Walden board will decide on residency requirements this Tuesday

The Village of Walden board, after contemplating the subject for several meetings, may finally amend residency requirements for village positions during a public hearing this Tuesday, September 3. The local law, if passed, will expand the residency requirements for positions like the village clerk and police chief to all of Orange County

## Organic market opens in Walden

The Village of Walden welcomed a new business to Main Street last Thursday, August 22: Ker Market, a store and eatery that specializes in tasty treats, herbal drinks, and other organic products. While still new to the village, the storeowners are excited to serve Walden and hope to foster a community space for residents.

Vern and El, co-owners of the business, are a couple from Highland who enjoy making botanical products from scratch. They previously operated Ker Market online for several years, selling herbal extracts, infusions, sprays, sachets, and more. The word "Ker" is a Celtic term that translates to "a place where there is life." They declined to give their last names.

With their new storefront in Walden, the two now have a physical location where they can sell not only the aforementioned products but also homemade food and beverages. "We've been self-employed and always been into eating well and making products. We love making vinaigrettes, tea blends, coffees, and sachets," Vern said. "People enjoy the teas and sachets because they help with breathing."

The store boasts a diverse menu with a selection of goods both healthy and indulgent. Parched and weary passersby can re-energize with an organic tea blend, tisane, or coffee. For sweet tooths, the store offers ice cream and pastries with gluten-free options, the latter including muffins, danishes, pies, and almond horns. Those seeking something more fulfilling could try a sandwich, tuna salad, coleslaw, or seasonal soup.

The store is divided into two sections: a retail area where customers can purchase snacks and botanical products, and a seating area where customers can sit down and order a bite or drink. Vern and El hope that the store becomes a spot where residents can gather and relax, especially following the Walden Diner's closure in 2021.

"People in Walden are looking for a spot to hang out and meet with friends," El said. "We want to bring a sense of community here and offer a place where people can sit down and enjoy a sandwich or tea."

Vern and El were thrilled with their opening day last Thursday, receiving ample customer traffic and positive feedback. They look forward to engaging with the community and hope to add more items to their menu soon.

"It's been going great, the people here are very nice and supportive," Vern said.

## Walden family and church distribute hundreds of backpacks

The Ortiz Family, a group of outgoing residents who have lived in Walden for over 30 years, and the Greater Love Deliverance Center, a church located at 1715 South Montgomery Street, teamed up last Saturday, August 24 to host the former's annual backpack drive and the latter's first-ever community day in Wooster Grove. Throughout the afternoon, both parties gave away backpacks filled with school supplies to families in need of them for the upcoming semester, while also showing residents a good time.

The Ortizes, passionate about giving back to the community, began this tradition in 2021 after participating in 845 Unity's Back to School Drive in Middletown. Similarly, the GLDC strives to address community needs and has held backpack drives for several years, along with other events like free summer lunches and Thanksgiving dinners. Given the two parties' overlapping interests and the Ortizes' membership with the GDLC, the collaboration was a no-brainer.

"We've been living here for 30 years, and a lot of people have helped us, so we like giving back. A few years ago, we saw that Middletown had a backpack drive and we wanted to bring that to Walden," said Carolyn Ortiz. "We gave away 90 backpacks our first year, but on average we give away 120 to 150 backpacks annually."

"We hold our own backpack giveaways every year, and this year we partnered with the Ortizes to help with the donations. The community day is also a culmination of the free lunch giveaways we hold during the summer," said Bishop Troy Johnson of the GLDC. "We're much stronger working together and we wanted to take the church to residents, meeting their needs however we can."

Between 12 p.m. and 4 p.m., the Ortizes and GLDC members stuffed 400 backpacks with supplies for elementary, middle, and high school students; both parties bought these supplies with their own money and

received them from residents and sponsors. Early into the meeting, the board approved a motion for Mayor Dennis Leahy to sign a contract with Dialed Action, an extreme sports company from New Jersey that specializes in bike rodeos and stunt shows. This group will perform in the village during Celebrate Maybrook Day on September 28.

