## Asbestos basis for lawsuit

### Demolition project goes sour at Stewart Airport

A contractor hired to demolish 10 Army barracks at Stewart International Airport plans to sue the Town of New Windsor this month. John Pastor Sr. of Hudson Valley Environmental Solutions claims the town failed to notify him about asbestos contained inside the buildings.

"We were told it was abated," Pastor said.

Two separate claims will seek compensation for exposure to asbestos and compensation for monies lost resulting from asbestos at the site. In turn, the town is accusing Pastor of breach of contract.

Vice president of operations for the

Walden-based company, Pastor signed a contract over the summer to demolish 10 dilapidated buildings located on town property next to the airport. According to Pastor, he was never informed about the asbestos, not in the bid contract nor verbally by town officials. "There was nothing referring to asbestos in the bid contract," said Pastor on Friday.

Several large piles of rubble rested atop concrete foundations at the site earlier this week. Directly across the street was the Orange County AHRC, home to the New Windsor Preschool.

Town of New Windsor Supervisor George Green offered "no comment" when contacted about the project on Monday.

Pastor said he first learned of the asbestos on day one at the work site.

"The first day, the union showed up," he said, meaning the New York State Laborers' Union. "They said, 'You're starting to knock down buildings and you have asbestos here. You're not set up properly.'"

At that point, Pastor said, he called town Land Development Manager Jim Petro. "He told me, 'It's abated,'" said Pastor. Petro also declined to comment Monday.

About a week after the project began, the Department of Labor's Asbestos Control Bureau ordered the company - which did not have an asbestos handling license - to cease and desist demo work.

In a 2008 asbestos report, certified state Department of Labor asbestos

## Trees in trouble on Liberty St.

Following years of disease and over-pruning by utility companies, City of Newburgh volunteers are looking to replace about two dozen ailing trees along Liberty Street with hardwoods better suited to the environment.

"They're sick," said Kippy Boyle, a member of the city's Conservation Advisory Council. "They've been hit by trucks and disease. They're dying."

Over time, the trees have been cut back by utility companies needing access to power lines, leaving them deformed and vulnerable. "The wrong trees were planted," Boyle added. "Their root systems do not do well under sidewalks."

The City of Newburgh will apply for a \$20,000 TD Bank Green Streets no-match grant, administered by the non-profit Arbor Day Foundation, to re-plant 25 healthy trees along Liberty Street, from Renwick Street to Bay View Terrace. Ten of 14 eligible communities will be awarded the grant in January.

"We'll try to plant some shade trees, as well as flowering trees," said Boyle, such as flowering pear trees.

Several trees standing on Liberty Street near Overlook Place appeared as if their tops had been hacked off with a giant axe this week. Sidewalks lifted and buckled at their roots.

The trees in most distress are Norway maples, Boyle explained. "They look like giant martini glasses," she said, describing their shape due to sheared-off tops.

If awarded, the grant will also pay for a small electric vehicle to service trees around the city. The tree project is a collaboration of the Conservation Advisory Council and the Newburgh Heights Association.

"The city wouldn't have to pay a thing," said Ward 2 Councilwoman Genie Abrams, referring to the no-match grant. "This would be a wonderful way to improve our city's health."

The city's designation as a "Tree City USA Community" makes it eligible for grants and services for tree care and cultivation through the Arbor Day Foundation.

Earlier this year, a \$25,000 Urban Forestry grant from the state Department of Environmental Conservation paid for a citywide tree inventory. "That gave us a baseline from which we can identify the hazard trees and the trees that need minor maintenance," said Boyle.

If the city is awarded the grant in January, the tree plantings will hopefully coincide with Earth Day and Arbor Day in April, Boyle said.

# Military mom seeks holiday donations for troops

Military mom Lucy Mercado is once again preparing to send holiday care packages off to troops serving in Afghanistan. The New Windsor resident is currently seeking donations for the effort.

"When we are home with our families, safe and warm, they are in the fields putting their lives in danger, sleeping in the cold and missing their families," said Mercado.

Needed donations include clear packing tape, energy bars, energy powder drinks, cookies (homemade are okay), candies, chocolate, Quaker chewy granola bars, toothpaste, toothbrushes, Q-tips, baby wipes, panty liners, shampoo, small tubes of hand lotion, pens and Christmas cards.

Gift cards from BJ's Wholesale Club, Sam's Club, Wal-Mart and ShopRite are also needed, as are stamps. Individual stamps of \$5.95 are welcome. Mercado also seeks an attorney to work pro-bono to assist the foundation in applying for 501(c)(3) non-profit status.

Mercado founded the Support Our Heroes Foundation in 2004 while her son, Luis Mercado, served as a Marine in Iraq. "When I started mailing packages to

Eleven years later, Mercado remains devoted to the cause. "I have three platoons in Afghanistan," she said last week. "When one platoon returns, I adopt another."

Mercado said she wants to make sure the troops that are still serving are not forgotten. "How is it possible, that we go on with our lives, enjoying our freedom... and forget the most important thing, those who make it possible?" she asked.

inspector David Horton, working for Alpine Environmental Services, outlined details on the asbestos contained within the buildings.

"Disturbance/abatement of any asbestos containing materials, as well as air monitoring, must be performed by a (state) DOL-licensed contractor, in accordance with state and federal regulations," Horton concluded in the report.

"With asbestos, once you knock a building down, everything becomes contaminated," Pastor said.

The contract was awarded for \$262,000. However, Pastor had to hire a licensed asbestos subcontractor - in this case, GC Environmental, based in Bay Shore, Long Island - to handle abatement work. The abatement costs immediately doubled the job expenses, he said.

"They were pushing us to get the job done for the air show," Pastor claimed, referring to the New York Air Show in late August. "They wanted it done quick-

ly."

Pastor said he received a verbal agreement from town Supervisor Green that he would be paid weekly in order to keep the project going. With mounting costs from the asbestos abatement, it was the only way he could continue the work, he said. When two payments were missed, Pastor said, he asked for a payment schedule in writing. He was told to finish the job.

