use of volunteers, said LoBiondo. ARSN also pays for children in the program to join the Newburgh Rowing club and participate in the afterschool Rowing, kayaking and summer camp programs of the Newburgh Rowing Club.

"This is a vital program," said Coach Ed Kennedy, retired physical education teacher, head coach of the swimming programs at ARSN, and longtime swim instructor.

"The minority drowning rate is so high in the United States that the Centers for Disease Control has declared it to be an epidemic. According to the CDC, African American children ages 5-19 drown in swimming pools at rates 5 times

higher than those of non-minorities. This disparity is greatest among those 11-12 years where African Americans drown in swimming pools at rates 10 times those of white children."

"The only way to combat that, is with swim lessons and there have to be organizations such as ours which offer free swim lessons. We originally started this program so that we could teach kids in the city of Newburgh to swim in order to pass the swim test required for the sport of Rowing. We soon learned that this program was much more important and that we are saving lives here."

"That is why we are so happy to be able to keep this program going and that we are at a point we are hiring back our own kids as lifeguards and now aquatic directors. We are delighted that this year we were able to hire two of our Rowers as Aquatic Directors to run the program," said LoBiondo.

"Karla Gunera and Citlaly Garcia have been with us since they were 10 years old. They are now accomplished swimmers and rowers and are Honor students and sophomores at our Lady of Lourdes

high school where they attend on full scholarship. The ultimate goal of our program is to lift children out of poverty through swimming, Rowing, teamwork, and academic mentoring."

"We are also thankful that we had members of Habitat for Humanity of Newburgh, Caitlin and Tom, come out and get in the pool to help teach the children to swim," said LoBiondo.

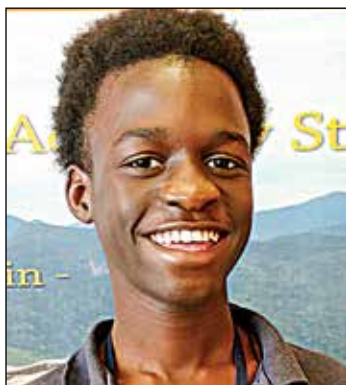
To qualify for the program, children must be at least seven years of age, residing in the city of Newburgh, and living at or below the federal poverty level. Parents must fill out the application and return with a copy of financial proof of income, a recent physical, and a recent report card.

The program runs every Sunday from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m., taking place at the Union Avenue Community Fitness Center Pool in New Windsor, which allows the foundation to use the pool for a deeply discounted price.

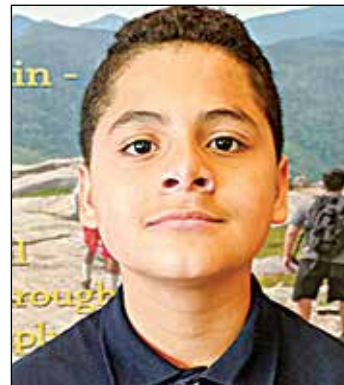

Newburgh Enlarged City School District launches online bullying reporting system

The New York State Dignity for All Students Act (DASA) requires schools to collect and report data regarding material incidents of discrimination, harassment, and bullying. The goal of DASA is to provide the students with a safe and supportive learning environment.

The Newburgh Enlarged City School District will be launching a new online DASA Incident Reporter aimed at making reporting cases of bullying safer and confidential. The system, developed by the district's communication's team, allows students, parents, staff, or anyone who may witness an incident of bullying, harassment, or discrimination to report it. The details of the incident are then electronically sent to the appropriate school staff for review. Those who choose to report even have the option of reporting anonymously if they don't feel comfortable being identified. "We take matters related to DASA seriously and developed this platform so witnesses and victims can report confidentially and even anonymously," stated Dr. Roberto Padilla, Superintendent of Schools.

The online option can be more effective because it gives students and parents another outlet to report incidents that occur either during school hours or after. Most students who report are not the targets but concerned bystanders. The district believes that if students are given the opportunity to report something in a way that doesn't compromise their own safety, they will. This will ultimately lead to a greater safety district wide.

The Newburgh DASA Incident Reporter also includes videos and is a resource hub. There are resources for bystanders, those who may be victims themselves, and even those who are doing the bullying. There are also resources for parents and families on how to best discuss bullying with their child(ren). Additionally, the system clearly defines what actions constitute bullying, harassment, and outlines the various forms.

The system will be located on the district's homepage or accessed by visiting .dasa.newburghschools.org.

Padilla presents draft 2018-2019 school budget

Newburgh Superintendent of Schools Roberto Padilla has proposed a draft budget for the upcoming 2018-2019 school year. The spending plan proposes a 2.82 percent increase in spending over the previous year. The draft budget totals \$275,391,654.

