# Converging on the Capitol

## Area leaders take issues to Madison

MADISON - Business, industry and education from Wisconsin spent a recent afternoon taking their top issues directly to those in the best position to do something about them state lawmakers.

Centergy hosted Central Wisconsin Days April 4-5 in Madison, featuring 30-minute sessions with area lawmakers or their representatives at the state capitol.

"The reason why we host this event is for the opportunity for our business community to really have a voice down here at the capitol," said

Centergy President/CEO Angel Whitehead. "We're one of the only groups that do it, and if we're not telling our legislators what's happening in our communities and how our businesses are being impacted or hurting, who's going to tell them? We need to bring those voices down here," she added.

Centergy has hosted the annual event for nearly two decades. This year, nearly 100 residents met with lawmakers to inform them about current high-priority, public policy issues that impact economic development in central Wisconsin, namely housing, childcare, and tax reform.

An overwhelming need for childcare was identified by the groups. A shortage of childcare has left many parents/guardians with no other option than to remain home to care for their children, and not return to the workforce postpandemic.

"You really have to plan your childcare before you even plan to have a baby because it's two years before you can get any childcare for a baby nowadays," said Karen Olson, Development Director for the Marshfield Area Chamber of Commerce & Industry, as she and other Marshfield business and education representatives met with Sen. Jesse James (R-23). "The people we talk with, they have enough

teachers probably right they - maybe on the other now, but they don't stay in the (work) force for long," Olson added. "It needs to be looked at as a career. They are teachers of our young and we need to look at that as a sustainable career with benefits and good pay teaching our young, so that

spectrum of life - stay out of the judicial system, which costs us way more."

Olson and the other Centergy advocates asked for additional grants for the Child Care Counts: Stabilization Payment Program, which allows

eligible providers to receive ongoing monthly payments, providing the financial stability they need to stay open, to recruit and retain qualified staff, and to continue providing highquality care for children.



# United Way to distribute emergency money **Federal funds target Wood County**

WISCONSIN RAPIDS -- United Way of South Wood & Adams Counties is the fiscal agent for an award of federal funds made available through the Department of Homeland Security (DHS)/Federal Emergency Management under Agency Emergency Food and Shelter National Board Program (EFSP).

Wood County has been chosen to receive \$13,342 (Phase 40) to supplement emergency food shelter programs in Wood County. Non-profit, faithbased organizations and local government agencies providing food, shelter and supportive services in Wood County are eligible to apply for funding. Applications are available contacting Stefanie Drexler at stefanie@ uwswac.org or 715-421-0390. The application deadline

is 4 p.m., Friday, May 5. Under the terms of the grant from the National EFSP Board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: Be private voluntary non-profits or units of government; Be eligible to

a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI). Agencies applying (UEI) and a Federal Employer Identification Number (FEIN); Have an accounting system; nondiscrimin-Practice ation: Have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs; If they are a private voluntary organization, have a voluntary board.

A local board comprised of representatives from county government and local human services agencies will review the applications and distribute funds awarded to Wood County. The local board has distributed Emergency Food and Shelter funds previously to Soup or Socks, St. Vincent de Paul, and The Wisconsin Rapids Family Center. Past EFSP participation is not a requirement.

#### **Important: Unique** Entity Identifier (UEI) Requirement

All agencies participating in the Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP) must provide their Unique Entity Identifier

for these federal funds must have a UEI. The National Board used the DUNS previously, but the DUNS is now obsolete and is not acceptable for entities receiving federal funding. The federal government stopped using the DUNS Number to uniquely identify entities. Now, entities doing business with the federal government or receiving federal funds must use the UEI created in the System for Award Management

(SAM.gov). If your entity is registered in SAM.gov, you already have your UEI, and it is viewable in SAM.gov. Remember, you must be signed in to your SAM.gov account to view entity records. All SAM. gov registrants have been assigned their UEIs and can view them in SAM.gov.

# Election results verified

MARSHFIELD - There will be no changes in the results of school board and city council races, following recent verification and recount efforts for both.

The Board of Canvassers for the Board of Education of the Marshfield School District convened April 11 in the conference room of the Board of Education office located at 1010 East Fourth Street in Marshfield, for the purpose of verifying the vote count for the School District Education Board of elections and referendum held on April 4.

While there were slight changes in the numbers, the results themselves did not change.

