DEC: don't eat the fish

Catch and release advisory for PFOS-laden waters

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation has issued a catch-and-release advisory for fish contaminated by perfluorinated chemicals (PFCs) in Newburgh and New Windsor.

These streams and lakes include Beaver

Dam Lake, Moodna Creek, Washington Lake, Masterson Park Pond, Silver Stream and Recreation Pond, thought to be the chief delivery point for PFCs flowing from Stewart Air National Guard Base and into the local watershed. A stream between Stewart State Forest and Beaver Dam Lake is also included in the advisory.

"What we find is the levels of PFCs

in the fish are high enough that a catchand-release advisory should be in place," said DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos. Fishing itself is fine, Seggos said, but "don't consume the fish."

Seggos was joined by city and county officials at the City of Newburgh water treatment plant on Monday to make the

Addicts get second chance at city Drug Court

Friends and family gathered in a courtroom last week to celebrate two men and the beginning of the rest of their lives. It was graduation day at City of Newburgh Drug Court.

"I came here for a shoplifting charge," said Carl Banks. "I was 58-years-old, standing before a judge for petty larceny... that's when I said I wanted to change."

Banks graduated from the City of Newburgh Drug Treatment Court Program, which offers reduced sentences to people struggling with alcohol and drug addiction. The program offers a second chance to offenders caught up in the cycle of addiction. The program also offers a veterans' track, designed specifically to serve veterans.

"I thought I was here for punishment," said former program participant Rolly Bain, speaking during the ceremony last Wednesday. "It was really a blessing."

"I was tired of doing jail time," said Banks after the ceremony. "I wanted to change my life. I wanted to become a productive citizen."

Now free of a years-long heroin

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Urban Farm in full bloom

here were hefty heads of cabbage and chunky bunches of Swiss chard. Watermelon vines wondered over the edges of raised beds, and gangly garlic stalks stood in a long row, ready for picking and curing.

Vegetable beds are in full bloom at the Downing Park Urban Farm this month. Boasting more than a dozen kinds of vegetables, grown in 30 raised beds, the urban farm is also home to hundreds of Italian honey bees.

The vegetables are grown organically, with no chemical pesticides or fertilizers. "This is fish fertilizer," said Carl Jack, gesturing to a barrel full of pungent-smelling liquid last week. "It's made with fish and seaweed. The plants love it."

Jack is the director of the Center for Hope youth center, which has transformed the two-and-a-half-acre urban farm into a thriving center for agriculture and learning this summer.

Funded by a grant from the Ogden Foundation, the pilot program aims to give Newburgh youth an opportunity to learn hands-on farming techniques and sustainable-growing practices. The program employs four young people from the Center for Hope and lasts for eight weeks into August.

"We want to engage youth in Newburgh that may have an interest in gardening, farming and sustainability as something they would be interested in doing for a living," said the farm's Outreach Manager Virginia Kasinki. "As it gets organized, we're hoping to train more youth."

The City of Newburgh, Newburgh Community Land Bank and the Downing Park Committee partnered to create the urban farm in 2015.

A thin mist of rain fell on the plants at the farm on Friday. Melon plants inside a small greenhouse stayed warm and dry. The cool weather was perfect for weeding.

"We pull weeds and fertilize the plants," said 15-year-old Elijah Dodson, who helped to build many of the garden beds. "I like getting dirty," said Roedasia Hardgrove, 18.

The farm teaches the kids skills in irrigation, plumbing and carpentry. "It's also a way of helping them to get organized," said Kasinki. "They learn how to work in a team. Gardening and farming is a team effort."

For the center kids - some who have grown up in tough circumstances - farming is therapeutic, he said. "They come here and you can just see them relax," said Jack, a farmer by trade. "Farming is not just about growing. Farming is life."

The vegetables will be sold in the coming weeks at the Downing Park Farmers Market, which takes place at the park on Fridays from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. through October 31.

