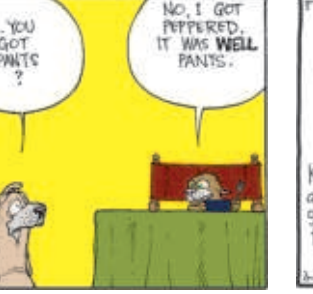

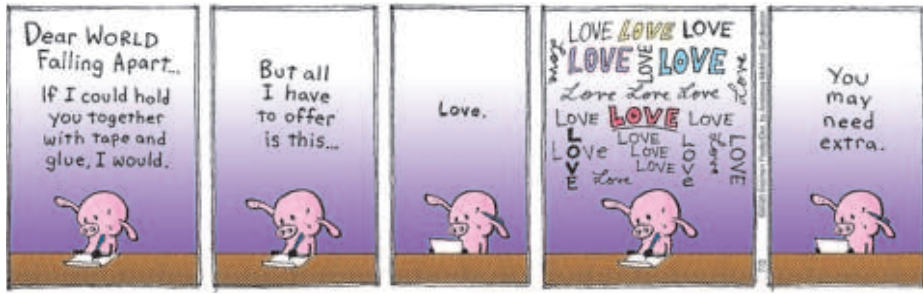

Business in Focus:

Clancy Holt's Fishing Guide Business on State Route 12 Has Been at it for 64 Years

FISH ON: Holt, a Redding, California Native, Moved His Guide Business to Lewis County 35 Years Ago

Every year growing up Clancy Holt and his family would spend two months camping on the banks of the Sacramento River near Redding, California to fish for salmon every day.

They would tie salmon on a rope through their gills, stake it to the ground and keep them alive for four or five days until they had enough to can with a pressure cooker.

"I got good at it," Holt said. "As I got to my early teens, I got very good at it."

One day, in 1955, when Holt was 16 years old, a man walked up on their camp site and asked if any fish were around. Holt's father told the man to walk down to the bank and pull on a rope staked to the ground. The man pulled on the rope, which had a 40-pound salmon tied to it, was splashed with water and nearly pulled into the river.

The man asked Holt's father if he would take him fishing. He politely declined but offered to have Holt take him if he paid Holt money. The

man asked how much.

"I said, 'I don't know. Nobody ever paid me to catch fish,'" Holt said. "My dad said, 'Give him \$5 and he'll catch you a salmon.'"

Holt took the man about a half mile down the river in the family's boat and pulled into an eddy where he knew a bunch of salmon were. Holt threw out his line, hooked a salmon and handed the pole to the man who fought it and landed it. The man was ecstatic.

"He says, 'That was fun. I want another one. How much?'" Holt said. "I said, '\$5 more.'"

Holt made \$15 that day. It was prior to any guide licenses in California. Soon Holt began taking people on trips from daylight to 11 a.m., then working in a grocery store from 1 p.m. to 9 p.m. Within a year, in 1956, he had established Clancy Fishing and has been guiding full time ever since.

Holt, now 81 years old, has led

thousands of fishing trips in his 61-year career as a guide, and Clancy Fishing has moved from Redding all the way up to state Route 12. He's guided the entire Pacific Northwest, from the Sacramento River to northern Washington, and has even led trips for salmon in Chile, South America.

"I've been guiding for a lifetime," Holt said.

He stopped guiding trips three years ago at 77 years old, and now has a staff of four guides, including his son, Ron Holt, as well as Steven Hammond, Richard Hassett and Blair Johnson. Now Holt books the trips, arranges the schedules, meeting locations and so forth.

Clancy Fishing's website says the business has guided more than 10,000 trips, but that hasn't been updated in years, Holt said. Clancy Fishing keeps three guides busy most of the year and clients come

from as far away at Latvia.

"I don't know how many thousands and thousands of clients that Clancy Fishing has guided since it's been in business," Holt said. "I have no idea."

The business has 10 boats, ranging from 26 feet that are used for big rivers, like the Columbia River, down to 18 feet that are used on smaller rivers, such as the Wynoochee River and the Satsop River.

Clancy Fishing guides trips for mainly salmon, steelhead, sturgeon and Kokanee lake trout. The most requested fish by his clients are winter and summer steelhead, fall king and silver salmon and sturgeon.

Holt discovered Lewis County while on a vacation from Redding. He was on his way to Alaska to check out the fishing up there but had to make a pitstop when he reached southwest Washington.

