Busy month for Marlboro Hose Company

In recent weeks, the Marlboro Hose Company has seen its share of fires and emergencies. On Tuesday, March 22 they received a call at 4:11 p.m. on a dumpster fire at 6 Tanglewood Park Drive that quickly jumped to a structure directly next to it.

"It could have been a storage shed or something for putting stuff in," said

Fire Chief Andy Polizzi. "It was a vacant building [and] there was nothing in it."

Polizzi said the fire was quickly knocked down and his company was back in service at 5:28 p.m.

"As soon as the engine got there we pulled a line and darkened it down right away," he said. "It was just unfortunate that it happened."

Polizzi said at this point the cause of the fire is listed as 'undetermined' by the Ulster County Fire Investigation team.

"It's hard to determine that because everything was burnt in the dumpster," he said.

Polizzi said the investigation team, as well as the Marlborough Police Department, checked with nearby neighbors, asking if anyone had seen anything related to the fire.

For this event, Polizzi had the Milton Company as "standby in our quarters

Heroes Marlborough officers honored for saving lives

The Marlborough Town Board and Police Chief Gerald Cocozza honored three officers on Monday with Pride of Marlborough awards for saving the lives of two overdose victims by quickly administering Narcan, an opiate antidote. Opioids include heroin, morphine and prescription pain pills like codeine, oxycodone, methadone and vicodin.

Cocozza acknowledged that in recent years the use of heroin is at epidemic levels all across the United States. In response, New York State has provided special training in the use of Narcan that is effectively saving lives. Cocozza said all of his officers have received training and the police vehicles are equipped with the counteracting drug.

"When someone overdoses on heroin the heart rate decreases [and] the respiratory rate decreases to the point where they die," he said. "With the ability to issue Narcan those effects are immediately reversed and in most cases we're able to save those lives."

Cocozza said on Dec. 22, 2015 Sgt. Justin Pascale saved the life of a female adult who had overdosed in her car by the side of a town road.

The Pride of Marlborough award stated, "Thanks to his quick thinking and

Lloyd honors hometown surveyors

The Lloyd Town Board recently proclaimed March 21-26 as Surveyor's Week in Lloyd and encouraged "all citizens to recognize the many contributions and the ongoing dedication of surveyors to our community and throughout the United States." There are approximately 45,000 professional surveyors in the United States.

The proclamation pointed out that the profession has changed dramatically since the Colonial Era, moving from simple descriptions and locations of land boundaries to present day development of hydrographic and engineering surveys and geodetic surveys that are used "to determine precise global positioning for activities such as aircraft and missile navigation and cartographic surveys used for mapping and charting."

The proclamation points out that professional surveyors today use "sophisticated equipment and techniques, such as satellite-borne remote sensing devices [for topographic mapping] and automated positioning [for real-time GPS work], measuring, recording and plotting equipment," in their work. "The role of the surveyor has been and continues to be, integral in the development and advancement of our state and nation."

Patti & Rick Brooks, of Brooks and Brooks Surveying and Planning in Highland, both have long roots in the profession going back two and three generations. They have professional ties with many area and regional organizations such as the Mid-Hudson Valley Land Surveyor's Association, New York and Vermont Associations of Professional Land Surveyors, the NYS Wetlands Forum, the American Planning Association and the Ulster County Development Corporation, to name a few. They have also lectured before the New York State Bar Association, the Catskill Area Forestry Association, the New York State Survey Colleges and the New York State Surveyors Association. Both have even been called upon to testify in court on cases pertaining to their profession.

Rick Brooks said surveying is a branch of engineering "that is so specialized that our numbers are small," noting that in New York there are only 1,400 licensed surveyors as opposed to 60,000 professional engineers, a ratio he says holds true nation-wide. He said the average age in his profession is nearly 60 and hopes that with a more concerted outreach there will be younger individuals attracted to

their ranks.

Brooks said changes in his profession have mostly been technological, with "GPS a good example," along with laser scanning and drones now being used in the field "that is all in the forefront of land surveying." He pointed out that by using high-tech GPS receivers "you can know within a few millimeters precisely where you're located on the face of the earth."

Brooks said Egyptians used surveying techniques when they laid out the pyramids, calling his field "the second oldest profession in the world."

Brooks said most of the work his company does in the region is for land preservation organizations including for the New York City watershed lands. In addition, they do infrastructure work for cities and towns who have not done upgrades for a century and for public utilities. They also assist landowners in need of simple residential lot-line clarification, for subdivisions or site plans for small businesses.

Brooks said the reward he and his wife receive from their work "is a strong sense of community. We have the ability and we do help people within our wide community with a varying range of problems, whether creating a lot for their son or daughter or straightening out a commercial violation through a site plan review or solve where their property boundary lines are." He said they often work outside, a big plus in their minds.

"You're not chained to a computer screen, such as if you were an engineer, you'd be staring at a computer screen all day," he said.

Patti Brooks called the proclamation by the Lloyd Town Board "wonderful,"

saying she is grateful for their action in bringing attention to their profession. She thanked the town Supervisor's secretary, Kate Jonietz, who has worked in the field, for spearheading the proclamation.

Brooks said every year Highland school students and Scouts visit their office in the hamlet "and that gives us an opportunity to reach [out to] young children and their parents on land surveying. That's when you really need to touch them, informing them that surveying is a profession."

Brooks said in her 40-year career she has seen the profession move from using tools and techniques that have been employed for more than 200 years to present day GPS and robotic instruments. She points out, however, that it still takes training and experience to plot lines correctly.

"It is incumbent upon us as a profession to educate the public on the importance of applying not only mathematics but legal principles to the science and art of land surveying," she said. "Because of the technology that's out there, there's a perception that anybody can survey their property or anybody can be an expert at measuring because they have the tool. But unless you know how to properly apply that tool, it can actually be a very dangerous thing."

Brooks particularly enjoys and appreciates the historical aspects of her profession and looking at and analyzing old survey maps that were created by the forefathers and pioneers in her field generations ago. She said she likes the characterization that she and her husband are "links in a chain" that stretches deep into the past as they peer into a limitless future.

