Venning promises a tax decrease

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The proposed City of Newburgh 2023 budget was presented to the city council and general public on Tuesday, October 11 with new position considerations, continued decrease in tax rates and goals to address ongoing department needs. It was prepared by Newburgh City Manager Todd Venning, along with City Comptroller Janice Gaston.

Venning stated to the city council and public that the currently proposed budget before them was difficult to balance due to the inflation and cost increases across the country. However, the city was able to reduce overtime projections of about a million dollars. In the last several weeks according to Venning, the city had received a final stress score of 0 from New York State Comptroller Thomas DiNapoli, a decreasing environmental stress score for three years in a row and an A3 bond rating by Moody's Investment Services.

Several listed goals for the city with this budget included keeping service levels at a high rate, enhancing operational capacity and oversight which will lead to higher performance by the city's departments, and increase utility user fees. One specific goal that has been discussed at most meetings over the past few months has been the city's codes department which with the proposed budget will look to increase the size of that specific department.

The first public presentation made by Venning was on the General Fund for

'Everything Must Go' Newburgh Sears closes its doors

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After more than 70 years, Sears is no longer a part of the Newburgh Community

The retail chain officially closed its Newburgh Mall location on Sunday, October 16. No decisions have been announced on what the future holds for the space.

On August 31, Sears Newburgh released a statement via their Facebook page to make their customers aware of their closure. Facebook comments in the thread shared sadness and memories of either working at the store location or shopping there for their goods. "Its with a heavy heart to be announcing the Sears Store at the Newburgh Mall is closing its doors on October 16. We want to thank the

community for its support over the last 43 years here in the Newburgh Mall."

The Sears location at the mall was reported to have been the last remaining Sears location in the Hudson Valley while many across the country were reported to have closed. The well known and recognized box store

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Life among the Giants

San Miguel Academy rowers honored at MetLife Stadium

The San Miguel Rowing Program was honored by the NY Giants at MetLife Stadium on Sunday as part of Hispanic Heritage Month. San Miguel rowers were invited onto the field during a timeout and presented with the "Local Latino Achievement Award."

Ann Mara Cacase, representing the Mara Family and the Giants Organization, presented San Miguel Rowing with a check for \$25,000 wearing a special 'San Miguel' Giants jersey. San Miguel Rowing, part of San Miguel Academy of Newburgh, is one of the largest hispanic rowing programs in the country. Last June, San Miguel Academy rowers placed 11th overall at the US Rowing National Youth Championships in Sarasota, Florida after qualifying for Nationals in May with a solid first-place finish in the U15 quad division at the USRowing Northeast Youth Championships in Lowell, Massachusetts. The Northeast is one of the most competitive divisions in the country.

San Miguel Academy of Newburgh was founded in 2006 to break the cycle of poverty through education. The rowing program was established in 2010 with a small group of boys in borrowed equipment and hand-me-down boats. Over the years, the

program has grown to over 40 rowers, boys and girls, who train year-round on Ergometers and, weather permitting, on the Hudson River. San Miguel Rowing is now among the largest middle school rowing programs in the country, as well as the largest minority rowing program, and has proven to be significantly beneficial to obtaining continuing educational opportunities for San Miguel Academy students.

"It is such an honor to be nominated by the Giants for Hispanic History Month. With so many of our students having diverse cultures and coming from different backgrounds, it is such an incredible opportunity to be recognized by a great organization such as the NFL," said Caitlin Giampaolo, a humanities teacher and rowing coach for San Miguel. "All of our rowers work extremely hard, every day, to hone their craft. The rowing programs' motto is "hard work pays off." All of our rowers dedicate their time and effort to our program in hopes of a better future. We appreciate this opportunity and recognition as we continue to make a name for ourselves, and build our program into a successful future."

"The NY Giants organization has always stood for integrity and hard work. San Miguel Academy rowers

are especially proud that the Giants have singled them out for Latino achievement," said Father Mark Connell, Executive Director and rowing coach for the San Miguel Program. "Our rowers work hard 6 days a week, both in the classroom and in the boat. We are all grateful that our student-athletes have been recognized by the NY Giants and the NFL."

"Our coaches are inspirational because every time I think about giving up, they tell me to keep going. Before I started rowing, I used to give up pretty easily. I tell myself to keep rowing and keep trying because it's all worth it in the end," said sixth grader Isabella Luna. "In rowing, you all have to work together and keep trying in order for the boat to move. My boat came in third in our first regatta. We were really excited. It shows that hard work pays off."