The proposed budget calls for a tax levy of \$112,390,599. According to the Newburgh Enlarged City School District, this represents a 2.57 percent increase over the previous tax levy. The levy remains within the state's tax-levy

limit.

Some of the major expenses in the budget include health insurance costs, bilingual education, school safety and security, kindergarten expansion and salaries.

More than 50 percent of the proposed spending plan will be paid for with state aid. Approximately 40 percent of the budget will be funded by the local tax levy. Miscellaneous income such as payments in lieu of taxes (PILOTS) from tax-exempt entities represent 2.9 percent of the budget revenues.

The budget factors in an increase of \$1.9 million in foundation aid from the state. However, the district

notes, Governor Andrew Cuomo's proposed \$769 million increase in aid to public schools for 2018-2019 is 4.2 percent less than the increase the Division of the Budget projected for that year.

Padilla will present the draft budget at Newburgh Board of Education meetings throughout April. The school board's budget adoption deadline is April 20. A public hearing for the budget is scheduled on May 8. The school district budget vote takes place on Tuesday, May 15.

Old electrical wiring also needs immediate attention, he said. "There is a lot of older wiring that needs to be addressed," said the building inspector, and electrical panels need be moved away from boilers and sump pumps, Horton said. "I've asked them to address it with an electrical survey of the building. Some of the electric is quite old."

Built in 1882, the building was a former horse carriage factory that became "one of the leading manufacturers of carriages and sleighs in the country," according to the City of Newburgh. The city purchased it in 1894 and, under the supervision of architect Frank Estabrook, converted it into City Hall.

Last month, the city was issued almost a dozen violations relating to the building's various structural and electrical woes, among other issues. "They are substantial," Horton said.

"A plan has to be put in place to repair the building," said Horton, and getting rid of the temporary shoring in the building. "To understand what is going on with the building structure, you have to open up the walls and ceilings. The walls and ceiling have to be tested for asbestos before they are opened up."

"We need to evaluate whether it is safe for us to continue to occupy the building while we breathe in that air," Ciaravino said. The city has contracted with Quality Environmental Solutions and Technologies (QUEST) to conduct testing for lead and asbestos, and McLaren Engineering Group for the structural and electrical work.

An electrical inspection has already been completed for the building, said city Engineer Jason Morris. "The inspector is currently writing his report," said Morris. QUEST is expected to finish with the lead and asbestos testing sometime this month, he said.

"We have to figure out why the building is moving, make permanent repairs to the building and if not, then they have to vacate the building," Horton said. "We're holding the city to the same standard as a typical property owner."

Ciaravino reiterated the point last Thursday. The city must "follow our own rules, as we are expecting of our

residents and others in our community," he said.

Other city-owned buildings that also have temporary shoring include the West End Firehouse and the

Safety Building, housing both the city fire and police departments, the city manager said.

