Tension over taxes

Residents upset over pending tax increase

At Monday's Newburgh City Council meeting, the council voted to hold a public hearing on a proposed local law that would potentially raise the tax limit.

The hearing will be on November 12 and in conjunction with the hearing for the City Manager's 2020 fiscal budget.

In addition, the council agreed to set a date for a special meeting prior to November 12 to discuss budget concerns. This meeting will be on November 6 at 7

p.m., and it will be open to the public.

"The city council members, myself, and the city comptroller, and our city manager are working diligently," said Mayor Torrance Harvey. "To minimize layoffs, and to minimize and decrease what has

Harvey challenged by Muhammad for mayor

Although, Ali T. Muhammad only recently moved full time to Newburgh, he aspires to take the mayoral seat from incumbent, Mayor Torrance Harvey.

In addition to the mayoral seat, three city council positions are up for grabs this year. Just last Saturday, early voting started for the general election. The official general election is on November 5. For some, the mayoral race draws the most controversy.

If Harvey wins, this term would become his first completed full term. Harvey's current term began after Mayor Judy Kennedy's passing in 2018. "I trust the people of the City of Newburgh to re-elect me for a full term," said Harvey.

In many ways, Muhammad and Harvey are two very different men.

Muhammad is running on the Independence line while Harvey is running on the Democratic, Libertarian, and Working Families line. In April, Muhammad was initially on the Democratic line. In June, Muhammad was taken off the Democratic line. Harvey had filed a petition with the Orange County Board of Elections to have Muhammad taken off the line.

One of the issues was accusations of false signatures. "We reviewed his

been proposed for tax increases.”

During the meeting, City Manager Joe Donat presented updates on the budget. Donat and Comptroller Todd Venning believe that they have found a solution that will lower the current proposed tax levy.

It is suggested that the city’s tax overlay is removed from the budget. According to Donat, the tax overlay provides an additional safety net, and improves cash flow projection by estimating what the city actually plans to receive.

The proposed overlay was \$1.3 million. If the overlay is removed, the proposed tax levy could go down from 20 percent to 13.5 percent. The proposed homestead tax increase could go down from 9.1 percent to 3.15 percent. The proposed

non-homestead tax increase could go down from 18.07 percent to 11.63 percent.

In addition to the tax levy, residents worry about proposed cuts and layoffs to public safety in the proposed 2020 budget. The proposed budget suggests a 20 percent overall cut to overtime. It also proposes a 14 percent cut to the police workforce, and a 16 percent to fire personnel.

During the meeting, several residents spoke on the proposed budget.

One such resident is Ophra Wolf. Wolf owns three properties in the city and has personally renovated the properties with her partner. For one building, she is the landlord.

“Life here in Newburgh is hard,” emotionally said Wolf. “I’m working my ass off. I’m living on Dubois street and I’m doing more than just renovating a

building on my own.” Wolf proceeded to speak about one of her properties and the connection she has to the community.

“That is a non-homestead building,” said Wolf. “I’m keeping the rents low. I’m providing the apartments to young people, some of whom have friends in the audience today. So, they can stay in Newburgh, because they grew up and were raised here.”

Wolf worries about how the council perceives citizens, and the quality of life in Newburgh. “So, I want to make sure that before you go further into these negotiations, that you’re really considering the economy of spirit here in Newburgh,” said Wolf. “What people like us bring that doesn’t have dollar signs attached to it.”

“The poverty in this city is by design,” finished Wolf. “It’s not by mistake.”

Firefighters protest against proposed layoffs

“Honk for no layoffs,” said one sign in loud red capital letters. One portion of Broadway has been particularly loud, as off-duty members of the City of Newburgh Fire Department have rallied for support outside of City Hall and around the city. According to Brendan Hogan, President of The Newburgh City Firefighters Association, they will be there indefinitely until the City Council properly addresses the recent proposed layoffs and budget cuts.

The City Manager’s proposed 2020 budget suggests laying off 14 firefighters and 15 police officers. In addition, the budget proposes decreasing overtime and funding for both departments. The budget also proposes cuts to the Department of Public Works.

“We’re just trying to show them that the public supports public safety and not laying people off,” said Hogan. “We’re trying to let the council know, and city management know that these ideas are

dangerous and not really for the will of the people, judging by the number of honks we’ve gotten here.”

In addition to picketing, off-duty firefighters have also been going door to door with pamphlets explaining the situation and the potential repercussions.

Last week, Hogan and other union leadership met with city administration to address areas where savings could be made in order to avoid layoffs. Although Hogan found some areas concerning, he believes that saving positions is the biggest priority.

“I much rather have another guy with me on call, than brand new shiny gear,” said Hogan.

Although, Hogan is hopeful that layoffs will be avoided, members of the Fire Department have made preparations to help those who may be cut. Hogan and others have reached out to other departments in the area that may be open to employing those in need of new jobs. “We hate to see them go but we just want to see them land on their feet,” said Hogan.

Town of Newburgh candidate profiles

On November 5, from 6 a.m. until 9 p.m., Orange County will hold the 2019 General Election. In the Town of Newburgh, Supervisor, Town Clerk, Town Justice and two council office positions will be on the ballot.

A questionnaire was developed by the Mid Hudson Times and given to all Town of Newburgh candidates. The following information was compiled based on each candidate's answers.

Candidates for Supervisor

Gil Piaquadio

Incumbent Gil Piaquadio is a 35-year resident of the Town of Newburgh and married with four children. He served six years on the Planning Board before being elected to the Town Council in 2003, and served three four-year terms from November 2003 to 2015 on the Town Council. In November 2014, he was elected to fill the vacancy in the Supervisor

position. He has since been elected for consecutive 2-year terms in November 2015 and 2017. Piaquadio has an extensive security background, and has worked with the Orange County Sheriff's Office on a part-time basis for over 32 years. In addition, he served as President for both the Newburgh Rotary Club and City of Newburgh Lions Club.



He is also a member of UNICO, Elks Club, Masons, and Shriners. He received the Melvin Jones Award, which is the highest award given by the Lions Club, for outstanding humanitarian efforts. Additionally, he received a recognition award from the Amateur Speed Skating Union of the United States for

contributions made to the sport of Speed Skating on a local and national level. He is the author of "How to Claim Your Money."

Piaquadio seeks to serve the Town of Newburgh residents, and continue to keep taxes low without reducing services to residents. He feels the Town of Newburgh is beautiful with wonderful residents, and is proud to call the town his home. Piaquadio shared that by working together the town can be made even better and that is why he wants to be re-elected as Supervisor.

Piaquadio explained that his experience as an elected official, business owner, and town resident are all skills that he brings to the job as Supervisor of the Town of Newburgh. He feels he is also responsive to taxpayers' needs and works continuously to address the needs of the town.

Piaquadio's top three issues are: school safety, school taxes and traffic.

The Town of Newburgh, he said, will continue to cooperate with school districts to ensure the safety of all children.

Piaquadio expressed the need to find alternate ways to fund education other than through the property owner. He shared that forty states currently fund education through alternate sources. For several years, he has been encouraging Albany to utilize such alternate sources to fund education and will continue to pursue that.









Piaquadio explained that the Town of Newburgh has a Traffic Advisory Board and retains traffic consultants to assist with traffic concerns. Additionally, there has been an increase in the number of police officers to monitor traffic violations, and speed indicators have been placed in several locations in the town. There are plans to place more speed indicators throughout the town in the future.

Piaquadio is running on the Republican, Conservative and Independence Party lines. He has been endorsed by the CSEA and Hudson Valley Building & Construction Trades Council.

Democrat Diana Campos believes that the Town Clerk's Office is the first point of contact to the town for most residents. It should be an open welcoming contact, which keeps town residents informed and engaged.

Campos shared that she has over 20 years of experience as a fundraiser. She has developed and implemented administrative policies working with Boards of Directors and staff. In addition, she has ample opportunity

and experience interacting with government entities, and community members. She is bilingual and will seek to make the Town of Newburgh as inviting as possible to those who are non or limited English speakers.

