What to do when the lights go out in Walden?

Village complains that NYSEG isn't replacing them

The Village of Walden is taking a proactive stance in attempting to get its street lights repaired by the New York State Electric and Gas (NYSEG) company. With dozens of lights out in the village in the middle of winter, the municipality is keeping up the pressure on the corporation to fix the street lamps.

During the Village Board's meeting on Dec. 3, Trustee Lynn Thompson asked Village Manager John Revella what was being done about the darkened street lights. "What recourse do we have that

they are absolutely not coming to this village in a timely manner to fix the multiple street lights that are out?" Thompson asked Revella. "I'm very concerned about the street lights that are out in front of the post office. I saw a child almost get hit by a car because you could not see this little person trying to cross the street. I saw the same thing with a gentleman who stepped off the curb. You couldn't see him. It's winter and he had a dark coat on. It's way too dark there."

Montgomery commemorates Pearl Harbor Day

Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day was held at Powell's Landing Pavilion in the Village of Montgomery on Saturday morning. People gathered to commemorate the day of infamy.

Veterans of Pearl Harbor were honored with prayers, a moment of silence and the singing of "The Star-Spangled Banner" and "Taps." Afterwards, there was a symbolic toss of a wreath into the Wallkill River.

Veterans in attendance included American Legion Post 521 of Montgomery and Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 2064 of Maybrook. They honored their fellow veterans with a 21 gun salute as well as a color guard. Those in attendance were grateful of the sacrifices American veterans made during the attack on Pearl Harbor.

"It's of paramount importance for the American people to pause on a day such as the anniversary of Pearl Harbor and reflect and remember and honor those who perished," said Tim

Dempsey, a lifelong member of the Maybrook VFW and former commander of the Montgomery American Legion.

"Consider the fact that the attack on Pearl Harbor is what propelled us into World War II."

Commission is who you complain to, there's no one else that has authority over them," Revella replied. "We can talk to senators, legislators, the Governor's office. We can try those avenues, but that division is the one that oversees public utilities in the state of New York since the state broke it up into these private companies. The problem is our private company was a United States company that was sold to a foreign entity, and since that time it's been disastrous and gone downhill." NYSEG is a subsidiary of Iberdrola, a Spanish electric conglomerate.

The manager said the village has written letters to the company about the issue, and had its elected representatives argue on its behalf, to no great avail so far. "It is a problem and a safety hazard, and we're definitely concerned about it," Revella told the board. "Especially the ones on our main thoroughfares. I spoke to NYSEG on Sunday, because they were out doing services, and they assured me that they have stacks of work requests for the village."

Work crews are working to repair the lights, but the village hopes the pace will quicken. "They've been fixing them the past week, but prior to them starting to fix them there were at least 30 out," Revella

said.

The village is looking at additional solutions to the ongoing problem with the street lights. "We always have this issue," Walden Mayor Susan Rumbold said. "We had a major issue on Main Street for a few years with the electrical lines, which is one reason why we had to remove the trees. But you always have lights blowing out, and being able to get to them is an issue. But we've been looking at alternative lighting for a while to try to address that issue."

During last Tuesday's meeting, the board unanimously approved three local laws, including legislation that will fine residents for failing to comply with the village's requirement to install new water meters in their homes. The board also approved a law that will see the installation of a stop sign on Northern Avenue and Ivy Hill Road and a bill that will create a no parking zone from the southwest corner of Oak Street and West Main Street.

Walden is considering signing a 15-year contract with the county that would see the village provided with \$102,000 worth of new police radio equipment by Orange County, but during last week's meeting, multiple board members expressed reservations about the length and

specifics of the deal.

Trustee John Ramos contended that the proposed 15-year municipal contract is too long, and will see the radio equipment grow outdated long before the end of the contract. Rumbold also raised concerns about the long-range costs of the deal. The shared services agreement would see the village receive the equipment up front at no cost, but Walden would then be responsible for replacing the equipment as it breaks. "A group of people got together and talked about it and came up with this contract, and the board just has questions," Rumbold said. "Once we get the answers, we're going to have to make a decision whether to get onboard or not. The county has been talking about it for a couple of years, and we're just now getting the details of the paperwork. We didn't know what the contract was going to look like, so we're just getting those things now."