Consequently, according to Pastor, work was halted with some debris and foundations remaining. A Sept. 29 letter to Pastor from town Attorney Michael Blythe clarified the town's position, stating "there is no provision in your contract with the town for interim payments and the town declines to make further payments to you until the job is complete." The letter continued, "In the meantime, the town considers you in breach of your contract."

So far, Pastor claims, he has been paid half of what was agreed to in the contract. Moreover, he said, there was much more debris to cart away than first estimated,

adding expenses in addition to the abatement. "I'm indebted for over \$200,000 for the asbestos work," he said.

GC Environmental has since filed a mechanic's lien against the property. Pastor said he expects liens to be filed on behalf of Hudson Valley Environmental Solutions later this week.

Pastor maintains the lawsuit could have been avoided if the town had notified him of the asbestos in advance. "If I had known ahead of time, it would cost less than a quarter of what it costs now," he said.

Pastor said the claims would be filed in federal court within the week.

# Local Christmas Tree makes it to the Big Apple

The 2015 edition of the world-famous Rockefeller Center Christmas Tree, set to be lighted on national TV tonight, has humble beginnings.

Until last month, the 78-foot Norway Spruce adorned a quiet stretch of Route 44-55 in Gardiner. Now it's been decorated and set for the spotlight

"It's so nice that the tree is coming from New York," said longtime Plattekill resident Ester Coppola as she watched the tree get cut down on Nov. 4. "We don't need trees from New Jersey or Connecticut. We have plenty right here."

Coppola was just one of the many on-lookers who shared such feelings. From behind the "Rockefeller Center" marked crowd barriers, scores of community members took turns exchanging cameras to take pictures with the 78-foot Norway Spruce as their backdrop. They watched in awe as the Center's head gardener, Erik Pouze, with his crew of over 20, chain-sawed through the base of the 10-ton tree with ease, and when the team (with the help of a massive crane) finally manipulated the tree safely upon the truck bed, the people swooped in for more photos.

And to think the mighty tree had become something of a nuisance for Albert Asendorf and Nancy Puchalski, the homeowners who donated the Spruce.

"We were gonna knock it down," said Asendorf following the cutting Wednesday, "then we thought somebody might want it."

Little did he know that "somebody" would be a city of over 8 million people.

The tree has been on the property since Albert's family moved into the home in 1957. At the time, he was 4 years old. The tree was 6 feet tall. Over the years, the Asendorf family has grown alongside the tree.

But the Spruce, as sentimental as it may be, grew too much. It was good for climbing, but a hindrance in many other ways. The mighty limbs offered no view from the living room windows of Albert and Nancy's home; they also threatened powerlines.

When the time came to make a decision, the family heard through word-of-mouth about Rockefeller Center's acceptance of potential tree submissions. They sent in

the trees information, including the height, location and a picture, and things got moving.

Pouze first visited Gardiner in the summer to see the tree in person. He was immediately impressed, and so began the regimen of care.

"I thought it was a great tree," said Pouze following the cutting. "So we started watering it, feeding it, and making sure it was getting along."

The final decision was made a few weeks before the removal, but the Asendorfs were asked to keep mum. Doing so became increasingly difficult after Rockefeller Center hired local state troopers to monitor the tree since previous trees have been the target of vandalism.

It's safe to say that everyone in the community was aroused by the occurrence to some degree. It was, after all, a once-in-a-lifetime occasion - if that. In the end, Albert himself seemed to be the only person wondering what the fuss was all about. Among the swarm of reporters, he reaffirmed his emotional value of the Spruce, but he also questioned the fuss that had just taken place.

The tree lighting will be televised by NBC on Dec. 2, beginning at 8 p.m. The show will be hosted by Today show members Al Roker, Savannah Guthrie, and Natalie Morales and feature musical guests Sting, James Taylor featuring Chris Botti, Mary J. Blige, The Band Perry, Band of Merrymakers, and Andrea Bocelli. In person, the live performances will be happening from 7-9 p.m. at Rockefeller Plaza, between West 48th and West 51st Streets and Fifth and Sixth Avenues

# City seeks funds to construct new city pier

The city is seeking funding to rebuild the Newburgh Landing Pier. The city pier has been closed for more than a year due to damage from ice in the Hudson River.

Last year, city staffers found leftover New York State Department of State funding to finance a conceptual design for a plan to construct a new pier. However, city officials say more funding is needed.

Seagulls stood motionless on the wooden posts of the pier on Monday, staring at passing visitors to the waterfront. A sign posted to a fence blocking entry to the pier read, "The Newburgh Landing is temporarily closed while we secure funding for its restoration."

"The existing Newburgh Landing Pier was closed in January, 2014, due to damage caused by ice flows in the Hudson River," city Engineer Jason Morris explained in an email this week.

"A subsequent comprehensive structural evaluation of the pier in the spring of 2014 revealed significant structural deficiencies that will require the pier to be completely replaced."

It will cost an estimated \$2.8 million to construct the new pier, Morris said, but the city does not currently have the funding to pay for construction. "The construction project cannot be commenced until sufficient funds are identified," he said.

Weinstein Architecture, based in Hastings-on-the-Hudson, presented a design for a 200-foot-plus-long pier

with a floating dock and moorings for small to medium-sized vessels and local cruise ships at a public hearing in August.

"During the conceptual design/public input process, several large cruise line companies were contacted to determine their docking needs..." Morris said. "A future docking location for the Newburgh-Beacon Ferry was

also incorporated into the design. Docks were also added to accommodate smaller local cruise ships and other visiting vessels wishing to dock at Newburgh."

Morris did not provide a target start date for the project to resume, but said the city is "actively seeking" funding to move the plan forward.