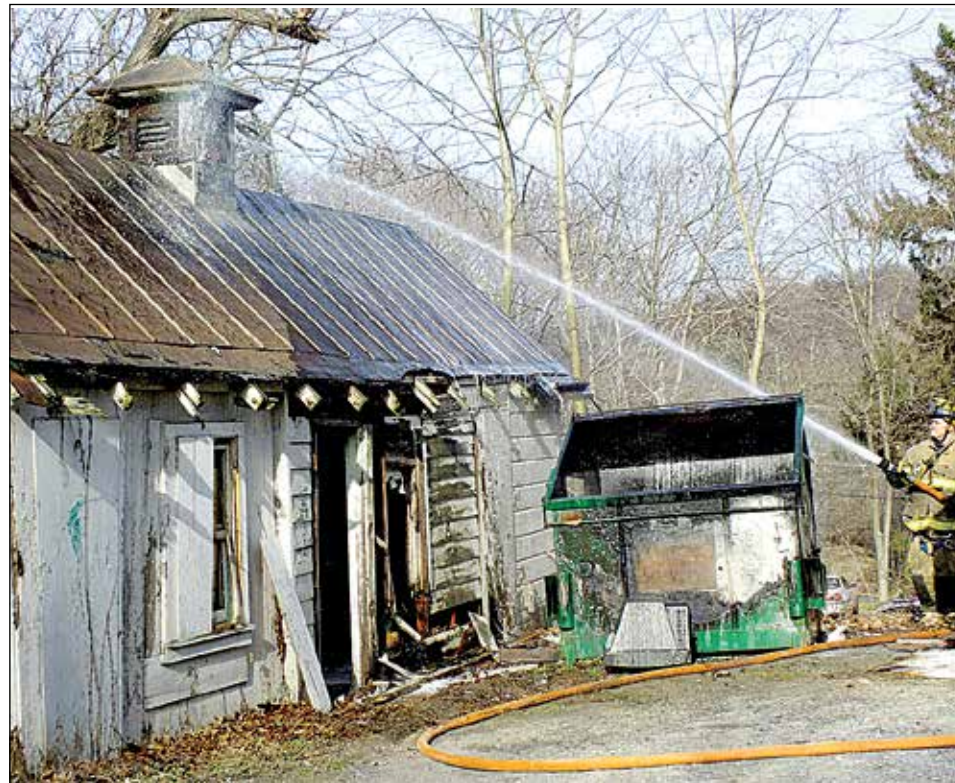

and Mobile Life Services and the county fire coordinator and the Ulster County Fire Investigation Unit were at the scene.” He said Mobile Life transported one of his firefighters to the hospital “for slight smoke inhalation [with] no life threatening issue. He was treated and released. He has gone for his physical and is back in service.”

The next day Polizzi said his company was called to a house fire at 96 Plattekill Road at 7:10 a.m. after a passerby reported it. He said an engine truck from Milton, a FAST Team from Highland and Central Hudson, the Police Department and the Ulster County Investigation Unit were called to the scene, with Middle Hope on standby in Marlboro’s quarters.

“It burned a little bit of the kitchen, the bathroom and burned a hole in the upstairs landing and started to work its way up through the hole but luckily we got there and put it out before there was any other extension [of the fire],” he said.

Polizzi said the investigative team listed the fire as accidental and “may be possible signs of plumbing work with an open torch on the first floor bathroom

wall but that has not been determined as of yet. They’re still investigating that and speaking with the plumber who was there the prior day.” He said a bank presently owns the house.

Polizzi said no one was hurt at this fire and his crew did a great job.

“They got in [and] knocked it down real quick,” he said. “They cut a hole in the roof to let all the hot gases out...The guys did a really bang up job with a limited amount of manpower. I think there were three people when we got on the scene.” By the end of the event Polizzi said there were 22 personnel at the scene.

Polizzi said they had the fire under control very quickly but continued checking for hot spots or for any extension of the fire onto the second floor or into the attic.

Polizzi said they also investigated a propane tank leak outside of a house on Saturday. They found a kinked line, shut the gas off and turned the matter over to the Marlborough Police Department “to see if they come up with anything.”

Polizzi said his company has also handled numerous brush fires in the past few

Lloyd Historical Society to sponsor program on obscure but heroic Civil War commander

Jamie Malanowski, upcoming speaker for the Town of Lloyd Historical Preservation Society (TOLHPS), was only eight years old when he saw a *Life* magazine double-page spread of a painting of Civil War Commander William Cushing sinking the Confederate ironclad CSS Albemarle. The young Malanowski was hooked – both on Civil War history in general and on the dashing young commander who led the torpedo attack on the venerable warship.

Basing his presentation on his recent book, *Commander Will Cushing: Daredevil Hero of the Civil War*, Malanowski will describe what made Cushing special at TOLHPS's Monday, April 4 program to be held at the Vineyard Commons Theater in Highland, starting at 7 p.m.

Although the young Jamie Malanowski never forgot the swashbuckling Will Cushing, other people did. Until now Cushing has probably been the most exciting Civil War hero most people never heard of. In his book, Malanowski shines a new light on the career of this stellar, but nearly forgotten, young leader.

Malanowski describes Cushing as "exciting, attractive, and impressive – a very interesting character in American history who has fallen into obscurity." Will Cushing was one of a family of brothers who had impressive Civil War records. But Will was the rebellious one, right from the time when he was a youngster who drove wagons too fast around curving roads, pulled snakes out of snake holes and organized a group of boys who called themselves the MUSS Group and marched military fashion outside his school.

However it was as a young man that Cushing gained the most notoriety by being tossed out of the Naval Academy for buffoonery four months before graduation. Then, just a few months later, the war started and he was pulled back into service at the lowest possible rank. Malanowski will tell Cushing overcame that less-than-impressive beginning to become a bold and daring commander.

Malanowski is also the author of "And the War Came," a book about the six months leading up to the Civil War, and was the primary writer for a series in the New York

Times entitled "Disunion," which took an in-depth look at the causes and events of the Civil War. But he is perhaps best known as satirical and humorous writer. He is the author of two novels, *Mr. Stupid Goes to Washington* and *The Coup*, both called "very funny" by reviewers. He was also one of the founding writer/editors for *Spy* magazine, has worked for *Time*, *Esquire*, and *Playboy*, and has written for television and the movies. The April 4 audience in Highland can expect him to be as entertaining as the "rascal" Will Cushing himself.