Boys and Girls Club purchases Key Bank building

The Boys and Girls Club of Newburgh has purchased the former Key Bank building at the corner of Grand Street and Broadway. The nonprofit is expected to move in sometime next year.

The organization has lived at its current location on Liberty Street since the late 1960s. The four-story Key Bank building is mostly vacant, said seller Rick Milton. The first floor of the building housed Key Bank until 2015, he said.

We had a number of people who were interested in it," said Milton. "But we wanted the Boys and Girls Club to have the space. The other folks were doing a commercial deal, and they were doing community service. It was the right thing to do."

Key Bank replaced the Columbus Trust Company bank branch in 1984. Columbus Trust owned and operated the bank for nearly a century prior.

City Corporation Counsel Michelle Kelson said the nonprofit was seeking a Main Street grant from the state Office of Community Renewal for rehab of the almost 20,000-square-foot building space. "They are seeking additional funding to get their programs running," Kelson said at City Hall last Thursday.

The Boys and Girls Club of Newburgh

provides after-school and summer programs to about 750 children in grades kindergarten through 12. The nonprofit provides students with tutoring, homework help and academicenrichment, as well as sports and arts programming.

announcement.

Catch-and-release advisories are also in effect in Hoosick Falls and Petersburgh, which had drinking water supplies contaminated with perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA). However, the commissioner explained, "PFOS has a greater affinity for protein" than PFOA, and can become concentrated in high-protein food such as fish.

The lakes and streams in question are all downstream of the Stewart Air National Guard Base, which was designated a state Superfund site last year when high levels of perfluorooctane sulfonate (PFOS) and other PFCs were found there.

Washington Lake – the city's main drinking water source – was shut down due to PFOS contamination in May 2016. State testing has shown the chemical leached from the air base into Recreation Pond, and further into Silver Stream and Washington Lake. The city issued a previous catch-and-release advisory for the lake last year.

"There should be no more excuses after this week for the Pentagon to clean up this contamination at the source," said Congressman Sean Patrick Maloney.

The congressman announced that he

would introduce an amendment to the 2018 Department of Defense Appropriations Act requiring \$35 million be devoted to cleanups at Air National Guard bases contaminated by PFCs. "The time for bureaucratic feet dragging is over," the congressman said.

Maloney was referring to the DoD's lack of action in the water crisis, now more than a year old. The federal agency has been roundly criticized by elected officials, environmental groups and Newburgh-area residents for non-action

in the face of DEC data which reveals the air base is the chief source of PFC contamination in the watershed. The DoD has stated it would carry out its own investigation of the base this year.

"The state has done literally everything it can," said Seggos.

The DEC will pay for a new pump and filtration system at Washington Lake, an overhaul of the city's water treatment plant and pricey drinking water from the Catskill Aqueduct, among other related expenses. The state has also carried

out a blood-testing program that found Newburgh residents have five times the level of PFOS in their blood as the average American.

"The highest levels have been found among residents who have lived here a long time," Seggos said. These levels are "still below what the average American would have had in their blood 30 years ago," Maloney noted.

Manufactured in the U.S. until 2000, PFOS was used in Scotchgard products, cookware and other non-stick products. It was also a key ingredient in fire foam, used for decades at the air base. "This is a public health problem," said Riverkeeper President Paul Gallay. "This is an environmental problem... people are being poisoned."

While the state and local municipalities have done the utmost to address the water crisis for over a year now, the DoD has been the "glaring exception," said Gallay. "Every day that goes by, the problem gets larger," he said.

An additional \$70 billion in defense budget spending is expected next year, Maloney said. "We're saying, 'You have more money than ever,'" he said. "These excuses have got to stop."

addiction, Banks lives and works as a volunteer at Renwick Recovery, a transitional housing facility on Mill Street. "I credit Judge Williams," he said. "Doing time would have been easy."


City Court Judge Eddie Loren Williams presides over the city drug court. "It starts with the idea that you need treatment," he said. "You need to embrace that idea up front."

Some participants "wrestle" with that idea, the judge said. However, it's part of the "commitment we require as part of the treatment," Williams said. "It requires a commitment from the community, as well."