The village will invite Craig Cherry, the Deputy Commissioner of the Orange County Police Liaison Services, to speak to the board about the issue at its next meeting on Dec. 17.

The county's radio program would allow all municipalities to hook up to their system with the equipment it will provide.

State: Shawangunk overcharging on sewer rates

A report issued on Nov. 22 by the office of New York State Comptroller Thomas DiNapoli contends that the Town of Shawangunk charged sewer district users higher rates than was necessary. According to the state's audit of the town's 2018 sewer district charges, "District users, including outside users, paid \$2.1 million more than the total expenditures. Charges to DOCCS (New York State Department of Corrections and Community Supervision) alone exceeded expenditures by \$1.4 million."

The audit also determined that the town "did not have a written agreement or basis for rates charged to DOCCS for sewer services." According to the report's key findings, Shawangunk had an excessive fund balance of \$4.4 million as of the end of 2017, which according to the state is a balance in excess of 844 percent of the district's average annual expenditures.

The town has 90 days to craft an action plan to deal with the state's findings. After the Town Board's meeting on Dec. 5, Town Supervisor John Valk said the municipality disagreed with some of the state's findings. "They make it sound as if we were just accumulating money," he said. "We do have plans for the money with these upgrades. It's something we can't mess around with environmentally, having the sewage go into the river. With all of the things we do, the roads can have potholes, the police can be busy, but we can't let that sewage go in the river. The DEC (Department of Environmental Conservation) is very strict and they could fine us. So we are making upgrades as they're needed. The latest thing we're doing is the agitation ditch, and there are

two sets of rollers that are \$50,000 apiece. They have to be replaced because one broke and we're just relying on one now. But we disagree with the idea that we did this with no basis. It was well thought out and this board was aware of it. When the auditor came in, the first thing I said was 'You will find this and these are the reasons.' The reason we didn't pay those bonds off earlier is that it was a 10-year period before you could call the bonds. So that's why we accumulated the money, to pay those off for the last upgrades."

Valk explained to the public during Thursday's meeting that the issues with the sewer plant date back two decades. "Some of the stuff in there we responded and disagreed with," he said of the audit. "The reason this all started was 21 years ago, we tried to negotiate a contract with the Department of Corrections because they used too much capacity in our sewer plant and weren't paying for it. So in that 21 years, we were unsuccessful in negotiating a contract. It's been on their desk and they don't get back to you and years go by. So we were told by some unknown person to raise the fees to operate our plant, to get our capacity back. Which we did. It accumulated a fund balance, which in the meantime we paid off our bonds last month. We're making some major upgrades right now. We'll probably spend \$400-500,000. Even though they say we have a large fund balance, in 1999 the Town Board created a reserve fund, and I checked with the bookkeeper and there was \$500,000 in that reserve fund of this fund balance."

Valk noted during the meeting that the town has a plan going forward to deal with the state's issues. "We have to do a correction plan within 90 days, and as part of that correction plan I believe we should

put a substantial amount of money in this fund," he told the board. "Because these upgrades we're doing right now, if we had to charge the taxpayers, our sewer rates would skyrocket. So this would be a protection. This is the whole purpose, that we can comply with the DEC and maintain a quality sewer plant."

The town will follow the state's recommendations laid out in the report. "We may need another upgrade, because with 400 residents using it, it's not enough money to pay for major upgrades without grants," Valk said. "But maybe we're wrong and they'll slap our wrist. But we will correct it and comply."

Shawangunk will work over the next three months to craft an action plan to deal with the state's findings. "Part of that is that we paid off the bonds, and the other part is that we're reaching out to Corrections to renegotiate that contract," Valk explained to the public. "We'll also put money in the reserve for the repairs we're making now. Come budget time next year, we'll adjust the rates."

Comprehensive plan

The board opened a public hearing on the town's recently refreshed comprehensive plan during last week's meeting. The process began last year to update the comp plan for the first time since 2003, and Town Planner Bonnie Franson laid out the procedure and results of the effort during a presentation during Thursday's session.

On Jan. 26, a pair of public workshops were held at Town Hall and in Walker Valley to solicit residents' vision on the future of the town. In conjunction with feedback the town solicited online, the Shawangunk Comprehensive Plan Committee, which consisted of Valk,

Councilman Robert Miller, Shawangunk Planning Board Chair Mark Watkins, Richard Barnhart, Roger Rascoe, Arif Khan and Richard Hoyt went about drafting a plan that could lead to potential zoning changes down the line that could attract new business and residential developments to the municipality.

