

Legally ensure your family can make health decisions for you

Who do you want making decisions if you can't speak for yourself-family or a stranger?

Did you know your spouse, adult children, or next of kin don't automatically have the right to make health care decisions for you? It's a shocking truth that surprises many Wisconsin families: If you become seriously ill or injured and can't speak for yourself, your loved ones might have no legal authority to make medical decisions on your behalf without proper documentation.

Through April 25, 2025, the State Bar of Wisconsin is offering their guide, "A Gift to Your Family: Planning Ahead for Future Health Needs," as a free PDF download at wisbar.org/healthcare.

"Without a Power of Attorney for Health Care, your family can be forced into costly and time-consuming guardianship procedures just to gain control over a loved one's medical care," said Jon Fischer, an elder law attorney with McCarty Law.

Ben Adams, a retired attorney, said, "The court process can be avoided in most cases if you do advance care planning.'

The 24-page downloadable guide includes practical information about powers of attorney, living wills, and organ donation, along with state-approved forms that make documenting your wishes straightforward. The State Bar offers this resource annually during

Merrill-Go-Round celebrates 50 years of innovative community transportation

The Merrill-Gothe staple of Round. public transportation in Merrill, celebrated its 50th anniversary on Monday, April 21, 2025, with Mayor Steve Hass and other local dignitaries boarding the bus for a commemorative ride along the original route.

"I want to thank everyone for coming," said Mayor Hass prior to boarding the bus for the ride. "This is the day of the 50th anniversary of the Merrill-Go-Round in the city of Merrill. ... That's a feat ... We're doing doorto-door pickup five days a week." He noted few cities offer that kind of service.

The celebration included Mike Ravn, who along with Joanne (Sazama) Andress, won the naming contest for the bus service back in 1975. While Andress was unable

Honor Flight Mission #51: What took you so long?

James (Jim) K. Campbell, Jr. of Wausau is the Co-Founder and Vice President of Marketing for the Never Forgotten Honor Flight, Inc., and a retired Lt. Col. with the United States Marine Corps. These days, one of the first things he asks veterans on these flights is, "What took you so long?

Many who completed the Never Forgotten Honor Flight Mission #51 on April 14, 2025, "have waited 15 years to apply!"

"It's your turn!" he said. Campbell shared that he often hears the same responses time and again, when he asks the question. But those who do finally sign up for a Never Forgotten Honor Flight often become a source of encouragement for other veterans to do the same. He said there are five common reasons veterans give for not signing up.

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"About 50% of the qualified veterans-those who served prior to May 7, 1975-haven't signed up or flown on their Honor Flight," Campbell said.

He wants veterans who haven't vet participated in this opportunity to know:

1. "I don't deserve it" Because "I wasn't in combat."

Only 1 in 11 military personnel were combatants-yet every job mattered. "The 1 didn't fail or die because of the 10 who

At the cutting edge of public transportation

"Merrill's been at the cutting edge of transportation, this little city of Merrill," said Ravn. "There was a little blurb that we were the second city in the state of Wisconsin that had trolley service. And I think we were one of the first, if not the second or third, that did this deviated bus route."

Merrill has a long history of being an innovator in public transportation. In 1890, Merrill became the second city in Wisconsin, after Appleton, to offer trolley service to residents. At that time, service was provided via a system of steel rails embedded into the streets, with electricity supplied via an overhead wire that made contact with the trolley car by way of a long spring-loaded pole on the roof of the trolley (also called a streetcar) via a small wheel or slider, to conduct electricity into the motor of the trolley.

One of the first in the country and first in the state to innovate on rubber tires

But Merrill has been making headlines transporting residents via bus-like motor vehicles on wheels far longer than

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
require the expense of trolley rails. It was one of the first such trackless trolley cars in the United States and the very first in Wisconsin "or anywhere in the northwest." [Source: May 8, 1913, The Merrill Daily Herald.]. Merton Carpenter, who formerly was a motorman for the Merrill Railway & Lighting company on the railcars, was hired as the first operator of the new trackless trolley car, according to the May 3, 1913, edition of The Merrill Daily Herald.

Service began on May 6, 1913, and ran from the "end of the western terminal of the regular car system, at the foot of Cottage avenue, and conveys passengers as far west as Emmerich & Staats store [the corner of Foster St. and W. Main St. today] in the Sixth ward, thus making an extension of about one-half mile," another newspaper article confirmed. And while it still utilized overhead wires to provide electricity to the motor, it made Merrill and the Sixth Ward quite famous at that time, with Merrill's trackless trolley being featured in "moving pictures" and magazines later in 1913 as one of the "oddities of Wisconsin."

Merrill went completely off the rails

When the trolley barn burned down in 1925, the City went completely off the rails, switching to motorized bus service that did not require tracks, local historian and City of Merrill Alderperson Michael "Gus" Caylor said. Years later, the City even subsidized a taxi service

to provide transportation for elderly and disabled residents.

The roots of today's Merrill-Go-Round trace back to 1973. Cavlor said. when Dolores Kelly, an advocate for the elderly, convinced the City to provide limited bus transportation for residents with special needs. The service, initially called Dial-A-Bus, began in April of that year with Dan Caylor as the first driver.

"The first Dial-A-Bus in '73 was operated for elderly and disabled," said Caylor. "When they started the Merrill-Go-Round itself in '75, that's when it got opened up" to the general public.

A growing need warrants a new name

the need for As transportation grew within the community, a batteryoperated bus was planned, but it needed a name. That led to the contest that Ravn and Andress won with their "Merrill-Go-Round" submission.