Campos shared that she feels the Town of Newburgh is in a development limbo



and there hasn't been any new significant development. She would like to work to identify a "Town Center" which will attract small businesses, cultural institutions and community activity. She feels the Town of Newburgh needs to implement a dynamic marketing campaign which will highlight all the positive opportunities. She will work to increase the town's social media presence, by improving and upgrading the website and other internet contacts. She will work to "open up" the Clerk's Office, perhaps by offering off-site days/hours and extending regular hours.

Campos would also like to promote and publicize Town Council meetings to invite residents to attend and participate in the Town of Newburgh.

Joseph P. Pedi

Incumbent Joseph Pedi is 34-year resident of the Town of Newburgh and married with children and grandchildren. He has a Master of Science Degree in Biomedical Engineering from Rutgers University and a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Biology from Lehman College in Bronx, New York. He is a graduate of the Bronx High School for Science. Pedi is the former Vice President of Operations for 13 years for LSI Industries in New Windsor.

Pedi is running for the position of Town Clerk for the first time, but currently

finishing the term as Town Clerk for former Town Clerk Andrew Zarutskie who recently passed away. Pedi shared



that he enjoys the position and finds the position gratifying working within the community on a public service basis.

Pedi was First Deputy Town Clerk under the late Andrew Zarutskie since October 2017 and was appointed Town Clerk by the Republican Committee in May 2019 to finish Zarutskie's term. The Town Clerk's position requires a great deal of organization and writing skills. Pedi feels his education and business background has prepared him for the position of Town Clerk.

Pedi feels the "Top 3" issues impacting the town are the Danskammer Plant, contamination of Washington Lake and land development.

He carries the Republican endorsement and that of Supervisor Gil Piaquadio and Hudson Valley Building and Construction Trades Council.

Town Justice

Richard Clarino

Incumbent Richard Clarino has been a part time Town of Newburgh Justice since 2004. He worked for the New York State Unified Court System from 1991 until 2017. Clarino is a graduate of Newburgh Free Academy, Orange County Community College, SUNY Albany and the Albany Law School. His public service associations and accomplishments include: member of the Orange County Magistrates Association (Past President 2007-2012), Sr. Judicial Lecturer for Town & Village Justices: NYS Office of Court Administration (1997-2009), NYS Bar Association Mock Trial Competition Judge (1994-present), Orange Lake Civic Association Board of Directors (2001-2012), Dan Leghorn Engine Company

Councilman (Two Seats)

Scott M. Manley

Incumbent Scott Manley is a Town of Newburgh resident since 1974 and graduate of Newburgh Free Academy. He also attended Orange County Community College. From 1981-1983, he was a member of the Printers Union at the Newburgh Evening News. On September 12, 1983, he joined the Town of Newburgh Police Department. Manley spent ten years in patrol, three as a detective and the remainder of his career (2008) as a Sergeant. He spent over ten years as Town of Newburgh PBA Union President. In his personal life, he has two sons, a daughter in law and a granddaughter. His parents still proudly reside in the Meadow Hill neighborhood of the Town of Newburgh. He was appointed to the Town of Newburgh Town Board in August of 2015 and elected to a four-year term in November of 2015.



Manley said he was raised to get involved. In 2008 when he retired from the Town of Newburgh Police Department, the Town had some financial problems and was forced to lay off employees, that bothered him so he became involved in a local committee. In 2015, he decided it was time to run for Town Council.

Dealing with both the public and employees with a background in law enforcement and also Union President for so many years, Manley feels that he is able to talk to anyone and work things out. He shared that he is open minded and looks to come to a reasonable conclusion to help people. Manley feels that when it comes to any type of union items or civil service dealings, his background helps the town and taxpayers. Since he is retired, he is available to be at town hall if needed. In addition, Manley explained that continuing to enhance public safety, more police officers and insuring they have the equipment they need, and also upgrading Highway Department equipment to ensure safe roads, is his first priority.

His second priority is involving town water. Last year the Town of Newburgh acquired over 70 acres around its watershed to protect the drinking water, and he feels the town needs to continue to do that.

Lastly, Manley wants to look at the comprehensive plan and zoning laws to see what may have to be updated to protect the town.

Manley will appear on the ballot on the Republican, Conservative, Independence and Liberterian party lines.

He has been endorsed by the CSEA Local 1000 AFSCME - AFL CIO, Orange County Shields, Local 17 Labors, Hudson Valley Building and Construction Trades Council, New York State Fraternal Order of Police.

James (Jim) Presutti

Incumbent James (Jim) Presutti is a Certified Arborist, Certified Nursery Landscape Professional, and owner of a Horticultural Services Business for 19 years. He's been in the Arboricultural/Horticultural industry for 39 years and has a degree in Forestry. Presutti has been married to his wife for 38 years. He has two children, son Matthew, an Air Force Academy graduate and currently an F15E Strike Eagle Fighter Pilot in the Air Force and daughter Megan, a first-year medical student at Ross University School of Veterinary Medicine.

Presutti is running for re-election because he enjoys giving back to the community that he grew up in. He shared that he enjoys working with and helping people. Additionally, he wants to be able to help shape the way the Town of Newburgh grows and moves forward while having respect for natural resources, and providing services and recreation to all the residents. For many years, his father urged him to run for a council position, but he was not at a point in his life where he could commit to the role the way he wanted. However, about five years ago when his father was ill he promised his father he would run. He ran and was elected successfully. He is seeking reelection in order to keep serving Town of Newburgh residents.

Presutti said his leadership goes back to high school where he was president of his senior class. He has been in positions from laborer to business owner and everything in between. In his years working, he has been in positions to shape legislation at both the local and State level sitting with both lawmakers in Albany and workers in farm fields.

Presutti's first issue is providing water to Town of Newburgh residents. He will continue to be vigilant in obtaining property around our watershed to protect it, all the while working with groups like the Quassaick Creek Watershed Alliance to be sure the watershed has clean tributaries. He will also continue to pursue other water sources within the town such as wells.

The second issue is keeping the growth of the town from happening faster than planned. He will work to update the Town Master Plan to utilize planning for smart growth while still providing the best services to town residents. He will also work on Town of Newburgh zoning regulations to make sure they are up to date and help encourage new businesses that are in alignment with the Town of Newburgh's Master Plan.

The third issue is helping Town of Newburgh employees have the proper equipment they need to do their jobs efficiently. He shared that the town has started to do this over the last couple of years by beginning to purchase new trucks and equipment and rotating out old and outdated equipment. This has resulted in a savings for the town due to the less amount of downtime on equipment and savings in repair costs.

Presutti carries the endorsement of the Republican and Conservative parties, CSEA Local 1000 of the AFL/CIO and Mid-Hudson Construction Contractors Association.



Rich Steger

Democrat Rich Steger is a 1989 graduate of Newburgh Free Academy. He has an AAS from SUNY Delhi (Parks and Recreation Management), BSE from SUNY Cortland (Physical Education), MSE Mount Saint Mary College (Special Education), and CAGS Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts (Public School Administration).

His employment history includes public school teaching in the Valley Central School District for 26 years, President of the Valley Central Teachers' Association for 4 years, Vice President of the Valley Central Teachers' Association for 20 years, and NYSUT Political Action Coordinator for the 39th Senate District. Public service and affiliations include being a member of the Hudson Valley Area Labor Federation, Greenlight NY Campaign, and Hope Not Handcuffs.

Steger feels that in recent years the Newburgh Town Council has lacked any real debate due to one party rule and that it's time for the Democrats to have a seat at the table and for real conversations to take place. He would like to be a voice at the table. Steger said he has spent almost 25 years advocating for children and union members and will be a fierce advocate for all residents.

Steger expressed that his strengths are leadership and organization.

Steger shared that his "Top 3" issues facing the Town of Newburgh are:

Giveaway PILOTS (Payment in Lieu of Taxes) Steger explained that the Town of Newburgh is a high demand location and he feels that there is no need to give large tax breaks lasting a decade or longer to companies who show up with their hand out seeking larger profits. He feels companies must pay their full fair share to ease the tax burden faced by the residents.