"We try to mix things up for the events that

we do for the kids in the village here. Dialed Action is a group of guys who are professional bicycle riders," said Leahy. "They come out and do a display, and they also promote not doing drugs and stuff like that."

Following this, Leahy announced Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month for September and Breast Cancer Month for October, encouraging residents to

wear and adorn their housefronts with teal ribbons in September and pink ribbons in October. The board has maintained this tradition for over a decade following the passing of Corrine Feller, the daughter of Orange County Legislator Ron Feller.

"We started doing this around at least 13 years ago; I think it was done for Corrine Feller, the Feller family came to us and requested it. Little did I know that later on, it was going to affect my family," Leahy said. "The ribbons are one of our ways of trying to be proactive and encourage people to get their health checked."

Later on, Leahy warned residents about improper disposal of cooking oil and grease; the village DPW has recently reported several instances of damaged and clogged plumbing caused by grease being drained down kitchen sinks. He and the DPW advised anyone with leftover cooking oil or grease to pour the byproduct into a container, such as an empty milk carton, and throw it away in the garbage.

"The buildup of grease in the plumbing system creates sewer backups and overflows that can damage your homes and the environment. The grease washes down the kitchen sink and sticks inside sewer pipes, both on your property and in the streets. Over time, the buildup can block the entire pipe, resulting in sewer backups and overflows," Leahy said. "By disposing of household grease properly, you can avoid the expensive repairs and unnecessary disruptions to residences and businesses."

Leahy also made two smaller announcements: first, registration for the Montgomery Little League is currently open for its Fall 2024 and Spring 2025 seasons. Registration and more information can be found at montgomeryllny.com.

Second, the VFW 2064 will host a tricky tray raffle on Sunday, September 15 at noon on 209 Main Street. For the regular prizes, residents can purchase two ticket sheets for \$10 and additional sheets for \$5 each; sheets for special baskets will cost \$2 each, \$5 for three sheets, or \$10 for 12 sheets. All proceeds will go toward the Auxiliary's efforts to help local veterans.

rather than just the Town of Montgomery.

During the board's August 20 meeting, Village Attorney David Donovan announced that he revised the law's draft to reflect the board's feedback from July 16's public hearing. Last month, the board was indecisive on the law's distinction between a resident and residency, resulting in a 3-3 vote; some trustees were satisfied with the law's definitions, while others felt they could be stronger.

"So after the last meeting back in July, I made some modifications, as the board was looking for a little something more," Donovan said. "I did put the definitions of resident and residence as was requested."

While Trustee Becky Pearson was absent on August 20, she sent Donovan an email in agreement with the revisions but suggested that candidates could provide their bills as proof of their residency in Orange County. Donovan discouraged this idea and felt that focusing on this one form of proof could be too restrictive when choosing candidates.

"How about having to show something? Not sure if water and sewer would work with your name on this bill. Something a rental would have to pay if they don't own a home," Donovan read from Pearson's email. "My only response is that I previously advised against that since when you start calling out certain things, you're limiting yourself to those things without having any other conditions you could potentially investigate."

Given that three trustees were missing from last week's meeting, the board agreed to hold a public hearing for the law on September 3 at 6:30 p.m. This will give residents another opportunity to comment on the law and allow for a fuller board to vote without the risk of a tie.

## Pine Bush school board approves safety plan

At its August 20 meeting, the Pine Bush school board approved a revised School Safety Plan.

Joseph Lenz, Assistant Superintendent for Business, reviewed the plan, saying there were few revisions and they dealt with changes in positions. The plan includes two reunification sites and agreements with the towns of Wallkill and Crawford for School Resource Officers. No one from the public spoke when president Gretchen Meier opened the floor for comment.

Lenz also reported on the district's busing plan. He said information had been sent out the week before the meeting, earlier than usual. He has received calls to move bus stops back to their original locations. He and Amy Bruckner, interim Superintendent of Schools, have been visiting the bus stops.