Vineyard Commons, where the April 4 program will take place, is at 300 Vineyard Ave., about a mile and a quarter from the Hamlet of Highland on Route 44/55, just south of the Hudson Valley Rehabilitation Center. To reach the theater, turn into Vineyard Commons and follow signs to Building 6. Early arrivers get the best parking spaces. The program is free and the public is invited. Free refreshments will be available. For more information call 255-7742.

weeks.

"Back to back, I think we had three or four in one day," he recalled. "We've had a busy month. I've got to com-

mend all the guys and the officers and everybody; they're doing what they are trained to do."

Polizzi took over the reins as Fire Chief on Jan. 12 upon the retirement of long-time Chief Bobby Troncillito. He said it has taken him a little time to get used to being in the command position as opposed to working at the operations level.

"I'm getting comfortable with it a little at a time," he said. "Now I'm in that position where they're telling me I need an engine, I need this, I need that, and amongst worrying about the whole operation of everything, you have the added responsibility of all the members. But I'm enjoying it and starting to get comfortable and settled into my seat."

Polizzi tipped his hat to Troncillito, saying he learned a great deal about the fire service from him.

"He's a phenomenal person, firematic-wise, and knows his stuff," Polizzi said.

E-prescription law goes into effect

A new law, four years in the making, went into effect this week, essentially ending the era of handwritten prescriptions by physicians with impossibly hard-to-decipher penmanship.

The new law, which went into effect on Monday, mandates that all prescriptions written in New York must now be transmitted electronically from the prescriber to the pharmacy, as part of the state's I-STOP initiative which aims to curb prescription medication abuse. Mandatory electronic prescribing is part of a larger measure known as I-STOP, or Internet System for Tracking Over-Prescribing Act, which was passed in 2012. Among the law's chief aims is reducing drug diversion and doctor shopping.

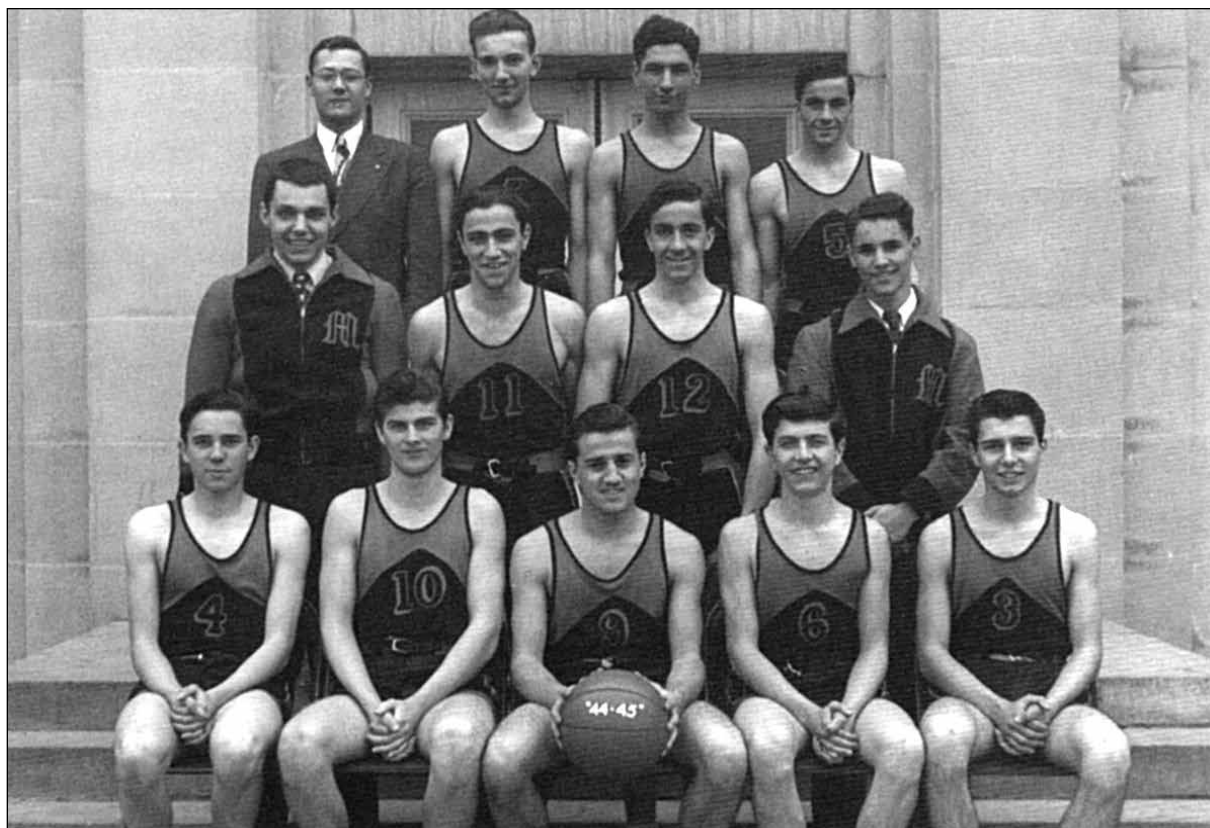
As of March 27, prescriptions can no longer be handwritten or called in to the pharmacy, except during a disaster or in the event of technological or electrical failures. In those cases, prescriptions can be handwritten on an official New York State prescription form. The law applies to all prescribers, except veterinarians, who still may use traditional paper prescription pads.

More than 60,000 medical professionals are already e-prescribing, the Associated press reports. The reform, which should make it easier for pharmacists and patients alike, is aimed at cutting down on the number of stolen or forged prescriptions. The legislation targets so-called "doctor shoppers" who visit multiple doctors and pharmacies to get multiple prescriptions for controlled substances.

Patients who look to comparison shop for the best prices on their medications can still do so before asking their doctor to electronically send their prescriptions to their preferred pharmacy.