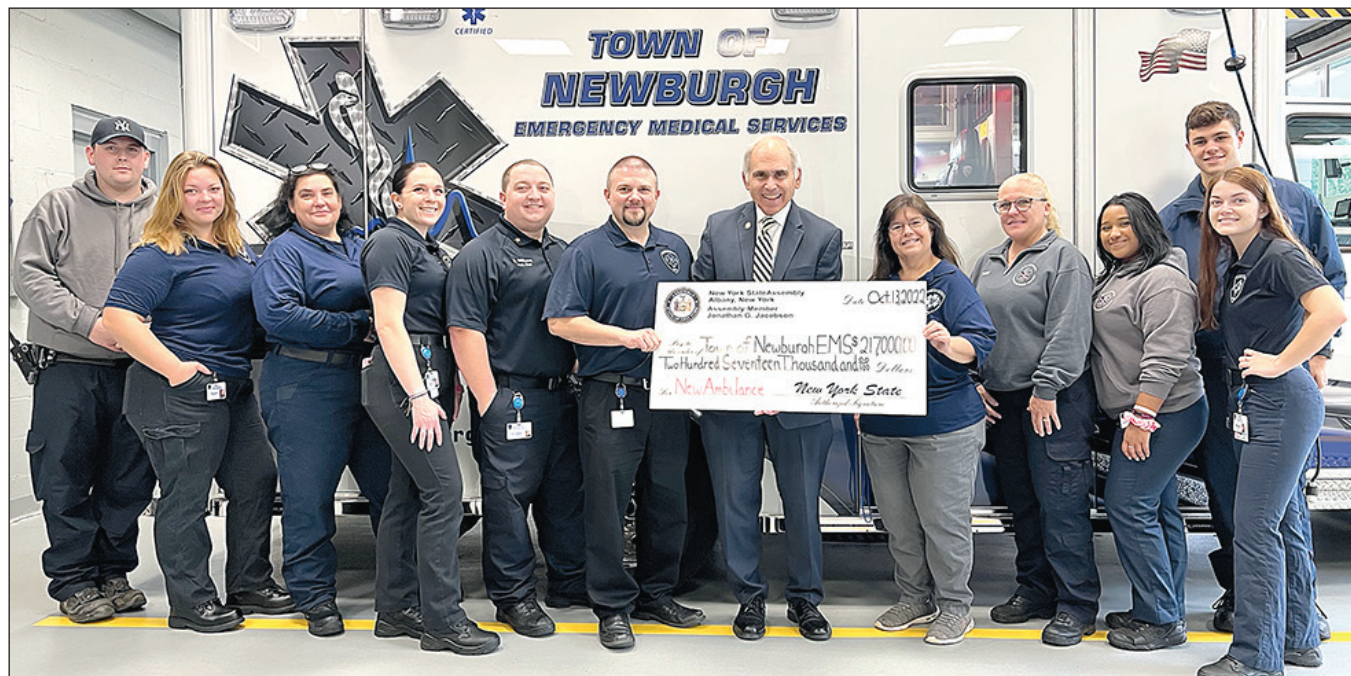
"When I heard we were going to the Giants game to be honored, I was excited for the hard work that we did and happy for everything that my team has done," said sixth grader Emiliano Cervantes. "As the coxswain, I motivate my team to work together and keep trying. I tell them to not give up and take more power with their strokes."

Jacobson announces funding for town EMS

Assemblyman Jonathan Jacobson [D-Newburgh] presented a check in the amount of \$217,000 to the Town of Newburgh Emergency Medical Services Inc. [TONEMS] to help in the pursuit of a new state of the art ambulance to be added to their fleet.

In his opening remarks, Jacobson recognized the work between his office and TONEMS Executive Director Christopher Napolitano and Chief Bryan Williams in bringing in a new state of the art ambulance rig to their station. This ambulance will have a load system that will help reduce injuries to patients who are being transported. "They explained what they needed, they were saying that they have three ambulances but two are usually in the shop, and which cost them a lot of money. And that puts a lot of wear and tear on the one remaining one," said Jacobson. "This was an important investment in our community."

"We had a great meeting, it was very informative on both sides of how the process looks. Within weeks, we were able to get paperwork started and rolling, and went through the whole process in his office," said Napolitano. "Assemblyperson Jacobson was there

for us during COVID. And, you know, when he came here to drop off supplies to us, he said, you know, if there's anything you need in your travels, let me know, reach out and that's exactly

what we did," said Williams. "He truly meant what he said when he offered his help."

According to Napolitano, the ambulance itself is still being

constructed and built and going through certain background checks and work. The anticipated time period of when the ambulance should arrive would be by the end of next year or so.

Newburgh urban renewal land to be redeveloped

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The site development agreement between the City of Newburgh and Kearney Realty & Development Group for the redevelopment of properties at 140 and 146 Montgomery St. and 137 Smith St passed with a 6-1 vote on Tuesday, October 11.

Request for proposals [RFPs] had been sent out by the city seeking to redevelop the parcels that have remained vacant for years. Two submissions for redevelopment were submitted to the city council by The Kearney Group, along with Liberty Street Partners.

Both firms presented their own ideas and presentations for redevelopment of the land and both project submissions were reviewed by the mayor's Strategic Economic Development Committee [SEDAC]. Members of SEDAC appeared before the city council and voiced their support of the Kearney

Group's proposal over the other proposal. The Kearney Group's project proposes a mixed-use mixed-income development on the three parcels with a central greenway, an on-site property manager and several retail spaces. The properties, which consist of several wooded areas, are adjacent to the Horizons-on-the-Hudson Elementary School, the Varick Homes apartments and the Bourne Apartments.