Terrylyn Cohn, interim Assistant Superintendent for Instruction, reported on preparation for staff. Administrators held a retreat earlier in the day. New staff will meet on August 26 and will take the "famous bus tour" of the district, which covers seven towns. Staff training will take place August 28 and 29. The training will include conscious discipline, which teaches adults and children how to respond to conflict with kindness and self-regulation. Training will also include the importance of self-care.

In her report, Brockner said that staff, including the Student Resource Package unit, participated in Wallkill's National Night Out activities on August 13 at Little League Park. Representatives gave out school supplies. Elementary school counselors were also available to meet and greet parents; Brockner noted that the counseling positions are new this year and one will be present in each elementary school.

Meier said the first day of school is Tuesday, September 3.

The board's next meeting will be September 10 with the public session starting at 7:30 p.m. instead of 7 p.m.

## Tributes offered to retired ANG Wing Commander

Family, friends, and members of the NY Air National Guard's 105th Airlift Wing gathered in the Steward Air National Guard Base in Newburgh last Friday, August 23 to commemorate the late Major General Thomas P. Maguire Jr., the former Adjutant General of New York who passed away on July 20 at 77 years old. Maguire, a decorated veteran who served 34 years in the US Air Force, went by many titles throughout his lifetime, from Forward Air Controller pilot and Wing Commander to loving husband and father.

The memorial opened at 10 a.m. with attendants gathering at the base, conversing with one another, and examining Maguire's memorabilia. The 105th Airlift Wing conducted a flyover at 11 a.m., followed by a welcoming message from Tom, Maguire's older son and Commander of the 105th Mission, and an opening prayer from Father Joseph LaMorte, Vicar General of Archdiocese of New York.

"This place has become a sacred place for our family, so it's entirely appropriate that this is the meeting spot for this last public memorial, celebration, and goodbye," Tom said. "This is a hybrid of a lot of stuff: it's a wake, a celebration, and maybe a little bit of a roast."

#### **About Thomas Maguire**

Maguire was born on June 8, 1947, in Mount Vernon, New York, and was the first child of the late Thomas Sr. and Florence Maguire. He graduated from The College of the Holy Cross in June 1969, receiving his US Air Force Regular Commission from the school's Reserve Officer Training Corps program, and later earned his pilot wings from the Laredo Air Force Base in 1970. Maguire began his military career as a Forward Air Controller in 1971 during the Vietnam War, flying a Cessna O-2 Skymaster in over 250 combat missions for 12 months.

"This young, 23-year-old man with no pilot experience other than Air Force

pilot training, was directing ordnance from aircraft moving far too fast to see the targets while protecting friendlies on the ground," said Colonel Ryan Dannemann, commander of the 105th Airlift Wing. "Those missions set the stage for young Lieutenant Maguire to be awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross...he was awarded this medal three times that year and had 10 Air Medals to go with it. You could have walked past General Maguire a hundred times or even a thousand times and you would never have known he did such things."

Following his missions in Vietnam, Maguire became a T-37 instructor pilot for the Laredo Air Force in 1972, then joined the NY Air Force National Guard two years later, serving the 137th Tactical Air Support Squadron in White Plains. In 1982, he managed the Air National Guard's largest weapons system conversion after the 137th mission moved to the Stewart Air Reserved Training Center in Newburgh. Throughout the 1980s and '90s, Maguire served various leadership

roles for the 137th Airlift Squadron and 105th Military Airlift Group, eventually becoming Wing Commander for the latter, and he coordinated airlift support for Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm during the Persian Gulf War.

"Part of being that relatable human leader is in his language and it's being available, a trait that many leaders struggle with. Tommy always picked up the phone right away or called me into his office right away," said Major General Timothy LaBarge, who previously commanded the NY National Air Guard before retiring. "He was available every single time and walked that fine line between being the towering paragon of virtuosic leadership and being a relatable, empathetic, humanistic leader. It was an art form to him."

