Montgomery PB presents noise study for KSH

After an 18-month hiatus, the KSH warehouse project finally returned to the Village of Montgomery's planning board agenda on Wednesday, October 30. The project's hearing featured a highly-anticipated noise study from the village's consultant and elicited several concerns from residents who live near the site.

KSH RT 211, the project's applicant, proposes two 60,000-square-foot warehouses and two 80,000-square-foot warehouses for Route 211 near Union and Weaver Street. Over the last few years, numerous residents

Chilly weather, gray skies, and poor air quality from county wildfires did not stop Walden residents and officials from celebrating veterans during the village's 14th Annual Veterans Day Brick Dedication, a time to remember and cherish these individuals and their sacrifices to the nation.

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Planty Things opens in Pine Bush

re you looking to spice up your home with some greenery? Or perhaps you want to raise and cherish a leafy companion? Marisa Vassallo, a Pine Bush resident, recently opened the perfect business for these longings: Planty Things, a new store located at 110 Center Street in the hamlet that specializes in common and exotic house plants.

During the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, Vassallo grew house plants as a new hobby. She initially stored her floras in a dedicated plant room, but as she continued growing more of them, she expanded her collection to her basement and dining room until moving everything to a personal greenhouse. After receiving numerous compliments from house visitors, Vassallo decided to pursue this passion full-time, leaving her previous job in healthcare to start her own house plant business. She and her husband Michael began selling plants last March and signed a lease for their store's building in September; the shop officially opened last Friday, November 1.

"During COVID, I started growing house plants like crazy. I had a plant room, then I grew to the basement, then I grew to my dining room, and then my husband was like 'I think you need a greenhouse,'" Vassallo said. "So we built a massive greenhouse that I was letting people visit, and then I started doing pop-up events here like Harvest Fest."

"Everyone was like 'Your house plants are beautiful, you should start selling these,' and I never really thought about it. I used to be a cardiac stenographer, but I wanted to do something different that I really cared about," she continued. "So I left my job and I started growing more and more to sell them."

Planty Things offers over 200 varieties of houseplants, many of which Vassallo collected during her travels around the country and world. She grows all of her plants through tissue culture and propagation; after cutting off a small

piece of a plant's node, she can create an identical specimen in water. Of all her house plants, Vassallo loves hoyas, monsteras, and philodendrons.

"We travel a lot, and wherever we travel, I'll bring plants back and make sure I have my permit for that country," she said. "I did my inventory recently; my philodendron variety is over 50, my hoya variety is over 50, and I easily have over 200 different varieties."

For opening day, Vasallo hosted a ribbon-cutting ceremony with her husband and friends, providing visitors with refreshments, music, free plants, and a raffle for a rare plant. She is ecstatic to operate her own business in Pine Bush and she looks forward to sharing her passion with residents.

"I'm very attached to Pine Bush, it's a very small hamlet and we have lots of friends and family here," Vasallo said. "I'm very passionate to be a part of this community, and I'm so glad I can start my own business and open something unique where I grew up."

have criticized the project's size and location, with many asserting that this warehouse development will increase truck traffic, generate noise and light disturbances, and worsen the village's water supply. Residents were especially unhappy with the applicant's noise study and demanded the village conduct a third-party study, delaying the project's hearing for a year and a half.

Enter Stephen Szulecki, vice president of The Noise Consultancy. The planning board hired Szulecki last August to conduct noise measurements near the proposed site and work with the applicant's consultant on addressing residents' noise concerns.

"In August, the village board of trustees authorized the planning board to retain the noise consultancy and conduct our own independent ambient noise measurements with our consultant," said Amy Frisbie, planning board chairwoman. "Our expert report is now available and we have our noise expert here with us tonight."

For the first half of the hearing, Szulecki presented his ambient noise report, comprising four measurements that he recorded between October 3 and 4 at the rear property line of 73 Weaver Street. Each measurement was an hour long, except the last one, and covered the afternoon, evening, night, and morning respectively. Szulecki noted that most of the applicant's measurements were taken during the

morning and afternoon, only covering about half the day's noise levels.