One of the major discussion points involving this project for the past few months was the recognition of the land as designated Urban Renewal land within the city. The process of Urban Renewal came into the city during the 1960s and properties along the Newburgh Waterfront and East End neighborhoods were destroyed. Most of the properties in that proportion of the city were notably owned by Black homeowners and business owners. Today, there are several hills along Water St. that have remained vacant

for years and the Newburgh Waterfront properties on the opposite side of the CSX rail line have remained and serve as attractions for residents and city visitors. Conservation efforts have led to the creation of the East End Historic District [EEHD] that remains.

A digital media project, funded by the National Park Service African

American Civil Rights Program Grant in the amount of \$50,000, was to be conducted through the Sound and Story Project of the Hudson Valley. No public updates to this particular project have been made since a public meeting was held back in July at the Boys and Girls Club.

Alleged sexual predator arrested

On October 13, the Orange County Child Abuse Unit in conjunction with Orange County Child Protective Services arrested Jose Ramos Alonzo, age 33, of Newburgh.

Investigation determined Alonzo engaged in a course of sexual conduct with a child less than eleven years old. He was subsequently arrested for Predatory Sexual Assault of a Child, a class A-II felony, and Endangering the Welfare of a Child, a class A misdemeanor.

Alonzo was arraigned before Judge Noreen Calderin of the Town of New Windsor Court and remanded to the Orange County Jail without bail. He was next scheduled to reappear before the court on October 14, 2022.

Lake Street re-opens

The bridge and roadway of Lake Street (NY 32) through the City of Newburgh has been reopened. Crews have completed the rehabilitation of the bridge that carries Lake Street (NY 32) over the Quassaick Creek. The previous temporary bridge has been disassembled and the roadway stabilized and repaved.

Four-county chase ends in bridge crash

A four-county car chase involving police and a suspect in a Rockland County attempted murder has resulted in the arrest of the man on I-84 near the Newburgh-Beacon Bridge.

Forty-six-year-old Todd Humphrey is in the custody of the Clarkstown Police Department after the widespread pursuit. He has been described by police as a murder suspect.

Clarkstown Police said Humphrey allegedly assaulted his girlfriend with a hammer at the Tappan Zee hotel. The victim was able to escape the room and get the attention of a hotel staffer who dialed 911.

When police got to the scene, Humphrey was gone. An alert was sent out to all police in the region to look for his vehicle.

At about 1:30 p.m., he was located by State Police in Putnam County where a vehicle pursuit began.

He eventually made his way into Dutchess County on I-84, over the Newburgh-Beacon Bridge, traveling in the wrong direction, until he eventually crashed and was taken into custody. The crash was reported

to involve the suspect's vehicle, a tractor-trailer, a state police vehicle, and other vehicles.

The suspect and another driver sustained minor injuries in the crash.

Humphrey was taken into custody at the accident scene by the state police.

Traffic on and around I-84 was at a virtual standstill Monday afternoon as a result of the incident.

Orange County to provide active shooter training to educators

Orange County Executive Steven M. Neuhaus, the Orange County Sheriff's Office and Orange County Emergency Management, in collaboration with Orange-Ulster BOCES Department of Health and Safety, the New York State Police and local law enforcement and first responders, will hold an active shooter drill at 1 p.m. on Tuesday, November 8.

The drill, which will be staged on the Orange-Ulster BOCES campus in Goshen, is not open to the public.

"Keeping Orange County's students and residents safe is of the highest priority and I think this training will help," Neuhaus said. "Our hope is that our educators will never need to utilize what they learn. However, as County officials, we want to make sure they possess the knowledge and information that will enable them to survive in an active shooter situation."

Orange County Sheriff Carl E. DuBois added: "In law enforcement, we train for something we hope never happens. If this training can interrupt or terminate an active shooter situation and save lives, it is well worth the time and effort invested. The primary goal of this presentation is to stress the need for preparedness and through this training, the safety of our citizens, especially our students, will be enhanced."

The training exercise will focus on emergency response to an active shooter incident on campus and will involve a simulation of law enforcement response to an active shooter. It will help assure a coordinated, timely, and effective response in the event of a major incident.

The exercise will also educate attendees as to how to recognize signs of potential violence at schools, how to respond to an active shooting or other violent situation, and how to create an emergency action plan. Residents should expect to see an influx of law enforcement and other first responders at Orange-Ulster BOCES starting at approximately 8 a.m. on that Tuesday.

"I want to thank County Executive Neuhaus, the agencies involved in this exercise, Orange-Ulster BOCES Director of Operations Mark Coleman, Assistant Director of Facilities Joseph Russo, Emergency Management Technician Duane Lopez and our hard-working staff for putting together this

City's new aquatic center still three years away

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Newburgh City Council approved the execution of a contract with engineering firm Clark Patterson Lee [CPL] in the amount of \$804,000 for professional engineering services at Delano-Hitch Park. This approval begins the process of pursuing a brand new aquatic center for the City of Newburgh.