In 1967, Maguire married his wife Deborah, and the two expanded their family over the next few years with their three children: Lindsay, Tom, and Dan. During his time living in Walden, he was a member of the Most Precious Blood Church, the United Way of the Dutchess-Orange Region, and the Hospice of Orange-Ulster. One of Maguire's biggest priorities was his

family, whether making time for his wife and children or setting a positive example for them.

"His love for our family was unparalleled. Our family has grown to include his six children, and he would want each of them to know how much he loved them all. I feel very blessed that my son Alexis was able to know him even for a short while," said Lindsay, Maguire's daughter, who provided a eulogy. "Through his words and actions, he taught love, hard work, and devotion. He exemplified how to show patience, understanding, and commitment."

"Some of you may remember that my dad bought this little red, two-door Saturn Coupe. It was a sporty little car and it was a five-speed, and he enjoyed it. He didn't have that car for very long and he got rid of it; he'd rather

be with his family in a minivan than by himself in a little sports car," said Dan, Maguire's younger son. "Around that same time, he went on a golfing trip with some of the guys from the base. When he came back, he enjoyed himself but said 'I'm never going back there because I want to be with my family.' That's who my dad was."

Near the end of his career, Maguire became the Adjutant General of New York in August 2001, weeks before the September 11 terrorist attacks. Immediately following these attacks,

he and members of the NY National Guard responded to Ground Zero in Manhattan, navigating the dust and debris to find survivors. Maguire also assisted soldiers and airmen with training and equipment during the War on Terror. After retiring, he spent his last 14 years with Deborah living in Sun City Center, Florida.

"He was a huge example for me of how to prioritize life: putting your family and friends first, focusing on the big rocks, and treating people nicely," Tom said. "My biggest takeaway from him is that there's no secret to success and leadership; it's just treating people nicely and treating them how you want to be treated. Making sure that you remember people's names and that when you're talking to someone, you make them feel like they're the only one in the room. He valued people's feedback more than anybody that I've met."

The 105th Airlift Wing concluded the memorial service with Taps and a flag-folding presentation, followed by a closing prayer from Father LaMorte, and finally a recording of the U.S. Air Force Song.



# The last movie theater is closing

That's all you need in life, a little place for your stuff. That's all your house is: a place to keep your stuff. If you didn't have so much stuff, you wouldn't need a house. You could just walk around all the time...

"That's what your house is, a place to keep your stuff while you go out and get...more stuff! - GEORGE CARLIN

he Town of Newburgh is getting another place in which we can keep our stuff, this time at the expense of the area's last movie theatre.

Showtime Cinemas announced last week that it will be closing for good on September 15. The property on which the theater sits, has been sold and is being renovated into a two-story storage facility and include a drive-thru area and a 3,300 square foot storage addition to the front side of the site. There are 10 additionally proposed buildings, totaling 71,825 square feet, to be built and a 600 square foot office on the site, located on Route 300 near the Newburgh.

The announcement prompted a discussion on social media about whether or not we really need another storage facility in the area. The consensus, at least among theatergoers, is that we don't.

Showtime, like other theaters in the region, never fully recovered from the pandemic. The Downing Cinema at the Newburgh Waterfront closed a year ago. Take a ride down Route 94 in New Windsor and you'll pass not one, but two piles of rubble at Squire Village that used to be movie theaters. The Destinta, which was torn down earlier this year was originally an A&P,

## Back in the field and the bees are wild!

**O** k, so as you recall, I have all my equipment and a couple empty supers in the back of my truck, with a piece of cardboard for a bottom, and an inner cover for the top, to put the harvested honey frames in, a way of sealing it and keeping the robbing at a minimum. I have fired up my smoker with the propane torch and it is smoking pretty good. I am off.

pretty good. I am off.

Some hives are more aggressive than others. I just know when I approach. They have histories. All else equal, like it's a warm day with no storms brewing and the bees are wild in their search for late summer nectars and pollens, a few hives have the disposition of black birds to a hawk's head. Don't let them know you are there. Don't bang anything. Puff of smoke in the front entrance, pop

the outer cover of the top, a couple puffs of smoke right away into the center hole of the inner cover, and retreat. Give it a minute. I take my hive tool and slowly lift the inner cover exposing the frames of the honey super. A couple more puffs of smoke, and some smoke on the worker bees there on the frames. Good.