Especially, families, said the judge. "Participants do better when families are involved," he said, as they can provide support, motivation and encouragement when the going gets toughest.

Participants typically face drug possession charges and other non-violent misdemeanors, said city Drug Court Resource Coordinator Lindsay Frusciante.

They come from all over Orange County. "They're usually referred by a judge, lawyer or prosecutor's office," said Frusciante, a credentialed alcoholism and substance abuse counselor. "Any legal entity can make a referral," she said, and individuals can also reach out to join the program on their own.

"What distinguishes drug courts is their uniquely collaborative approach to treatment: upon voluntary entry into court-supervised programs, appropriate nonviolent addicted offenders become part of a dramatic intervention process," the New York State Unified Court System states.

"This process involves coordination between defense attorneys, prosecutors, treatment and education providers, and law enforcement officials. Rules of participation are defined clearly in a contract agreed upon by the defendant, the defendant's attorney, the district attorney and the court."

There are 141 drug courts operating in the state. The Newburgh drug treatment court program currently has 33 students, some who were honored at the ceremony for reaching the halfway point in their treatment plans. More than 150 people have graduated from the program since it began in 2003.

Participants are required to undergo drug testing, meet regularly with the judge and enter an inpatient or outpatient rehabilitation program.

Each participant gets an individualized treatment plan, which may involve seeking employment, housing and education services. Graduations are held three times a year. "It's a voluntary program," Frusciante said, and participants need to complete the program in order to receive a sentence reduction.

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Ridesharing comes to the Hudson Valley

Ridesharing companies received the green light from the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles to begin offering rideshare services across the state last month. Ridesharing companies Uber and Lyft have begun to offer rides throughout the Hudson Valley.

"I love the freedom of it," said Lyft driver and brand ambassador David Rein. "I can go on whenever I want at 3 in the morning or at 8 in the morning. I can work any time I choose. What I love the most are the passengers."

Rides are hailed electronically, through a computer or phone app, into which users plug credit card information, and pick-up and drop-off locations. Drivers use their own personal vehicles and are required to have background

Lyft prices include a base fare of \$1.15, a charge of \$1.00 per mile and \$0.25 per minute, plus tolls and fees.

Rides are now available in cities such as Newburgh, Middletown, Poughkeepsie, Beacon and Kingston. Some rural areas may experience slower service, depending on the availability of drivers.

The service offers "a reliable, convenient and oftentimes more affordable transportation option," said Assemblyman James Skoufis in a June statement.

Skoufis, who advocated for years to have ridesharing come to the Hudson Valley, described local ridesharing as a source of jobs and an additional means of transportation for tourists.

"Ridesharing has been proven to help reduce drunken driving incidents," Skoufis said in an email Monday. "It also allows people from downstate to enjoy the Hudson Valley without a renting a vehicle or a driver's license. In addition, it allows senior citizens who need rides to different medical appointments to get the service that they need."

Ridesharing services have been available in New York City for approximately six years. Last month, Governor Andrew Cuomo signed legislation making ridesharing legal around the state. The Department of Motor Vehicles approved licenses for Uber and Lyft in late June.

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Defendant pleads guilty in kayak murder case

Orange County District Attorney David M. Hoovler announced today that on Monday, July 24, 2017, Angelika Graswald, 37, of Poughkeepsie, pleaded guilty before Orange County Court Judge Robert H. Freehill, to the felony of Criminally Negligent Homicide, in connection with the drowning death of her fiancé, Vincent Viafore, while they were kayaking on the Hudson River on April 19, 2015.

At the time she pleaded guilty, Graswald admitted she caused Vincent Viafore's drowning death by removing the plug from his kayak. She also admitted she knew that the locking clip to Vincent's kayak paddle was missing, that he was not wearing a life vest, or a wet suit, and knowing that the waters in the Hudson River where they were kayaking were dangerously cold and rough at the time. Evidence shows that at the time of the incident Graswald was wearing a life jacket. Graswald admitted her actions constituted a gross deviation from the standard of conduct that a reasonable person would have observed in the situation, and that her actions caused the

death of Vincent Viafore.