Traffic Congestion Steger noted he feels that traffic congestion needs to be addressed especially during rush hour. He will elicit assistance of Orange County and New York State agencies to study traffic flow and management in key areas and will persist until needed changes are made.

Protecting Natural Resources Steger feels we need to ensure that developers comply with all codes to prevent contaminating the air, water and soil. Steger shared that the Town of Newburgh needs to require that all developers be environmentally friendly and develop a plan to determine how much/what types of development the Town of Newburgh can withstand without being detrimental to the quality of life. He wants developers to care as much about the residents and the environment as they do their profit margin.

He will appear on the ballot on the Democratic and Working Families Party lines. He has been endorsed by the Hudson Catskill Central Labor Council, Hudson Valley Stonewall Democrats, Latino Democratic Committee of Orange County and Orange County Democratic Women.

3 council seats up for grabs

Last Saturday was the beginning of early voting for Newburgh's general election. On the ballot are three city council positions. In addition, the mayoral seat is up for contention.

Running for the council at large seats are Anthony Grice, Omari Shakur, Christine M. Bello, Steven Majano, and Michele Basch.

Grice is the current councilman-at-large, and the incumbent. In addition to working as a councilman, he works as a school teacher for the Newburgh Enlarged City School District. Grice is running on the Democratic and Working Families line. Grice is interested in issues like the protection of watersheds, drinking water, improving transportation, and investment with no displacement. "In my mind they're all connected," said Grice.

Shakur is also running on the Democratic and Working Families line. He is also running on the Independence line. Shakur has run for office and lost in the past. Shakur is known for being an outspoken community activist. Shakur is interested in increasing access to affordable housing, jobs, and economic development. Shakur and his team are currently working on a 100-day plan that will work with the final City Manager budget for 2020. "We empower the city," said Shakur. "We've registered over 3,000 people, all the other candidates come looking for the

vote. We make sure people have votes."

Like Shakur, Basch is also running on the Independence line. Basch is the owner of The Warehouse restaurant on Liberty Street. "The biggest issue in this city is the fluctuation in taxes," said Basch. "The tax structure in my opinion needs to be addressed." Basch believes that all service costs, like public safety, need to be put into fees. She believes that these fees should be shouldered by nonprofits.

Bello contrasts from her opponents as she is the only Republican candidate. Bello currently owns a floral shop and was a councilwoman in the past. "My platform is focused on quality of life, public safety, transparency, a responsible budget," said Bello. "The key issue focused on expanding our tax base." Bello believes her past term was highly successful, and would like to see more accountability from the current council. "Some members of the council think that the work sessions are optional," said Bello. "They're not. It's an honor and a privilege to sit at the council table, to be elected by the people, and to be entrusted with their money."

Majano is running on the Green Party line. Majano couldn't be reached for comment. In the past Majano was a former campaign aide to Sen. James Skoufis. In addition, he is a native of Newburgh. According to his website, Majano is interested in economic development, taxes,

petitions, there were signatures that were invalid," said Harvey. "There were made up names on his petition."

As a result, Muhammad didn't have enough signatures to run on the Democratic line. "To me this is a form of voter suppression," said Muhammad. "You're knocking off your own party members." Muhammad said by the time he was made aware of the situation; he didn't have enough time or money to file the recourse. Despite running only on the Independence line, Muhammad has no concerns about being at a disadvantage to Harvey.

Muhammad and Harvey also have different background stories. In 1991, Harvey officially moved to Newburgh with his family as a teenager. Harvey has been married for 19 years and has three children.

In his time living in Newburgh, he's become a hallmark of the community. In addition to being the mayor, Harvey is a history teacher at Newburgh Free Academy.

Although Muhammad isn't as heavily known as Harvey, he still focuses heavily on community outreach. Just recently, Muhammad had handwritten hundreds of letters, explaining his mayoral efforts, for the community.

Before moving to Newburgh, Muhammad was a Beacon councilman. Muhammad was the first African American Muslim Beacon councilman. After finding himself at odds with the Democratic Committee of Dutchess County for endorsing Republicans, Muhammad found himself at the center of two disloyalty hearings. As a result, he left Beacon behind.

In a 2016 interview with The Highlands Current, Muhammad defended his decisions. "I've been a Democrat my entire life and will always be a Democrat because that's where my progressive views and my heart will always be," said Muhammad. "I represent the people, not the establishment and if doing what is right for my constituents is considered disloyal, then so be it."

Despite past troubles, Muhammad is hopeful that he can bring change to Newburgh and deepen his community connection. Although Muhammad has established residency in Newburgh, there are still doubts. "A lot of people don't believe he really lives here," said Harvey. "He established a residency about a year ago at 101 Liberty Street, and no one hardly sees him there. There are people

in our community who don't believe he really lives there."

Regardless of critics, Muhammad remains committed. His father founded the Islamic Learning Center of Orange County on Washington Terrace. "I've been a part of this community since I was four years old," said Muhammad. Although Muhammad has been in more than one place for his whole life, he still considers Newburgh home. After starting the mosque in Newburgh, Muhammad's family started another mosque in Beacon. Muhammad grew up in Beacon and Newburgh. But from age four to 16, a majority of his time was spent in Newburgh.

"Barbeques, cleanups, community givebacks," reminisced Muhammad. "We boycotted the gas station down the road from the mosque because they were being disrespectful. I learned about civic engagement at an early age from my parents' activism and interfaith community work." Muhammad emphasizes that although he only moved here as an adult recently, he's been involved his whole life.

If elected, he would like to bring a charter change. "In 100 years, we've had two charter changes," said Muhammad. "It's time to have another one."

Recently the council came under fire for the City Manager's 2020 proposed budget suggesting cuts and layoffs to the city's public safety departments. Before the proposed budget's presentation, the

council emphasized they weren't aware of the exact details of the budget yet.

"They had [budget] hearings," said Muhammad. "If they didn't [know], then that's even more negligent." Although the position of mayor is a part time job, Muhammad says he'll dedicate all of his time to the position.

Directly addressing the cuts, Muhammad believes cutting first responders is problematic. "You can't say public safety is our number one priority, and then want to make those cuts," said Muhammad. Muhammad believes cuts should be made from other areas and departments. "I looked at the top 23 people that are general employees, that aren't fire and first responders, you look at those people."

In an effort to avoid cuts, and tax raises, Harvey is proposing a one percent non-resident payroll tax. Harvey believes this will expand the tax base, and avoid burdening homeowners with taxes and increase revenue. Harvey also wants to ask the larger non-profits, if they can contribute to the public safety fees. "They all use police, they all use fire department," said Harvey.

"I've been working very diligently, speaking with our state elected officials," said Harvey. Harvey has been outlining ways with other elected officials to improve the budget situation. "No one wants to lay off people from our public safety department."

More often than not, generating of

revenue is brought up to the City Council. To many, increasing revenue can help improve the quality of living and avoid cuts to public safety.

"We have a very aggressive and active revitalization plan," said Harvey. Recently, Harvey and other city officials have finalized a master plan to address issues like the quality of municipal properties. If re-elected, Harvey wants to continue to address issues like the quality of living and how to improve the city.

Harvey hopes to expand and increase efforts to generate revenue. The city has already begun progress on a 2.7-million-dollar project on 109 South William Street with Baxter Construction. In addition, the city is working on a multimillion base cider factory with Graft Cider that will increase revenue and tourism. In addition, Harvey is interested in potentially developing an ecofriendly hotel conference center on the waterfront.

"That's why I need a four-year term," said Harvey. "We got projects already lined up for workforce development. We want to educate and train our current workforce, and residents; so, they can have meaningful employment."

"We need an economic engine," said Muhammad. If elected, Muhammad wants to bring in new businesses and developers. Muhammad is interested in businesses like a potential new movie theatre, music venues, and hotels. He hopes to engage single parents, the homeless, veterans, and more with new businesses. For him, creating opportunity is a big priority. Muhammad believes that revenue will change the environment for the better.