I dislike wearing a veil, a bee suit, gloves, all of the beekeeper's protective paraphernalia. Can't stand it. So, when I come to one of the angry hives, I, at least, put on a face veil. The anger and aggressiveness of a hive might be due to any number of reasons. Some are simply genetically prone to hyper-awareness, and often beekeepers will requeen a hive with these tendencies in hopes of changing the genetic make-up of the worker bees and having a new queen produce a less sensitive population in the next generation. In our area of the world, we don't have to worry about "Africanized" bees. Killer bees, as they are sometimes referred to down south, cannot survive our cold environment. At least, not yet. The African genetics are not in our local bees. African bees are high-tree dwelling insects prone to swarming repeatedly. The rapid swarming, or dividing of the colony by natural means, insures an effect defense against viruses transmitted by mites, as the mite life cycle is longer than the swarm cycle of the African bees.

If a hive has recently been attacked by a raccoon reaching up inside trying to get some protein from the brood, or a skunk, or some other predator, the hive will be on edge and hot to the touch. If a hive has been knocked over by the wind, or a black bear, they will be on high alarm. Putting back together a hive lying in pieces on the ground, I wear protection. If it has been raining for three days and the bees are coming out again, wait another day. Little tricks to not wear another layer of clothing.

I'm in a hot hive right now. They're like little bitches. (Excuse my Olde Germanic, *bicce*). I'm not going to be in the hive for long. They are isolated and stand alone and never see a human. Bees have facial recognition, but if they never see your face, how can they recognize you? That's the kind of thing beekeepers think about.

This hive had a late start, was the product of more than one combination, and while there is some work in the honey super, I am not taking any honey from it. While here, I will break the hive down to the lower box, check for eggs, have a quick look for the queen, and put in a treatment for mites. I use formic acid, a naturally occurring acid in the hive, applied in Formic Pro strips, two per hive, to be left for 14 days. It can be used with the honey supers on, as it is organic, and it is a one-time treatment, unlike so many other methods which require repeated disturbance of the hive. I barely have time to go in the hives once, let alone numerous visits for the same result.

Oh hell! Right on the first bone of the second finger, left hand. "You *bicce*!" Almost always when I get stung, it is my own fault. I was trying to go

too fast. Even the most experienced beekeepers get jumpy in the middle of a project. I lifted the inner cover a second time and got sloppy. Both the poor worker bee and I suffered; the bee because honeybees sting only once and when they do, they are finished, and me because I can feel the stinger and the venom in the bone of my finger, like hitting it with a hammer!

Tomorrow I will have a full day in the bees, gathering honey and checking for brood. It will be too hot, again, to treat for mites. Ninety degrees is too hot to use the acid. The acid burns the mouths of the mites, and they can no longer feed, and it works inside the cap brood too where the mite eggs are laid right alongside the queen laid egg. Don't ask me how.

Have a great week. I am piling it on this week, getting ready for the first of the big garlic festivals. Bottling honey, cleaning and bagging garlic, making braids. I will be heading up to Bennington, Vermont this Friday for the Bennington Garlic Festival on Saturday, one of my favorites. Come on up! Vermont is beautiful when the months don't end in "ber".

#### Battery storage

PlattekillSupervisorDeanDePewSr.ismisinformed when he declares that "lithium battery storage is in my view extremely dangerous," as he did at an August 7 town meeting. What are the facts? Utilityscale battery storage is in use in 39 states. Fires are rare but get a lot of publicity. Unfortunately, New York had three battery storage fires in 2023. They caused no outside damage, contamination or injuries, but stoked fear.

In response, Gov. Hochul convened a panel of experts, the Inter-Agency Fire Safety Working Group, to determine how the fires started, how they could be prevented and how to better manage any future fires. For example, one fire was found to be caused by faulty sealing of a battery container, allowing water to infiltrate and cause a short circuit. The working group also tested all of the sites for hazardous substances that might have been released by the fires. They found none.