The plan's vision for the hamlet of Wallkill calls for celebrating the Wallkill River, while revitalizing the hamlet gateways and creating a destination main street for Wallkill. The plan for Walker Valley is to protect the scenic character of NYS Route 52, a State Designated Scenic Byway, while also creating zoning that strengthens the economy along Route 52 and expanding utility and transportation infrastructure to serve the Route 52 corridor.

The aspirational plan includes big goals like establishing a riverfront walk along the Wallkill River that would connect a park to theoretical businesses including a farmer's market and thriving cafes and restaurants, as the town is setting an ambitious series of goals it hopes it can meet over a 10-year period. "You don't always reach all of your goals, but you have a wishlist," Valk said. "That's what the comp plan is. What we should do is go back more often and look at it and say 'Ok, we're headed in the wrong direction, so let's go this way.' But 17 years is too long between plans. It is ambitious, but looking back at the other one, we did reach a lot of those goals. Some of them take years, but we do our best."

The public hearing on the comprehensive plan will remain open until the board's next meeting on Dec. 19 as the council awaits input from the Ulster County Planning Board.

Water main break in the Village of Montgomery

A water main break occurred in the Village of Montgomery at approximately 3 p.m. last Wednesday.

According to Ralph Nelson, superintendent of public works for the Village of Montgomery, the break occurred due to a valve that failed. He also noted that the valve was old and had deteriorated parts. The Village of Montgomery's Department of Public Works was able to stop the majority of the leak last Wednesday.

Despite this event, Nelson stated that 100 percent of the village residents still had running water. Some residents reported brown water. To protect people, the village's department of public works issued a boil water notice, as the community's drinking water could have been damaged by pathogens.

The boil water notice has since been lifted, per Nelson's orders. The water can now be used for drinking and cooking.

Town of Montgomery IDA approves 90 percent tax exemption on Project Sailfish

The Town of Montgomery Industrial Development Agency announced a 90 percent tax exemption on Project Sailfish, the new Amazon distribution center coming to town. This exemption will be in effect for the first five years of the project.

Bluewater Industrial Partners, who submitted the project's application, has now assigned the application to USEF Sailfish LLC.

Montgomery Village, Medline announce benefit agreement

The Village of Montgomery Preservation Committee and Medline announced last Wednesday an official Community Benefits Commitment agreement to fund community projects, volunteer organizations and local school district enhancement projects. The agreement will bring a number of new improvement projects to the village as early as 2020.

Some of the initial projects selected for implementation

by the committee include: new playground equipment for the Montgomery Elementary School, kayak launch on the Wallkill River at Canning Road, traffic and safety improvements, including crosswalks from State Route 17K to the elementary school as well as funding for local recreational leagues and enhancement and development of green space and improvements to existing parks.

All projects will be identified by the committee and are anticipated to be implemented within the next 18 months.

"The Community Benefits agreement demonstrates that ongoing communication and compromise can serve as a model for village residents to work with larger companies looking to be an active part of our community," said Randi Greene, founder of the Village Preservation Committee. "This is an opportunity for a company like Medline to be the good neighbor they've promised to be and an example of corporate citizenship to others looking to do business here. We shouldn't have to choose between big business development and charming villages. If a large company is willing to be part of the community and participate in its heritage and growth, we can find a way to work together. It is very gratifying to know Medline is all in on the concept of improving and preserving all that we love about the Village of Montgomery."

Medline, whose current Middletown distribution center is located in Orange County off US-6 in Wawayanda, is looking to move to a new location in the Town of Montgomery purchased from Aden Brook Farm. The agreement is conditional upon the facility moving to the proposed location.

"We've been part of this community for more than 15 years. Many of our employees grew up here, live here, send their kids to school here," said Dmitry Dukhan, vice president of Global Real Estate for Medline. "We want this community to reap the benefits of Medline's continued presence in Montgomery, both in terms of these types of improvements and the jobs we will retain and create."

Medline petitions to extend Water and Sewer Districts

Medline Industries, Inc., a healthcare company, is petitioning to the Montgomery Town Board to extend the Neelytown West Water and Sewer Districts for their proposed 1.3-million-square-foot warehouse on 494 State Route 416.