"One person, one election is not going to change Newburgh," said Muhammad. "It's creating a culture that's going to change the environment."

Although Harvey is the incumbent, Muhammad believes he still stands a good chance at winning. Still, he finds the difference between winning and losing to be meaningless. "It's about how are we improving together," said Muhammad. "If I don't get enough votes to become the next Mayor, I have plans of action. It's about getting more people included in what's going on, whether or not I'm elected."

"My plans, if I theoretically lost, would be to continue to educate high school students," said Harvey. "I would continue to work with organizations and associations which I have already built in serving the people, in a capacity in which I can educate and contribute in a positive way."

Souls at the polls

Local churches organize early voting drives

History was made on Sunday in the City of Newburgh when six pastors drove members of their congregations to the Newburgh Activity Center to vote early in three local elections.

As New York State Governor Andrew Cuomo signed early voting into law in January of this year, the City of Newburgh geared up to give voters in the City of Newburgh, Town of Newburgh and New Windsor a chance to vote nine days before the November 5 local elections.

The event was dubbed “souls to the polls” by Bishop Jeffrey Woody of the Cathedral at the House church.

Pastor Willie Mays of New Life Pentecostal Church, Inc., explained why early voting in New York state should impact the community in the City of Newburgh in particular.

“The early voting is designed to reach out to communities of all colors to get out because of the crisis in the City of Newburgh,” he said. “The voter turnout has not been good in the past.”

Pastor Mays attributes the low turnout to consistent lack of support in encouraging the community to get out and vote.

“The people haven’t seen the support,” he said. “I think the religious leaders are responsible to help them get active. A lot of time people don’t think their vote counts, but we have seen that when you get out, changes will be made.”

Bishop Woody stated that early voting gives more of a window of time for people to vote.

“If you only have the one day, if you miss it, that’s it,” he said.

This was the reason why New Windsor resident Ada Campbell was encouraged to vote early this year.

“I’m glad New York state has this now,” she said, “so we can beat the crowds and so that our vote be heard early on.”

Michael Pagano, a Newburgh resident, was excited to vote early this year, as he would not have been able to on Election Day.

“I actually will be out of town on November 5, so I wanted to get the vote out early,” he said.

It is estimated that 50 people from the participating churches voted this time around. Nearly 30 cars were led by a black GMC caravan that was driven by Bishop Woody.

The six churches participating were the New Life Pentecostal Church, Inc., The Cathedral at the House, Calvary Full Gospel Family Church, the New Life Deliverance Church, Inc., Hudson Valley Christian Church and the Faith Family Church.

The early voting law came at a crucial time.

The voter turnout in New York state had been in a downward trend for several years. Despite a significant spike during the 2018 midterms, it has ranked in the bottom 10 for all but two elections in the last decade.

Newburgh Free Library holds Census hiring event

Last week was the Census Bureau's national recruiting week. In order to help recruiting efforts, last Tuesday the Newburgh Free Library held a Census hiring event.

Applicants were brought to a room setup with computers. Although the 2020 census is possible to fill out online, the Census Bureau is still seeking out census workers.

"People will be able to respond to the census for the first time online," said the Census Bureau's Deputy Director Ian Hull. In addition, this census will be the first census that can be filled out completely over the phone. One of the positions that the Census Bureau is hiring for are phone operators.

In addition to phone operators, the Census Bureau is looking for enumerators. Enumerators are individuals that go from house to house counting occupants. Although this year's census has more fill out options, there will still be the traditional paper form and house to house count option.

For hard to count communities like Newburgh, it is especially pertinent for the bureau to be able to hire workers who understand and know the community.

"Although the census is a national event, it's got to be conducted at a local event," said Hull. "We can't just say we need to hire X number of people in Newburgh and call it a day. There

are different neighborhoods, different communities."

Historically Newburgh has had a lower count than other communities in the nation. In addition, Newburgh has more diverse demographics. For example, Newburgh has a high population of immigrants, both documented and undocumented. As a result, language boundaries exist. In addition, fears of losing residency status exist. "In order

for this to be successful, we got to have people working in every neighborhood [in Newburgh]," said Hull. "Because we know people will be more reluctant to open their doors to someone they don't recognize"

Applications to work for the census will be accepted on a rolling deadline. "Right now, we're just recruiting," said Eric Marion, recruitment assistant with the Census Bureau. "Trying to get as

many applicants as we can."

At the moment there are field positions, administrator positions, recruiting positions, IT positions, and more available with the Census Bureau. "Field positions are definitely needed," said Marion. "Because there are a lot of different communities that we need to count." In addition, IT and office related positions also have a heavy need for applicants.

Although efforts are on a roll to recruit workers for the Census Bureau, some believe outreach efforts haven't been strong enough. Maria Aurich-Garcia received an email about the recruiting event from the Newburgh Free Library. Aurich-Garcia had previously finished an application to see if she qualified to apply, and attended the event to check the status of her application. "I can tell you, not a lot of people know about this," said Aurich-Garcia. Aurich-Garcia didn't witness any other efforts to promote the event.

The event lasted from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. As each hour trickled by, people passed in and out of the library. Some partook in the recruiting event, and others didn't. According to Hull, the recruiting goal in Orange County is over 3,300 people. Hull said only 900 people in Orange County so far have applied for the census.

"We've got a huge goal of people we need to recruit," said Hull. "We really need help getting the word out that we have jobs."

Cornerstone Healthcare holds first annual PrEP fest

Last Monday, Cornerstone Family Healthcare held their first annual PrEP fest. The event sought to unite the community around HIV prevention in an educational and entertaining manner. In addition, the event was held in honor of PrEP awareness week.

PrEP stands for pre-exposure prophylaxis. PrEP is a pill that is taken once a day. Anyone who is at risk of STDs can take it to prevent HIV.

Featured during the event were various booths. Attendees were given sheets to fill out as they went from booth to booth. With each completed sheet came a free PrEP fest shirt. Attendees were provided information and various trinkets and objects at each booth.

"One of the things we want to make sure we tell people is that HIV is an STD," said Andre Green, PrEP specialist for Cornerstone. "Some people kind of put it separate. If you're at risk of getting one, you're at risk for getting the other."

Historically, HIV prevention has been surrounded by stigma and stereotypes. One common stereotype is that

HIV is a disease that only impacts the LGBTQ community. Although members of the LGBTQ community like gay and bisexual men are at higher risk of being diagnosed with HIV, it isn't a disease exclusive to anyone.

"That's one of the things that's hindering us from stopping the epidemic," said Green. "It's for anyone. Anyone who's at risk, anyone who's having sex, anyone who's sharing needles, anyone who doesn't know their partner's status is at risk of getting HIV. Unfortunately, they think it's [only] an LGBTQ issue. When in reality it's a human issue."

According to the Office of Disease Prevention and Health Promotion, an estimated 1.2 million Americans are living with HIV. One out of eight people do not know they have HIV. Although data shows that HIV infections have declined 18 percent from 2008 to 2014, HIV still continues to exist without an official cure.

To combat HIV and its spread, organizations like Cornerstone take innovative measures. Cornerstone currently has a HIPS program. Ralph Burnett has been

the HIPS coordinator for Cornerstone since August. Burnett recruits individuals who are at a high risk of being infected with HIV or any other STDs. Then those individuals help recruit others for testing and preventative measures like PrEP.

"It's an effort to end the epidemic by 2020," said Burnett. "That's what we're doing here." HIPS is one of many efforts that focuses on helping achieve the points established in Governor Andrew Cuomo's Ending the Epidemic plan. Ending the Epidemic is a three-point plan that was established in 2014. The goal is to achieve the first ever decrease in HIV prevalence in New York state by 2020.

According to Gay Men's Health Crisis, New York State currently leads the nation in the amount of new HIV cases. In 2014, there were more than 2,100 new diagnoses. More than 125,000 New Yorkers are living with HIV/AIDS. Nearly 20 percent do not know they are infected. More than 100,000 New Yorkers have died from AIDS related causes.