According to the New York Battery and Energy Storage Technology Consortium, based in Albany, the final recommendations of the working group are expected in mid-2025 and will likely include independent peer reviews for safe design and installation, special inspections to ensure safety compliance, and site-specific training for local responders.

Modern civilization has relied on burning fossil fuels, which we know now are catastrophically heating the planet. We can either accept and manage the risks of new technologies like wind and solar energy and battery storage, wait for unicorns to generate energy, or put our heads in the sand and keep burning oil and gas as the planet burns.

Gov. Hochul has set goals for battery storage in New York, but she must address the community fears and misinformation that are delaying deployments. She has disappointed climate voters this year, but will she redeem her claim to be a climate leader? I hope so. JOYANN SAVINO Highland

Captain Paul William "Buddy" Bucha passed away on July 31, 2024. He was a man of many accomplishments and accolades. Beloved father, husband, brother,

friend, Gold Medallion Inductee of the International Swimming Hall of Fame, Lindy Champion of St. Louis, named alongside Elvis Presley as one of the Ten Most Outstanding Young Men in America by the Jaycees, two-time All American Swimmer,

West Point graduate, Stanford MBA, Army Airborne Ranger, member of the Ranger Hall of Fame, and recipient of the Congressional Medal of Honor. He is survived by his wife Cynthia "Chintz" Bell-Bucha, sisters Maryanne Hertzer (Norman), Judy Shelton (Steve), and Sandra Bucha Kerscher (John), his four children Jason, Heather, Lindsay, and Becky, with

Bellyanne Judy Sandra h), his eather,

his first wife Carolyn Maynard Bucha, and nine grandchildren.

Paul Bucha was born in Washington D.C. on August 1, 1943 to his parents, Mary and Paul, a colonel in the U.S. Army. He spent his childhood in Germany, Japan, Indiana, and St. Louis, graduating from Ladue Hortons Watkins High School in 1961. Paul received several scholarships for both academics and athletics, but instead decided to attend the United States Military Academy at West Point. At his first Yale Army swim meet he realized that he had forgotten to



let Yale know he would not be attending. He supposed they had figured it out, and he went on to be a twotime All American and captain of the swim team at West Point. After graduating number two in Military Order of Merit in 1965, Paul attended Stanford University where he received an MBA and attended Airborne and Ranger schools, before reporting to Fort Campbell, and then to Vietnam in 1967.

Paul Bucha exemplified courage both in action and compassion. On March 18, 1968 Paul directed the men of Delta Company in the defeat of a vastly superior enemy force. Upon returning home, Paul was informed that he was to be awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor. Paul, a man of exceeding humility, knew that he would not have survived without the courage and competence of the men he commanded. He accepted the medal on behalf of Delta Company, and always acknowledged that when he wore it, he did so for them all. Paul always denied that he had "won" the honor, insisting that it was a medal he had received, and never forgot the ten men that were lost



in that battle. He thought of them every day.

In his years following Vietnam, Paul impacted countless lives, as he lectured on leadership to heads of all branches of the U.S. military, as well as students, educators, business leaders, at Harvard and Yale, to incoming West Point cadets, and graduates of all four service academies, on his five pillars of leadership: Honor, Integrity, Competence, Confidence, and Humility. Paul approached everyone as an equal, and his eagerness to listen to the concerns of others, to offer guidance, assistance, or friendship, was inherent to his character. He advocated before the United States Senate for fair and compassionate acknowledgement of the contributions made by immigrants in our armed forces, for which he received the Ellis Island Medal of Honor in 1994. Paul argued on behalf of racial equality, using his platform to urge people to open their hearts to the concerns of others. He asserted that those calling

for racial justice should be thanked for speaking out so that together we can work towards a better future. After having the courage to treat his own post traumatic stress through counseling, Paul spoke publicly about his struggle in an effort to normalize the conversation around trauma for all who served in our armed forces. Paul was a member of the foreign policy panel during the first Obama Presidential campaign, and traveled with Michelle Obama as she spoke to military families. It was Paul's compassion and dedication that convinced Mrs. Obama to focus her work as First Lady on aiding military families.