E-prescribing is also meant to reduce the risks associated with traditional prescription script writing. Miscommunication can lead to mistakes that can put medical careers and the lives of patients at risk.

There is more. Justin Duchin played for New Paltz and is now the jayvee coach at Newburgh, and David Lostaglio was the starting catcher for New Paltz.

Adam Gerentine played and started for Rochester

Institute of Technology, Mike Giacoia played for RPI, Mike Schoonmaker at Oneonta, Billy Casey at Mt. St. Mary, Zach Kisling on a full four year scholarship at Fairleigh Dickinson, Mike DeLuca at Cairn University in Pennsylvania, Scott Oliver at the University of Tampa, where he is a pitcher, and Jackson Segnit, who is on the Cazenovia baseball team.

Years ago Sam Mandia was on scholarship for Seton Hall, where he excelled as a pitcher and then was drafted by the Toronto Blue Jays.

Marlboro schools would be number one in spending

If Marlboro School District was in Connecticut it would be first in that state in per pupil spending, but it is in Ulster County where it ranks 4th behind Onteora, Rondout and Ellenville. Ulster County school districts as a group are in the top 15 counties in the United States in per pupil spending. But the per capita income of Ulster County is \$41,648, and far below the national average of \$46,049.

Here is Ulster County per pupil spending versus Fairfield County, Conn. Fairfield is one of the wealthiest counties in the United States with a per capita income of \$98,688. Here is how they rank in per pupil spending: Onteora, \$39,299, Rondout, \$27,173, Ellenville \$24,987, Marlboro \$24,165, New Paltz, \$23,561, Kingston, \$22,538, Greenwich, \$21,687, Highland, \$20,506, Saugerties, \$20,109, Wallkill, \$20,060, Weston, \$19,996, Westport, \$19,747, New Canaan, \$19,171, Darien, \$18,584, Wilton, \$17,645, Stamford, \$17,409, Norwalk, \$16,719, Ridgefield, \$16,523, and Danbury, \$12,728.

A different way of measuring per pupil spending in Marlboro is that its superintendent Michael Brooks came from Cornwall, which has a per capita income of \$52,620, versus \$43,624 in Marlboro. Cornwall's

per pupil spending is \$18,856, compared to Marlboro's \$24,165, a difference of \$5,309 or 28%. Before Dynegy got into trouble, Marlboro was spending close to 75 percent more per pupil than Cornwall.

What's Wrong with the Conservative Party In Ulster County?

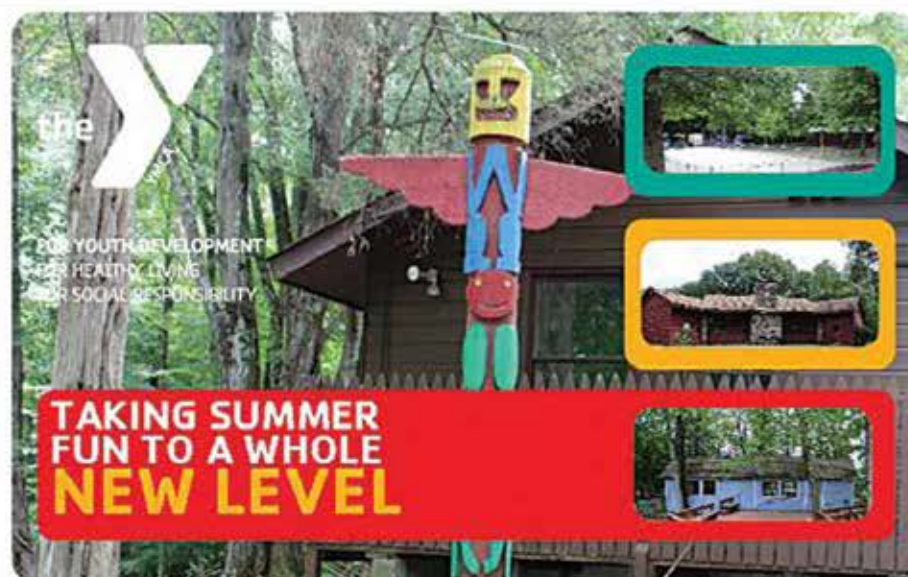

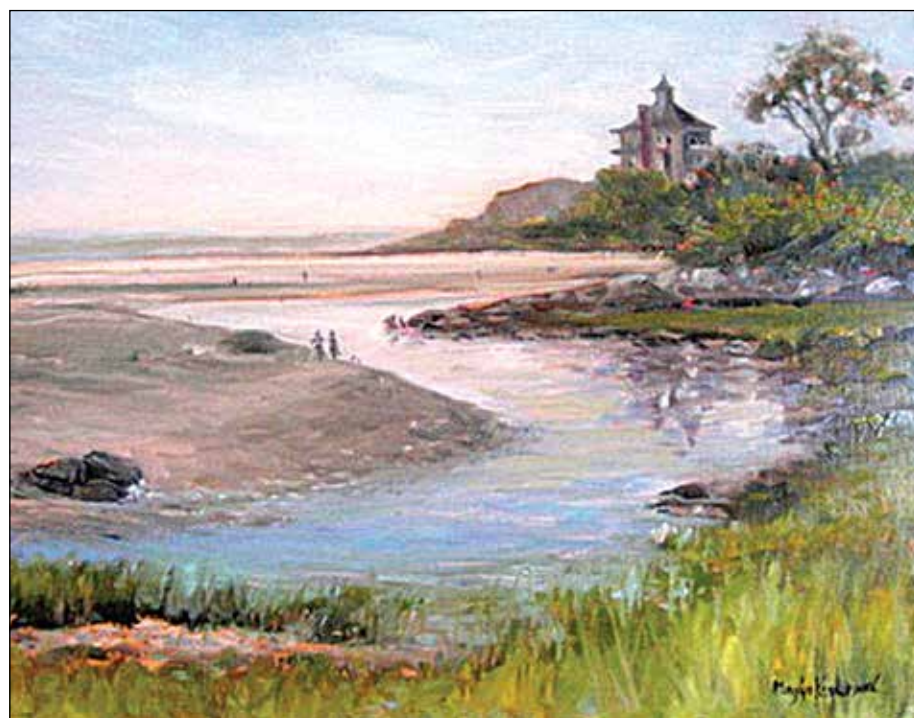
Landscape art at Wallkill River School



Islam, Women and Shari'a

Noted scholars Dr. Erin Augis and Dr. Zakia Salime, experts on the topic of women in Islamic societies, will jointly deliver a panel presentation entitled "Islam, Women and Shari'a: Case Studies from Senegal and Morocco" at 7 p.m., Wednesday, April 6 in the Gerry Forum of the Rowley Center for Science and Engineering on SUNY Orange's Middletown campus.