"As I got into Washington, I saw

all the rivers and opportunities," Holt said. "Every 10 miles there was another river you could go fishing on."

He checked maps and noticed all the lakes in southwest Washington, then saw the amount of rainfall the area receives. Fishing at that time was excellent. Plus, there were steelhead in nearly every river and no size limits on sturgeon at the time.

"The Cowlitz River was probably the best river in the northwest," Holt said. "The Columbia River was full of fish."

He stopped in Lewis County and just fished for a while. It didn't take him long to realize there was no need to go to Alaska. He went back to Redding, packed up all his belongings and set up his headquarters along state Route 12.

For a time, he didn't need to go anywhere other than the Cowlitz River for nearly 365 days a year, barring a storm. Eventually he started hitting the Columbia River, too.

There were fishing opportunities everywhere," Holt said. "You could take your clients fishing every day knowing they had a good chance at success. But it's not that way anymore."

When Holt first arrived in Lewis County, he looked at the pristine waters and an abundance of fish and figured it would stay that way for as long as he was around.

"I thought, 'Nobody can ever destroy this resource, with all this beautiful country, water and fish,'" Holt said. "I was wrong. Man's doing a good job. They're wiping this resource out."

Salmon are still on the decline in the state, even after \$1 billion spent over the last 20 years on salmon recovery programs, according to the 2018 State of the Salmon report by the Governor's Salmon Recovery Office.

Salmon habitat is being decimated by the construction of roads and housing and commercial development. Coho salmon being caught have dropped from nearly three million fish in 1976 to less than 500,000 in 2017, according to the Washington State Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW).

The Cowlitz River, which used to be one of the crown jewels of salmon fishing in the state, now has three hydroelectric dams on it that cover up native spawning beds. Historically low numbers for Chinook salmon have prompted the closure of fishing for them in the Cowlitz

River in 2020.

"Poor management from the WDFW and very poor goals," Holt said. "They're slowly wiping out every run of fish that we have in the state. Washington could be the fishing capital of the world, and Lewis County could be the hub of that if we just managed and developed our resources properly."

Holt is still making the most out of the current fishing situation in the state, and there are still nice fish to be caught. His business books clients from all over the world and he has at least one guide on the river nearly 365 days a year.

"You do that by treating your people good and keeping them safe," Holt said.

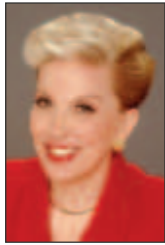

Dear Abby

DEAR ABBY: I divorced my wife 20 years ago, leaving behind two daughters. My older girl was 5 when I left, and due to my ex's lies, I wasn't able to see them.

When my older daughter turned 18, she contacted me. She confessed that she had been forced to lie in court, and we reconnected. At 19, she came to me pregnant. She asked if I would take her baby and asked that I tell no one, especially her mother. I agreed.

Last year, my daughter died in a car wreck. My granddaughter will turn 4. Should I go against my daughter's wishes, tell my ex and risk her taking her? Or should I let things remain as they are? My current wife and I are the only people who know. — SECRET IN VIRGINIA

DEAR SECRET: I urge you to discuss this matter with a lawyer because there may be legal ramifications. Your former wife has demonstrated she is the kind of person who would force a child to lie in a custody matter. Having done it once, she's capable of doing something equally underhanded. I am trying hard to come up with a reason why you should go against your daughter's wishes and disclose this to your ex, and I cannot think of a single one.

DEAR ABBY: Am I awful because I don't sympathize when people put their business on the internet? For example, I read some comments on YouTube, and this woman was talking about how "all men cheat." I told her maybe it's just all the men she opens her legs to. My account was suspended for a week because of it.

Another time, a man was talking about how none of his many kids talk to him. I asked what he had done to them that none of them speak to him, and he got mad. Abby, I'm not looking for trouble. I feel that if you can't take someone not kissing up to you, stop putting your business

out there. Am I wrong? —

STRAIGHTFORWARD IN THE WEST

DEAR STRAIGHTFORWARD: I think so. When traits were handed out, it appears someone forgot to give you a filter. I agree that some people overshare online and doing it comes with a risk. However, your comments weren't helpful; in fact, they were cruel. When a bee stings, its prey tries to swat it away, and that's what's happening to you. To avoid trouble, curb your impulse to comment, or be prepared to deal with the consequences that are sure to follow.