After Vietnam, Paul turned down an offer to attend Harvard Law school when he was recruited by Ross Perot to launch EDS abroad in 1975. He and his family lived in Tehran until the Iranian Revolution in 1979, when he was sent to Paris, France. There, Paul worked in coordination with the United States government towards securing the release of EDS employees held hostage during the revolution. He was a real estate developer, corporate consultant, member of the board of the Fisher House Foundation and Intrepid Fallen Heroes Fund, and a powerful advocate and voice for the servicemen and women of the U.S. Armed Forces and their families.

Paul enjoyed skiing at Sugarloaf in the mountains of Western Maine, diving the reefs of the smaller islands of the Bahamas, and riding his namesake thoroughbred horse "Buddy" with Chintz. He traveled the world with friends and family, loved a passionate debate, chocolate milkshakes, and John Denver.

Paul ultimately accepted his opportunity to attend Yale. With the assistance of the West Haven VA, who took excellent care of Paul in his time of need, his brain was donated to the Center for Human Brain Discovery at Yale University. This was both an expression of his appreciation to Yale New Haven Hospital for the care they took in treating his youngest daughter's breast cancer, and a hope that someday the possibility of a diagnosis of Alzheimer's Disease will be but a distant memory.

Services will be held in January 2025 at the United States Military Academy at West Point. Memorial

donations may be made to Fisher Center for Alzheimer's Research Foundation.

Norma Molitch Deull was a pioneering leader in bringing Broadway shows and other touring live entertainment productions to cities and towns around North America, helping to shape the cultural landscape. Born in Philadelphia in 1933 to a family of Jewish immigrants from Eastern Europe, Norma was a long-time resident of New York City and Cornwall, New York. She was a proud 1951 graduate and Distinguished Daughter of the Philadelphia High School For Girls, and graduated in 1955 from the University of Pennsylvania.



As president of entertainment trucking company Clark Transfer for more than 30 years, Norma stood out as a strong female leader in the theatre and trucking industries, long dominated by men. A family business since its founding 75 years ago by her father Louis Molitch and his partner James P. Clark, the company is responsible for transporting the national tours of most major Broadway shows, as well as symphony orchestras, operas, ballet companies, popular music concerts, and other live entertainment. In 2024, Norma was awarded a Touring Broadway Award by the Broadway League, and her company was recognized by the transportation industry's Commercial Carrier Journal as a Trucking Industry Innovator. Under her leadership, Clark Transfer also created the industry-leading Touring Green program, which enables touring productions to address the climate challenge by offsetting the carbon impact of moving their scenery and equipment. Since its inception, the program has offset more than 45,000 metric tonnes of carbon.

Norma saw the company she led until her death as a great extended family, including her Harrisburg, PA-based staff team and a nationwide fleet of more than 100 drivers. Family was central to her life, both professionally and personally. She was especially proud that members of four generations of her immediate family have been directly involved in the operation of Clark Transfer, including her parents Louis and Sylvia, her two brothers Barry and Matthew, her two sons and their wives, and her grandchildren.





## Town of Montgomery Dial-A-Ride

Dial-A-Ride is a service that is open-to-the-public where you are required to call ahead of time to reserve a ride on the bus. You must call at least 24 hours in advance but typically you need to call further ahead because the service is on a first-come, first-served basis and the schedule can fill up quickly. Please be aware that this is not like a taxi service, where you are picked up at your door at whatever time you have arranged with the cab company. With Dial-A-Bus, the many requests for rides are accommodated as best as possible and riders are picked up and dropped off at the curb (curb-to-curb service). The schedule changes daily and specific pick up and drop off times cannot be guaranteed. Please allow extra travel time, as other passengers will likely be picked up or dropped off during your trip.