Augis, professor of sociology at Ramapo College, has conducted significant research on Muslim women in Senegal and West Africa. Salime, professor of sociology at Rutgers University, has published articles on her extensive study of women and Shari'a in Morocco and North Africa. Dr. Michael Strmiska, professor of world history at SUNY Orange, will introduce the speakers and moderate the presentation. Dr. Cory Harris, chair of the

College's Behavioral Sciences Department, will lead a robust post-presentation discussion. Admission to the presentation is free and the event is open to the general public.

"Shari'a is the system of Islamic law, which is based upon the Qur'an, other sacred texts, local custom, and different schools of interpretation which are constantly evolving," Strmiska explains. "Its meaning, range and application vary depending on local conditions and the views of religious and legal authorities. Some common misunderstandings of Shari'a arise from assuming that the most extreme interpretations and applications of Shari'a are the only form of Shari'a when in fact Shari'a varies considerably in different countries."

"There seem to be many fallacies and stereotypes related to Islam and its followers. Those misconceptions have infiltrated our interactions and relationships across society, often with very negative and grave consequences," says said Dr. Kristine Young, SUNY Orange president. "Some of those issues have also found their way onto college campuses across the country, including a recent event on our Middletown campus. Our two speakers have in-depth knowledge of Islam and Islamic societies, so I am quite hopeful their presentation will help us create a broader understanding of Islam, Shari'a and the status of women in Islamic societies."

The appearance by Augis and Salime is the latest in a series of events requested by Young--and organized by a wide cross-section of academic departments at SUNY Orange--to help the College address, in a thoughtful way, the topics of civility, inclusivity, political and religious differences, safety and security, race relations, and many others.

The presentation is being coordinated by the College's Global Studies and Behavioral Sciences departments, with support from the Board of Trustees, Office of the President, SUNY Orange Foundation, Committee on Institutional Diversity and Equity, and the academic departments of Criminal Justice, Arts and Communication, Occupational Therapy Assistant, and Interdisciplinary Studies. Attorney to speak on 'Three Strikes Law'

In the United States, nearly half of the states have habitual offender laws which are statutes enacted by state governments mandating courts to impose harsher

sentences on those convicted of an offense if previously convicted of two prior serious criminal offenses. In some states, individuals accused under these laws are referred to as persistent offenders or prior and persistent offenders.

On Thursday, April 7, at 11a.m., well-known Hudson Valley attorney Jonna Spilbor will speak on this subject, The Three Strikes Law. The presentation, which is free and open to the public, will take place in the Orange County Trust

Company Great Room 101 at Kaplan Hall.

"There is a real debate about whether Three Strikes does what it was intended to do," says Spilbor. During the lecture Spilbor will give an overview of the criminal process in order to put Three Strikes into perspective.

Spilbor is licensed to practice law in three of the nation's most influential jurisdictions - New York, California, and the District of Columbia. Within that domain, she operates Jonna Spilbor Law based in Poughkeepsie. She also founded the "Jonna Spilbor Law, Positively Divorced Empowerment Workshops." Currently, she is among the few elite attorneys in the Hudson Valley who is a member of the National College for DUI Defense.

In addition, she writes a blog "The Gutsy Girls Guide to Getting Divorced" and her in-depth legal analysis of celebrity criminal cases has been featured nationally

in Variety Magazine, The San Francisco Recorder, the Los Angeles Daily Journal, and at CNN.com. She is the resident legal expert on talk radio shows, WPDH, 101.5 FM and Mix, 97.7 FM and as an outspoken attorney, columnist, and legal analyst, she appears regularly on the Fox News Channel, the Fox Business Network and other television networks, most recently on "Paul Dean's E! True Hollywood Story." She formerly was a regular contributing columnist for Findlaw's Writ.

After graduating from Thomas Jefferson School of Law in San Diego, she served in the San Diego City Attorney's Office, Criminal Division, and the Office of the US Attorney in the Drug Task Force and Appellate units. Her work with wayward youth earned her a certification as a Court Appointed Special Advocate in the San Diego Juvenile Court. In addition, she received special recognition by the San Diego bench for her work in the area of Three Strikes defense. Spilbor is considered to be a California death penalty scholar. Her research has been published in the San Diego Justice Journal.

Marlborough officers honored for saving lives

thorough training and prompt action Sgt. Pascale was able to save an individual's life. The Town of Marlborough hereby presents this commendation and appreciation on his dedicated service to the community."

Coccozza honored two others, Officers Robert Doviken and Richard Pagano who were together and "fortunately had each other to hold onto" when they responded to a call on March 12, 2016 for the overdose of an adult male who was unconscious at a home in Marlboro.

"Theirs' was involving a family and the emotions that go with it. When they responded to this call they were advised that CPR was in progress," said Coccozza, adding that again, through the officer's quick actions they saved a life.

Supervisor Al Lanzetta and the members of the board thanked the officers for

their service to the public in these critical situations.

In an interview, Coccozza described how Narcan is administered.

"It looks like a syringe that has an atomizer at the end of it and no actual needle part. You take this syringe and you put it to the patient's nose and you squirt it into their nostril. The body ingests it and it counteracts the effects of opiates," he said. "It takes a few minutes but it negates the opiate high and brings the respiratory and heart rate back. Usually after Narcan the patients are fine, like nothing ever happened." He said after spraying one nostril with the syringe an officer waits to see if there is a reaction but if there is nothing, then a second syringe is administered in the other nostril.

Coccozza pointed out that even if an officer makes an incorrect diagnosis and administers Narcan, "the worst that the

patient's going to suffer is a wet nostril."