"I was a little dismayed when the applicant decided to take measurements mostly during the peak of commute times in the morning and afternoon. That's not to say there weren't other measurements taken, but a great deal of measurements they took were from those periods," Szulecki said. "Those are not representative of hours of the day, and certainly overnight hours, when the ambient levels are quite low."

showcased Szulecki measurement's graph, illustrating the average noise levels for a Weaver Street household, and listed each of their noise sources. The measurements ranged between 40 and 47 A-weighted decibels, typical noise levels for a rural neighborhood, with the evening and night measurements being slightly higher due to nocturnal wildlife. All four graphs included a few infrequent noise spikes, usually caused by aircraft coming in and out of Orange County Airport or the occasional delivery truck.

"Some things that you wouldn't be too surprised to find in the area during the afternoon of a beautiful day would be kids playing in the neighborhood, a lawn mower in the distance, and birds chirping," Szulecki said, describing his afternoon measurement. "Being that the woods and wetlands were so close to where the measurements were taken, there's a fair amount of summer insects and peepers active during those hours. A FedEx truck could be heard coming down Weaver

Street, helicopters that are taking off and landing at the airport, a car horn, and plane overflights."

Following his presentation, Szulecki explained that this study is a requirement of the DEC's noise criteria and will serve as a baseline for the proposed site's existing noise levels. This will help the applicant better understand conditions that would increase noise levels, such as truck traffic and inventory drop-offs, and consider ways of mitigating the project's impact on the surrounding ambiance.

Several residents who live on Weaver and Union Street voiced their concerns to Szulecki. Given the site's proximity to their homes, many asserted that the project would diminish their quality of life with constant noise from tractor-trailers entering and exiting the facility. One resident mentioned he could already hear coyotes from his living room at night, so the project's truck traffic would be very loud and

very difficult to block out.

"I think what we've all been saying as residents is we're accustomed to a certain amount of noise in the Village of Montgomery. We understand that we live along a state route, and we understand that there are warehouses and farming operations around our village," said Karina Tipton, a Weaver Street resident. "But what we do not want is to have our lives encumbered by additional noises that are greater than what we are accustomed to."

After Szulecki left, several more residents reiterated their criticisms of the project to the planning committee. At the end of the meeting, the board agreed to continue KSH's hearing on Wednesday, November 20 at 6 p.m. in the Montgomery Senior Center. Frisbie also mentioned that Szulecki and the applicant's consultant will discuss residents' feedback and troubleshoot potential issues during a technical meeting.


Walden considers noise abatement and enforcement

The Walden Village Board discussed noise abatement and enforcement measures in its recent meeting, focusing on updating equipment and training for officers. Village officials raised questions about the police department's current noise monitoring tools, particularly the decibel meter's calibration status and usage procedures.

Trustee Becky Pearson inquired about the calibration frequency and training for officers in noise measurement. Police Chief William Herlihy responded, noting that only five officers are trained to operate the meter, which has not been calibrated in some time. He suggested purchasing a new, high-quality decibel meter that would undergo annual calibration and emphasized the importance of having a reliable tool to accurately measure noise levels for enforcement purposes.

"If we're going to strengthen our code," Herlihy said, "then I would suggest purchasing a good decibel. meter and then our calibration would be once a year recommended and then we will train all of our officers in it with the addition of all of our newest officers."

Trustee Bill Taylor asked if training documentation was maintained, to which Herlihy confirmed it would be documented with future officer training. He also recommended acquiring a backup meter to prevent disruptions if one unit is unavailable. Pearson asked



about alternatives, such as a decibel-measuring app, which Herlihy said could be explored, though calibration requirements would need to be assessed.

The board agreed to revisit the matter at the next meeting (Nov. 12) after pricing options for new meters are gathered.

Montgomery finalizes caboose acquisition

The Village of Montgomery will soon receive its own shiny, vintage caboose similar to the ones at Maybrook and Campbell Hall. While the date is unconfirmed, the board agreed to transport the newly acquired train car to the village's entrance on 17K during its November 5 meeting.

The board opened the meeting by recognizing Tony Marano, a resident and World War II veteran who turned 100 years old on November 8. Marano is a long-time community member who actively participates in the Maybrook Railroad Museum, the Maybrook VFW Post 2064, and the Village of Montgomery's ZBA. In celebration of his life and accomplishments, the board gifted him a special village sweatshirt.

"Tony Marano will be 100 years old. He is a World War II veteran, one of the original soldiers who unveiled the Veterans Corner sign, he's been with the Maybrook Railroad Yard for 40 years, and he's an icon in this village," said Mayor Mike Hembury. "On behalf of this board, we salute you."