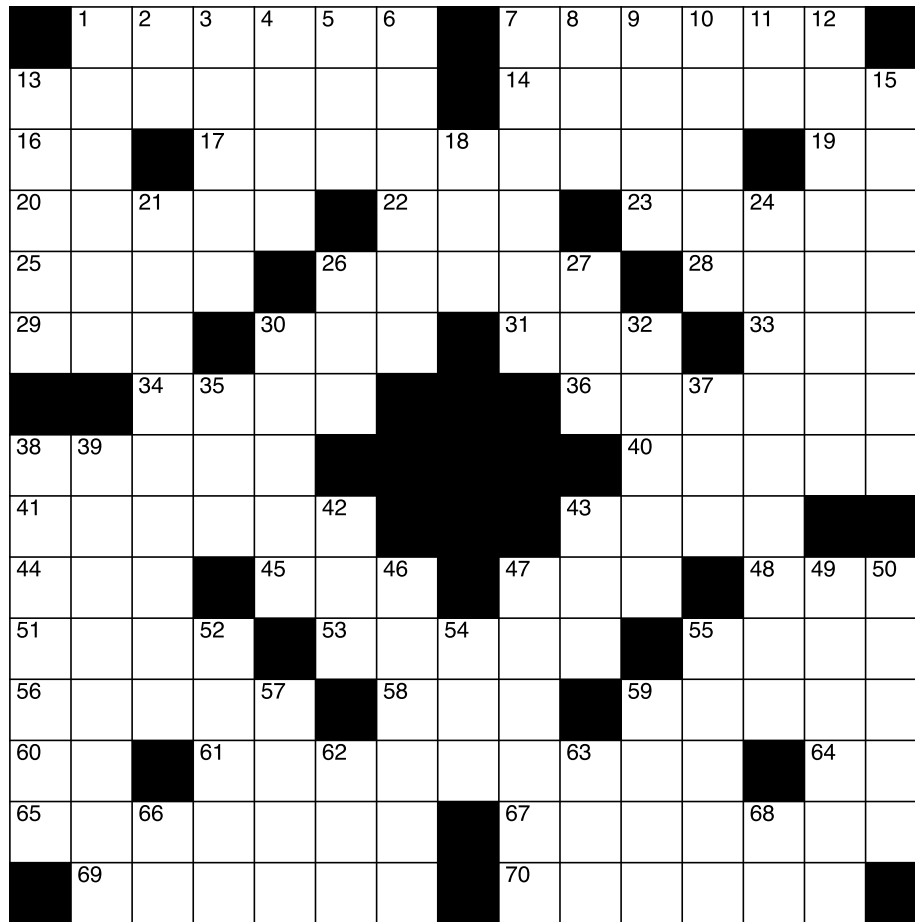

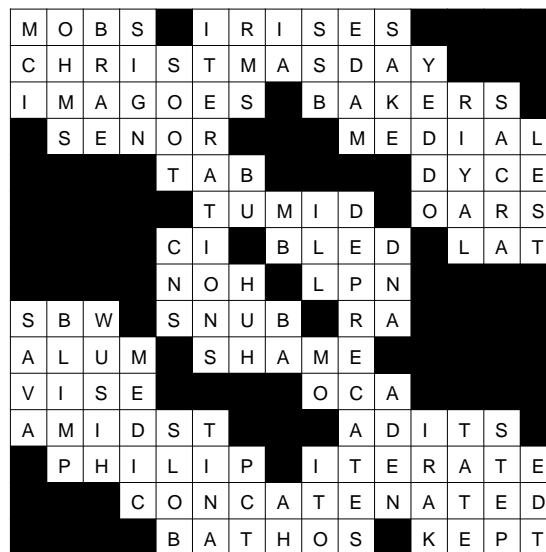

Upon failure of the person responsible for the placement or of the owner, to remove a sign, poster, sticker or advertising device regulated by the new Article after notice as specified in the Article has been given to remove the sign, the Superintendent of Highways or his designee is authorized to remove same from a Town street right of way. Said signs, posters stickers or advertising devices shall be held for a period of 72 hours (provided the removal could be accomplished without destroying the sign, poster, sticker or advertising device), and if not claimed by the owner thereof within said seventy-two-hour period, the Town Superintendent of Highways is authorized to dispose of said signs. There shall be a fee of \$10 per sign for any person or organization redeeming a sign seized pursuant to the terms of this section. Upon receipt of written authorization from the New York State Department of Transportation and/or the Orange County Department of Public Works, the Town Superintendent of Highways shall also be authorized to remove signs, posters, stickers or advertising devices in accordance with this section from state or county roads and highways.

Twenty-five vendors were present displaying their services at the Sunday expo including the aforementioned MSMC as well as Walden Savings Bank, SCORE of the

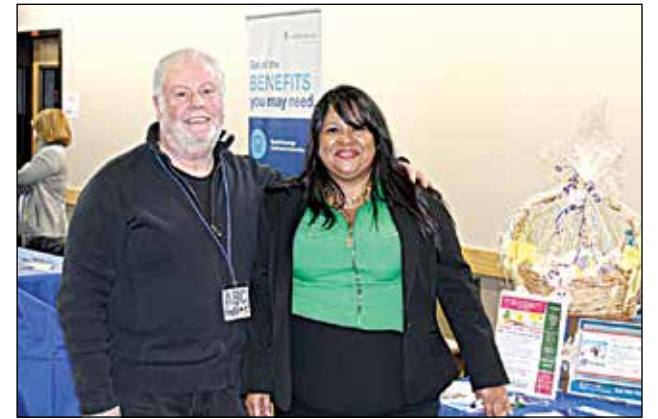

Town of Newburgh to get \$1.8M to improve water quality

a new tunnel will be activated under the Hudson River in 2022,” said town water department Chief Operator John Egitto. “When the new bypass tunnel is completed under the river, it requires the aqueduct to shut down until the connections are made.”

“It could be offline for six to eight months,” he said. “Because of that, the town will have to rely on the Chadwick Lake Filter Plant and purchasing water from the Town of New Windsor to make up the deficit. So, it’s critical that the town makes sure the water at Chadwick Lake is reliable and robust as possible.”

Upgrades will include water-quality monitoring equipment, a new clarifier and a powdered-activated carbon system. “Powdered-activated carbon is added at the front end of the treatment plant,” Egitto explained. “It removes different organics that may be in the water.” This type of filtration addresses taste and odor issues, and summertime algal growth, in particular, Egitto said.

According to a town press release, the DEP will reimburse the town with a total of \$1,823,900 for work on the project. Once the upgrades are completed, the filtration plant is expected to supply up to 2.7 million gallons of drinking water per day.

The town hopes to put the project out to bid this year and complete the work by mid-year in 2019, said Piquadio.
