Western Week in Scottsdale:

Scottsdale Parada Del Sol Historic Parade and Trail's End Festival Returns!

s part of Scottsdale's Western Week, Scottsdale Parada Del Sol Historic Parade and Trail's End Festival Kick Off 2022. This February, the 68th annual Parada Del Sol Historic Parade and Trail's End festival unite Scottsdale's present with its past, giving the community a fun and entertaining event.

Now being managed by the Scottsdale Charros, which had a hand in the parade's humble beginnings, the event also serves as a signature part of the city of Scottsdale's Western Week.

This annual celebration provides an opportunity to educate visitors and residents alike of the area's rich history woven with cowboy, Native American and Western cultures that have made an instrumental impact on the way the city has evolved to date.

Much like the parade and festival, Western Week has become an interactive and engaging way for the city of Scottsdale to celebrate its past and recognize the people that have helped shape the city's rich history. There are a multitude of events that encompass Western Week.

The Scottsdale Gallery Association's Western Week themed Gold Palette ArtWalk kicks off the signature celebration with a specially themed ArtWalk from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 3. During the event, art and history lovers can peruse the streets of the Scottsdale Arts District as they enjoy live entertainment.

Participating galleries will also be hosting individual artists' receptions and highlighting Western and Native American artists and artworks.

On Friday, Feb. 4, the 64th Annual Hashknife Pony Express rides into town!

In honor of this historic event, Western Spirit: Scottsdale's Museum of the West hosts a free celebration from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. outside the museum, featuring live entertainment from bands, line dancers and authentic Native American hoop dancers, food trucks, activities for the kids, a presentation about the History of Hashknife at 10 a.m., and free admission into the museum.

At high noon, guests can welcome the


Hashknife Pony Express riders as they complete their more than 200-mile historic horseback ride from Holbrook, Arizona to deliver more than 20,000 pieces of U.S. mail.

A multitude of events take place Saturday, Feb. 5, beginning with the 68th Annual Scottsdale Parada Del Sol Historic Parade and Trail's End Festival. Early that morning, guests will start lining the streets of the parade route — from Drinkwater Boulevard along Scottsdale Road, finishing at Brown Avenue and Indian School Road — to watch more than 120 entertaining entries including colorful floats, horseback riders, marching bands and more.

This year's parade theme is "Back in the Saddle" after events due to COVID-19 derailed the parade last year. Local celebrity and businessman Dan Harkins of Harkins Theatres will serve as Grand Marshal of the parade.

The parade culminates at noon with the Trail's End festival, a gigantic western-themed block party that takes over the

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streets of Old Town's historic district.

The party goes on until 4 p.m. and features three live stages and a jam-packed entertainment line-up including popular local bands such as Mogollon, Raun Alosi, the Herndon Brothers and Dan Harkins' band, Union Rock, as well as traditional performers as well as arts, crafts and merchandise booths, food trucks and beer vendors, a massive kids' corral with inflatables and mechanical rides. Guests can also enjoy a pre-

sentation by Scottsdale Mayor David D. Ortega.

Also on Saturday, Feb. 5, the Arizona Indian Festival takes place along the West Lawn of the Scottsdale Civic Center Mall.

This two-day festival serves as an opportunity for tribal tourism to raise awareness about Arizona's indigenous communities through fun, engaging and delicious experiences. Honoring the Arizona Indian community, the event features traditional arts and crafts, entertainment, foods, innovations and trends in cultural experiences.

Following the festival on Saturday,

Feb. 5, recognition of Scottsdale's vibrant native cultures continues in the most tempting way with the Arizona Native Edible Experience, an evening filled with native chef prepared foods and cocktails and demonstrations, live performances, a silent auction, and interactive conversations.

Held at Western Spirit: Scottsdale Museum of the West from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m., the event's guests of honor are Veronica and Denise Homer of the Miss Indian Arizona Association. Recognized for their auspicious and important work for the association and their legacy work in tribal communities throughout Arizona and

Indian Country, Veronica and Denise have created experiences for young Indigenous women of Arizona that continue to nurture and create positive social, educational, political and economic impacts in their respective communities and the public as a whole.

On Sunday, day two of the Arizona Indian Festival takes place until 4 p.m., wrapping up Western Week 2022. Chiappetti grew up attending the Parada Del Sol parade with his father, a Lifetime Charro, from the time he was just two years old and has ridden in the parade with the historic Hashknife Pony Express for 21 years.

Dennis Robbins

While many people may look fondly upon the parade for its lively entries and beautiful horses, it may have never crossed their minds how the streets were so clean after all the horses clomped through!

The community has Robbins and the Cocopah pooper scoopers to thank for this valiant duty!

Robbins has come a long way from that role, but he is still heavily involved with helping the parade become a success in any way possible.

Gary Shapiro

Gary Shapiro has been involved

with the Parada Del Sol since 1971 when it was managed by the Scott-sdale Jaycees. At the time they were the key organization behind the Parada Del Sol rodeo and parade. In 1981, he became Parade Chairman and in

1990 he was honored to serve as a Parade Grand Marshal.

Since becoming a Charro in 1991, Shapiro has advocated for the Charros taking over Parada Del

Sol as a natural transition of leadership and manpower and was part of the early strategic meetings with the civic partners to make it happen.