Coccozza pointed out that by law no arrest is made when someone calls for help or on someone who has overdosed, however, any drugs are confiscated and later destroyed.

"The idea behind it [law] was they didn't want anybody to not call 911 to help somebody because they were in fear of going to jail or being arrested," he said. "This increases the chances of helping someone who might have overdosed."

Coccozza said these officers put their training to good use.

"They used the product and it worked well and were able to save lives; the drug is amazing," he said. "To go there and see the gasp of death and the victim is physically dead and CPR is being performed and Narcan is administered - within a minute they're back, normal, they're up, they're talking or fighting or vomiting but they're alive again. When you save

someone's life that in itself is amazing, no matter what you did to save that person's life. This Narcan training is sort of a miracle and these two people would have been dead for sure had the officers not had that medication and/or the training."

Coccozza said today street heroin is often cut with fentanyl, a synthetic opiate analgesia that is similar but far more potent than morphine. He said drug dealers do this to stretch the heroin and make more money.

Coccozza praised his officers.

"They took good action and used cool, calm [and] collected reasoning and administered the drug just like they were trained to do and fortunately in these circumstances the patients survived and they're lucky to be alive because of the actions of those officers," he said. "They did a very good job."

Farm to table

Program discusses sustainable agriculture in the city

“Community-oriented work and specifically Community Based Agriculture, is a powerful driver...” says Dave Llewellyn, Director of Farmer Training at Glynwood, an agricultural nonprofit organization that works toward ensuring the Hudson Valley is a region defined by food through the implementation of sustainable farming.

Llewellyn will come to Kaplan Hall’s Orange County Trust Company Great Room 101 to speak on farming within the domain of the city on Monday, April 4, at 7 p.m.

In a time when the “farm to table” concept is everyday talk, Community Based Agriculture is, indeed, a practical way for neighbors to grow good foods while enjoying local public spaces in an atmosphere of outdoor education. Along the way, unkempt vacant lots may be turned into vibrant food producers and those who cultivate these spots of land learn about soil health, adaptation, collaboration, and sustainable, resilient farming that promote wellness through exercise, volunteerism, and community building whereby all ages and backgrounds work together.

Llewellyn will describe how food connects us all and gives us a direct connection to the natural order in the world and the opportunity of the therapeutic experience of serenity in a garden. He will explain what is meant by a “sustainable food system” as well as the many places that community gardens/farms can be set-up through ingenuity and innovation. Throughout the presentation, he will give

a broad view of a food production system that balances environmental, social, and economic benefits while delivering food security –knowing the food is safe to eat and that a good, safe food supply exists.

Llewellyn oversees Glynwood’s farmer apprentice program and the Hudson Valley Farm Business Incubator, in addition to contributing to other regional farm education and land access efforts. He coordinates on-farm composting and soil fertility for Glynwood’s vegetable operation,

pastures, and hayfields. Before coming to Glynwood, Llewellyn worked on diversified, sustainable farms for many years. He apprenticed at the Massachusetts Audubon Society’s Drumlin Farm and managed organic vegetable gardens for Heifer International’s Overlook Farm. Dave holds a BA in Political Science from Susquehanna University and a Certificate in Nonprofit Management from SUNY Purchase.

This lecture presentation, which is free and open to the public, is offered as part of the Cultural Affairs programming series

and in collaboration with the Newburgh Urban Farming Fair. The NUFF is looking to create community gardening/farming within Newburgh and to help to educate the residents of Newburgh and anyone who is interested in establishing community focused farming in other municipalities.

The students raised the money by sitting outside of Frank's Deli and Hannaford's.

"We had signs stating what our cause was and who we were trying to raise money for and people donated both items and money," DeCrosta said.

Last October was the first period of fundraising, with distribution of the items in November and December. The second phase took place last week at the Community Room of Jenny's Garden.

Terry Melita helped the students place some of their fliers in buildings and coordinated the delivery times of the products. Her son, Marc, Haidaoui and Stephens raised money in front of Sawyer Savings Bank and purchased the needed items from several local stores.

The students estimated they collectively raised \$500 for the purchase of the items.

Richard Gerentine, who developed both senior facilities, said a mother of one of the honor students contacted him about their proposed project.

"I think it was a very big hit with the tenants and I think the individuals enjoyed doing it and they were very successful," he said.

Gerentine said this was the first time this has happened at his senior complexes.

"I am grateful that they chose my developments to participate," he said. "I know the residents really appreciated it, not only the products but the conversa-

"I am very pleased with what I got, very nice," she said. "They got me body wash. I don't know where they got it, it is so nice, and mouthwash and a toothbrush. A very nice young man brought it to the door for me."

Toni Reina said the student's program was "beautiful."

"It was very nice, everybody loves it," she said.

Local dentist Dr. Anthony Pascale, who donated the toothbrushes and toothpaste, said he was (and still is) a member of the National Honor Society.

"I always try to help out whenever I can with the community, whether it's the school or the senior citizens. If I can be generous and help them out, I certainly enjoy doing that, whether donating supplies or services," he said.