Following the opening announcements, Hembury provided an update on the village's new caboose, a project he initially brought up earlier this year. Around June, Hembury and his wife Sue bought a caboose from the Port Jervis rail yard for one dollar; the train car currently sits in Campbell Hall and will be transported to the village through the Middletown & New Jersey Railroad. Hembury assured residents that the transportation process would be completely free, though the village would need volunteers and donations for refurbishing the caboose's interior.

"Going back about four months ago, my wife acquired a caboose from Port Jervis. The caboose was given to us for one dollar, and it will be transported here for nothing. The caboose was transported to Campbell Hall, it's sitting there now, and Middletown & New Jersey will transport it to the Village of Montgomery," Hembury said. "Brian Fitzpatrick is looking into refurbishing the inside, we're looking for people to do that. It's not in the way of any electrical or water lines, and it'll be a nice addition to the entrance of the village. Something nice, something free."

Hembury motioned for the village to relocate the caboose to Route 17K near the Montgomery Water Works. The board passed Hembury's request with

a 4-1 vote; Trustee Randi Picarello wanted to learn more about the village's plan to refurbish and pay for the caboose's interior, but the other board members felt they could figure that out along the way.

Later in the evening, Trustee Kevin Conero announced that the village will stream all of its meetings on YouTube instead of Facebook starting on Tuesday, November 19. These recordings can be found at youtube.com/@OfficialVillageofMontgomeryNY.

by the Valley Central High School Pep Band, and an opening prayer from Pastor Rick Bruschi of Freedom Road Bible Church. This year's master of ceremonies was Jim Grismer, a retired FDNY captain, who welcomed everyone to the dedication and introduced the speakers throughout the afternoon.

"Today, we honor the men and women of the United States Armed Forces for their service and sacrifice. Generations of American service members have courageously secured and maintained our freedom, beginning with the Continental Army in 1776," Grismer said. "Originally, Veterans Day was called Armistice Day, going back to World War I. It was conceived as a tribute to the Armed Forces members who sacrificed their lives in WWI and was signed on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month."

Steve Neuhaus, Orange County Executive, and Mike Anagnostakis, OC District 17 Legislator, discussed the impact of U.S. veterans and active duty personnel, emphasizing the sacrifices they make to uphold freedoms in not only America but the entire world.

"At the end of the day, when something goes south around the world or someone needs help, whether it's a humanitarian crisis or a war, they don't call Moscow, they don't call Beijing, they don't call these other countries," Neuhaus said. "They call us, and the men and women that wear the uniform step up, represent us, and make us proud."

"I think we should be celebrating veterans every single day of the year, doesn't matter what day it is. We owe everything we have to veterans; all the freedoms we have and all this nation is due to the veterans," Anagnostakis said, "Never have so many owed so much to so few in the history of this country. At any given time period, only 1% of the population has served in the military, and yet they've garnered everything that we have in this nation."

William Sestrom, a U.S. Army veteran and charter board member of Hudson Valley Honor Flight, recounted his experiences with the latter organization, including its

formation 14 years ago after he met the late co-founder, Steve Nicoli.

"In 2010, I got a visit from a young guy named Steve Nicoli. He walked in and asked me for 50 bucks; he wanted to get a bus, take World War II veterans to Washington DC, and show them their memorials. Before the first flight, it was a bus ride, and we had our first meeting at The Thayer Hotel in West Point," Sestrom said. "To this date, we have taken over 3,000 veterans, probably around 3,200. I went on the last flight myself, and I can tell you it's life-changing for all of us."

Walden Trustee Becky Pearson listed the veterans who were added to Veteran Memorial Park's brick dedication. These included U.S. Army Veterans Norbury "Skip" Chambers, Jason C. Fries, LeRoy Fries, Donald Little, John H. Manning, Douglas Luke Millsaps, Colonel John L. Roman, Carol S. Weeks, and Laurence L. Winum: U.S. Marine Corps Veterans James Francis Decker Jr., Charles Thomas Millsaps, Christine Harrington Millsaps, Robert Ossentjuk, and Jedediah Roman Winum: U.S. Navy Veteran Randy A. Noguera; and U.S. Air Force Veteran Jackson Winum.