Most attention was given to a school board race which saw incumbent Mark Konrardy reelection by just 13 votes, holding off challenger Nicole Forst, who finished in third place in a four-way race for two board seats. Following the verification process by the Board of Canvassers. Konrardy actually gained two votes and won by 15 instead of 13. Forst had until 5 p.m. on Friday, April 14 to file petition requesting a recount, but no such filing was made prior to the deadline, so the results have now become official.

Tara Tremelling was the top vote-getter among the four candidates, and she

Dan Neve, who finished last in the four-way contest. Officially, Tremelling received 4,509 votes, while Konrardy - after picking up two additional ballots received 4,323 votes. Forst picked up 4,308 votes, while Neve got 3,762, after he also picked up two additional votes during the Board of Canvassers' verification process.

Meanwhile, one closest races in Marshfield's history has been solidified, following an official recount of the ballots from election day.

Andrew Reigel has now officially won the District 10 council seat being given up by incumbent Peter Hendler. Vote totals from the election initially indicated Reigel defeated Bonnie Andres 257-255. Andres requested a recount following the Board of Canvassers' April



will replace incumbent April 13 recount process, held in the Common Council chambers at City Hall, the results of the race were exactly the same.

> "This was my first recount, so it was a learning experience," said City Clerk Jessica Schiferl, after the recount process ended. "I think it went really well. It showed that on election day our poll workers are doing the jobs that they need to do. We didn't see discrepancies in our poll books or in our absentee logs," Schiferl added. "As we handcounted all of the ballots today, the machine counted everything exactly as we hand-counted. I thank all of the poll workers who made the election day go smoothly and I hope that this helps voters feel a little more comfortable in the election process."

The spring election voter turnout in the city limits of Marshfield was 59 percent.




# Marshfield 150 for 150: Very Reverend Hugh J. Deeny

NOMINATED BY JOSEPH C. FISCHER, EVANSVILLE, ILLINOIS

"Bishop, that's a big order . . . I'll take it and with God's protection and your help we can do With that comment first principal of Columbus High School, the Very Rev. Hugh J. Deeny, accepted the challenge to build a replacement for St. John's two-year junior high. From that meeting on Sunday evening, June 12, 1949, on through to the groundbreaking, the laying of the cornerstone and finally the dedication, Deeny Father never gave up the huge task of building a new school while still caring for a large parish, St. John's.

The official announcement of establishment Columbus High School was made on January 16, 1950, by His Excellency, the Most Reverend John P. Treacy, Bishop of La Crosse. The sponsoring of the project was left to Reverend Hugh J. Deeny, pastor at St. John the Baptist Parish. Following the first formal announcement of the proposed new school. planning pushed ahead, and on April 22, 1951, the ground was broken by Father Deeny for the structure. The cornerstone was laid on Aug. 18, 1951, by Bishop Treacy. Final dedication of the milliondollar building was made on Sept. 14, 1952, and the class of 1952 was able to hold its graduation ceremony in the newlyconstructed auditorium.

His interest in the school which he built, with the



assistance of ten area congregations, did not end when he "graduated" from the principal's job during the 1953 commencement exercises. It ended, rather, with his death, June 30, 1955, in an automobile accident near Milwaukee, which also claimed the life of E. M. Lee, local businessman.

The Most Rev. John P. Treacy, Bishop of La Crosse, at the funeral Mass read for Father Deeny, dedicated the auditorium in his memory. It is now known as the "Father Hugh J. Deeny Memorial Auditorium" in memory of the man who built and established Marshfield's Catholic high school.

Two days after Father Deeny's death, the editor of the Marshfield News-Herald penned the following tribute which appeared on the editorial page of the July 2, 1955 newspaper:

prodigiously throughout his pastorate here. In his work, he had time to participate in civic affairs whenever called upon. And in his associations with the young people of his own faith or other faiths, he endeared himself to all who came to know him.

High School. He labored

"One can only speculate what was in store for him had Father Deeny been spared to continue his religious labors, but there are those who long ago predicted he would go far in his church, based on his accomplishments here. His organizing ability was evident in the results he accomplished. In church and school, his accomplishments stand for many years as a monument to the highlyproductive five years of his pastorate here.