DEAR ABBY: I have been married for seven years and have two beautiful children. My husband and I both work full-time, yet I do almost all of the household chores. I have asked him repeatedly to help ease my workload and stress by dividing the chores more equitably, but my requests are met minimally and temporarily. This has caused arguments, tension and resentment.

He says, "You and I value different things," or, "This isn't what I want to focus on at home," or, "Your standards are too high and have negatively impacted your relationship with our kids." I do ask our kids to clean up routinely because I want them to be active members of this household, and this is how I was raised.

It's putting a strain on my marriage and affecting my feelings toward my husband. Do I need to let this go? Or are my priorities misplaced? — OUT OF BALANCE IN RHODE ISLAND

DEAR OUT OF BALANCE: From your husband's perspective, why should he have to help with the housework if he can jawbone you into doing the lion's share? Perhaps you should offer him a choice — participate more or someone will have to be hired

to take some of the burden off your shoulders.

As to your children, please stick to your guns. It is important they master basic housekeeping skills so that when they become adults, they will be able to take care of themselves. Few children relish the idea of doing housework, but many of them do it anyway as a way to earn an allowance.

DEAR ABBY: I was happily married to the same woman for 51 years. "Jane" was married 42 years to the same man. We were both widowed. We hooked up and were enjoying our time together, but after about three years it all changed.

Do you believe in split personalities, the Jekyll and Hyde thing? Jane started falsely accusing me of having affairs with other women. The last two women she accused me of being involved with I don't even know. The accusations have been coming more frequently. One day she's fine; the next day she is accusing me.

Jane doesn't like vulgar language, and normally she doesn't use it. But when she's accusing me of communicating with these women, she uses words that would make a sailor blush! When I asked him if he could please step 6 feet away, he became even more hostile and accused me of asking in the wrong way.

I go for a walk every day for exercise and to shop for necessary groceries. I have experienced people in aisles coming very close to me. I step aside to give space for others. Generally, most people are careful, respectful and even give a thank-you. This man was aggressive for no reason. What should I have done other than just walk quickly away? — THREATENED IN OAKLAND, CALIF.

DEAR THREATENED: You did the right thing. I seriously doubt the person worked in or even near a hospital, because if he did, he would have taken the proper safety precautions. In these stressful times, people sometimes act out over perceived slights. With someone so angry, aggressive and clearly looking for trouble, the right thing to do was to get away as quickly and safely as possible. The man was lucky the store management didn't eject him.

Train to nowhere

Sci-fi thriller series 'Snowpiercer' journeys through an artificially frozen wasteland

It can be hard to imagine a completely frozen-over Earth in the middle of a sweltering July, but that is the catapult of the story behind the new sci-fi series, "Snowpiercer." A new episode airs Sunday, July 12, on TNT.

The last surviving humans on the planet all boarded the 1,001-car-long, super-speed train, Snowpiercer, before the Earth became inhospitably cold after an ill-advised attempt to cool the effects of global warming went horribly wrong. At the final boarding call for passengers, people without tickets rushed the train, violence broke out between those desperate for survival and the guards of the Snowpiercer, and a handful of those desperate souls staked their claim on the final carriage of the train, becoming Snowpiercer's "Tailies."

Subjected to abhorrent treatment under a strictly enforced class system, the Tailies are given the bare minimum necessary to survive. They are fed disgusting, constantly shrinking rations and treated as less than human by those who enforce the status quo. Tailies with special skills are selectively chosen as needed to ascend through the train for whatever jobs need doing for the upper classes, and those that are returned to their home car bring with them intel about the rest of the train.

Seven years into the train's never-ending journey, Tailies have banded together to organize a revolution to force their oppressors to improve their living conditions. Andre Layton, portrayed by Daveed Diggs ("Blackish"), is the leader of this revolution, and when he is unexpectedly plucked out of the last car to investigate murders in the upper classes, the Tailies enact his planned takeover without him.

As a former homicide detective, Layton investigates a series of murders that the First Class was wholly unprepared to handle. Layton is surveilled at a distance by the mysterious head of Hospitality, Melanie Cavill (Jennifer Connelly, "Labyrinth," 1986), and more directly by Brakeman Till (Mickey Sumner, "Low Winter Sun"), a security enforcement officer who is saved from the bloody uprising by Layton.

After watching him leave them, other Tailies involved with the revolu-

tion splinter over whether they believe Layton will return to their car after his work in the upper classes, or if he will remain there, having had a taste of a better life and forgetting the bigger goal of creating equality among all classes of passengers aboard the Snowpiercer. Without much knowledge of the 1,000 cars beyond the one they call home, the Tailies are forced to push forward in the hopes of gaining ground in an essential carriage and holding resources hostage as a bargaining tactic.