Shapiro has fond memories of his experiences with the Charros and the Parada Del Sol, calling the city of Scottsdale itself a close-knit community in those early years:

"It was a little like TV's 'Andy of Mayberry' in that it seemed like everyone knew everyone, we were all neighbors, we all displayed a sense of western hospitality, and we promoted our town as The West's Most Western Town," he says.

ose Leon is an active member of the Scottsdale Charros, a board member of the Parada Del Sol Foundation and is the Parada Boss for the 2022 Scottsdale Parada Del Sol Historic Parade.

But being granted the "great power" of Parada Boss comes with great responsibility — one Leon does not take lightly.

According to Leon, the Parada del Sol Parade Boss "is in charge of the whole event and coordinates with the committee members to help execute the event."

Leon also oversees the important fundraising aspects of the event: "The previous committee enlisted the help of the Scottsdale Charros to elevate the fundraising efforts."

Leon has been an entry participant in the Parada del Sol with the Scottsdale Charros and prior to that with the Scottsdale Active 20/30 Club since 2011.

Over the past few years, he increased his involvement with the Foundation Board and the Parade Committee as Parada Boss. Leon loves that the parade has



such a long-standing history with the City of Scottsdale and that it serves as a kick-off to spring events and anchors Western Week for the city as well.

"After the Parada del Sol, we have other activities in Scottsdale and the entire Valley with events like the Phoenix Open and Spring Training. It's a great time to get together as a community," he says.

Being involved with these efforts has also given Leon a better perspective on serving the community. "I've traditionally given up my time to fundraise, but this event helps create great relationships with people that are extremely passionate about our Western traditions here in Scottsdale," he says, adding he believes the Scottsdale Parada del Sol Historic Parade is such a mainstay with Scottsdale residents because it has been a part of the fabric of the community since the incorporation of the City of Scottsdale itself.

"Many native Scottsdale residents grew up coming to the parade and continue to bring their families to enjoy a tradition that they enjoyed as children," he says.

"It also marks the beginning of events as mentioned before that create a huge inflow of travelers to the area for spring activities."

Leon is passionate about helping people recognize that the Parada del Sol itself is a charity and this marquee event that is free for the community also raises funds that go back to the charities in the local community.

"It's a win-win for everyone involved," he says, adding he's looking forward to helping the Parada del Sol resume after taking a year break due to the pandemic and to bringing folks from the community back together for this incredible Scottsdale tradition.



In fact, bringing public art to the city is a group effort. Istern Spirit: Scottsdale's Museum of the West has been an integral part of preserving Scottsdale's heritage and history since it opened its doors in 2015. It has been participating in Western Week for just as long—serving as the arrival destination for the riders of the historic Hashknife

Pony Express.

As the City gears up for Western Week 2022 including events such as the Scottsdale Parada del Sol and Trail's End Festival, Western Spirit: Scottsdale's Museum of the West takes center stage. A 501(c) 3 and a city-owned facility, Western Spirit plays an active role in many of the city's events that are designed to both entertain guests and educate them about Scottsdale's deep cultural roots.

"We represent all aspects of Western culture, and we feel it's very important to share and recognize our heritage and culture as well as the events that took place in Scottsdale and throughout Arizona in the past so we don't lose touch from where we came from," says David Scholefield, marketing and communications director of the museum.

In fact the museum's mission states it serves to celebrate the West and its importance by informing, educating, inspiring and engaging museum guests through high-quality exhibitions, educational programs and community outreach addressing regional history.

"The activities being undertaken with the city align very well with our mission and we hope to become a bigger, stronger partner in the future," adds Scholefield. Partnering with the city for events such as




Western Week and the Hashknife Pony Express also provides an opportunity for the museum to be further profiled within the community, bringing it to the attention of local residents and visitors as well as people all across the valley.

During Western Week 2022, the museum hosts the celebration surrounding the arrival of the 64th Annual Hashknife Pony Express on February 4 from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. The free event includes entertainment such as live music and performances, activities for the kids, food trucks, a presentation about the History of Hashknife at 10:00 a.m., and free admission into the museum. And, of course, the event provides "front row seats" for the arrival of the Pony Express riders

who, at high noon, will end their 200-plus-mile ride from Holbrook with more than 20,000 pieces of U.S. Mail in tow.

In addition to exciting events in collaboration with the city such as the Hashknife Pony Express celebration, the Museum of the West maintains an outstanding collection of both ongoing and limited-time exhibitions. One of the highlights of the museum's rotating exhibitions is most certainly in alignment with Western Week and will be on display through Spring of 2023. This exhibition, titled Light and Legacy: The Art and Techniques of Edward S. Curtis, celebrates the life of photographer, ethnographer and adventurer Edward Curtis and his tremendous contributions to the art and science of photography. Over the course of three decades, Curtis traveled the country visiting more than 80 Indigenous Peoples and creating thousands of images, audio recordings and the earliest motion pictures of Native Americans.

As a result of a partnership with Arizona Highways, the museum recently displayed an exhibition titled The Art of Our Photography, which featured the work of 10 artists that were given access to the magazine's extensive photo archive and invited to select any of the images Arizona Highways has published since 1925 to recreate through their artistic craft.