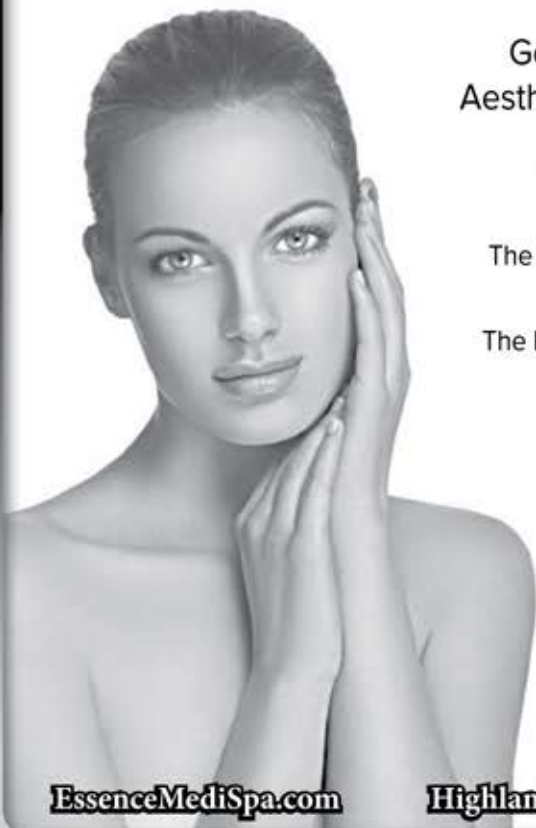

## Micro-mismanagement by committee

A chance encounter with a member of the Newburgh City Council recently produced a suggestion that, with the budget in place for 2016, the council need not meet during the month of December. Instead, they might decide to wrap things up and call it a year.

The comment might have been made in jest, but it does make sense. It would be the perfect Christmas present for the city that has next to nothing, from a governing body that has been mired in dysfunction.

Lame-duck members of the city council are refusing to go quietly.

Cedric Brown, who lost his bid for re-election, decided recently to make a late-evening motion for the city to begin a search for a new city manager. That the motion passed was irrelevant, since he lacked the necessary votes to actually fire Michael Ciaravino, the current city manager. Brown, it was noted here recently, had been at odds with Ciaravino since the manager began his investigation of Police Lt. Peter Leach, a friend of Brown's, who had been collecting disability payments.

At last week's meeting, Councilwoman Gay Lee, who will also leave office at the end of the month, began verbally sparring with the manager, the police chief and with members of the public. Issues at the table included a proposed hiring freeze, raises for police officers and proposed pay cuts for three city employees. Lee, at one point, scolded Police Chief Dan Cameron for not providing her enough information about the proposed raises.

The rancorous debate that often engulfs these meetings is more than just counter-productive. It's micro-management to a fault. The city charter provides for a manager to oversee the day-to-day operations of the city. The city manager is entrusted with hiring, firing and, to a large extent, negotiating salaries and raises with city employees. (Police officers are covered by a collective bargaining agreement.) The council approves a budget and entrusts the manager to work within that budget.

When it comes to excessive meddling, it's not

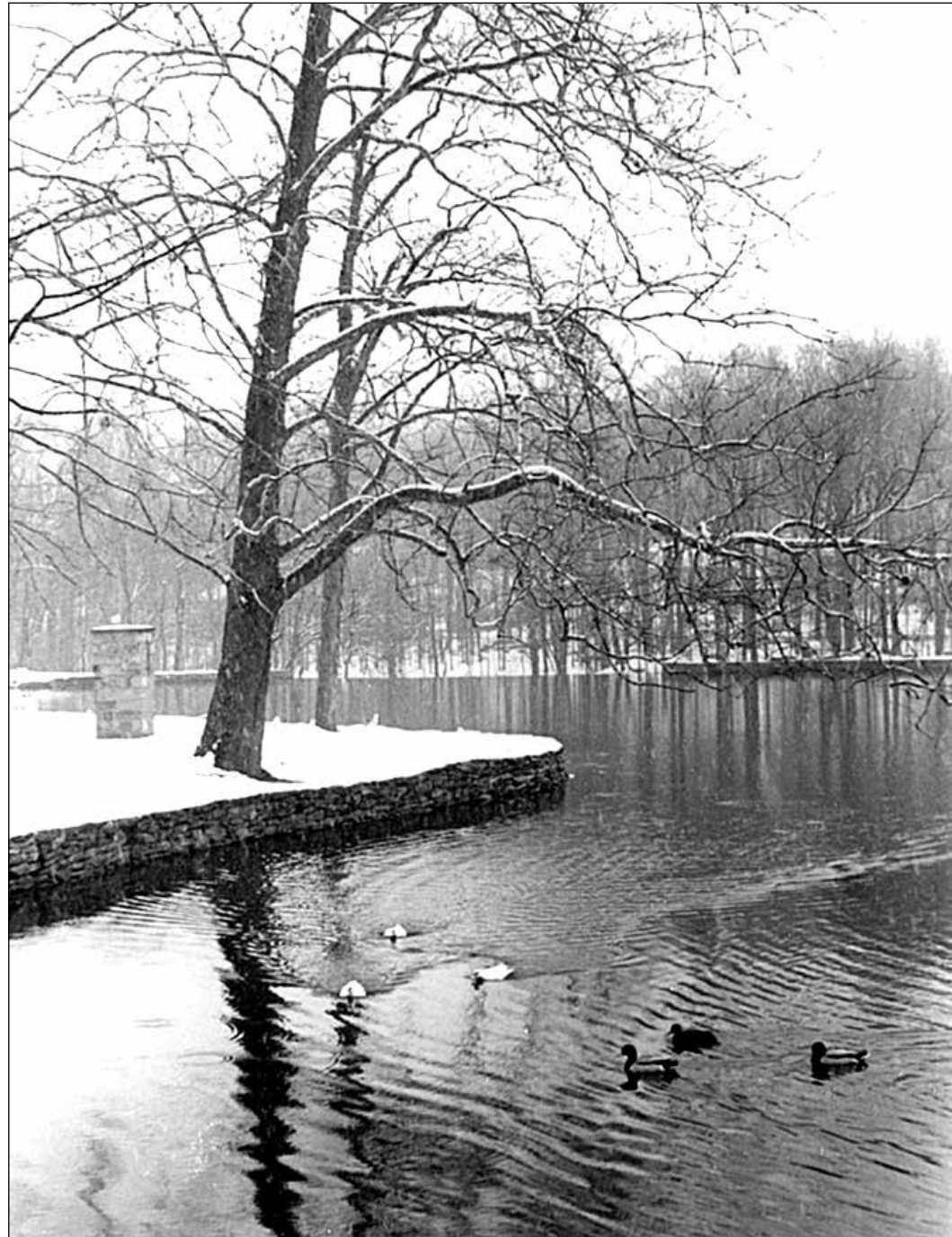

### Seniors shortchanged again

We got shafted again. I don't get it. The cost of living has definitely risen this year. My utility bills are up due to energy delivery rate hikes, housing expenses steadily climb (homeowner's insurance). I see noticeable food price increases at the supermarket. Property tax hikes are a given every year. Medical expenses steadily rise. Yet, for this year, the government says our living expenses are so low that a cost of living adjustment (COLA) is not warranted! There will again be no COLA (zero dollars) to help defray the cost of inflation.