"Here is a man whose church will miss him sorely and whose community will mourn the passing of a fine citizen, the kind of man we can ill afford to lose. In this simple testimony of his worth, we believe we bespeak the overwhelming sentiment of all the people of Marshfield."

Today, nearly 68 years later, those who knew Father Deeny during his time in Marshfield, whether as a pastor, teacher, principal, fellow citizen, remember him fondly with high regard.



gonna challenge. I'm not gonna lie," Sen. James told the group. "There are people that feel that this is something that should've never been governmentsubsidized, and it's created a sustainability issue, and now we have to answer for it," James added. "We have not had the discussion on the Senate side yet regarding Child Care Counts."

"We hired (Bowie) from California, and it took him eight to nine months to find housing. We waited that long for him to get here. He just couldn't find anything, even from the rental side of things, but certainly a house, which is what he really wanted," Olson said. "So, that put us behind in getting that organization going. We had funding and everybody was ready, and they kept saying, 'Why isn't it happening?' It was because our director from California - which was a good transplant to bring into Wisconsin - couldn't find housing," she added.

"The city sees it as an issue and they're doing as much as they can. They started subdivision because we're years behind. This should've been looked at a long time ago, and I think other areas are finding that as well."

group Olson's of Marshfield business, industry and education representatives encouraged legislative efforts increase the annual amount of low-income tax credits certified by WHEDA, with 35 percent set aside for rural communities with populations under 10,000.

'There's legislation being worked on right now that is strictly focused on the housing issue, so I think those will be rolling out here soon," Sen. James told the advocacy group.

revenue formula for local governments, which is driving more and school districts more and municipalities referendums, to things like maintaining curriculum, programs and proper staffing levels. Coincidentally, the meetings with lawmakers came the day after voters rejected referendums in both the city and school district of Marshfield.

"As soon as I knew that those referendums lost, I said the reason that these lost is because people don't want to see their taxes at the local level go up," said Rep. Donna Rozar. "So. we've got to step up to the plate at the state to go back to supporting a lot of these programs, which we did in 1911, when we initiated the income tax," said Rep. Rozar. "Ninety percent of that money went back to local municipalities when the income tax was initiated in 1911. We are down to about eight percent," she

Aside from Sen. James and Rep. Rozar, Centergy advocacy groups were also able to meet with Representatives Nancy VanderMeer and Katrina Shankland, along with Sen. Patrick Testin.

"I'll be following up with the legislators we met with, see what kind of bills are out there, what's happening on the floor at this time and what are our next steps so we can keep advocating for these issues and making an impact," Whitehead said at the end of the day.



MARSHFIELD Wildwood Zoo has announced the arrival of "Willow," a female red fox.

Willow is a year-old, marble morph fox with a white coat and unique markings. was initially kept as a pet and transferred to Wildwood Zoo when her living situation needed to be adjusted. She was not a candidate for being released, as she was too habituated and reliant on humans, and she could not survive on her own.

Willow remained "off exhibit" for the past month to acclimate to her new caretakers and clear her quarantine period. She has proven to be an inquisitive, playful, and easygoing individual. She is a bit shy, but she is adjusting well to her new exhibit. Willow's situation coincided with the passing of Blizzard, the senior arctic fox, and she is fortunate to call Wildwood

world and the largest of the true foxes. They are typically about three feet long and two feet tall with a red-orange coat, white belly and throat, whitetipped tail, and black ears and legs. They have a long, narrow snout and large, pointed ears. Their proportions vary with their ecosystem; desert-dwelling foxes are taller and lankier with thinner coats, while foxes from colder places are shorter, stocky, and fluffy. They make a range of vocalizations, from soft huffs and whines to loud coughing sounds (called gekkering), barks, and screams. Families will often stay together and share a territory, which may overlap with other families' territories.

There is considerable variation in the color morphs of red foxes. Natural coloring ranges typical reddishfrom orange to shades of yellow and tan, nearly white, or almost entirely black. Silver foxes are the most common morph in North America, with a predominantly black coat and silver mottling across

While there have been attempts at domesticating foxes, true domestication has yet to be achieved. Even foxes meant to be companion animals still retain their wild instincts. They are loud, smelly, destructive, and likely to escape if not kept in a proper enclosure. Foxes are also very mouthy and communicate extensively using their teeth. Despite the growing popularity and demand for pet foxes, they do not make good pets.