Forum on the history behind Newburgh's monuments

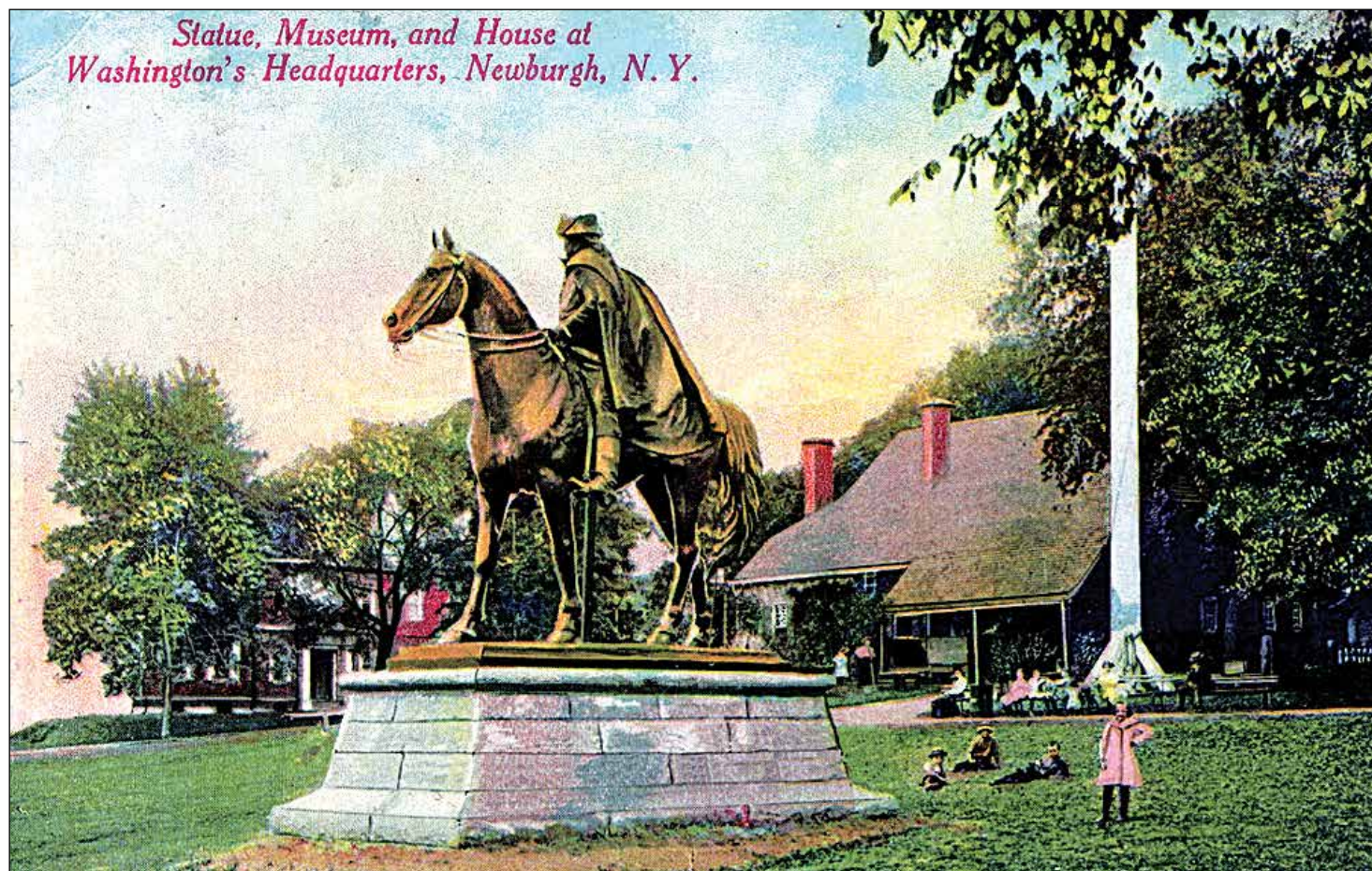
Newburgh is a monumental city. The Newburgh Historical Society welcomes members and guests on Sunday, April 3 for an opening day that will include a slide presentation entitled "Monumental Newburgh." Starting at 2 p.m., a panel led by Society member Tom Knieser will showcase the many beautiful sculptures and memorials installed in the city. There is a story behind the motivation and creation of each public monument.

"In the years we traveled with our kids to various cities, the outdoor sculptures became a part of the memory," Knieser reflected on how he came to appreciate the topic.

There are two dozen examples scattered throughout the City of Newburgh, which have become lasting elements of the city's landscape offering unique lenses into a local heritage.

One noted 19th century Newburgh sculptor, Henry Kirke Brown, designed monuments for the U.S. Capitol and West Point. His sculpture of George Clinton, Revolutionary War General, first governor of New York and twice Vice-President of the United States, once graced the Newburgh waterfront.

Architect, John H. Duncan, oversaw the construction of the imposing Tower of Victory at Washington's Headquarters. Duncan would be best known for his "Grant's Tomb" in Manhattan and the

World War II Memorial at the foot of Broadway.

soldiers and sailors Memorial Arch at the entrance to Prospect Park in Brooklyn.

Other works memorialize war veterans, volunteer firemen, Martin Luther King and honor those who fell victim to the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11. Some have not survived the test of time, like a World War II memorial that once sat at the foot of Broadway and a plaster model that honored Revolutionary War General Anthony Wayne.

The panelists will expand our awareness of these works through their knowledge of history and foster an appreciation for their presence within the community. The speakers include Elyse B. Goldberg, Historic Site Manager at Washington's Headquarters; Mary McTamane, City of Newburgh Historian; and David McTamane, veteran support advocate and a founding member of Habitat For Humanity of Greater Newburgh.

The forum will take place at the Captain David Crawford House, located on 189 Montgomery St. in Newburgh. Admission is \$5 per person and free to members of the Society. For more information please call 561-2585 or visit their website, newburghhistoricalsociety.com.

The Historical Society of Newburgh Bay and the Highlands was launched unofficially when the Hasbrouck House (Washington's Headquarters Newburgh) was in danger of demolition after the Revolutionary War. The current Society, incorporated in 1884, has always been an advocate for Newburgh's history. The Society's headquarters, 1830 Captain David Crawford House, was purchased in 1954 to save it from demolition and symbolizes their dedication to preserving and protecting Newburgh's assets.