The site of the proposed project is currently adjacent to the existing water district boundary and the sewer district boundary is only separated by Interstate 84. If the town board accepts the petition, a ten-inch water main and a four-inch sewer main would run along the length of State Route 416. Both would tie into existing mains on Neelytown Road.

Medline has promised to pay for the water and sewer district extensions. The company has also proposed a payment of \$75,000 to the town as an allocation fee for entering into the district. Once Medline enters into the districts, the corporation would become a taxpayer, paying user fees, operations and maintenance and capital cost charges.

The warehouse's water demand at full occupancy would be 5,390 gallons per day and the sewer flow at full occupancy would be 6,611 gallons per day according to Larry Wolinsky, attorney for Medline.

"There's capacity in the current system to accommodate these demands, even considering potential development within the districts," Wolinsky said.

Wolinsky later noted that when properties are close to water and sewer districts and require certain water services, the environmentally protective way to deal with the problem is to extend the districts and allow water to flow into the municipal system at a single discharge point. He added that this is more environmentally conscious than having in ground septic systems or extracting groundwater resources.

"We believe this makes a lot of sense for our project and is the environmentally responsible way to go," Wolinsky said.

There were objections to extending Medline's water and sewer districts during the public hearing on Thursday. Karina Tipton, a resident of the Village of Montgomery, noted that there are businesses already operating near the proposed Medline warehouse that do not have water and sewer. She believes that it is unfair for the town to extend the water and sewer districts for a new business in Medline while not helping out old businesses.

"It says that we don't care about the businesses that are already here. It says we only want to bring in new businesses," she said.

Currently, the town board cannot take action on this matter, as the Town of Montgomery Planning Board has not completed the State Environmental Quality Review Act process. The public hearing on Medline's possible extension of the Neelytown West Water and Sewer Districts will continue at the town board meeting on Jan. 16 at 6 p.m.

Local students to learn about career & technical education

Ulster BOCES Career & Technical Center instructors have scheduled visits at each of the Ulster County high schools to discuss the various programs that are available next year to juniors and seniors. Students who are currently enrolled in programs will also be available to share their first-hand experiences with the current sophomores. Students with any questions about their ability to attend the informational sessions should speak with their guidance counselor for further details. An Open House for parents and their students to attend together is also planned for February 20, 2020. There will

be two sessions to choose from at 5:15 p.m. or 6:15 p.m. The snow date for this event is February 25.

Ulster BOCES has a 95% graduation rate. More than 40 articulation agreements are in place for two-year career programs with several post-secondary institutions. Upon successful completion of coursework, most CTE programs allow students to earn college credits while in high school, and some qualify students for industry-related licenses and certifications. Through a blended approach of classroom instruction, hands-on learning, and worksite assignments,

students build specific skills related to a career area. Programs are designed with input from business and industry partners. CTE can be a valuable career path for students interested in going onto college or directly entering the workforce.

Ulster County students have access to 26 hands-on, real-world programs in career areas ranging from culinary arts, healthcare, engineering, robotics, aviation, education, technology, and more. New this year, students will have the opportunity to enroll in Animal Science. This technical course teaches specialized and advanced skills in areas such as veterinary assisting, care and handling of animals in a laboratory or veterinary setting, dog grooming, and kennel/pet shop management.

In addition to the two-year programs, juniors can also learn about a senior year experience available in the rigorous Pre-University/New Visions program, which, in addition to classwork and the opportunity to earn 12 college credits, places students in the field alongside professionals for part of the day. New Visions programs are available in robotics/engineering, healthcare, education, and music and audio production.

The informational visits to the schools are scheduled as follows:

- Onteora High School on November 13 during periods 1-7 and Pre-University/New Visions presentations will be held during periods 2 and 6.
- Ellenville High School on November

14 during periods 1-8 and Pre-University/New Visions presentations will be held during periods 2-7.

- Highland High School on November 19. Both CTE and Pre-University/New Visions presentations will be made that day from 9:38 – 11 a.m. The snow date is November 20.

- New Paltz High School on December 3. The CTE presentation will take place during block 1 and the Pre-University/New Visions presentation will take place during block 2. The snow date is December 5.

- Wallkill High School on December 10 from 10 a.m. – 1:45 p.m. Pre-University/New Visions presentations will also be made that day. The snow date is December 11.