The current pool site at the park features the existing pool and waterslide combination, additional side parking lot and check in building with changing facilities. The pool has remained closed since the beginning of the pandemic and is in need of repair and remediation.

CPL had appeared before the city council in June with the proposals of splash pads and varying pool construction and amenities. CPL Engineers returned Thursday, September 8 with a revised master plan. The pool site featured a community sized pool, starting blocks, new multi-use building with locker rooms, new restroom facilities, concession stand, equipment and storage rooms and additional office space for the recreation department. However, CPL presented to the city council that the firm's anticipated time of

completion for this project would not be until 2025, around Memorial Day Weekend during their public presentation.

Council members were not happy with the timeline as this would be more time for city residents to wait for the new aquatic center. Several council members had commented that residents have contacted them out of frustration about not having a pool facility still available to them and their families.

During the previous city's work session on Thursday, October 6, City Manager Todd Venning stated to the council that the city would not know the cost of the pool until bids are sent out but as of October 6, the project cost could be \$14 million. In addition, the American Rescue Plan Act [ARPA] funds along with the possibility of bonding would be needed going forward with the pool costs if the council saw fit to move forward. With the rising costs of supplies and unable to conduct construction projects during COVID, these factors have contributed to the increase in cost for the city going into this project.

"The pool situation was something that we inherited and I think that should be made very clear to the community," said Councilman Anthony Grice. "I liked everything about CPL's design, they are a

City of Newburgh business, the only thing I did not like was the timeline."

"We have been living with a substandard pool for many years. One that's constantly needed repair and really wasn't done right the first way 20 years ago," said Councilman Robert Sklarz. "We need to move forward on this."

While the pool will be under construction, splash pads will be available to the community to offer outdoor aquatic activities. One is currently at Audrey Carey Park, one was being installed at Tyrone Crabb Park and another was to be completed at Xavier Lunan Park in the Heights. Most of the proposed water activities will take place at the park and will be available to the public to enjoy during the hot summer months.

"We're working with the rec director [Matthew Nordt] reaching out to some of the other community pools to see if we can coordinate some kind of summer schedule, with either the school district or the Mount [Saint Mary College]," said Venning. We're also coordinating some kind of camps that will be able to take children to water parks."

the city which is currently proposed at \$63.78 million. The city's budget general fund in 2022 was previously adopted at \$54.5 million. "The city operates several funds. We have a general fund which is our chief operating, and we have three enterprise funds which include water, sewer and sanitation," said Venning.

The highest revenue sources for the city listed in order started with the real property tax at \$23.6 million. This figure saw an increase of \$607, 207 over 2022. The non property tax at \$16.5 million saw an increase of \$2.73 million over 2022 and state aid at \$11.3 million with an increase of \$3.35 million over 2022. These revenue sources saw increases along with several other categories going into 2023. The only two categories in the General Fund that decreased were the Real Property Taxes (Other) and Department Income. Another alternative revenue source that will assist the city is the hotel tax that was passed by the state assembly, state senate and the office of Governor Kathy Hochul. "We will be able to implement that in the future and what that means is that [hotel tax] will be another revenue source that, is not

derived from the taxpayers," Venning said.

Discussing the expenses portion of the budget, the salary line at \$20.5 million and benefits line at \$17.2 million are the highest percentages out of the budget. Both budget lines make up 59% of the proposed budget. Continuing on with the budget, Venning briefly touched upon the budget with the police department that salaries could see increases, but are not guaranteed. Salary increases could then address the retention difficulties within the police department. Other plans for the police department in the proposed budget include equipment upgrades, searches for new facilities, additional training and reduction to the overtime.

Venning continued along with addressing the codes department that has been mentioned many times in previous council meetings by the public. "The codes department needs significant improvement. So, one of the things that this budget calls for by working with myself and, the department heads and the council with the building inspector, it calls for seven new positions in the codes department," Venning said. "That includes four building safety inspectors, two senior code compliance officers and an

additional clerk to assist the problems with the mail."

The additional positions to the codes department within this budget will help address the 7,600 rental inspections that should take place every year in the city, according to Venning.

The proposed budget also calls for a part-time arborist position in the parks department, working supervisor to the parks department and department of public works, an animal control officer for the police department, a full-time parking enforcement officer with clerk, a request for a fire commissioner and a deputy superintendent for the water department.

Other budget lines mentioned in the proposed budget address the public relations firm that the city council would like to have help in city promotions and communications. An alternatives analysis for the relocation of the police department and city hall either at 123 Grand Street or 155 West St has also been allocated. Street camera replacement, a land survey for Crystal Lake, the continuation of the citizen police academy and additional firefighter training have also been included in the budget lines.

Further along in the presentation, Venning reported that the taxable

assessed value in the city in 2022 is \$1.48 billion. This rating has continued to increase since 2016. For city homestead tax rates, they will be decreasing again for the fourth straight year and non-homestead tax rates will also be decreasing. The breakdown of those rates are available on the city website in the regular meeting livestream recording. "As the property values are rising and as we are stabilizing the tax levy, the rates are decreasing and we're hoping to keep that stable for everyone out there," said Venning.