Cornerstone holds conversation over women's health

Last Thursday, Cornerstone Family Healthcare facilitated a discussion over women's health issues. The event was held in honor of breast cancer and domestic violence awareness month.

The event was facilitated by Linda Mueller, President and CEO of Cornerstone. Mueller started off the event discussing the importance of breast screening.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women start partaking in breast screening procedures like mammograms and imaging at age 45. "But women should start getting familiar with their breasts at an early age," said Marjorie Seale, Nurse Practitioner at Planned Parenthood Mid-Hudson Valley. "Once you start developing, becoming sexually active, especially if you have a family history of breast cancer." Sometimes women begin screening earlier than the recommended age because of genetic markers found in their family history. Seale emphasized that

access to early intervention screening and treatment can decrease mortality rates for women.

The event continued on to focus on other issues like domestic violence awareness, and other issues that impact women's health.

"We also wanted to highlight maternal mortality. Obviously as well as breast screenings, and sexual violence," said Michelle McKeon, the Chief Operating Officer of the Regional Economic Community Action Program.

"Maternal mortality rate is the rate at which women experience death after or during childbirth," said Giovanna Rogow, Executive Director for the Maternal Infant Services Network. Rogow was surprised to discover that the United States has the highest maternal mortality rates out of the developed world. "It's really shocking," said Rogow.

According to the CDC, around 700 or more women die each year from pregnancy related complications. Three out of five deaths are preventable with better access to care. In addition, African-American, Native American and Alaska

Native women are around three times more likely to die from pregnancy-related issues than white women.

But even with a successful birth, women still face risks with raising children. Poverty is one of these risks. According to McKeon, in Orange County the poverty rate for women headed households is 31.8 percent. In the City of Newburgh, women headed households' poverty rate for children is 57.8 percent. "There is a significant issue of women having to do with women with children living below the poverty line," said McKeon. McKeon said that poverty has a short- and long-term negative impact on both the health of women and their children. "What affects the mother, affects the children."

The event ended with discussion over legislation and other issues that make it difficult for survivors of domestic violence. McKeon emphasized that policies and training for domestic violence needs to be improved. For survivors of domestic violence, access to healthcare can be difficult. Abusers can access the location of their victims through shared insurance bills disclosing doctor's visits.

McKeon also mentioned how basic actions like voting can be risky for survivors. "If it's election day, and you have a polling place," said McKeon. "He knows exactly where to sit and wait for you, if you think voting is important." McKeon believes allowing survivors to vote at different locations can be a safe option to avoid this risk.

The event wrapped up with final comments from the guest speakers. "What I'd like to ask you all to think about, as you leave today, is yes that women's health issues are extremely important," said Mueller. "How do you access care, when you access care is important. A lot was talked about bias, about what we think or don't think." Mueller finished by asking for the audience to avoid bias because of the uniqueness of each woman in need, and the desire to be understood. Mueller emphasized that society needs to reach a place where women's needs can be understood and discussed without legislation, money, or other boundaries standing in the way.

Halloween can be a fun time for children. Costumes of superheroes and Disney characters and candy can foster lifelong memories of our times of innocence.

At least that's how it's supposed to be, but allowing young children to go out after dark can also be a recipe for disaster. Several emerging trends in recent years have helped to minimize the opportunities for danger on what is supposed to be a fun holiday.

Many municipalities have set specific hours for when trick or treating is permitted. Many have also imposed Halloween curfews sandwiched around those trick or treat times intended to keep mischievous older kids out of harm's way.

Carry a cell phone for quick communication.

Remain on well-lit streets and always use the sidewalk.

Try to ration treats for the days and weeks following Halloween. If you keep candy guidelines realistic, consistent, and positive, your Halloween is less likely to be about arguing or controlling candy. It's also a great opportunity to teach your kids about moderation, balance, and healthful indulging.

Medicare for all: Good or bad?

Question: When is a tax not a tax? Answer: When it is a FICA. Look at your pay stub. You'll see withholding to pay your federal tax. You'll see withholding to pay your state tax. And in some cities, withholding to pay city tax. Then there's a line that says FICA. The means Federal Insurance Contribution Act. These are monies that you will get back – and more – when you retire or are disabled as Social Security payments and Medicare coverage. It's NOT a tax. It's an insurance premium that helps you when you need it. To call it a "tax," even more threatening a "payroll tax," is an attempt frighten by those who consider that ordinary Americans do not deserve either Social Security or Medicare.

Yes, there are such people. Some have hated Social Security and Medicare from their very beginning. Thus

the scare tactics to claim that one's taxes will go up enormously if "Medicare for all" ever comes to pass. FICA insurance premiums will increase. Not taxes. Company health insurance has a 20% to 50% overhead. That's to pay the administration their huge salaries and give dividends to stock holders.

The overhead for Medicare is around 3%. Humana, Inc., at one time owned more hospitals than any other company in the world. Then they discovered that medical insurance guaranteed greater profit. They sold all their hospitals and went full time into selling medical insurance. Medicare for all? Not a bad idea.

In New York, Kelly led the charge to support funding for Home Modification funding which would allow many New Yorkers to make upgrades (such as a wheelchair ramp to their homes or a grab bar in their bathroom) to their homes to give people the dignity they deserve to stay in their homes. Kelly also has fought for the last four years to ensure insurance companies cannot take away your prescription drugs, a practice known as "non-medical switching." This law passed with overwhelming bipartisan support this year and if Governor Cuomo signs this piece of legislation into law, it will be the strongest law on the books in the country. Kelly has also taken her strong voice to Capitol Hill in Washington DC to fight for cost controls and transparency in prescription drug pricing. Water District purchase

Recently the residents of the Town of Newburgh received a brochure about a public hearing in regards to the different charges for the various water and sewage districts. What has not been stated that on June 24, 2019 the town purchased from Mid-Hudson Marina Corp 20.4 acres off of Oak St. for 1.1million dollars for access to a future water supply for the Consolidated Water District and future park. Eleven acres are classified as underwater vacant land. Railroad tracks run thru the property with no vehicle friendly crossings.

This 1.1 million dollars purchase EXCLUDES ground water rights which we can purchase from Mid-Hudson Marina for up to 25 years for up \$600,000 yet the town will be under no obligation to draw water from this well. So why buy it? The full market value of these two properties on July 1,2017 was \$970,500 but in Feb. 2018 is was appraised for 2.350 million. Were surrounding properties increased by same percentage?

Mid-Hudson has offered to consider it a donation the difference between the purchase price and the appraise value. Is this for income tax purposes? The monies for the purchase comes from Consolidated Water District and the Parkland Reserve Fund. The dollar amounts of each though varies between the June 10 and June 24, 2019 meetings. The public notice for this purchased stated \$803,000. So much for transparency. Water, water everywhere but not a drop to drink.

Munich quartet opens chamber music season

Newburgh Chamber Music opens its 2019-2020 season with the renowned Munich Philharmonic String Quartet. The concert is Saturday, Nov. 2, at 2 pm at St. George's Church, 105 Grand St., Newburgh.

believe that by burning candles and incense, they are helping the dead return to their homes. It is a festive and joyous heartfelt holiday, keeping the memory of grandparents and great-grandparents alive for children.

Crossing the Newburgh Bay twice

The anniversaries of the Newburgh-Beacon Bridges are arriving this weekend. The first bridge, the south one, was opened on November 3, 1963. It was just a simple two-lane span but it revolutionized the communities it connected. Its silver-toned steel trusses gleamed in the gold of sunrise and the pink of sunset even though the expansive old view of the bay was forever limited by the structure. The second bridge, the north one, opened on November 1, 1980.

Two bridges were needed at this location because the first one had been far too small. Although it felt so modern in 1963 to drive smoothly over a concrete lane high in the air over Newburgh Bay, it wasn't long before that drive was delayed by traffic jams.