The Tailies aren't the only characters in "Snowpiercer" secretly constructing a strategy for change. Cavill is calm and stern whether she's dealing with

the concerns of First Class passengers or explaining to Layton the intricate balance that must be maintained in order to grow a perfect strawberry onboard the Snowpiercer, obviously suggesting he read between the lines and recognize his place as a member of the lowest class of passengers. It is clear that Cavill has more up her sleeve than she is letting on while she has her Hospitality jacket on; when she returns to her quarters at the end of her day to literally and figuratively let her hair down, she is greeted by a poster of chess strategies.

If "Snowpiercer" sounds familiar to you, that may be because the series is a reboot of the 2013 film of the

same name that starred Chris Evans during a rare break from portraying superhero Captain America in the Marvel Cinematic Universe series of films. The movie takes place 17 years into the train's run and references past Tailie uprisings that may be the ones we see unfold in the series.

That film was itself an adaptation of the 1982 graphic novel "Le Transperceneige," by Jacques Lob and Jean-Marc Rochette. The film's director and screenplay writer, Bong Joon-ho, also wrote the screenplay for the 10-episode "Snowpiercer." Bong received three Academy Awards for his 2019 film "Parasite": Best Film, Best Director and Best Original Screen-

play. That film, like "Snowpiercer," is a sharp examination of the classist structure of society and the violence and deception it often takes to ascend beyond the class you happen to be born into. In "Parasite," being poor is a stink that you just can't wash off, and in "Snowpiercer," you'll always be sent back to where you came from when the upper classes have gotten what they want from you.

All aboard the Snowpiercer! Class warfare is erupting, and you're either part of the revolution or you're the one facing it from your First Class train. Do not miss the penultimate episode of "Snowpiercer," airing Sunday, July 12, on TNT.

"Outcry" Season 1

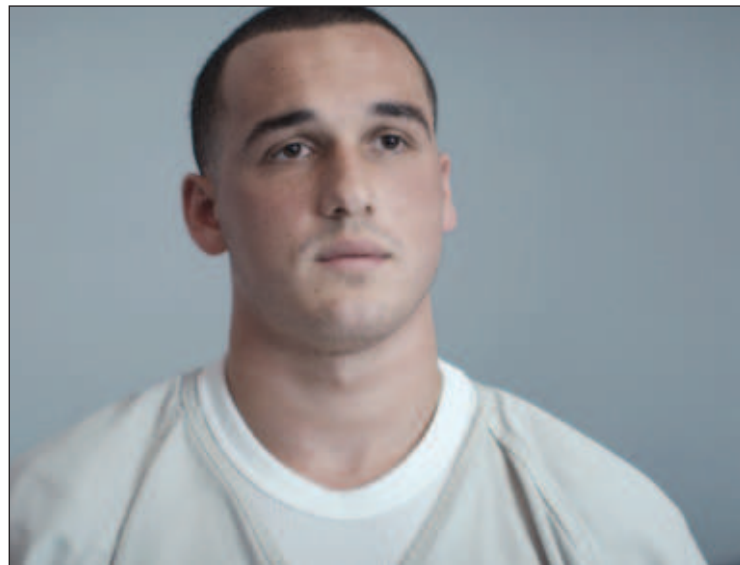
The freshman season of this Showtime docuseries lands on Hulu on Sunday, July 5. The five-part series focuses on former high school football star Greg Kelly, who seemed to have everything going for him as he entered his senior year in Leander, Texas. When he was accused of sexually assaulting a 4-year-old boy, Kelly's life began to crumble, and in 2014, he was convicted of the crime and sentenced to 25 years in prison without the possibility of parole. What followed was a roller coaster of events that this series documents and presents to viewers in a compelling way. Kelly spent more than three years behind bars as his family, community and legal team rallied around him in an effort to uncover the truth and expose the holes in the case against him. As you watch this series, you'll be shocked (and outraged) by some of the twists Kelly's case takes, a case that tore a community apart and changed some families forever. "Outcry" was supposed to premiere at the SXSW Film Festival back in March, but like so many things this

year, the festival was canceled due to the global coronavirus pandemic. This is a well-made, thorough documentary series, and it's a story you won't want to miss. Binge the entire first season of "Outcry" when it premieres Sunday, July 5, on Hulu.