In the Enterprise Funds portion of the budget, the metered water rate would increase by six percent, sewer would increase 108% of water rate and the sanitation fund is recommended to increase in user fees by five percent. The Enterprise Funds total is \$26.1 million.

The entire proposed budget can be found at cityofnewburgh-ny.gov/ArchiveCenter/ViewFile/Item/196 on the city's website. On November 14 there will be a public hearing on the proposed budget and city council will vote on the adoption of the city budget on November 28.

had once operated on the Broadway corridor and operated in the spaces that now make up the current 2 Alice's Cafe, Ann Street Art Gallery and GRITWORKS. The SEARS store had moved to the Newburgh Mall location following the construction of the mall and remained in their space till their closure.

Entering into the store on its final day, what was once a fully stocked store with appliances, clothes, jewelry and other items were empty floor spaces, several dozen racks left with clothes and other signage with the discounts. Over the course of the early morning

till closing, customers came and browsed what available products were left on the sales floor with discounts from 30 to 75% off.

Over the past several years, several businesses in the mall have closed but across the mall in the former BONTON store location, the newly highly anticipated Hudson Valley Resorts World Casino has been under construction for the majority of the year and has been recruiting residents and any interested for various positions at the space. The parking lot in front of the mall has also seen repaving work done on it in preparation for its opening later this year.

Inquiries to receive a statement from

a manager or store representative upon entry into the store were deferred to corporate communications. The Sears

communication office did not respond to requests for comment.

Orange County awarded two grants from NYS Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services

Orange County Executive Steven M. Neuhaus announced that the New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services has awarded the County \$149,980 through its Technical Rescue and Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) Grant Program.

In addition, the State awarded Orange County Fire Services \$141,200 through its Hazmat Regional Grant Program.

"These grants provide important funding that will greatly assist our emergency response capabilities in dealing with technical rescues and hazmat-related emergencies," Neuhaus said. "It contributes much needed funding for training and equipment to make sure that our emergency responders have the best resources to save lives."

Equipment funded through the grant will be utilized

by the Orange County Technical Rescue Team, which is comprised of approximately 100 career and volunteer firefighters from departments throughout the County. The unit responds to structural collapse, confined space, trench rescue and high angle rope rescue incidents in and is available for mutual aid assistance to neighboring counties.

Highlights of Equipment specified in the USAR grant include:

Collapse Rescue Equipment: Shoring, stabilization, cutting and disentanglement equipment/tools that would be used in structural collapse (building) type incidents.

Rope Rescue Equipment: Various rope, harnesses and gear utilized for high-angle rope rescues.

Confined Space/Trench Rescue Equipment: Airbags and SCBA bottles for performing rescues in tight areas or collapsed trenches.

Specialized Training: Training for members on specialized incidents involving rescues from an elevated location as well as removing victims trapped in complex machinery.

Personal Protective Equipment: (gear) for team members.

"The Orange County Technical Rescue Team mission is to respond to some of the most complex rescue situations imaginable," said Vini Tankasali, the County's Deputy Commissioner of Fire Services. "It is critical for the team to be outfitted with the proper specialized equipment and gear. This grant will help us accomplish that."

The Hazardous Materials Regional Grant Program provides funding for much needed Hazardous Materials detection and mitigation equipment. Orange County is the lead agency for the regional program which is comprised of Orange, Rockland, Sullivan and Ulster Counties.

Flu season comes early

The Orange County Department of Health has already issued a public health alert to coincide with the start of flu season and warns that this year could be much worse than recent years.

Flu season usually runs from October through May, and typically peaks between December and February. This year, cases started being reported in higher than usual numbers in September, and cases of laboratory-confirmed flu are increasing. As of last week, the OCDOH had reported close to 100 confirmed cases since August 1, an increase of 500 percent. The New York State Department of Health is reporting 596 laboratory-confirmed cases of influenza for the week ending October 1.

Measures that were used to help slow the spread of COVID-19, like social distancing, masking and vaccinations, also effectively slow the spread of influenza. Both COVID-19 and the flu are contagious respiratory illnesses that have similar symptoms, making it difficult to distinguish between the two viral infections. Symptoms of both, which can range from mild to severe, include fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, chills and fatigue. Respiratory symptoms may be present without fever and some people may also experience vomiting and diarrhea.

In addition to getting the flu and COVID-19 vaccines, the state health department recommends some practical ways to avoid contracting and spreading both viruses this fall and winter:

- Wash your hands often with soap and hot water for least 20 seconds to protect yourself from germs and avoid spreading them to others.
- Carry an alcohol-based hand sanitizer to use when soap and water are not available. Choose a product with at least 60 percent alcohol.
- Do not cough or sneeze into your hands. Instead, cover your mouth and nose with a tissue.
- Stay home if you are sick.
- Wear a mask that covers your nose and mouth if you are symptomatic.