Christopher Spencer, a Valley Central JROTC Army instructor and U.S. Army veteran, explained the significance of the poppy flower. Following World War I, poppies began sprouting all across Europe due to the abundance of lime from the wartime rubble, becoming a symbol of a soldier's bravery,

resilience, and sacrifice. Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, a late Canadian poet and physician, popularized the poppy's symbolism in his 1915 poem "Flanders Fields."

The ceremony concluded with a closing benediction from Reverend Nicole Hanley of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, followed by group photos and refreshments. The celebrations continued into the afternoon at St. Andrew's with a chili lunch, where church members discussed veterans' mental health and the post-service struggles they go through. Nathan Parker, a U.S. Marine Corps veteran, explained that many veterans who lack

social support experience feelings of shame, a major component in veteran suicide rates, and he emphasized that communities need to show their support for their veterans.

"You experience shame, and you've demonstrated that to the group. The group says 'No, it's okay, you're forgiven,' and you're welcomed back into the group. Usually, there's some sort of informal ceremony around that or something that makes you feel welcome again, and the feeling of shame goes away," Parker said. "What happens when you're not welcomed back to the group? The shame becomes internalized, you sit with it, and you stew with it again and again over a long period of time, and that's what leads to suicidality."

Arthur Lee, a fellow Marine Corps veteran, presented the Missing Man Table, a display adorned with several items in remembrance of veterans who never returned home to their families. These individuals are known as POWs, prisoners of war, or MIAs, missing in action.

"Each item on this Missing Man and Woman Table represents the emotions and feelings reserved for those who have not come home," Lee said. "The chair is empty, the seat remains unclaimed at the table. That is a lot to take in and for us not to forget. But that's the reason why we have this table so that we don't forget those who sacrifice."

Smoke, fire and the dangers that linger

he tragic death of Dariel Vasquez, an 18-year-old parks employee killed while fighting a wildfire in Sterling Forest, highlights the escalating danger of wildfires in the New York metro area. Vasquez was responding to the Jennings Creek Fire in Orange County—a region grappling with a severe drought that has set the stage for a series of destructive fires. The tragedy serves as a stark reminder of the deadly stakes for those on the front lines and the toll such conditions can take on our communities.

Wildfires are not just a concern for the West Coast; they are becoming an increasing threat in the Northeast as well. The dry spell gripping New York has primed the landscape for fire outbreaks, and recent blazes around the metro area have only underscored the gravity of the situation. Even in areas not traditionally susceptible to wildfires, drought conditions create a tinderbox, where a single spark can turn into a devastating blaze, putting lives, property, and entire ecosystems at risk.

The rains that finally arrived on Sunday night offered a brief reprieve, but this has been one of the driest autumns on record. The grav haze of smoke and the odor of fire engulfed our region Sunday

Governor Kathy Hochul rightly commended the bravery of state employees risking their lives to control these fires. But as Vasquez's tragic death demonstrates, that sacrifice comes at a high cost. In his role as a parks and recreation

may have written about this already, in some form, but it would have been so long ago you are not going to remember either.

By this time last year, the yearly task, the task at hand, was finished. It is time to plant the garlic. ${\rm I}$

plowed and disked the garlic field, but that is as far as I have gotten. The garlic is cracked (the heads broken into their cloves) and I have found my ingredients for the pre-planting soak, and the seeds final inspection will take place when they come out of the rinse.

I am picking stones from the dirt of the same field I was picking them from when I was eleven. Picking stones, cleaning the field, getting them into the bucket of the skid-steer and dumped onto a pile on the southern hedge row. I like stones, I've built a lot

of things from stones. My house. Fireplaces, walls, patios. I've been inside the Pharaoh's chamber in Cheops' pyramid, climbed the steps of the Temple of the Moon at Teotihuacan (the Aztec site north of Mexico City,) slept a night, alone, in the Temple of Ur in Petra, walked Roman roads, the Knossos stone road, spent an afternoon in a conical stone shepherd's hut on the piedmont of the Italian Alps. All stone. Studied the Castros of northern Portugal and Galicia. All being the stonework of men, of our human past. Stone. Rocks. I have found Native American arrowheads right outside the back door of my cabin.