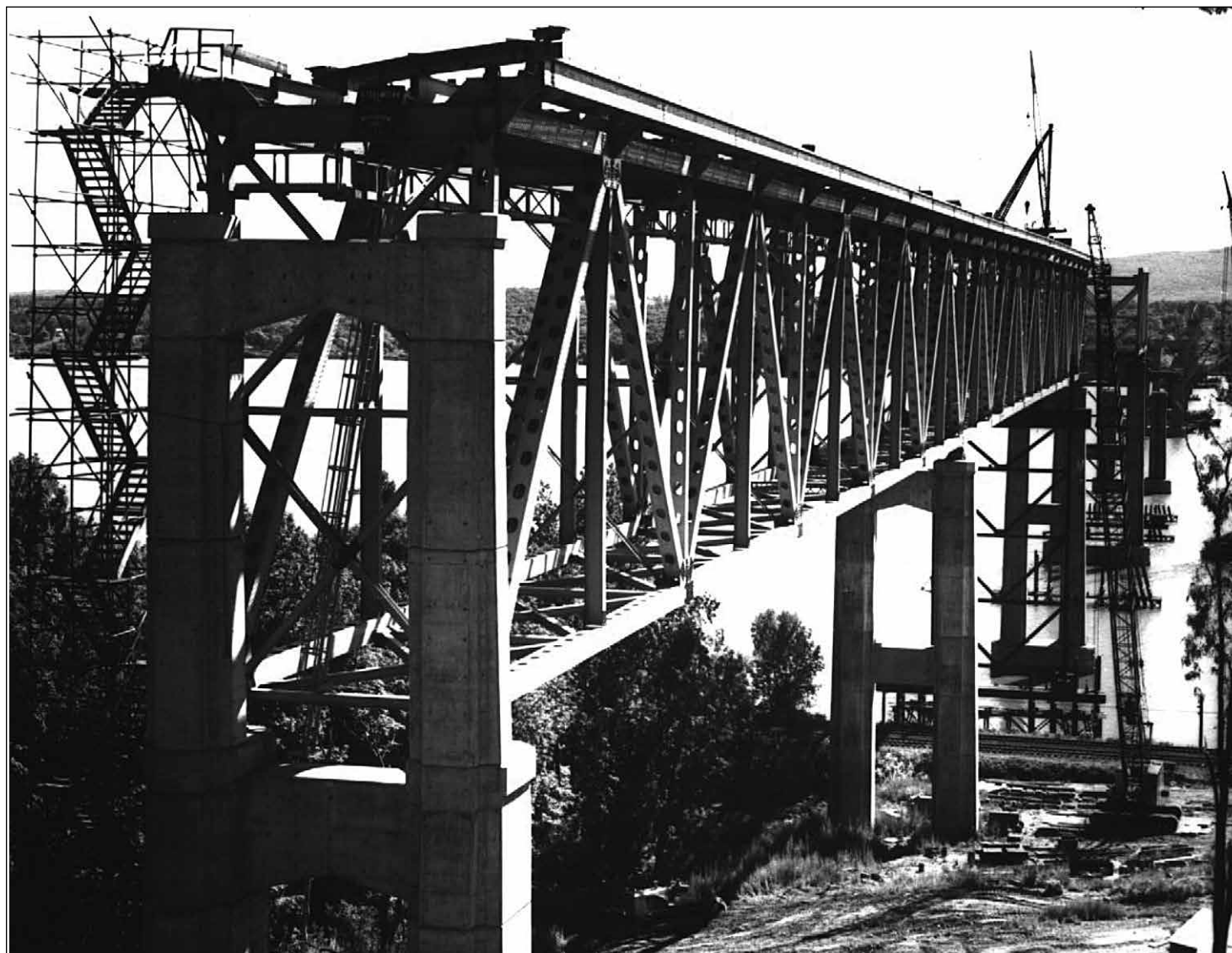

Interstate Route 84 was being constructed to cross the Hudson River at this point and its growing volume of traffic was always bottlenecked at our bridge.

Crunching three lanes into one took infuriating amounts of time, as anyone who drives around road construction or accidents well knows. On a two-lane bridge, any overheated engine could cause a stall that backed up traffic for miles. Few cars had air conditioning in the 1960's and the center of that bridge was no place to stay inside a hot car or truck on a summer day. I often sat outside on my bumper talking to others stuck as I was for long spells of time. Locals used to joke that it was just like riding the ferry because drivers would pull their cars onboard and then step out to enjoy the river breezes on the ride over. The difference was no one was moving on the bridge. So, shortly after the first span was opened, the second span was planned.

The first, amazingly, was not designed for expansion and discussions about adding a second deck (like the George Washington Bridge) were rejected as structurally impossible. Traffic volume

on interstate Route 84 proved that another two-lane bridge would be vastly insufficient.

Twice in modern history, we listened to caissons being driven into the river bottom. We saw bright lights shining from work barges into the twilight as construction teams worked around weather to stay on schedule. We brought our children and our elders to vantage points where cranes could be seen lifting steel into place and the loud impact drills could be heard. We marveled at workers walking the high steel girders and wondered if it felt dizzying to climb the enormous temporary staircases to the bridge deck.

As we watched the concrete forms being removed from the first piers of the south span, we could see that this next bridge would be much wider. Ultimately, the north span's concrete roadway would

be widened too, as much as possible, to carry three lanes westbound.

The week the 1980 bridge opened, the older bridge was shut down for remodeling and both parallel bridges came into service together in June 1984. An indicator of the result of poor planning can be seen in the variance between the price tags of the two bridges. The first in 1963 cost \$19,500,000 and the second in 1980 cost \$93,600,000.

Newburgh-Beacon bridges were designed by the firm Modjeski and Masters. The first bridge in 1963 was built of Bethlehem Steel and the second of U.S. Steel. Assembly of cofferdams (the steel boxes in which men worked underwater) and the triangular bridge sections took place in our local Steel-Style plant along the Quassaick Creek at the Newburgh-New Windsor border.

Tugboats and barges brought each part up to its position.

The U.S. Steel delivered was not the shiny silver of the old bridge but a rusty brown construction steel called Cor-Ten, an alloy developed to protect itself from corrosion and rust and, supposedly, never to need painting. Also called weathering steel, Cor-Ten is the alloy used on massive outdoor steel sculptures like those seen at Storm King Art Center and DIA Beacon. It might take an artist like Richard Serra, whose sculptures are exhibited at both centers, to love the look of the "new" bridge. Most of us mourn the glow and shiny clean lines of the earlier bridge as it stood graceful and independent across the river horizon.

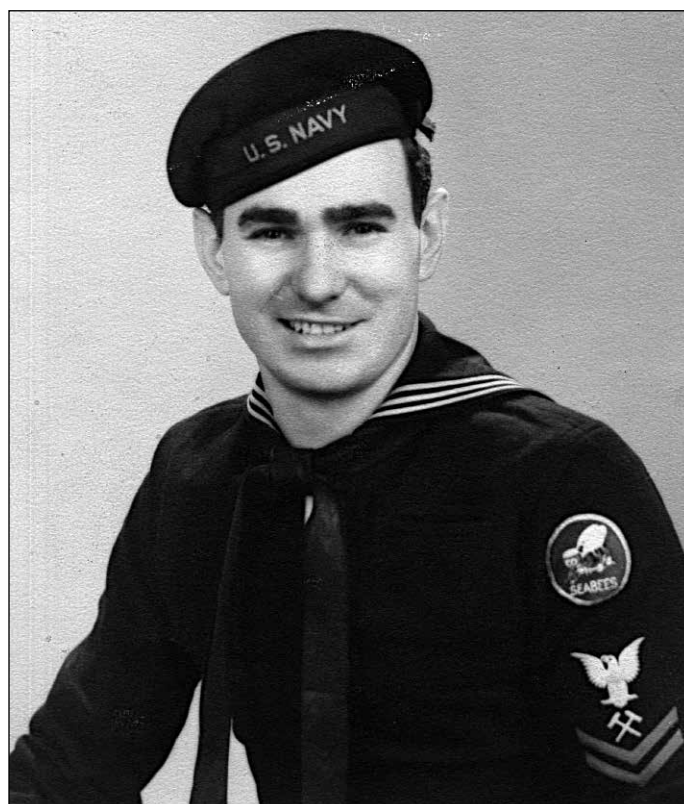

Some of you are wondering by now what the heck this public service type message is doing here on my page. Let me explain.