The Crawford House, a historic house museum and Society's headquarters is located at 189 Montgomery St. within the City of Newburgh's Historic District is open for tours on Sundays between 1 and 4 p.m. or by appointment. View the "Growing Up In Newburgh" exhibit, a community exhibit featuring the photographs and memories of Newburgh from the 19th century through the 20th century. 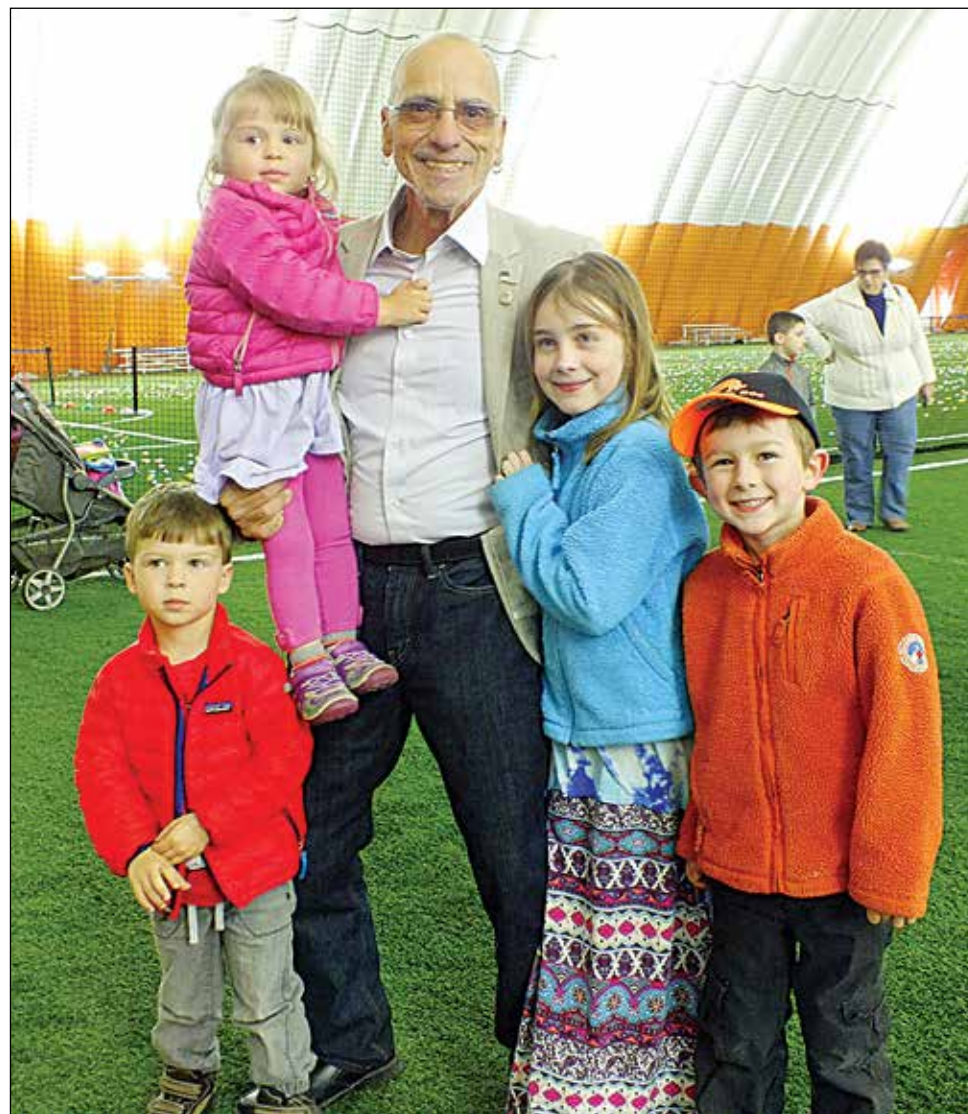
Corcoran said the Easter Egg hunt at the Sportsdome is "becoming a nice tradition [and] their donating the facility helps us

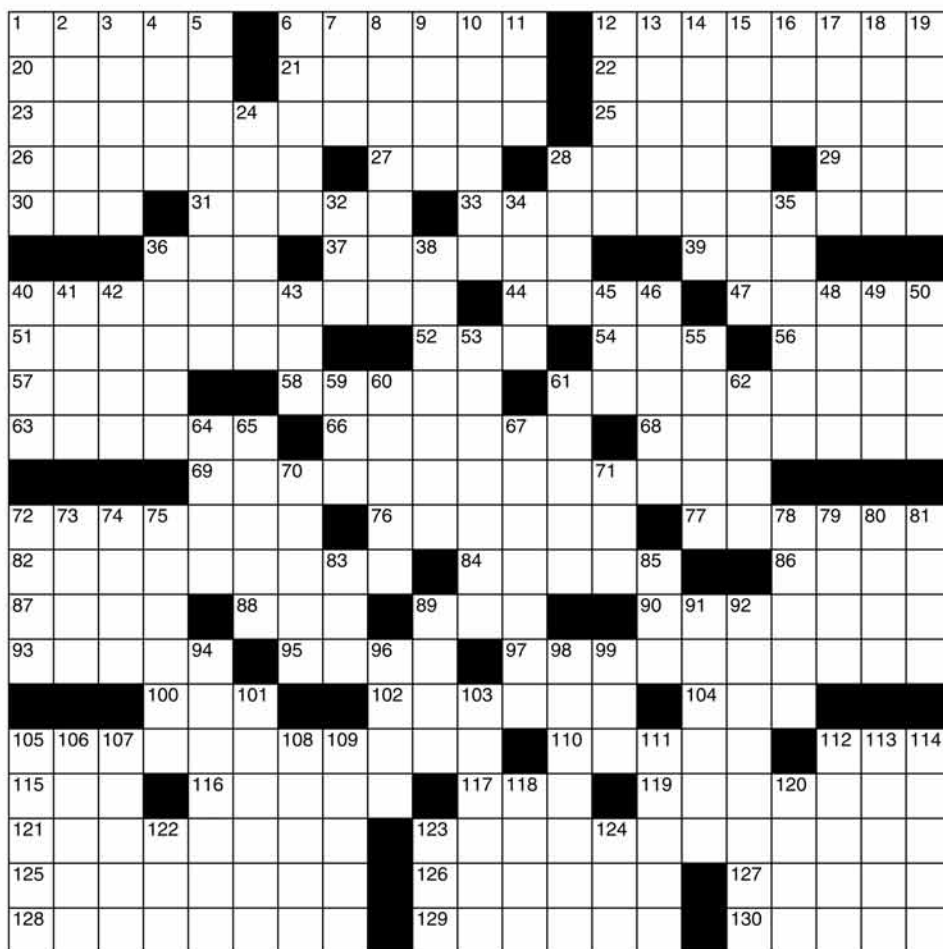

Each petition must be directed to the office of the District Clerk, must be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the

District, must state the residence of each signer and must state the name and residence of the candidate.