It is apparent the federal government's current inflation gauge is somehow flawed. I read online data indicating this inflation formula is volatile and basically inaccurate in measurement. Presently the government's inflation measure is the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W). This index measures prices of consumer goods such as food, housing, clothing, transportation, medical care, recreation and education. To make matters worse this flawed index is designed to reflect the spending habits of younger America, not us seniors. This index is irrelevant to the

actual costs incurred by older Americans. As a footnote, granted transportation costs have dropped due to falling gas prices at the pump but seniors don't drive that much, not nearly as much as the remaining population.

We seniors who are on fixed incomes especially feel the fiscal pain when a COLA is not given; the COLA is the only way we can somewhat keep up with rising living costs. Unfortunately our Social Security benefits are indexed to inflation as measured by an outdated government formula. Thus for 2016 our benefits will not change in amount.

Clearly something must and should be done to provide us seniors with an inflation formula (index) that hits the mark on accuracy and thus produces fairness. Greater emphasis should be given to medical care including prescription drugs whose costs take a big chunk of our retirement income. Last year prescription drug prices jumped 13%! This year the American Medical Association's data reflects a nearly 5% increase in drug costs. A point in fact is we have the most costly prescribed drugs of any nation in the industrialized world! This fact is etched in stone since the government won't allow Medicare to negotiate drug prices with the pharmaceutical companies. We have no choice. We pay what they charge.

Such an appropriate index for seniors has been developed with different weighting for expenses, among them medical expenses, as elderly people spend much more on health care than younger consumers. The index is called the Consumer Price Index-Elderly (CPI-E). It is designed to specifically take into account the spending habits of older Americans. If made law and implemented, the (CPI-E) index, in the future, would prevent the fiscal pain now felt by seniors. Formula fairness would be the byword. However, much to my chagrin, this index is being held captive to congressional gridlock.

To add insult to injury, all Medicare recipients will see their 2016 PartB (medical insurance) deductible

jump to \$166 from \$147. Furthermore, new 2016 Medicare enrollees will pay a higher PartB monthly premium of \$121.80 as compared to the \$104.90 premium of those already enrolled in the program.

In conclusion, we seniors are forced once again to tighten our fiscal belts since the government has put us behind the eight ball. Postscript: To serve the interests of fairness, in addition to the vital need for the (CPI-E) index, the flawed (CPI-W) index needs noteworthy reform.

# Social Service in 1875

Just a week ago, families and friends gathered for Thanksgiving, the national holiday of gratitude for life's blessings. Around our table, we talked about the charities that help others realize their dreams of having secure places in our community life – charities like Safe Harbors of the Hudson, or Loaves and Fishes or Habitat For Humanity.

My friend, Anita, who has given a long life of public service in her native South Carolina and elsewhere, asked me what Newburgh is doing these days about serving the homeless. "Not as much as it used to," I replied. Although there are many protocols and programs around each year to intervene for people in crisis, the system our community once had to protect and assist its homeless and hopeless population was long ago subsumed into bigger bureaucracies.

I looked up old annual reports of the Newburgh Alms Commission, the local citizens board who distributed aid to the homeless, the unemployed, the orphaned, the aged and all in need. In the days of the alms system, people who fell on hard times applied to their local village or city council, or a church or concerned neighbor made that application on their behalf. In the cold of winter, a family might just need wood or coal to keep their homes warm. They might need

bedding so that they could sleep up off the bare floorboards. If laid off from their jobs, they might need piecemeal they could take home to complete for a little income to tide them over when their seasonal job closed out. Aid in the nineteenth century was called alms or relief. External relief was the term for

any help that could be brought to the person where he lived. Internal relief was the term for bringing the person to the safety of shelter and sustenance. Homeless folks were taken to the Alms House in Newburgh starting in 1814. There, a warm bed was offered and hot meals each day as well as fresh clothes and a chance to work, if able, and move up and out of the facility.

The Newburgh Alms House lasted through 1969. The last big facility was torn down in 1970 and all social services were turned over to county administration. That old alms house was located on Lake Street and it surrounding

Mucchatoes Lake and included an infirmary for the frail elderly and a series of brick buildings constructed between 1853 and 1960 that were, indeed, a homeless shelter. No similar facility took its place.

The old state homeopathic hospital system supported people with mental illnesses during a similar time span of local history and those hospitals were also closed. Middletown and Poughkeepsie were our regional state

hospitals and many Newburghers can recall family and neighbors being admitted there for periods of time into the 1980's.

It is hard to say if communities like Newburgh could ever successfully return to local shelter systems. My research into the old Alms House annual reports reveals a set of circumstances quite like our own times. Look through the excerpted pages here from the 1875 report. One hundred forty years ago, managers at the city almshouse were certainly running a "farm to table" operation of fresh local produce feeding their

residents. Cows grazing on the almshouse farm provided 3,650 quarts of milk to residents. Two hundred fifty celery plants were harvested from a plot near the Quassaick Creek. Ninety pounds of butter was churned and spread on bread. Hundreds of bushels of corn, potatoes, beans, onions, and cabbage were harvested for the residents' tables. Annual contracts were signed with local farmers to deliver other meats and foodstuffs. Residents who were physically able helped in the cultivation and harvest.