- Saugerties High School on December 17. The snow date is December 18.

- Kingston High School on February 11. More details will be announced at a later date.

- Rondout Valley High School on January 7 and 8. Pre-University/New Visions presentations will also be made on those days. The snow date is January 9.

“One of the biggest challenges employers face is finding skilled workers,” said CTE Principal Amy Storenski, “Our goal is to strengthen the partnership between colleges, educators, and industry leaders and to be a conduit for student entering post-secondary education and workforce opportunities.”

Amazon makes a landing in Orange County

The contentious battle over Project Sailfish is over. The Town of Montgomery recently gave its approvals for a one-million square-foot warehouse near the confluence of Interstate Routes 84 and 747 and New York State Route 17K. Understandably, not everyone is happy.

There are environmental concerns that will require monitoring of the Tin Brook which feeds the Wallkill River and the water table that serves wells that provide water to the Village of Walden.

And there were loud grumblings about corporate welfare when the developers sought, and ultimately received a \$21.5 million tax abatement for their \$85 million project. Amazon owner Jeff Bezos, after all, is doing OK for himself and really doesn't need our charity.

To understand the process, one must realize that tax abatements don't often go to businesses that truly need them. Rather they go to those in the best bargaining position to negotiate for them. That's the case here.

Other elements to make the project sound like an early Christmas present for the region: 1,100 year-round employees, with more added in time for the holiday season, some 25 management positions added enough construction jobs to keep the local labor force busy through the first half of 2021.

It's the type of project envisioned by the county planners when Drury Lane became Interstate 747. Property that close to New York Stewart International Airport wasn't going to be used for residential development. Most planners would agree that light industry would be our best bet. The hope is that most of the trucks in and out of the place will easily find their way to Interstate 84 and – as at least one Facebook user suggested this past weekend – that maybe some of the new employees will keep the pizza ovens at Johnny's Pizza going strong.

Now that the die is cast, we can only hope for the best. In this case, that would be that all jobs are here for the long run and that the occupants of this massive warehouse do become a major contributor to this community in a positive way. That would go a long ways to assure us of happy holidays in the foreseeable future.

Screenplay for a commercial for chocolate

SETTING: Inside of a 1950's equipped kitchen. Clean, simple, yet well-stocked.

SCENE ONE: A young boy, about 7 years old, opens the door to the kitchen from the outside. We see him from his mother's view, which is inside the kitchen. She is pouring hot water into a tea pot. She wears a cooking apron, has on a green blouse. The boy peers into the kitchen from the outside world. He does not open the door completely and leans against the door-jam with his shoulder. He is wearing sneakers, shorts, and a striped tee-shirt of thin red, white, and blue stripes. Beside him is a dog, of which we see only the dog's feet behind the boy's legs. The boy speaks in an everyday boy-voice, with no pleading or other overtones.

BOY: "Mom. Do we have any chocolate?"

THE MOTHER: (Looking up at the boy from her teapot) "No son, not today."

The boy closes the door, staying outside with his dog.

SCENE TWO: The same boy, now dressed in a robin-egg-blue tee-shirt with white, horizontal stripes, shorts, sneakers, and with his dog again behind him, opens the door to the kitchen. The camera, from over the mother's shoulder, reveals she is rolling out pasta dough and making spaghetti noodles. It is obvious she is a good cook. No father, nor father like objects, are visible. No sister. The mother is again wearing her apron and has on a clean, pink blouse. The boy speaks in a clear, steady, boy-voice, asking matter-of-factly...

BOY: "Mom, do we have any chocolate today?"

MOTHER: (Looking up at the boy, half hidden by the door, from her kitchen work table) "No, sorry, not today."
The boy gently closes the door and can be heard moving away, playing with his dog.

SCENE THREE: The boy opens the door to the kitchen. The camera is behind his head. Through the doorway we see the back of his head, and in the distance, his mother is standing at the stove stirring, with a long handled wooden spoon, what looks like a large pot of tomato sauce. She is wearing a dress, apron and clean blouse. The boy, apparently leaning against the doorframe, asks in simple, undemanding, straightforward, fact-finding voice:

BOY: "Mom, do we have any chocolate?"

MOTHER: (Turning from the pot of sauce and looking at the boy, neither smiling nor unsmiling) "No, son."