Back after WWII, our community was growing. The population was only around 5,000. Veterans were returning and beginning to build on their dreams. One such veteran was Walter Ferguson. He was with the Navy, in a SeaBees unit, during the war. He was on leave in New York City, the Bronx, when he met his future wife, Catherine.

Moving back to his home in the Town of Newburgh, he was employed at Stewart Field, then an active Air Force Base, as an engineer. He was also a member of the Moose Lodge, along with the local Masonic Lodge and the Rossville Church.

Wanting to advance and build on his experience, he purchased a welder, with the expectations of using this equipment to begin a side business. On December 20, 1946, Walt and Woodrow Crawford, worked on a plow to be able to handle the recent snow and sleet which had fallen. Catherine was at Walt's parents, when Walt and Woody returned to Walt's

rental home on LeRoy Avenue to clean up the snowfall.

When they began to plow, they noticed flames coming from the home. Walt had Woody go call for help at a neighbor's. When Woody returned with Walt's brother, Charles, and a neighbor, Frank Kline, they observed Walt's shadow moving about inside, on the ground floor. Try as they might, the three men could not break down a door to help him escape. The structure burned to the ground.

One of the first responders that evening from the Cronomer Valley Fire Department was Don Stillwaggon. Walt was also an active member of the fire department. According to reports, two wells were drained dry trying to put out the fire. Remember back then, most wells in our Town were hand dug and not all that deep with a limited reserved capacity. Even today, not all areas in our Town have the luxury of fire hydrants, meaning the companies responding to an event have to carry water with them and get there quickly!

A fantastic job was done by the Cronomer Valley Fire Department, and shortly thereafter, with Don and Carl Stillwaggon, and Walt's brother, George, we attended the ceremony honoring Walt for his service. This was the most overwhelming ceremony I have ever attended.

No one knows why Walt went into the building, and we never will. Obviously he was battling the blaze. His wife was left with nothing but the clothes on her back and a new, 1946 Nash, recently purchased, not even a week before Christmas.

Recently, local fire departments have held awareness events at local schools. Constant reminders are posted reminding the public to have working detectors, and put in place escape plans to save their families. Our current equipment is more modern, the first responder response times much quicker, and support from surrounding areas greater. Even with all this, the most important component is YOU when an emergency happens.

So this week, in remembrance of Walt, sadly being one of the first of our community to fall in the line of duty, let's all say a prayer and take steps to keep our families safe this season.

Murder suspect returned to New Windsor for arraignment

Luis Rondon was returned to New Windsor last week after being held last week in California on the Murder of Deborah Waldinger.

On October 9, s. Waldinger was found dead in her Southgate village apartment. Thursday at 10 a.m. the suspect was arraigned before Town Justice George Meyers.

Shortly after this crime was discovered, I stated that we were committed to bringing the person responsible to justice and that is exactly what we did,” said Chief Robert Doss. “New Windsor Police Detectives returned late last night from the state of California with Luis Rondon in custody and under arrest for the senseless murder of Deborah Waldinger. No distance could have stopped the Investigators in this case from bringing him to justice for Deborah, her family and her friends. Mr. Rondon thought he could get away with murder. He could not have been more wrong. The credit for this arrest belongs wholeheartedly with all of the dedicated investigators who worked tirelessly together as a team to gather all the facts of this case. Their tenacity and teamwork was second to none and I commend each and every one of them.”

Rondon was charged with Murder 2nd Degree, an A-1 Felony. He was sent to Orange County Jail on No Bail and is due back in court on Oct. 30

New Windsor to install water meters

The Town of New Windsor will begin installing an Advanced Water Metering Infrastructure System at residences and businesses across the Town beginning this week with an anticipated completion date of nine months.

The smart meter technology will enable the wireless transmission of individual customers’ water meter readings directly to the Town’s Water Department. The smart water meters will enable customers to track their water use from their smartphone or computer and help the Water Department detect leaks sooner, which will lead to better water conservation. There will be no rate increases or surcharges as a result of this project.

The Town has contracted with VEPO Metering based in Elmsford, NY to install new water meters. The installation should take about two hours at each location. Installers will be supervised by Town staff, carry proper identification and wear VEPO tee shirts, jackets or vests. Contractor vehicles will also be clearly marked with the VEPO logo.

Prepare yourself and beware. You're in for an artistic scare.

This Halloween marks The Bakery in New Paltz's 30th annual "Night of 100 Pumpkins," a pumpkin carving contest open to all ages with a panel of judges choosing the winners.

Following the legendary New Paltz Halloween parade, The Bakery's outdoor café will be packed with glowing, ghoulish Jack O'Lanterns from 6 - 9 p.m.

Every year since 1990, The Bakery has hosted this Halloween extravaganza complete with free hot cider, cocoa, pumpkin bread and live music by a group of West African drummers and dancers.

The "Night of 100 Pumpkins" has become a staple in the New Paltz community. Joanne Orlando Talutto commented on last year's "Night of 100 Pumpkins" Facebook page, "Love this event each year!" Even Gordon Fire Equipment, LLC called the event "A New Paltz institution for Halloween!"

Originally, the name "Night of 100 Pumpkins" began as an aspirational pipe dream, in hopes of receiving 100 Jack O' Lanterns. Now, The Bakery has surpassed their goal, showcasing about 140 Jack O' Lanterns every year.

All pumpkin entrants receive a free Jack O' Lantern cookie. To keep the contest fair, child and adult (over 16) contestants are judged separately.

Prizes donated by local restaurants and retail stores alike—including Bacchus, Mohonk Mountain House, the Groovy Blueberry, Huckleberry and Inquiring Minds—will be bestowed upon the winners. According to The Bakery's owner David Santner, most of the prizes are gift certificates ranging from \$100 to \$25.

"People have been very consistent [with donating] since this is our 30th year doing this. So I just walk in and they say 'oh is it Halloween?' and they graciously donate," Santner said.

The event's judges vary from year to year. This year's judges will be Autumn Seguin, a glass blower and label manager at Team Love Records, Kevin Cook, a landscape painter and SUNY New Paltz alum, Lisa Chasin, a children's art

teacher, and Karali Pitzele, the program director at the New Teacher Center.

"The thing that's made the pumpkins people bring in so interesting and wonderful every year is that we recruit judges who are artists in the community," Santner said. "They tend to appreciate unusual and interesting and quirky pumpkins"

The categories for prizes include "Petrifying Pumpkins," "Pretty Pumpkins," "Peculiar Pumpkins," "Painted Pumpkins" and "Panoramic Pumpkins."

"A couple years ago, a family did [a panoramic pumpkin] and they called it 'A Night of 100 Pumpkins.' They actually had 100 tiny little pumpkins with a candle inside that was lit, and each pumpkin was carved into Jack O'Lanterns," Santner recalled.

Recently, The Bakery had to create a new category called "Classic Jacks" due to the fact that judges were honoring outrageously artistic pumpkins and discounting "plain ole pumpkins."

Looking to up your pumpkin carving skills? Gene Granata, who has been expertly carving pumpkins for over 20 years, suggests not to be afraid of picking an imperfect pumpkin, instead of opting for the smoothest, roundest one.

He also recommends cutting open the pumpkin from the bottom instead of from the top around the stem. "When you pull that plug out, a lot of seeds and stringy stuff comes out with it. Half your job of cleaning out the pumpkin is already done," Granata said in a Taste of Home article.

To keep your Jack O' Lantern intact as long as possible, cover the carved areas and the interior with petroleum jelly. This will prevent the pumpkin from drying out and will slow the growth of mold.

To enter a carved or painted pumpkin to "Night of 100 Pumpkins," bring your masterpiece to The Bakery on Oct. 30. Write your name and age on the back, and fill out an entry form provided at The Bakery. Winners will be announced on Halloween night, and prizes can be picked up at The Bakery located at 13A North Front St.