Reasons for entering the old Newburgh Alms House were typical for the times a century and more ago. Those reasons ring a familiar bell for us who discuss the homeless problem today. Most of those folks brought to the doors on Lake Street were alcoholics. Their intemperance had often lost them work and family support.

Unemployment was the next common cause of homelessness, especially in the 19th century when jobs were regulated only by the seasonal demand and there was no government insurance to provide safety nets. The local alms commission was the only safety net.

The old 1875 report to the city council warned of one growing concern and that was "tramps." Vagrants were walking and sleeping on the streets of Newburgh and the alms commission wondered how many it could continue to service when some didn't want to cooperate with their organized shelter.

# Country charm

## Borland House chef serves it up with a French twist

**A** well-loved house, the Borland House hides in plain sight in the heart of the village of Montgomery, the air inside filled with the warmth of family, the nostalgia of history, and lately, the smell of something decadent.

The Borland House was born in 1789, the same year the newly minted United States was swearing in its first president. Firmly placed on the National Historic Registry, the house has operated as a bed and breakfast for almost a decade, but remained closed to the general public.

But no longer.

“For the first time, anybody can come in and see how beautiful it is,” said Anna Frumes, gesturing to the sun-filled dining room.

Anna Frumes is a managing partner for the bed and breakfast, which she took over with her parents about 18 months ago. A chef who received her training in southern France, Frumes has been gearing the business toward the food since they re-opened. Now she has taken the next step and officially opened a restaurant, dubbed the Borland Brunch House.

The Borland Brunch House is open from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m., Wednesday through Sunday, and offers a unique menu of farm-to-table fare, kissed with a taste of decadence.

The restaurant’s menu changes with the seasons as

everything is made using local produce. Frumes said she personally visits the local farms and her menu is the result of whatever she finds there.

“I was born into a restaurant and raised around agriculture and food,” Frumes explained.

In her family, Frumes said everything was made from scratch. She spoke of gardens and how her mother ground wheat to make bread.

“I knew where my food came from. It seemed only natural to go that direction,” said Frumes.

Frumes’ path to the Borland House was more of a journey than a straight line, however. She came to Montgomery from California by way of France.

Obtaining her undergraduate degree in Biology from UC Berkeley, Frumes followed that up with graduate work at Columbia University in International Affairs and Economics. Her master’s thesis was an agricultural project in the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

Along the way she discovered that agriculture was something very important to her and her love of food was where she wanted her career to be. Driven to further her culinary education, she was off to France to attend a culinary institute and return to the United States as Chef Anna Frumes.

She started her own spice business in California called Anna’s Spices and even started up and managed

a friend's restaurant, but something was missing.

"I wanted a bed and breakfast," said Frumes.

Living in New York since 2008, Frumes was in Sleepy Hollow when she had her epiphany and decided that she wanted a location in the Hudson Valley due to the amazing local farms.

"The Hudson Valley has so much to offer as far as food goes," said Frumes.

The Borland House was the first bed and breakfast she visited.

"When I walked in, I thought, 'this is the warmest, most wonderful feeling in the world,'" said Frumes.

She moved quickly and together with her family, they were able to take on the historic house and the business at the same time. She said it has been a "wonderful experience" so far and they have been very busy in recent months.

The bed and breakfast features five bedrooms, split between an addition built by General Borland in 1839 and a newer addition in 2007. The rooms include private bathrooms, and of course, breakfast.

Frumes said as they were serving so many breakfasts, it seemed "silly" not to open a restaurant.

"The minute I moved in it made sense to do a restaurant as well," said Frumes.

Plans for a restaurant had to be put on the back burner however, as Frumes said they "legally were not set up for a restaurant."

Under the village code, a bed and breakfast could not have a restaurant. Frumes said she approached the village board and earlier this year they passed a local law changing the definition of a bed and breakfast, allowing for a restaurant with special permission from the village. She then had to work her way through the village approval process and get the blessing of the Department of Health.

Fully approved, the Borland Brunch House held its grand opening about three weeks ago and Frumes said the reception has been very warm.

Frumes said she has been told by customers that they walked by a thousand times and didn't see the Borland House.

"They said, 'it wasn't there for me,'" said Frumes.

Since local residents and the general public couldn't visit unless they were guests, the Borland House had in a way faded from view.

"It wasn't as much a part of the community as it can be now," said Frumes.

Neighbors can now visit the house and dine in the same rooms where General Borland hosted fellow congressmen for dinner. Frumes noted that General Borland was also charged with overseeing the building of the Erie Canal.

Frumes said opening her own restaurant has been a wonderful experience,

due in large part to her guests and customers, and she hopes to meet more of her neighbors as word spreads that the Borland House is open to everyone.

"We already have regulars—that's amazing!" said Frumes, adding that she loves to serve people good food and watch them enjoy it, but the real treat is knowing that she's watching them enjoy her food.

Frumes said one couple has been coming religiously every weekend since they discovered the Borland Brunch House. When her curiosity finally got the best of her, she was surprised to learn that they were making a special trip for her waffles all the way from Woodbury. Frumes said the restaurant has many other repeat customers, including some that come in two or three times per week.

Frumes describes her cooking as recognizable breakfast and lunch dishes made with wholesome and natural foods, but elevated with just a touch of decadence—a mixture of old and new world comfort foods. The menu changes with the seasons, reflecting what is available from local farms.

Popular items on her current menu include her Pearl Sugar Waffles, the Skillet Frittata, and the Apple Pie Dutch Baby Pancake—prepared from a special recipe created by local Dutch settlers using a traditional Dutch baby pancake which is thin and baked. The pancake forms a bowl which Frumes then fills with cinnamon stewed apples and a homemade caramel sauce.

The menu also includes: a French Herb Chicken with Persimmon Waffles, a Flourless Coconut Chocolate Skillet Cake (which is made with coconut flour), the Crema Catalana (a Spanish crème brûlée), a Grilled Swiss Cheese Sandwich (stuffed with green apples and bacon), and a Cheese-Stuffed Babka (a local sweet bread served with caramel sauce, cinnamon butter and fresh homemade compote).