On April 19, 2015, the Orange County 911 Center received a call that Viafore's kavak had capsized during a kayaking trip on the Hudson River. The New York State Police and other first responders searched the river for Viafore, eventually recovering his kayak, and that of Graswald, who had been taken aboard a private vessel. On April 30, 2015, Graswald was arrested by the New York State Police. On May 23. 2015, the Orange County Sheriff's Office Marine Unit were notified about a body floating in the Hudson River in the vicinity of West Point. They located and secured the body until the New York State Police could respond and recover the body from the river. The body was positively identified as that of Vincent Viafore. The plug, which was missing from Vincent Viafore's kavak, was eventually recovered from the center console of the car Graswald was driving. The plea will render Graswald, who is a lawful permanent resident, liable for deportation, although that decision will ultimately be made by a Federal Judge.

This plea agreement was entered into after extensive consultation with the victim's family, who understand the reasons for the plea agreement. Graswald is scheduled to be sentenced on November 1, 2017. The plea agreement, which was placed on the record at the time that Graswald pleaded guilty, mandates that she be sentenced to one and one-third to four years in state prison, the maximum sentence for the charge of Criminally Negligent Homicide. At the time of the plea proceedings Judge Freehill found that the interests of justice would be served by the plea agreement and that he believed it to be an appropriate disposition.

District Attorney Hoovler thanked the New York State Police for their investigation of the case. In addition, Hoovler thanked all the first responders and civilian volunteers for their efforts in searching for and trying to rescue the victim. Agencies which aided in the search and attempted rescue included the Westchester Department of Public Safety, Rockland County Sheriff, Cornwall Volunteer Fire Department, West Point Fire Department, Fort Montgomery Fire Department, Vails Gate Fire Department, Stony Point Fire Department, City of Newburgh Fire Department, City of Newburgh Police Department, Cornwall-on-Hudson Police Department, Town of New Windsor Police Department and Town of Cornwall Police Department, as well as other agencies.

The case is being prosecuted by Senior Assistant District Attorney David Byrne and Chief Trial Assistant District Attorney John Geidel.

"While no outcome can compensate for the loss of a beloved son, brother, and uncle, this disposition will hopefully bring a measure of closure to the Viafore family," said District Attorney David M. Hoovler. "This plea ensures that the defendant will be held criminally liable for her actions. By pleading guilty the defendant has acknowledged that Vincent Viafore's death was not simply a tragic accident, but the result of this defendant's criminal conduct."

Corporate welfare for the wealthy

ssemblyman James Skoufus (D-Woodbury) recently blasted a decision by the state's economic development engine to award \$21 million in tax credits to NBC Universal to keep The Tonight Show based in New York City. In a press release distributed last week, he termed it "corporate welfare." He's got a point.

We all love Jimmy Fallon. He's a Saugerties native who's proud of his Hudson Valley roots. We were charmed when he invited an entire Wallkill youth football team on his show a few years ago after a video that showed them unable to crash through a banner went viral. It's hard to imagine that he would like the show to pull up stakes and head to the west coast as did Johnny Carson in the 1970s.

Carson's migration coincided with the decline of the Big Apple, when crime and poverty seemed to overtake the big city that ended with the Federal Government looking the other way and the famous Daily News headline "Ford to city: Drop Dead!"

There's little doubt that late night television plays an important role in casting a positive image of the city. Mayor Rudy Guiliani urged David Letterman and Saturday Night Live to get back to work following 9-11. That was good for the city, but also good for the networks.

The TV viewers of middle America may not care where the show originates. Nor, for that matter do many residents of upstate New York who have to wonder why our tax dollars are invested in this. Some of us are still smarting over the MTA region surcharge that impacts residents of Orange and Dutchess counties.