The boy pulls his head back outside of the door and closes the door to the kitchen and the camera focuses on the outside of the door as we hear the boy leaving the area with his dog.

SCENE FOUR: Boy opens door. We see the mother at the kitchen table kneading bread. The boy asks in a non-emotional, yet slightly hopeful voice:

BOY: "Do we have any chocolate, Mom?"

MOTHER: (Looking at the boy as she rolls the bread dough) "No, son. We have none."

BOY: "Oh."

The boy closes the door. Screen dark.

SCENE FIVE: The mother looks up as the boy opens the door. We see the boy from the mother's position, the camera behind her looking over the interior of the kitchen to the door where the boy leans against the doorframe. The dog is visible this time and we see the dog's happy face looking, expectantly, at the mother. The dog stays at the boy's side, at the door. Neither enter the kitchen. The mother is sitting at the table, smoking a cigarette and drinking tea. We see the tea pot on the table. She

is not wearing her apron. The boy, looking at his mother, his hand on his dog's head, his shoulder against the doorframe, red tee shirt striped with thin white lines, asks

BOY: "Mom, is there any chocolate?"

MOTHER: "No, we have no chocolate."

As the boy turns from the room and closes the door very, very slowly, we see profound disappointment on his face, but he does not complain. The dog jumps against him.

SCENE SIX: From the mother's view, we see the door open. The boy leans against the doorframe. He is dressed in his original red, white, and blue, horizontally striped tee shirt. The dog stays behind him -- we see the legs. On the kitchen table is a bowl of fruit. The mother is peeling apples. The boy speaks in a simple, quiet voice,

BOY: "Mom, do we have any chocolate today?"

MOTHER: (Looking up at the boy at the door while peeling apples) "No son, we have no chocolate today."

The boy backs out very slowly and, as he quietly closes the door, he vanishes from his mother's view. The door is closed. We hear a heavy thump. Like a body falling. The dog barks loudly, twice. The mother jumps up from the table. Camera to black.

SCENE SEVEN: In a hospital hallway, a doctor in a white coat, with a stethoscope around his neck, is furious pushing a gurney with the boy covered by white sheets, down the shiny hallway to a set of swinging doors. The mother, in coat but with apron showing, is frantically trying to keep pace with the doctor.

MOTHER: "Doctor, what is it? What has happened to my beautiful boy!?"

DOCTOR: (Turning angrily to the mother) "Well, it's obvious! HE DOESN'T HAVE ANY CHOCOLATE! I HOPE WE ARE NOT TOO LATE!"

MOTHER: (Stopping abruptly in the hallway, the mother raises her hand to her mouth and whispers) "What have I done? What was I thinking?"

The doctor and the gurney with her son disappear between the large swinging double hallway doors.

Project Sailfish

The front page article, "Project Sailfish approved" represents a sad future for the Town of Montgomery. It could also mean that the residents of Walden may be boiling their drinking water.

The two year fight to defeat this project brought together many residents who attended countless public meetings presenting many strong objections to why and how this kind of project would change the character of this Town as well as cause serious environmental degradation. The Town of Montgomery Conservation Advisory Council expressed particular concern over the effect of a 20,000 gallons per day stormwater release to Tin Brook and the possible threat of a malfunction of the wastewater treatment plant that could add sewerage to this intermittent flowing brook.

As a result, some attendees formed a Tin Brook Watershed Alliance that would take up the cause of being an advocate for this little-appreciated brook. Getting support from the Wallkill River Watershed Alliance, our group decided that if Sailfish claims to be following "best

practices" in this construction then it is important to know what the health of Tin Brook is right now before any runoff and discharge takes place.

A proposal was given to the TOM Planning Board asking that this monitoring of the Brook be done at the expense of the project applicant both before and during the construction phases. Unfortunately, the Planning Board did not act to do this. However, the Tin Brook Watershed Alliance is now in the process of compiling all the past data on any monitoring done on the brook with the goal of presenting the current state of its health. In that way, once Sailfish gets underway, we can then monitor the brook for any impacts and take action as appropriate.

If anyone is interested in helping with this effort to protect our Tin Brook watershed, please attend our Thursday meetings at 7:30 pm at Wooster's Grove in Walden or contact the Town of Montgomery Conservation Advisory Council for more information. Remember, there is more than one way to skin - a fish!

