Orange County Veterans Memorial Cemetery will host Wreaths Across America ceremony on December 18

Orange County's Veterans Memorial Cemetery will host a Wreaths Across America (WAA) ceremony at noon on December 18. The event will be held rain or shine.

"The feedback we have received from hosting Wreaths Across America ceremonies in the past has been tremendous and we look forward to this year's in-person event," Orange County Executive Steven M. Neuhaus said. "It is a truly wonderful way to bring our community together during the holiday season and pay tribute to those who served our country. It also highlights our County's beautifully maintained Veterans Cemetery."

During the WAA ceremony, the County will also display its "Tree of Heroes" which will be adorned with pictures of veterans and their loved ones, along with notes written to them from children throughout the County. The 19-acre Veterans Memorial Cemetery has 13,400 plots and has 3,600 veterans and their spouses currently interred there.

Wreaths, which are \$15 each or three for \$30, can be purchased at the Veterans Service Agency (VSA), located at 111 Craigville Road in Goshen or online through the WAA website (wreathsacrossamerica.org) using search code NYOCVM. The tradition of laying wreaths to honor veterans began in 1992, when Morrill Worcester, the owner of Worcester Wreath Company in Harrington, Maine, had extra wreaths at the end of the holiday season. Worcester remembered a boyhood trip to Arlington National Cemetery in Washington, D.C. and decided to donate 5,000 wreaths to be placed on the headstones of an older section of

the cemetery. By 2014, Wreaths Across America and its national network of volunteers laid over 700,000 memorial wreaths at 1,000 locations in the United States and beyond, including ceremonies at the Pearl Harbor Memorial, Bunker Hill, Valley Forge, and the sites of the September 11 tragedies.

WAA ceremonies are celebrated at the same exact time at more than 2,500 cemeteries in the U.S. and abroad, with nearly two million wreaths placed to honor our veterans.

"The Wreaths Across America ceremony allows us to honor those

who have sacrificed their lives for this great country in a special way," said Christian Farrell, the County's Veterans Service Agency Director. "We are proud to once again take part in this meaningful event with our partners in the veteran community. The County's goal is to put a wreath on every grave in the cemetery and, with the support and volunteerism of the community, that goal is well within reach."



Stewart Marine Corps reserve unit gets new commander

Marine Corps Reserve Lt. Col. Timothy K. Gallagher has taken command of Marine Aircraft Group 49, Detachment B, at Stewart Air National Guard Base. He replaces Lt. Col. Jared K. Stone.

Marine Aircraft Group Detachment B-better known as MAG-49 Det. B-is a Site Support unit responsible for Marine Aircraft Group-49. The Site Command provides installation, administrative, logistical, medical, and family support for Marine Aviation Logistics Squadron 49 and Marine Aerial Refueler Transport Squadron 452, while also supporting normal independent duty functions to include management of military funeral honors and color guard details, Toys 4 Tots, and other community relations activities.

Gallagher graduated from the Naval Academy in 2003 with a Bachelor of Science in Political Science.

After completing the Basic School, he underwent flight training before being designated a Naval Aviator in August 2005 and reporting to VMGRT-253 at Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point for training as a KC-130 pilot.

He deployed to Al Asad, Iraq from July 2007 to February 2008 in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom while assigned to VMGR-352.

In March of 2009, Gallagher was selected to be an Olmsted Scholar and assigned to Paris, France. He completed the French Basic Course with honors at the Defense Language Institute in Monterey in February 2010 before proceeding to France. He completed his Master's degree in International Security at the Paris Institute of Political Science (Sciences Po) between 2010 and 2012. During his time at Sciences Po, Gallagher also completed an internship at the French Army's Center for Doctrine and Military Studies

Gallagher was Director of Safety and Standardization (DSS), and Assistant Operations Officer from August 2012 to November 2015 and completed the Weapons and Tactics Instructor Course in the spring of 2013 before deploying with Marine Air Group-Afghanistan from January to July 2014 where he served as the MAG's Future Operations Officer.


He also deployed with Special Purpose Marine Air and Ground Task Force Crisis Response Central Command as the VMGR Executive Officer and Operations Officer from April 2015 to August 2015 in support of Operation Inherent Resolve.

In 2015, Gallagher was ordered to attend the French Military School where he completed the French Army's Combined Arms Course and the French Command and Staff Course. Following his graduation, Gallagher again reported to VMGR-352, where he served as the squadron's Operations Officer from 2018 to 2019.

Ordered to the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations) staff in July of 2019, Gallagher served as the KC-130 Requirements Officer until his selection and assignment to command of Marine Aircraft Group 49 Det. B in 2021.

Gallagher is married to the former Meaghan Szermer Harris with whom he has three children, Timothy, Samuel, and Maggie.

His personal decorations include the Meritorious Service Medal (2nd award), Air Medal with bronze numeral 4, Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal (2nd award), and the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal.