Frumes also makes her own quince jam from local produce, and offers local maple syrup.

"The response has been incredible," said Frumes. "I'm very happy with how it's going so far, but I will always want to see more faces."

With that in mind, the Borland Brunch House is offering a weekday lunch special: from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., lunch is just \$12 and includes an entrée, side and drink.

Frumes is offering cooking classes as well, where she will teach students how to prepare a three-course dinner which they will then eat. The students will learn simple recipes they never thought they could do themselves. The first person to book for a given date gets to select the menu and the time of the class. Classes

can include up to 12 people.

The Borland House will also be participating in Montgomery's Old Fashioned Holiday on Dec. 12, with carolers on the lawn. They will be open to the public all day and running specials.

The Borland House will also be open through the holidays, including Christmas Day.

Frumes noted that since they will be cooking breakfast for everyone in the house that morning anyway, they will not close. She invites the public to spend the holiday with the family at the Borland House.

For those looking for a unique gift, the Borland House offers gift certificates good for everything from the cooking classes to the Brunch House to a stay in one of the rooms.

"We're really happy to be open. It's really nice to be able to share this home," said Frumes.

The Borland House Bed & Breakfast is nestled in the heart of the historic village of Montgomery, across from the village hall and library at 130 Clinton St.

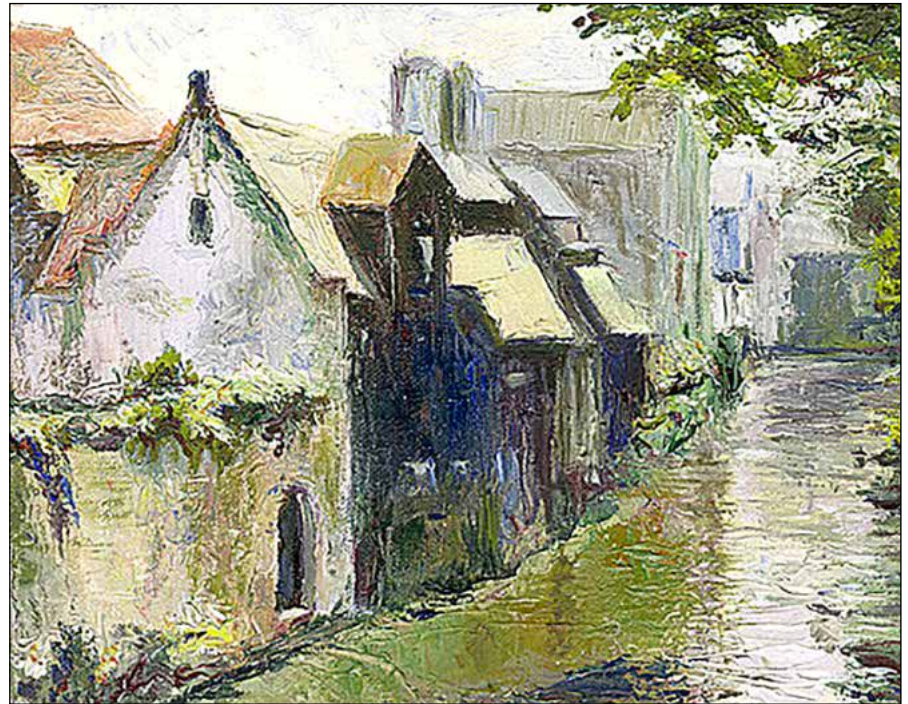
## New exhibit at Wallkill River School

## County launches GPS-based dispatching of ambulances

Orange County Executive Steven M. Neuhaus announced last week that the County has introduced a GPS-based dispatching system for advanced life support ambulance calls in the Town of Wallkill.

The Automatic Vehicle Locator (AVL) system utilizes Global Positioning Satellite (GPS) technology to track the real-time movements of any equipped vehicle, helping dispatchers more accurately deploy emergency resources.

The first call to dispatch via the AVL pilot program was for a tractor-trailer accident on the westbound Route 84 exit ramp in the Town of Wallkill at approximately 1:20 p.m. on Tuesday. The update of the County's computer-aided dispatch system at the Emergency Services Center in Goshen enabled a flawless transfer to the GPS-based service.

"When you call an ambulance, you want it to arrive as fast as possible. Seconds count," Neuhaus said. "If this model proves successful, and I think it will, it can be replicated in other local municipalities. I am pleased that

Orange County's Emergency Services Center was instrumental in launching this potential life-saving innovation. We appreciate that the Town of Wallkill has collaborated with us on this important initiative."

Orange County historically has dispatched ambulances based on protocols developed by individual municipalities. Town of Wallkill officials had approached the County about amending the protocol to include GPS tracking last year.

"The goal is to move the county forward when it comes to advanced life support ambulance calls," Town of Wallkill Supervisor Dan Depew said. "We are excited to utilize this cutting-edge technology. This innovative system isn't being used anywhere else in the Hudson Valley and it will save lives. I want to thank the County Legislature, County Executive, the Town of Wallkill Volunteer Ambulance Corps. and the County's Emergency Services department for working together and making this happen."

After 10 years of helping his father build the brand of Tuthilltown and Hudson Whiskey, Gable Erenzo has taken his longtime passion for distilling and merged it with his dream of producing spirits sourced from hyper-local ingredients and sold to local residents.

Enter Gardiner Liquid Mercantile.

Thanks to a 2014 change in New York State law, Gardiner Liquid Mercantile looks to be the first licensed distillery to open a satellite location, creating a locally focused eating and drinking establishment on the same premises as a retail store with the ability to sell all NYS branded beer, wine, cider and liquor for on and off premise consumption. All this while maintaining its ability to sell wholesale to wineries, breweries and commercial establishments.

"The goal will be to focus on fruit brand and similar products," Erenzo said. "We will produce just enough to retail out of this location and for our bar."

Taking a step back from his role as a corporate brand ambassador for Hudson Whiskey, Erenzo enters his venture with

"If you want to try one of our spirits you will have to come here and get it," Erenzo said. "They will not be available at retailers or distributors outside of GLM."