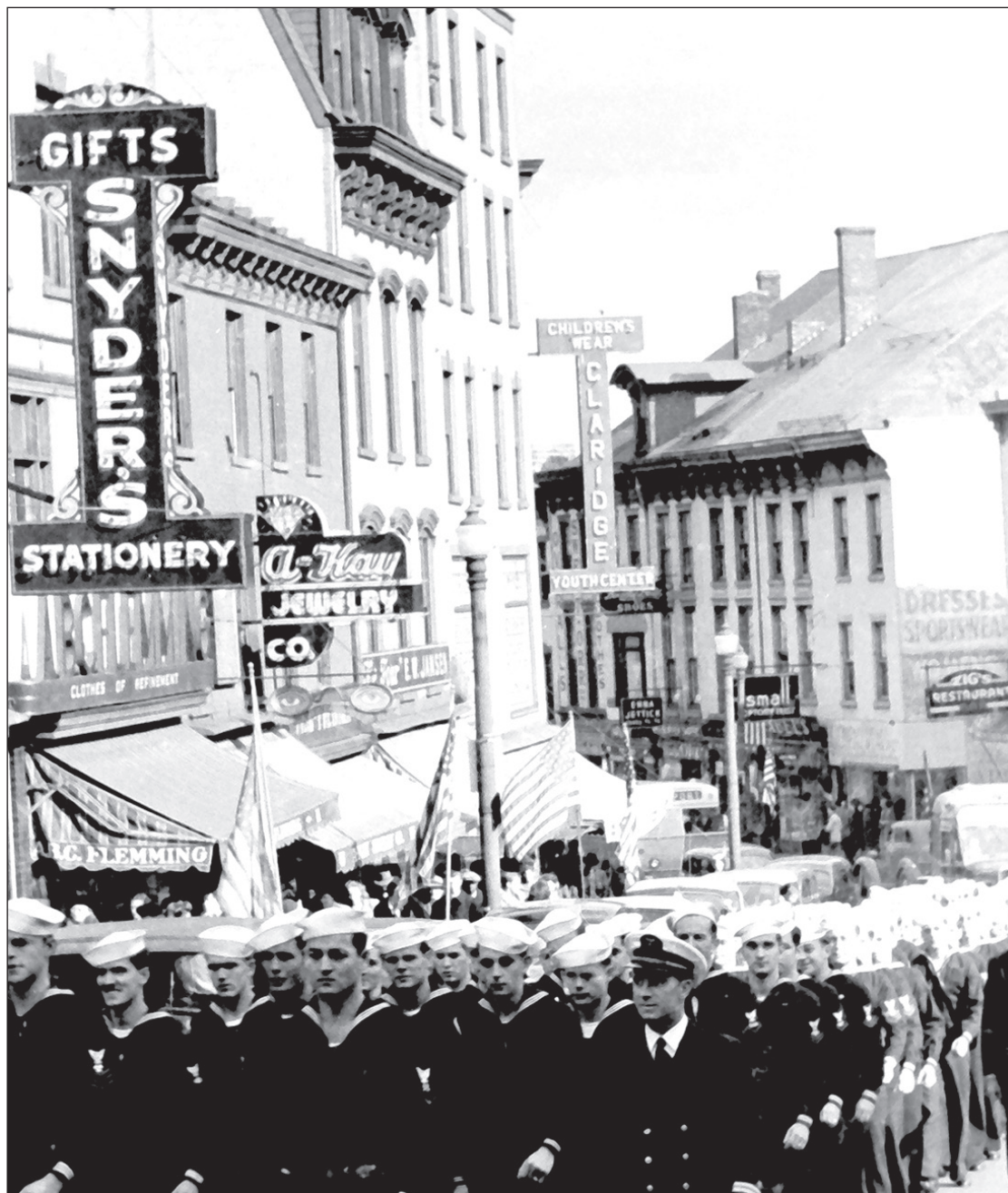

Is my life only worth \$15.20 an Hour?

Imagine, if you will, being a 42-year-old woman, an age when most women are raising children, or pursuing careers. Then imagine my reality: I was born with a disability and require help in doing the most basic of physical and personal care tasks. My mind is that of an adult, only limited by the inadequate “special education” I received, but my physical ability is that of an infant, needing help with everything.

I’m not seeking your pity nor your charity, I’m simply seeking an opportunity to live an independent life and equity for those folks who help me. I’ve been in a nursing facility for the last year, because I was unable to get adequate home care services from New York’s Medicaid system. My family members who provided me with uncompensated care were no longer able to manage my complex around the clock needs. My sleep-in home care workers, who are paid less than \$13 an hour, were required and deserve to have 8 hours of uninterrupted rest and sleep. Yet, I cannot be left alone, and so I made the difficult decision to enter a nursing facility for a short term stay until I could feel safe at home. Weeks turned into months, and then over a year went by. My belief is that God has me and he wouldn’t let me fall, sustained me.