NBC has deep pockets. It can afford to spend millions for broadcast rights to events like the Oympics and NFL games, and reap billions in advertising profits in the process. It doesn't need public assistance to the tune of \$21 million.

Small business, on the other hand, does need it. Twenty one million dollars could help foster business growth and create many jobs in a state where it is sorely needed. We need to focus on our priorities.

Nor any drop to drink

ater, water, everywhere nor any drop to drink!"

This line from a poem made an unsettling impression on me when it appeared inside our literature book in my middle school years. The poem by Samuel Taylor Coleridge was full of haunting scenes and moral lessons. In the poem, an old sailor recounted a harrowing ordeal at sea without food or water. Despite being surrounded by miles of ocean, there was no fresh water to quench his ravenous thirst. Our class ended that

lesson longing for a trip to the water fountain and walked home listening for the beat of albatross wings.

Like other creepy stories read in my childhood, I distilled only a few scenes that moved with me into adulthood. The desperation of the man

being without life-supporting water while surrounded by lapping waves is the essence of tragedy. I thought of the 1834 poem recently as I looked out at the vast Hudson River that is also too salty to drink while our city seeks a safe and permanent source of fresh water. On the news, I saw Assemblyman Skartados and Senator Schumer make impassioned pleas for remediation of the chemical contamination that still seeps toward our closed reservoir. Newburgh is at the bottom of the topography at this point in the Hudson Valley. My home is nearly the very bottom, being down near the shore. West of us are the hillsides that, for hundreds of years, have drained toward the estuary that carries water to the sea.

In my childhood, these lands were not suburbs but farms. Traveling out beyond Broadway or out along Little Britain Road, there were more barns than service stations. Meadow Hill was the Patton farm. Route 17K was still called the Cochecton Turnpike and its intersection with Union Avenue was the big farm stand of the Palmerone farm

where we drove every spring to buy our own tomato plants and flowers. When the New York State Thruway opened in 1952, the Palmerone family continued to farm the center of the new cloverleaf access ramp beside their barn. Now the old farm market is the Newburgh Nissan dealership and the farm name remains only as a marker on the wall of the mall on the northeast corner.


Reading through local directories in the 1940's and 1950's many Union Avenue and Cochecton Turnpike residents have a notation "off" beside their names. That means their property was considerably back from the road with a house that was down a long driveway. There were no street numbers because these long-time rural residents were well known to their mailmen and neighbors. Not everyone farmed. Some small businesses were interspersed with homes. A couple

of florists, a couple of equipment repair shops, a cabinet maker, two antique dealers, a feed store and two restaurants lined Route 17K between the city line and Lakeside Road. So did a big poultry farm, the Newburgh Country Club golf course and the transmission tower for WGNY radio. Of course the Air Force Base was the biggest presence. The sound of the recent air show was the soundtrack of my childhood: that rush of powerful engines as fighter jets came and went patrolling the skies over the northeastern United States and Canada.

As automobiles transformed so much of American life in the 1960's, they transformed Newburgh's leafy green watershed too. Roads were widened often and barns fell to make way for gas stations. Facing the increased traffic flow, land along the old rural routes was most desirable as commercial space and,

quite quickly, the regional main street moved from lower to upper Broadway and on to Union Avenue. People from the towns didn't come "down into" Newburgh for their shopping; city residents started going "out into" the towns. The new inter-municipal communication lacked an important factor: regional planning.

Newburgh is a small city that, in the mid-19th century, purchased what seemed to be abundant water supplies outside its borders. But it never anticipated that the forested acres that surrounded Washington Lake and Brown's Pond would be developed so intensely that clean, fresh water sources might disappear. This transformation over 60 years is one reason Newburgh is left wondering if we will have "nor a drop to drink."

"Orange County continues to mourn the loss of these men and appreciates the sacrifices that our servicemen and servicewomen make on a daily basis. I encourage all Orange County residents to pause for a moment when they see our flags and recall these lives that were tragically cut short."