"Palm Springs" (2020)

Don't miss the premiere of this unusual romantic comedy when it comes to Hulu on Friday, July 10. Andy Samberg ("Brooklyn Nine-Nine") stars as Nyle, a carefree man attending an upscale wedding in Palm Springs where he meets Sarah (Cristin Milioti, "How I Met Your Mother"), the bride's (Camila Mendes, "Riverdale") reluctant maid of honor. When he jumps in to save her from her own increasingly awful toast, the two begin to bond, and they inadvertently disrupt the wedding proceedings. 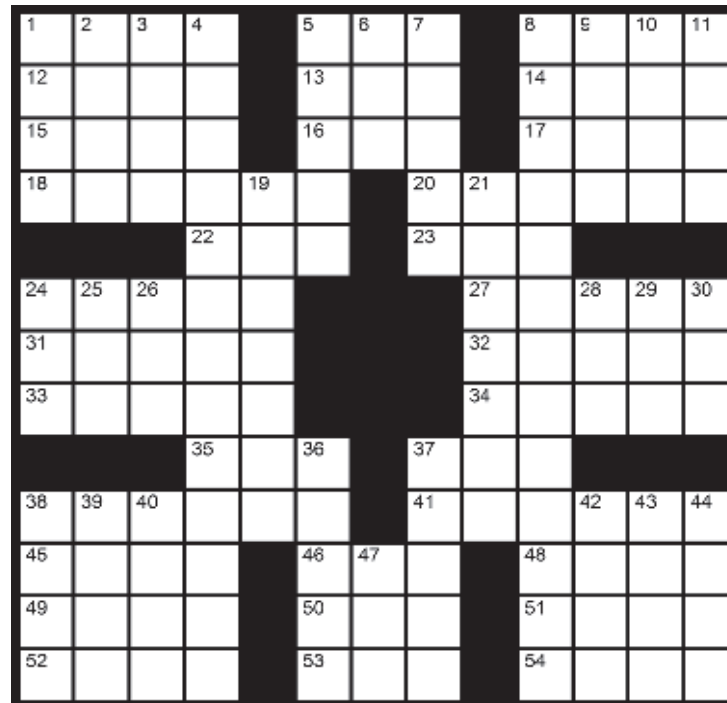

Based on the graphic novel of the same name by famed comic book author Greg Rucka ("Batwoman"), the film follows Andy, Booker (Matthias Schoenaerts, "The Danish Girl," 2015), Joe (Marwan Kenzari, "Aladdin," 2019) and Nicky (Luca Marinelli, "Don't Be Bad," 2015), who have been protecting the mortal world for centuries while managing to keep the fact that they are unable to die a secret. "Japan Sinks: 2020"

Q: Will there be another season of "Archer"? I feel like we've been waiting for a while now.

A: I struggled to think of a reference to one of "Archer's" million running jokes to use here, but none were suitable for a respectable, family-friendly TV column. (I can't even use "I had something for this ..." because that's usually prefaced by a swear word.) So I'll just say it outright: Yes, there will be another season, but it's been delayed.

Season 11 of the consistently profane cartoon comedy was originally scheduled for release on May 6, but the coronavirus happened.

The show's network, FX, announced at the beginning of April that it would "shift the premiere date to later this year."

"Later this year" covers a lot of ground, of course, and there's been no news since. But at least we know it's coming. In the meantime, we just have to be patient.

I mean, who are you, Samuel Watson – inventor of the stopwatch? (Ha! I found a reference I can use.)

Q: Did the boy who played Charlie Bucket in the original "Willy Wonka & the Chocolate Factory" ever do anything else?

A: Peter Ostrum didn't do any other screen work after "Willy Wonka & the Chocolate Factory" (1971), and that's fine with him.

Ostrum was 12 years old and doing some small-town theater work, with no grander acting ambitions, when he was spotted by a talent agent scouring the country for an actor to play Charlie. He got the role, turned in a shockingly good performance for someone so inexperienced, and then left the business. He was offered a three-picture deal but turned it down.

He has been incredibly publicity-shy ever since, and so his exact motivations aren't a matter of public record, but he has said that film stardom just wasn't a life he wanted, and that he's happy with his choice.

These days he works as a large-animal veterinarian in New York state and he loves it. He avoids talking about his "Wonka" role, except once a year to a grade-school class in his area. He indulges them in their questions about the choc-