Dial-A-Ride service is available in the Town of Montgomery including the Villages of Maybrook, Montgomery, Walden and in the Town of Crawford, including the communities of Pine Bush, Bullville, Thompson Ridge and Searsville. This type of service is open-tothe-public and is curb-to-curb, meaning that passengers are picked up and dropped off at the curb (not taken door-to-door). Reservations are required at least 24 hours in advance. When you make your reservation, please specify where you would like to be picked up, your exact destination, and what time you would like to make the trip. The scheduler will accommodate you the best that they can. Buses are also wheelchair lift-equipped. Contact the Transportation Office for details about our service area and accommodations.







Petermann's project, Centripetal Agonies, explores the interconnectedness of suffering across living beings through a historical lens that spans centuries. By examining religious traditions, societal dynamics, mass hysteria, and the limitations of language, the work delves into the roots of tragedy and ethical abstraction between species. Using animal rights as a focal point, Centripetal Agonies proposes a radical rethinking of linguistic philosophy, blending poetry, fiction, and critical essays to challenge traditional perspectives on communication, history, and ethics.

"I am indescribably honored to be named a Davidson Fellow," said Petermann. "The award is, to me, a reminder of the unique role that the humanities and social sciences can have in tackling critical issues."

Petermann, a rising senior at Valley Central High



School, hopes to pursue a career in literary arts, philosophy, or journalism. In addition to excelling academically, he enjoys photography, music, and reading. A former national award-winning gymnast and a vegetarian, Petermann's wide-ranging interests and dedication to creative expression have driven his ambitious project.

The Davidson Fellows Scholarship program provides scholarships of \$50,000, \$25,000, and \$10,000 to students under 18 who have completed groundbreaking projects in fields such as science, technology, engineering, mathematics, literature, and music. Since 2001, the program has awarded more than \$9.9 million to 448 students, and it is recognized as one of the nation's most prestigious undergraduate scholarships by U.S. News & World Report.

The 2024 Davidson Fellows will be honored at a reception at the Smithsonian National Museum of the American Indian in Washington, D.C., as well as a virtual presentation ceremony in September.





At this time last year, the Pine Bush football team was practicing in a muddy area behind the high school.

Despite the facilities now being light years better, as they are practicing

this year on the turf at Thomas Lonergan Field, several players confessed to missing the mud.



However, a much cleaner

Bushmen team is looking forward to 2024 as they suited up for preseason training camp, beginning on August 19.

"It feels great to play with the boys again," running back and defensive back Plexico Brooks said. "We're working hard and looking forward to the first game."

They'll have plenty of time to work hard and plenty of time to wait for the first game. They will have two scrimmages – Saturday, and September 6 – against the Cornwall Dragons and Washingtonville Wizards respectively, and they'll host the Our Lady of Lourdes Warriors on September 13 to start their eight-game regular season.

"We're a lot more experienced group now," Pine Bush coach Rich Ormsby said. "The leadership amongst the team individuals has grown from where we started to where we are now because they've been in the program for three years."

The Bushmen went young last season, finished with a 3-6 overall record and their 2-3 record among Class AA teams last year earned them the fourth seed in the sectional playoffs.

It was the Bushmen's first playoff appearance since they won the Section 9 Class AA championship in 2019.

"We're looking for a lot more this year," quarterback Triston Santos said. "It pushed us a little bit more, but we're looking for something better."

And they have the experience to make that push.

Santos, Brooks and Zanetti return to the Bushmen for their senior years. They also will provide much of the leadership for the Bushmen this year.

"When the coaches are always the ones saying, 'come on, let's go,' eventually it gets tuned out," Ormsby said. "But when 50 guys, on any given day, are saying, 'come on let's go,' it hits a lot, and you get a lot more. The motivation is much better when it comes from the kids, and we're starting to see it."

Zanetti described the 2024 Bushmen as a lot more experienced and talented than last year's team.

"I think we're going to surprise some people," Zanetti said.

In front of Santos on offense will be what Ormsby described as big, but relatively young.

"We have a couple of seniors on the line with a lot of experience, but we've got a couple of sophomores and a couple of juniors that are contributing," Ormsby said. "I think we had 11 line-