Gardiner Liquid Mercantile will feature a large deck with benches and seats as well as a patio with additional outdoor seating. Inside, GLM will feature a bar

outfitted with antique and vintage furniture and tractor seats as stools. GLM aims to appeal heavily to the large contingent of blue-collar workers that make up the heart of the Gardiner and surrounding communities.

The Advent wreath has its origins in Germany in the 16th century. The wreath, a circle of evergreen symbolizing God's eternal love, holds four candles, three violet, and one pink. Violet is the traditional penitential color of Advent, and the pink candle symbolizing joy is lit on Gaudete (Joyful) Sunday, the third Sunday of the season.

As we light the four candles one by one, we're reminded of how God's light has gradually illumined the world's darkness through history, culminating in Jesus, the Light of the World and the Son of Justice.

The Advent calendar often begins on Dec. 1, and there's a door for each day, behind which is hidden a picture or

The Jesse Tree is a way of remembering the Jewish roots of the Messiah. Jesse was the father of David, from whose house the Messiah would come. A Jesse Tree can be made of paper, a real branch, or some other material, and is decorated day by day with symbols of God's saving activity: an ark, stone tablets, a dove, and many others.

Every one of us has some part of our lives that yearn for light or that feels lost, and all forms of media flash before us telling us how great is the "need" of this broken world. This Advent pray for everyone in your family, in your neighborhood and in the entire world, who are waiting in hope for the coming of

Christmas, that the Lord make His light shine in our hearts and continue to shine all over the world.

In the darkest of December, many of us are warmed to our very souls as we cherish the most radiant, enchanting, and sentimental of seasons. Our Jewish friends share the happiness of Hanukkah, The Festival of Lights, as the Menorah is reverently lighted in celebration of the miracle of the flame, from a small vessel of holy oil in the Great Menorah or Candelabra, that lasted for eight days, in commemoration of the Maccabees, reclaiming of the temple in Jerusalem and the power of faith.

Hanukkah begins on the evening of Dec. 7 this year, with the lighting of the first candle, and continues for eight nights until all of the eight candles are aglow. 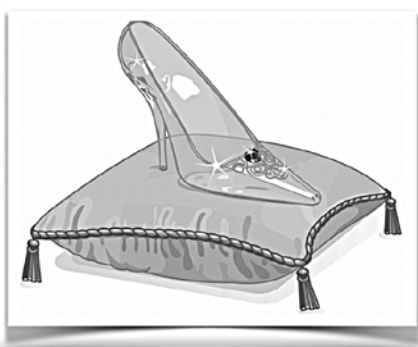

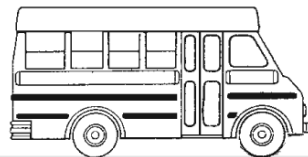

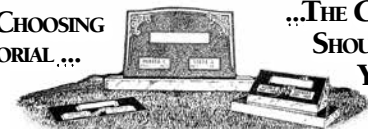

# District Attorney Hoovler announces guilty pleas by electrical contractor to tax and insurance crimes

Orange County District Attorney David M. Hoovler announced last week that Scott Duffie, 61, of the Town of Newburgh, pleaded guilty before Orange County Court Judge Nicholas DeRosa to felony charges of Repeated Failure to File Personal Income Tax Returns, in violation of the Tax Law, and Fraudulent Practices, in violation of the Workers' Compensation Law. Each charge carries a maximum sentence of one and one-third to four years in state prison. Duffie, the owner of Duffie Electric, an electrical contracting business, admitted that he failed to file personal income tax returns from 2011 through 2013, and cheated his worker's compensation insurance carrier by understating his payroll.

As part of the plea agreement that was announced in

Court, Duffie agreed to pay \$34,744 in restitution to the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance and \$59,319 to The Hartford. The District Attorney's Office will be recommending that he be sentenced to one to three years in state prison when he is sentenced on Feb. 3, 2016.

Duffie has operated his electrical contracting business since at least as far back as 1982. Over the years, Duffie has worked on federal and state public works projects, which generally are awarded to the lowest bidder. The investigation into the activities of Duffie Electric arose as a result of a referral from a labor union. As the District Attorney's Office investigated that complaint, including possible violations of the Labor Law, it became apparent that Duffie and Duffie Electric had failed to file proper tax returns for several years, and had been paying their employees "off the books." On Dec. 10, 2014, investigators from the District Attorney's Office, the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance, and the Orange County Sheriff's Office executed a search warrant at Duffie's home, at his shop, and in several vehicles that he or his business owns. Those searches turned up evidence of Duffie's true payroll. A review of those records by the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance and

the New York State Inspector General revealed Duffie's commission of crimes under the Tax Law and Worker's Compensation Law. Once a contractor has been convicted of a felony, he and his companies can be barred from working on public works projects.

District Attorney Hoovler thanked the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance, the Orange County Sheriff's Office, and the New York State Inspector General's Office for their assistance in the investigation.

"The illegal activities of unscrupulous contractors give those contractors an unfair advantage over contractors who play by the rules," said District Attorney Hoovler. "I have made it a priority under my administration to support Orange County's workers, and to try to recover money that contractors owe to the state. I am pleased to be working with organized labor in Orange County to ensure that contractors who illegally evade paying taxes and other statutory obligations no longer enjoy an advantage over contractors who follow the law. My office will do everything in its power to ensure that workers receive legal wages and proper insurance coverage."

Assistant District Attorney Julie Mohl is handling the prosecution.