Yet, faith alone will not free me, which is why I’m advocating for Fair Pay for Home Care workers. I ask Governor Hochul and our State legislators to bring their wages up to \$22.50 an hour. I need special people as caregivers, and they are hard to find. I also require workers who can commit to a long term stay with me, and under \$15.20 just won’t cut it.

Heating set for storage facility

True Storage, represented by engineering firm Clark Patterson Lee [CPL] hosted a public hearing at the New Windsor Planning Board Meeting on October 12 to discuss their proposed plans for the site along Blooming Grove Turnpike.

The current site is looking to demolish the existing single family dwelling to make room for a lot and a proposed three story storage building. The applicant has not proposed any outdoor storage or privacy fence and will have their own security systems in place at the site. The storage facility is not 24/7.

The applicant is still seeking several approvals and will be submitting new plans for the board’s review going forward before returning before the board and public.

No update in investigation of parish finances

Following the probe into financial irregularities detected at St. Teresa of Calcutta parish by the Archdiocese of New York back in the summer, there are no current updates into the investigation of former pastor Father William Damroth.

Damroth had served as the pastor of the local Newburgh parish for the past seven years before being transferred to Port Jervis to Immaculate Conception Parish. Damroth was set to begin as the new pastor on July 1. Since his leave of absence, Port Jervis has continued on with a new administrator but deferred any questions regarding the investigation to the archdiocese.

The archdiocese was contacted for a comment on the investigation but did not have any to make and there have been no updates at this time into the investigation. The Orange County District Attorney’s Office was also contacted but also did not have any comments to make at this time as representatives are not allowed to comment within their policy.

Eagle Scout Project brings new life to Cross Country Trail

Joseph Ponesse, a member of Troop 28 of the Greater Hudson Valley Council of the Boy Scouts of America, aimed to make a difference for one local middle school through his Eagle Scout project. While a Life Scout, the Eagle candidate must plan, develop and give leadership to others in a service project helpful to an organization outside of Scouting. The project must be approved by the Scoutmaster, the Troop's Committee and by the local Council or District.

Ponesse, a senior at Newburgh Free Academy, dedicated his Eagle Scout project to renovating the cross country trail at Heritage Middle School in New Windsor. When it came time to plan his project, Ponesse, a baseball player/wrestler and former student of HMS, knew he wanted to do something to benefit other athletes. The trail which was established in 2019 became unsafe for runners after it became ruinous during the COVID 19 pandemic. Ponesse worked with NECSD Buildings and Grounds, Anibal Velez and Cross Country Coach Chris Marino for the project. After months of planning, which included tips from builders and engineers, he put his plan into action in August 2021. The trail which was in great disrepair was cleared of debris and tree branches. Volunteers also built a natural bridge for a stream on the trail and built a sign for the trail. The project

Fifth Street returns!

Along Water Street near South Street, something old and curious has reappeared this past week. Like seeing a leprechaun in a fairy tale, a sight catches our eye and causes us to look down an old path. The path is an early Newburgh street where people walked to work and went to trade at businesses and where horses pulled wagons and later cars rolled up and down the last block to the Hudson River shore. Fifth Street has been unearthed.

In the early 19th century Township of Newburgh (the hillside farmland between Western Avenue and The Glebe that was first developed into building lots), streets were laid out perpendicular to the river and given numbers from south to north, starting at First Street and ending at Fifth Street. Some of First Street remains. All of Second Street is still in use, as is some of Third Street and a tiny bit of Fourth Street. But, old Fifth Street was plowed under by the many changes of urban renewal. It was the shortest of the original streets that bisected the downtown hillside, only running from the river up to Montgomery Street. It was also the street that retained

some of the oldest houses from the days of Newburgh Village and they, and the old cobblestone street they bordered, had begun to show their age when urban planning began in 1958. The first urban renewal plan that year was to build a high-rise apartment building on the site of Fifth Street quite like the Bourne Apartments across South Street. The demolition took place but the new apartment building never did, as dreams and schemes pushed forward for many years and land lay empty.

In the 1970's two dramatic developments erased the last impressions of old Fifth Street. Varick Homes were built as a self-contained garden apartment complex no longer oriented to any street and the "Marine Drive" road project widened Water Street from two to three lanes, removing the remnants of old curbs and sidewalks that hinted at the early downtown streetscape. One last block of each of the Township of Newburgh street grid was left running between Water and Front Street because these old streets were the routes that took all traffic under the railroad trestle to the riverfront. For little Fifth Street,

so much landfill was added to the new and bigger Water Street that Fifth's short remaining block down to the river was raised up to a level that could only accommodate pedestrians. Vehicles could no longer clear the overhead tracks.

On Front Street, across from Blu

Point Restaurant (previously Torches) the little Fifth Street right-of-way was a curious path to not much, but it was still a city street serving its function as a right-of-way. Then CSX Railroad announced it was time to repair and replace many of its small track overpasses, and construction fencing went up around the Fifth Street path. For years, weeds and saplings grew over what was left of Fifth Street until it was nearly forgotten. This week it reemerged like the mythical Glocca Morra crossroads in the old Broadway musical Finian's Rainbow. Many of us hope it will last more than a magical day and soon remain a link to memories of Newburgh's past and the busy intersecting streets that kept us well connected.