It's here, the stonework. It's no secret what man could do. Amateurs are amazed that such diverse stonework the world over can look so similar, they think it must have been done by the gods, or aliens, when in reality, to a mason, there is always a rational, human explanation, a way, even with tools

as simple as sand, string, or a copper bladed axe. The Egyptian stonemasons lived together in villages near the great sites, and evidence was left that they liked to party, and their beer was, no doubt, superior to our stinking Bush-league, aluminum tasting wee. Stones, stones everywhere. The Earth itself is a stone. Still forming, but a rock. What? The third rock? The Third Rock from the sun.

I'm old now, to tumble the big ones, but there are techniques and lifting is the least of it. My fingers in the soil to grab the cobbles are covered in thin dust. The field is dry, no measurable dampness in over a month. The air is full of smoke from wildfires on two sides of the village, and the woods below the field is filled with grey smoke, greyish white, you can see it moving. I told my wife to keep a keen lookout around the house. The smoke isn't coming from fires in Canada anymore, but from fires right here. It might rain tonight. I hope. Some rain on the soil, some moisture in the soil, will make the final tilling before planting cleaner, more productive, less loss to the wind.

We pried the biggest stones out with a large bar and a couple round-point shovels. Each plowing reveals different subterranean clunkers and when a plow blade meets an immoveable object, the blade of the John Deere plow pops backwards to prevent breaking the blade, or the rest of the plow, and I have to say, long gone John Deere, a blacksmith by trade, sure built the finest equipment. I don't know how old my three bottom plow is -- I bought it from my family's estate, it was Pop's -- but it is the finest earth cutting tool ever invented. Some of the green paint is still flaked to the steel and I polish the blades, the plow sheers, with lithium grease when I am done - as taught. Whenever I am on the tractor plowing, I can't help but think of potato farmer Jack Hoeffner and his big flat fields and how he loved plowing. He loved plowing. Flipping that soil. How clean it made everything. How it buried those weed seeds. Brought up minerals.

The field slopes to the west and catches the afternoon sun and from the higher spots I can see the mountain, Sam's Point and Cragsmoor and the

rest of Shawangunk ridge, both gleaming white from the cliff faces, or green, or pink and purple, like today, the leaf cover down. And at the end of the field, the highway, and across the highway, our roadstand and woods and greenhouse, far enough away to be quiet.

I am picking up stones and I can smell the earth on my dungarees and in the air and I can smell the approaching rain and I remember being in this field as a boy and the tractor and the stone bolt and my brother and father, the three of us walking across the field picking stones left behind by earth's history, tossing them onto the stone bolt. This time of year, too, and then unloading the stone bolt to the point it could be turned over and then the ride home on the stone bolt like a snow sled, a Radio Flyer, soon to come, and home to the white house down the lane, green framed by spruce and vew. And in the house, it was almost dark now, and Mom had supper cooking and I remember it was white potatoes with pan-fried pork chops and a Waldorf salad. You see, I have written this before, just like this, before, Long before.

ascientific claim that, since Peanut wasn't showing any symptoms of rabies in Mr. Longo's Instagram posts, he wasn't. So, apparently, some meatball doing a "simple Google search" from miles away is a diagnostic tool that overrides any veterinary expertise on the scene? I should again think the logic regrettably simple in this case that, if an animal not known to have received a rabies shot but potentially vulnerable to infection bites a human, that animal needs to be tested for rabies. Even if the only way to do it is sectioning its brain. Here, actually, a "simple

Google search" will yield a plenitude of horrific detail about the course of a rabies infection in humans if not treated promptly (Spoiler: Once the symptoms appear, you will die slowly).

The game was an 80-minute defensive battle, but Boffalo provided the game's only successful offense with about 24 minutes to go in the game.


"I just had a great pass to me," Boffalo said. "I looked at the goal, and was like, 'I need to shoot. This is my chance.' And then I did it."

DeGeorge certainly did her part, winning both of the Bushmen's first place finishes. She won the 200-yard freestyle with a time of 1:58.86 and then shaved three seconds off her 500-yard freestyle event to win that event with a time of 5:17.32.

"It means a lot," DeGeorge said. "Last year, I was a section champ in the (200-yard individual medley), but this year to be a two-time section champ feels good."

She will represent the Bushmen at the New York State Federation girls' swimming and diving meet on Nov. 22 and 23 at the Webster Aquatic Center in

The Bushmen were coming up the ranks during most of the meet and finally caught up, tying the New Paltz Huguenots after the 100-yard back-