City Tavern, established in 1773, was the political, social, and business center of the new United States. Jefferson, Adams, Franklin, and Paul Revere all ate here. In the mid-19th century, a fire badly damaged the Tavern, and it was

razed. The site was included in the area declared a National Historic Park, and, using written accounts, early photographs, and insurance surveys, the City Tavern was restored in time for the bicentennial. Chef Walter Staib has featured City Tavern in his PBS series, "A Taste of History".



Concerts which are on Wednesday nights, and the preparation for Community Day which is on Saturday August 26. This time of year always seems like a never ending crazy busy cycle.



SUNY Orange to receive grant for Liberty Partnership

SUNY Orange has received a \$1.5 million grant from the New York State Department of Education to establish an after-school Liberty Partnership Program, in collaboration with the Newburgh Enlarged City School District and the Boys and Girls Club of Newburgh, to improve academic success and career readiness for disadvantaged middle school and high school students.

With the five-year grant, the three partners will develop a wide-ranging program aimed at ensuring student persistence, high school graduation and sustained academic achievement. The program will be designed to serve 240 students and will also include college/career readiness training and service learning experiences for students in the Heritage Middle School as well as at Newburgh Free Academy's three campuses: Main, North and West.

"News of this grant is exciting for the College, the Newburgh School District and the entire City of Newburgh. At SUNY Orange, we understand what it takes to make students ready for college-level curricula, and how to help them achieve success in a college environment," said Dr. Kristine Young, SUNY Orange president. "Our strength at coordinating projects with committed and supportive partners will tie everything together and our broad base of subject-matter experts will assure the program has a positive impact upon the students and their families."

"The school district will identify students who are at risk of dropping out or most in need of this programming, and provide necessary guidance and support throughout the school year," Young added. "We will rely upon The Boys and Girls Club's expertise in building innovative programs and sustaining impactful relationships with students and families.

The bulk of the programming will be delivered at the College's Newburgh campus, and will feature a blend of smallgroup activities including the development of individualized learning plans, as well as academic interventions, enrichment opportunities, skills assessments, tutoring, academic and personal counseling, and other components.

The LPP's activities, slated to begin when the grant cycle begins on Sept. 1, will be largely adapted from engaging programming currently offered by the Boys and Girls Club, including "Project Learn," "Career Launch" and "Diplomas to Degrees." The grant's programming will also benefit greatly from the expertise of college faculty, academic departments, and the Office of Continuing and Professional Education, each of which will have opportunities to engage in LPP initiatives.

Delivering LPP programs after school hours will allow students to augment their in-school learning through an array of supportive activities that reinforce academic lessons while at the same time helping students plan for their future. Students will also have access to skill-building and experiential learning opportunities during the summer months. These activities likely will be scheduled in collaboration with various community

partners.

With funds from the grant, the College will hire a Liberty Partnership Program Director to oversee the program, as well as a Program Coordinator. The LPP Director will report to the College's Associate Vice President for Learning and Student Success.

The current grant award marks a return to LPP programming for the College. A previous grant cycle had supported a SUNY Orange LPP program for more than two decades. This new version will place a greater emphasis on college-community partnerships, and will rely upon a stronger relationship with the Newburgh school district that has grown through the development of the Excelsior Academy (P-TECH program) and other smaller projects.

Library host solar eclipse lecture series

The Gardiner Library will be presenting a series of events to celebrate the solar eclipse that will take place on August 21. Part one is a Family Event with Solar System Ambassador Ken Bailey at the library on Tuesday August 1 from 6:30 - 7:30 p.m. This event is free though pre-registration is required. Geared toward children from kindergarten to sixth grade and their parents, this presentation includes a power point presentation on what an eclipse is, instructions on SAFE solar viewing and, weather and time permitting, solar viewing with a PST solar telescope. Families will take home a handmade pinhole projector in the shape of New York State.

Ken Bailey is an amateur astronomer and has been most of his life. He has been doing outreach events with the Mid-Hudson Astronomical Association for over 7 years and was selected as a Solar System Ambassador for 2017. He is listed on the NASA Eclipse 2017 website as a Subject Matter Expert.