Coordinator Transit Brandy Brandt noted the significant role the service plays in the community today.

"The Merrill-Go-Round is dedicated to serving Merrill residents with pride and commitment," she said. "As a unique on-demand response transit system, we provide curb-to-curb service tailored to the needs of our community."

"Annually, our system facilitates approximately

55.000 rides, serving clients ranging from prekindergarten students to senior citizens," Brandt said.

Monday's During commemorative ride. Brandt demonstrated features of the modern including buses. accessibility options for riders with wheelchairs or mobility challenges.

"With the old buses, you could only fit like three people down here," said Brandt, explaining how the current fleet design has improved accessibility on its lower level in the middle of the bus. "A lot of the elderly couldn't make the stairs, and now this opens up six more seats, having it on both sides." She demonstrated how the seats raise and lower to

accommodate wheelchairs and/or riders without wheelchairs.

The Merrill-Go-Round operates five days a week, a change from its initial schedule. Caylor noted that "When the bus started, it served seven days a week," though with more limited hours than today's service.

According to Caylor, currently the funding for the Merrill Transit system is primarily provided by the federal government, which contributed 82% of the budget in the most recent

supported them," Campbell said. "It's the 99% of the population who didn't wear the fabric of our nation's military who don't deserve it."

2. "I've been to D.C. before"

"All who've been there and then flew on an Honor Flight say the same thing," Campbell explained. "'It's like I was never there!'"

Family vacations, reunions, duty assignments in D.C., or even going as a guardian don't compare. "Most of the existing memorials hadn't even been built when you were there before," he added. And surprisingly, "Seeing the memorials doesn't even make the top three list of veterans' most liked experiences on an Honor Flight."

3. Medical conditions

"If your doctor approves, we will take you," Campbell said. Some veterans express concern, saying things like, "I don't walk so good..." But Campbell reassures them: "We've taken veterans with no legs. They didn't walk at all!"

4. Anger

Many veterans especially those who served in Korea and felt ignored, and those who served in Vietnam and felt blamed for the war—feel this way, Campbell said. "BUT, all who felt this way got closure after going on an Honor Flight."

5. "I don't want to relive my experiences"

"Your mind is like a photo album; you won't ever forget what you experienced," Campbell said. "But the Honor Flight experience helps keep your mind's photo album closed more than it's open. Nightmares disappear. There's closure after five or more decades."

Eligible veterans should apply now

"Never Forgotten Honor Flight recognizes you for your sacrifices and achievements by flying you to Washington, D.C., to see YOUR memorials at no cost," the application site reads. The goal is to provide veterans with a safe, memorable, and rewarding experience—with an emphasis on closure and healing.

"For what you and your comrades have given to us, please consider this a small token of appreciation from all of us at Never Forgotten Honor Flight," the site adds. Currently, applications are being accepted for WWII, Korean War, and Vietnam War veterans. Priority is given to:

- WWII veterans


- Veterans with a terminal illness

- Followed by Korean War veterans, then Vietnam War veterans

All veterans who served honorably are eligible for an Honor Flight if they served on Active Duty, Active Reserves, National Guard, or Inactive Ready Reserve (IRR)—in any branch of service—before May 7, 1975.



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APRIL LAW OF THE MONTH: WORK ZONE SAFETY State Patrol urges drivers to be patient and avoid distractions to keep highway workers safe

Construction season is approaching, which means crews will soon be out fixing and building roads and bridges. Drivers have one of the biggest roles in keeping work zones safe for construction crews.

The Wisconsin State Patrol's April Law of the Month encourages drivers to help create a safe space for crews who work on and alongside the road.

"Construction crews and county highway personnel often work within feet of traffic," said Superintendent Tim Carnahan said. "These people need to be able to rely on drivers to do their part to ensure a safe work zone. The Wisconsin State Patrol is working to combat unsafe driving in work zones with the help of troopers on the road and overhead with our Air Support Unit. Last year, we issued over 7,000 citations and warnings for traffic law violations in work zones."

Speeding, following too closely, and distracted driving cause most workcrashes. These zone crashes are preventable. According to preliminary

data for Wisconsin, there were 2,174 work zone crashes in 2024, resulting in 10 fatalities and 779 injuries. On average, that is one work zone crash every three hours.

Work zone safety tips

Driving safely and slowly through work zones will protect workers and motorists. Wisconsin's laws further protect road workers, with penalties for traffic violations doubling in work zones.

Do your part to keep work zones safe with these tips:

• Buckle up, phone down. Eliminate

distractions. State law prohibits the use of handheld electronic devices in work zones, except to report an emergency. Looking down for just 5 seconds at 55 mph takes a driver's eyes off the road for the length of a football field.

• Plan ahead. Leave

early or take an alternate route when construction is anticipated. Know before you go with 511 Wisconsin. Download the 511 Wisconsin app or call

5-1-1 for the latest travel information across the state.

• Expect the unexpected.

Speed limits may be reduced, traffic lanes may be shifted, and crews may be working on or near the road.

• Keep your distance. Rear-end collisions are common in work zones, so give yourself extra space. • Be patient. If you don't see workers, that doesn't mean they're not there. Always be watchful for workers and vehicles throughout the work zone. Move over or slow down for stopped emergency vehicles with warning lights activated. The Move Over Law requires drivers to move out of the lane closest to a maintenance worker or emergency responder. If you can't move over, slow down. • Use the zipper merge strategy when lanes are reduced; take alternating turns to merge. 