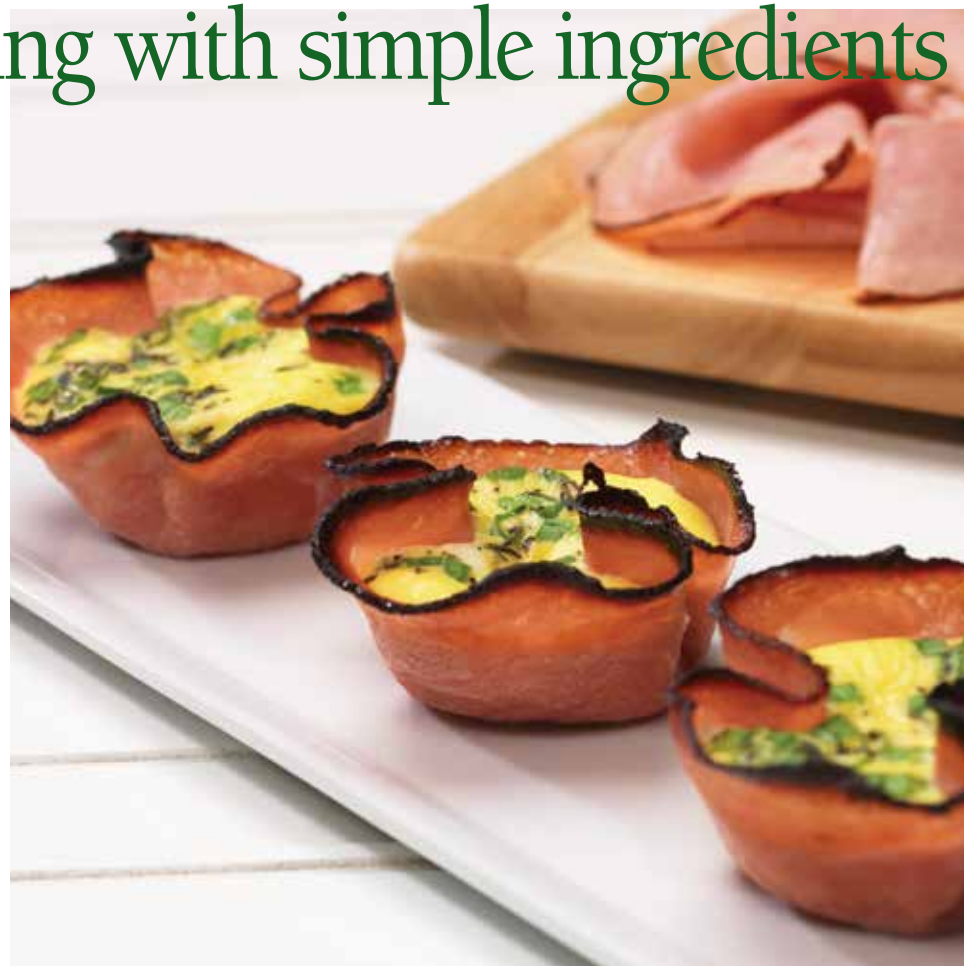

3 holiday activities to engage with loved ones

Fill your home with the scents of holiday spirit

· **Create a seasonal scented simmer.** Take to the stove to make a homemade air infusion from ingredients in and around the house. Simmer pine branches, citrus peels, vanilla, nutmeg, cinnamon, and whatever else can be placed in a pot or slow cooker with water. 3. Add coffee, sour cream, oil, eggs and vanilla. Whisk to combine.
4. Scrape batter into prepared pan and bake until toothpick inserted in cake comes out clean or with moist crumbs attached, 50-60 minutes.
5. Let cake cool in pan 15 minutes, then invert onto rack, removing pan. Let cake

cool completely.