The second event is a special Planetarium Show and Solar Observing at SUNY New Paltz on Tuesday August 8 from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. The cost is \$3.50 per person and pre-registration with payment is required by August 1. Payment must be in the form of a check made out to "SUNY New Paltz Acct. #900340.

Those interested are asked to pre-register as soon as possible. Seating is limited to 40, but the planetarium will graciously add an extra show if there is enough interest. The event starts with solar observations from 4:30 to 5:30 p.m., using telescopes that have special filters on them to block out most of the light. Participants will also learn how to use proper equipment to safely view the Sun and upcoming solar eclipse on August 21, 2017. The Planetarium Show will be held from 5:30 to 6:15 PM inside the Coykendall Science Building. This show will feature the night sky for that day. Locate and learn about the stars, constellations, planets, galaxies and other objects that may be visible and the mythology behind some of their names, as well as information about solar eclipses.

Part Three of the series is a Solar Eclipse Lecture and Presentation at the library by astronomy professor Tom Crepet on Friday August 18 from 7 to 8 p.m. This program is geared for adults. Steele Road homes scheduled for hookup to town water main

The Town of New Windsor is heading into the last phases of work to connect approximately two dozen homes to municipal water. The residences, all located on Steele Road, have wells that were contaminated by perfluorinated chemicals coming from Stewart Air National Guard Base.

The town received approval from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation to move forward with the work this week, New Windsor Chief Water Plant Operator John Egitto said.

The town engineer is very near completion of the water main design," Egitto said on Monday. "Once that's complete, it will go to the Orange County Health Department for review and approval."

The project involves more than 20 properties with wells contaminated by perfluorooctane sulphanate (PFOS) and other perfluorinated chemicals

that leached from the air base into the Newburgh-New Windsor watershed. According to the DEC, the water pollution was caused by decades of fire foam use.

Egitto estimated the final work will go out to bid in late August. The state will

reimburse the town for the total cost of the project, he said. Private properties on Weather Oak Hill Road and Moores Hill Road were connected to town water earlier this year. Homes in the Town of Newburgh will also need connections to municipal water mains. The properties are located on Coronas Lane and Lear Lane, off Route 17K. "We're in the process of designing the water main extension," said Town of Newburgh Engineer James Osborne. "Six homes are targeted for service."

Osborne couldn't say for certain when the work would be completed. As with the New Windsor project, designs will need approval from the county health department, Osborne said. "We may need easements to run the water main on private roads," said the engineer.

The majority of New Windsor municipal water comes from the Catskill Aqueduct; the Town of Newburgh draws its water from the Delaware Aqueduct and Chadwick Lake.

The City of Newburgh drinking water supply at Washington Lake was found to be contaminated with PFOS in the spring of 2016. DEC testing revealed the chemical flowed from the air base into Newburgh and New Windsor through Silver Stream.

Buyer beware: new owner says home was 'uninhabitable'

Town of Newburgh resident Tracy Cotich, like any prospective homeowner, had her the house inspected by a licensed inspector before purchasing it in September 2016. Cotich was informed that it passed inspection, and that the town had issued Certificates of Occupancy the previous December. However, days after acquiring the property Cotich noticed soft spots in the floorboards, which lead her to discover that not only was the house not up to code, but it had severe structural, safety and health issues that made it uninhabitable.

A 16-page report written by an engineer subsequently hired by Cotich revealed that her new home had no foundation under much of the flooring, that floor joists were rotting due to severe termite damage and contact with the ground, building walls were rotted from moisture, and certain ceiling joists were not structurally sound or up to code causing the roof to be in danger of collapse, to name a few issues. In summary, Cotich learned that the repairs would be so extensive, it would cost \$188,602 to simply bring the house up to code, and was recommended that the house, which she paid \$234,500 for, be demolished. Not only has Cotich lost the money spent purchasing the house, she has also been paying its mortgage, taxes, and insurance since November 2016, in addition to other storage and rental fees. She has been recommended to declare bankruptcy.