If not, go catch a glimpse of it now. Many of its cobblestones are revealed again.

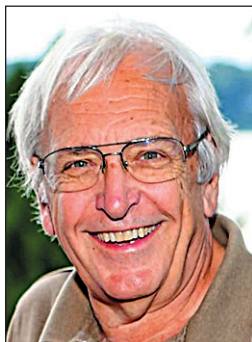

Seeing things like this warms your heart and soul and is a reward for the improved maintenance we accomplished over the past few years. While we still have so much more to achieve, things continue to move forward.

For anyone interested, we established a website, rossvillecemetery.org, to salute our volunteers, their accomplishments, and begin documenting the history

of the location. On this site, we've begun an "On Line Research" page which includes some lists of people interred in the two cemeteries, which are separated by State Route 32. If you believe some ancestors may be resting there waiting for a visit, please take a look. These lists are older, and do not include newer burials. The address of the cemetery is 818 State Route 32, Wallkill, NY.

We will accommodate as many as we reasonably can who wish to learn the cleaning process and will provide everything needed, including a cold bottle of water to keep you hydrated. I must caution you that stones which

appear to be unstable and which could possibly tip over will not be touched until a later time after they are made safe. We are also beginning to straighten up some of the stones which are leaning and can be safely returned to their correct position with the efforts of one or two volunteers.

If you are interested, want to learn, or just simply drift by to chat or take a tour, we will be there on Saturday, October 22, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. We welcome visitors, questions on family members in the cemeteries and any information you may have on the location, either documents or photos, which are great. These will be posted on the website to be shared by all, preserving another part of our community's heritage for future generations.

Please reach out and contact me if you want to participate in cleaning a marker so we have enough supplies on hand to be successful. If the marker is a specific family member, please provide the name so we can inspect the stone beforehand. There is absolutely no charge! If you find it to your liking and enjoy both the tasks and people, you can make a donation to further the association's work, but it is not necessary. Preserving our heritage is what is paramount and sharing it with everyone is our goal.

The Newburgh Free Academy football team had its entire offense for the first time this season, and the Kingston Tigers paid the price.

The Goldbacks – playing their first home game since the September 30 shooting-marred victory over the Warwick Wildcats – scored at least two touchdowns in each of the first three quarters on their way to a 55-12 win over the Tigers on Saturday afternoon at Academy Field.

The Goldbacks have now won five straight games after two season-opening losses and are sitting in line for the top seed in Section 9 Class AA. Their 3-0 class record puts them in position to clinch the top seed with a win over the Monroe-Woodbury Crusaders on October 29.

The Crusaders are 2-0 in the league and play the Tigers this week.

The top three of the league's five teams will make the playoffs with the top seed getting a bye into the championship game.

"I think we've come a long way since the first two weeks," sophomore Mason

Hoover said. "I think we're really on a roll now and it's going to be hard to stop us the rest of the season."

It was hard to stop Hoover, who threw for 287 yards and four touchdowns, and with almost a full season under his belt has taken charge of the Goldbacks' passing attack. He joined the varsity team last year in the Section 9 Class AA championship game when then-quarterback Dylan Iorlano suffered a shoulder injury.

"I feel like it's just been a big role to take on," Hoover said. "It's been at the start a little bit of pressure, actually, but I think I've eased in so far."

With his weapons, it's easy to ease in.

Everyone knows his 6-foot-8 target, Deondre Johnson, who caught three passes on Saturday for 61 yards on a touchdown.

He also found Elijah Bevier for six receptions, 144 yards and two touchdowns.

"We have Deondre, but (Bevier) is as good as any receiver we've had before Deondre," Newburgh coach Bill Bianco said. "He's got Division I schools calling ... he can do everything. We have him run the ball at quarterback a little. We

have him run and do jet sweeps. We have him throwing trick plays. We have him catching the ball, long ones and short ones. He's versatile and he can do a lot of different things."

Tajir Walker handled most of the chores on the ground as he rushed for 82 yards and scored three touchdowns. Jishawn Hall had 62 yards and a touchdown.

"We have a talented team and it's nice when we have everybody," Bianco said. "This is the first week this season we've had the whole offense. Every week someone's been out for this or that, so when everybody's on the field, there's a lot of different kids that can make plays."

The game was originally scheduled for Friday night but was moved to Saturday afternoon after security measures were increased and the last

home games moved to daytime after the triple shooting in a parking lot on September 30.

That led to a more subdued atmosphere at Academy Field.

"It's not as packed as it usually would but we've still got to no matter what happened," lineman Fabien Rhodes said.

Rhodes was a key component to keeping the Kingston offense from gaining any traction as he helped bottle up the running game, making a few notable hits. Three of his tackles went for a loss.

Darryl Jackson led the team defensively with eight tackles.

"I feel like we're getting it together," Rhoden said. "It was just the two losses in the beginning of the season that really woke us up. It made us focus and be ready for it."