6. In small saucepan bring cream to a boil. Take off heat, add white chocolate, cover and let sit 5 minutes.

7. Stir until smooth, then stir in peppermint extract. Let cool 15 minutes.

8. Pour glaze over cake, letting it drip down sides. If desired, sprinkle cake with peppermint candies.

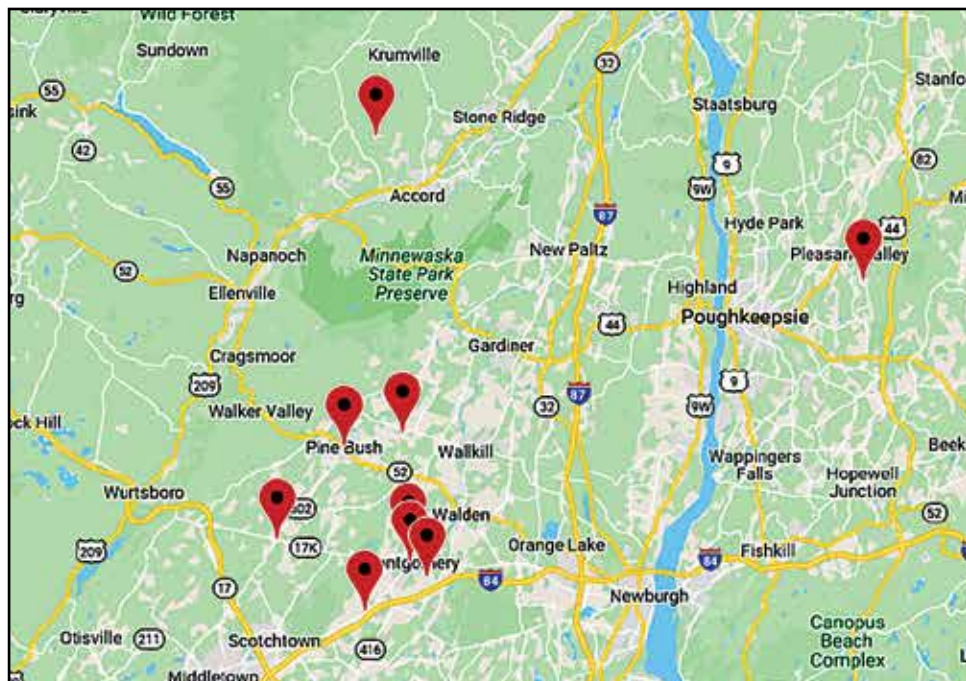

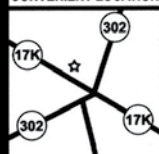

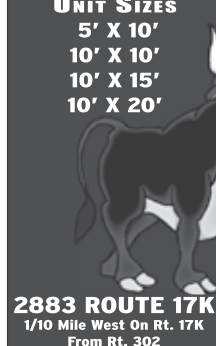

But after that, the pins started piling up

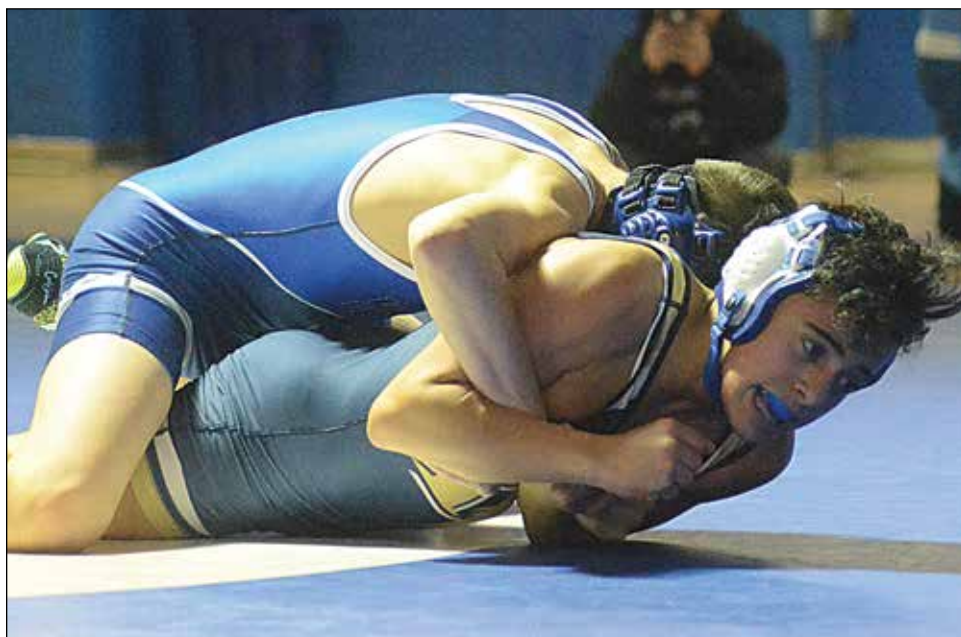