Cotich claims that not only did the former owners, William and Linda (Slaughter) Lodge, and the Town of Newburgh know about these extensive issues, but that she also has documentation indicating the owners "actively concealed these extreme defects to the property," which

Cotich acquired from the Town of Newburgh Code Compliance Department by completing a Freedom of Information Law request.

Marc Kerchman, the attorney for the Lodges that oversaw the sale of the property, stated, "I do not believe it is appropriate for me to comment on a client's closed real estate matter," when asked for comment.

Cotich has brought her concerns to several agencies in the state, only to be told that the behavior of the involved parties does not constitute a crime or negligence. There are, however, ongoing investigations against several of the involved parties. Cotich is determined not to give up.

"Does it sound fair and just to you that I was sold a home without proper disclosure from the sellers and that was 'inspected' by an agency (Town of Newburgh building department) charged with the responsibility of verifying that structures are safe and code compliant? Residents of the Town of Newburgh rely on the Town of Newburgh Building department to do its job. They failed miserably in this case and refuse to take ANY responsibility for it," wrote Cotich in her letter of complaint to Attorney General Eric Schneiderman.

Supervisor Gil Piaquadio, when asked about the allegations, stated, "The town was named in a lawsuit recently and it would be best for me not to comment."

Cotich is seeking the support of other Town of Newburgh residents and New Yorkers to demand accountability from both the municipalities and licensed professionals whose job it is to ensure that structures are safe and in compliance.

"I'm looking for the Town of Newburgh to take responsibility for its gross negligence," said Cotich.



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


Elise also took center stage during the ceremony, starting her speech in Japanese—the language she elected to learn for school.

"My mom sat through all the complaints and you have no idea how many there were," said Elise Bartley. "I couldn't tell you how many times Mom told me that it was surprising that in homework there was work involved, however, despite the moans and groans, we made it through, didn't we?"

"A lot needs to be said for the mother who put up with so much for so many people," added Tavia Bartley. "Over 30 years of service comes to a close today. It's

Each year was an adventure. One year, Cathleen Bartley had seven of her children at the kitchen table for school—with one a senior and one in kindergarten.

"I think it's wild that this whole journey is over," said Caryn Bartley, the eldest sibling. "It's hard to believe that Mom is done. No more homework at the kitchen table. It's mind-boggling that we've gotten to this point... we're all done."

Cathleen Bartley said one of the greatest benefits of their great homeschooling experiment was being able to spend more time with her children and to know exactly what her children were learning. The hardest parts were preparing the quarterly reports to the school district, clearing the table for supper and puzzling things out on their own—which became easier over the years with various forms of technology.

"Thirty-one years ago we looked at our options and decided to homeschool one year at a time, no support group or co-op, not much info, just knowing it was the right thing to do," said Cathleen Bartley. "All of a sudden our journey has reached its final destination. Our children have arrived at the crossroads of life. We watch and pray as God opens doors of opportunity for them."

Graduates from Heritage Christian Academy have pursued futures in education, healthcare, military, corrections, childcare, baking, book publishing, auto mechanics—and now possibly dance instruction.

"Her outgoing and friendly spirit has given her the ability to dance in front of a room full of people simply because it was fun," said Tavia Bartley.

Tavia referred to a recent incident at a local health fair. A dance cross fitness group was doing demos and trying to get spectators to join in.

"Elise was one of the only people that would get up and do it with them and they were impressed with her skills," said her mother.

Elise has her black belt in Tae Kwon Do and was a cheerleader for six years. She also served as a cheer coach for one year at Leptondale Christian Academy.

She has now been offered a dance instructor position at Dance Xross Fitness in Beacon, following her certification this fall.

In the meantime, her mother is helping her recent graduates study for CLEP tests and considering serving as a guru to local families in need of advice on homeschooling.

"To those of you still on your homeschooling or schooling journey, I would encourage you to enjoy this time, take more pictures and don't sweat the small stuff," said Cathleen Bartley.