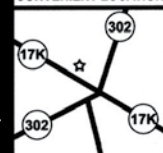

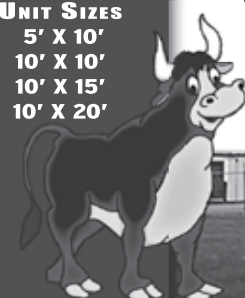

Poland, Australia, Canada and England.

Where the wild birds go

What better venue to learn about wild bird rehabilitation than the Hoot Owl?

On Saturday, October 26, the Hoot Owl restaurant hosted a live owl and raptor event featuring Anne Mardiney of Wild Mountain Birds. Visitors were able to chat live with the representatives from Wild Mountain Birds including Peter Corey and Debbie Quick. Hoot Owl owners, Ariff Khan and Sabeen Hasan host Wild Mountain Birds in May and October of each year and Khan said, "It seems like a perfect tie-in with the Hoot Owl. It is a fun free event for families, and our customers generously donate to her organization to support her wildlife rehabilitation efforts. We had over 100 people attend this event and look forward to hosting other events."

Mardiney has been a wildlife and wild bird rehabber since 2007 and takes in about 350 to 400 creatures, mostly birds, annually with approximately 65% released back to the wild. The program is conducted voluntarily with no financial support from State or other agencies. The birds utilized for demonstrations are not able to be released due to physical limitations which would limit their ability to survive on their own. Birds being rehabilitated are not brought out to the public. Donations are welcome and often used to offset the costs for food. Mardiney can charge a fee for the programs she conducts using the un-releasable education raptors.

Asked where her programs are held, Mardiney said, "I do go to schools and do short education programs with small groups. I won't do assemblies because only the kids in front can see the birds or ask questions. I do about 80-85 education programs each year for pre-schools to senior citizen centers."

She also shared a few common misconceptions people have about her program and live raptors.

"Many people think the screech owls are not real or are babies. They are all full-grown adults and skilled at perching without moving to try to be invisible. People ask if the raptors love me, or are my pets, and the answer is no to both. All came from the wild and are still innately wild. However, my peregrine falcon is imprinted on me. From the day it was confirmed he could not ever be released due to function in only one eye I purposely treated him

differently, similarly to hand-raising a parrot, to let him get calm and comfortable around me and others.

Another assumption people make is that they can pet or touch these birds. They cannot, as they are still wild animals, easily stressed by noise, dogs, and anything unexpected. They are still dangerous. My migratory bird permits do not allow anyone but me and my authorized assistants to hold or touch the raptors."

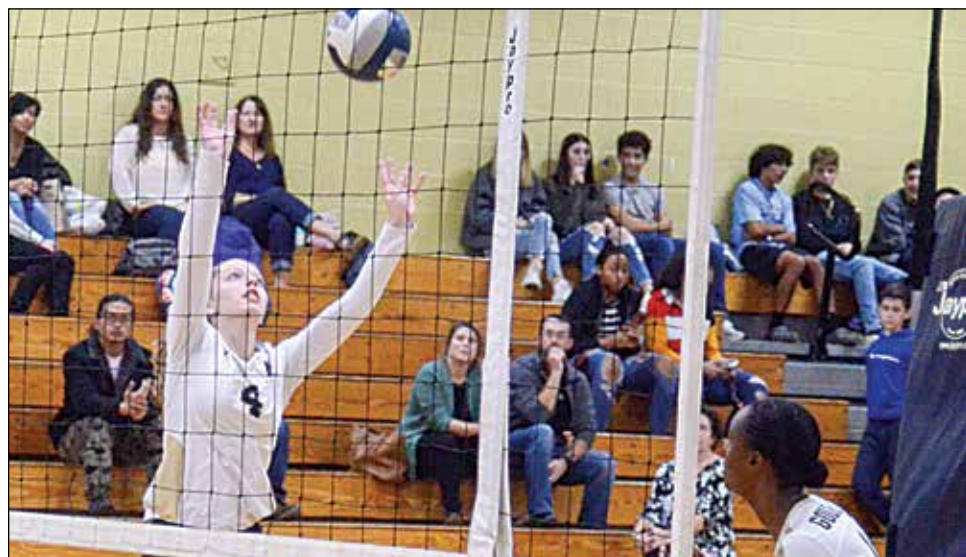
The Goldbacks lost the match, 25-10-

Goldbacks claim top seed in Section 9 playoffs

With time running out on the game, Yasir Arnold could be seen running up and down the Newburgh bench trying to get himself back in the game after being forced to leave due to cramps.

He finally got back on the field with a minute to go in the fourth quarter after the Goldbacks had just retaken a 7-point lead.

On his first play, Arnold intercepted Middletown quarterback Dalton Howell to seal the Goldbacks' 27-20 victory on Friday night over the Middletown Middle Bears.

"It hurt to watch my team," Arnold said. "My backups are not bad, but you execute better with the starters. I couldn't execute due to cramps, but I came back in the game and delivered what needed to be delivered."

That was after the offense delivered.

The Middle Bears had just taken a 20-19 lead on Howell's 86-yard touchdown pass to Robert Denson, and the Newburgh offense hadn't scored since the second quarter.

But with 4:20 remaining, the Goldbacks took over on their own 46, and quarterback Amarri Tice and freshman wide receiver Deondre Johnson took charge.

First, on third-and-four, Tice hit Johnson in stride for a 37-yard reception and then Tice tossed a third-down jump ball to the end zone that Johnson came down with for the game-winning touchdown.

"That's a huge advantage," Tice said. "We have another wideout (Kendall Scott) that's 6-4 and he's pretty fast. All I have to do most of the time is throw it up there and they go get it."

Johnson, a freshman playing in his second varsity game, has made an immediate impact for the Goldbacks, hauling in two touchdown passes on Friday, and one the week before against Kingston.

He also went up to catch an 8-yard touchdown pass with 5:21 remaining in the first quarter.

"We knew he was a good player and that's why we brought him up, and I told the rest of the team with him, this isn't a 'you had a great season on JV callup,'" Newburgh coach Bill Bianco said. "He's mastered that level and he can play."

The Middies intercepted Tice twice in the game, the first on the Goldbacks' 14 that Chris Washington returned for a touchdown. Then Jason Sandoval Campos' extra point gave the Middle Bears a 7-6 lead.

The Goldbacks took the lead on Nick Patterson's eight-yard touchdown run and then they took a 19-7 lead when Tice and Arnold hooked up for a 59-yard touchdown pass. With 4:55 to go in the second quarter.

It was the last time Newburgh scored until the game-winner.

"I think part of that was they controlled the ball more and we were on defense more," Bianco said. "That definitely

helped slow us down. A few of our guys were cramping. They got momentum and some other guys had to step up."

Campos hit a 24-yard field goal to cut Newburgh's lead to 19-10 at halftime. Then he hit from 27 yards out to cut the lead to 19-13 with 5:27 left in the third quarter.

The Middle Bears (3-4, 2-4 Class AA) almost tied the game when Howell hit Steven Acosta for a 66-yard touchdown pass. However, the play was called back for holding.

Immediately after, Howell tied the game with his touchdown pass to Denson. Campos' extra point gave the Middle Bears a 20-19 lead.

"When they scored, we got fired up," Tice said. "We had to get back to it and get the ball down the field and do what we had to do."

This game had originally expected to be a battle of the unbeaten and to determine the top seed in the Section 9 Class AA playoffs, but Middletown forfeited 3 league wins (Kingston, Pine Bush, Monroe-Woodbury) for playing an ineligible player.

Newburgh (7-0, 6-0 Class AA) came in as the top seed and are scheduled to face No. 4 Monroe-Woodbury on Saturday. The Crusaders missed a late field goal on Saturday to suffer a 23-20 loss to The Washingtonville Wizards, who grabbed the third seed. Washingtonville's win eliminated Middletown.

"This is a huge win," Tice said. "This gives us momentum going into the playoffs. We just have to keep at it and get better."