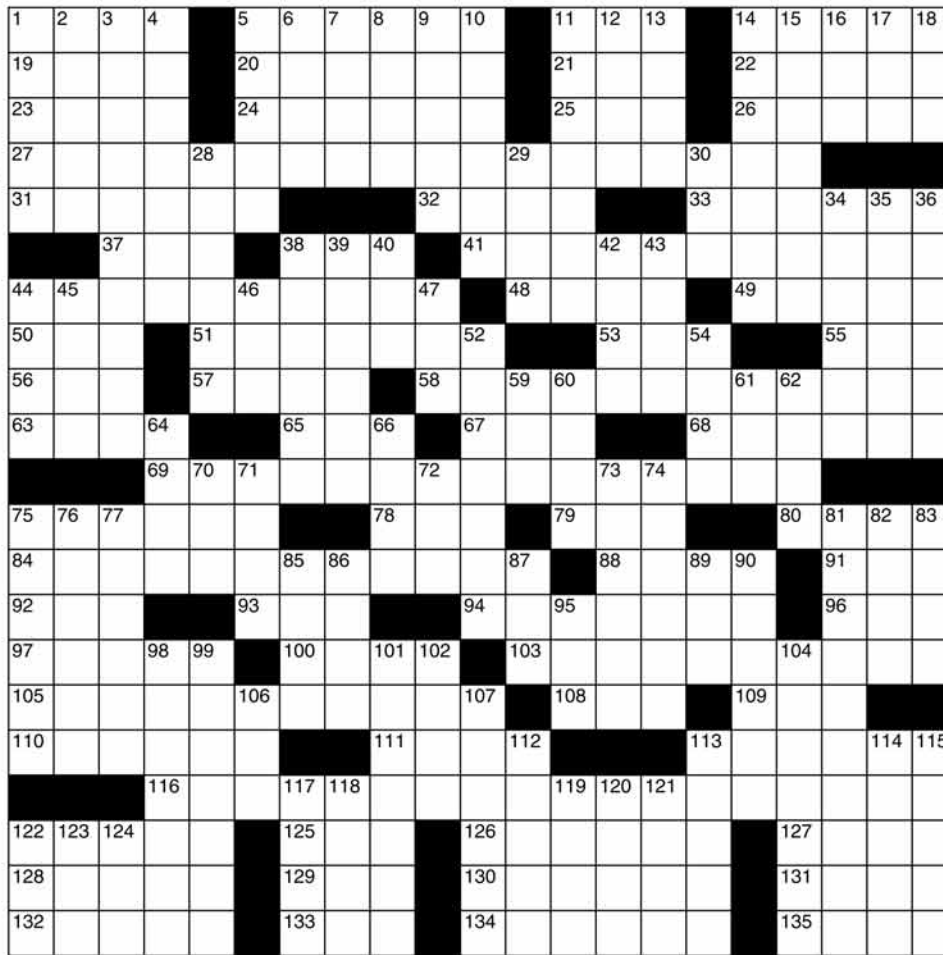

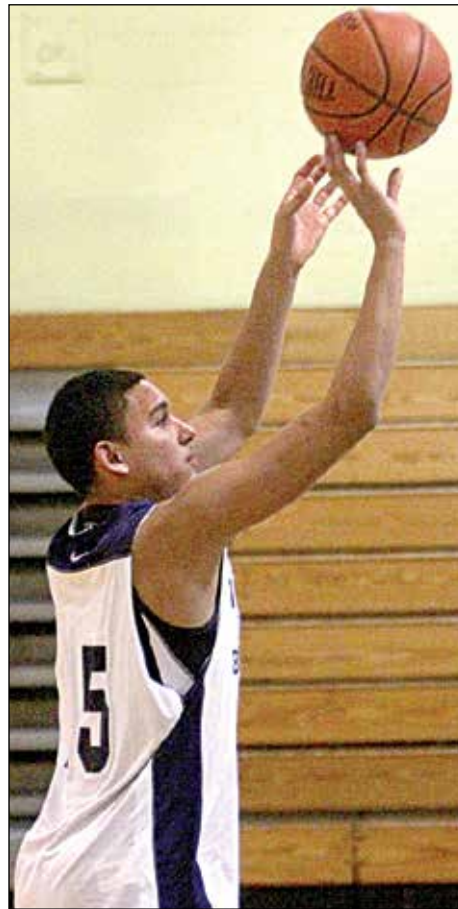
Newburgh Free Academy's varsity boys' basketball returns for the 2015/16 season after posting a 9-10 record during the 2014/15 campaign.

The Goldbacks lost four players from last season, and now they return with a more experienced group hoping to help the team this year.

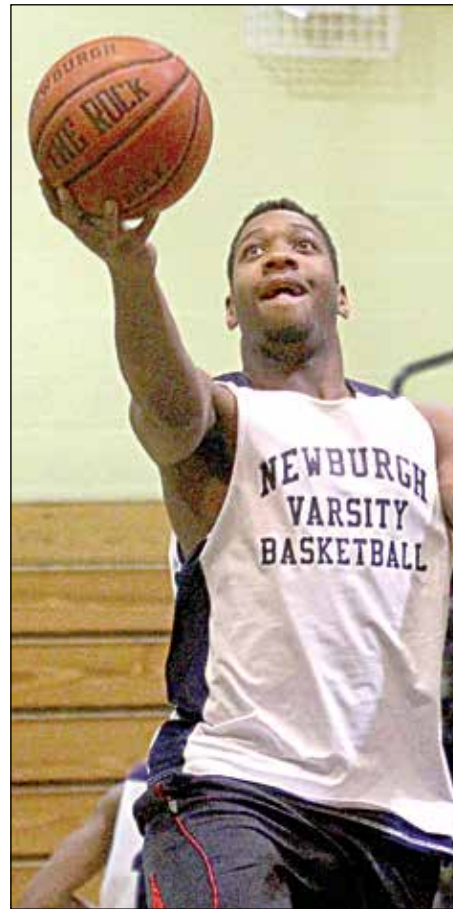
"We have a lot more experience this year coming back," said Matt Brown, Newburgh's coach. "Guys are very eager to really get going and have a successful season this year."

Before the partnership his mother, Jamai Leigh, never heard of Team Impact, but is so pleased she received a call from the on campus ambassador. She is happy for her

son and wants to see him succeed.

Two-time Skyline coach of the year, Ryan Kadlubowski, is also excited about the opportunity to have Paris on board. He believes his team will learn from Paris, just as much as Paris will learn from them.

"We are extremely excited to have Paris join our program. He has a great attitude and perspective on life and our team will gain as much strength from him as he will from us. We will help motivate each other to strive for excellence and to not take any moment, on or off the court, for granted," said Kadlubowski.
